Chairperson's Report

Museum and Gallery Services Queensland (M&GSQ) completed its second full year of operations in 2006.

One of the major achievements of the year was the recruitment of new members to the M&GSQ Board to bring it to full complement. Up until the company's second Annual General Meeting in April 2006, the M&GSQ Board membership comprised its four original Directors: John Walsh and Ross Searle, as appointees of company member Regional Galleries Association of Queensland (RGAQ); and Frank McBride and Denise Neville, as appointees of company member Museums Australia through its Queensland branch (MAQ).

Ross Searle retired from the RGAQ Board at its AGM in March 2006 and consequently stepped down as Director on the M&GSQ Board. RGAQ appointed Richard Baberowski to the position.

The M&GSQ Board had been actively seeking to recruit three Independent Directors as provided for in the company's constitution. These positions had been vacant since the establishment of the company in October 2004. Candidates were sought from a broad range of fields in order to complement and enhance the skills and experience of the Board members. At the company's Annual General Meeting on 18 May, three Independent Directors were appointed to the Board:

- Cr Julie Boyd, Mayor of Mackay, Mackay City Council.
- Geoffrey Ewing, a consultant working in the areas of commercial and projectbased negotiations. Geoffrey also has a background in law and the mining, energy and building industries.
- Sarah Perrott, Manager of Corporate Public Relations at the Queensland Museum.

In June 2006, Frank McBride and Denise Neville completed their terms on the MAQ Board, and consequently stepped down as Directors on the M&GSQ Board. MAQ appointed Lisa Jones and Gillian Ridsdale to these positions. Due to other

commitments, Gillian resigned from the Board in July and Michelle Smith was appointed in her place.

The M&GSQ Board met a total of eight times in 2006. During the year, the Board reviewed the company's resources and their ability to support its goals and strategic direction as outlined in the Business Plan and made further refinements to the company's staffing structure. The Board also reviewed the company's Mission and Goals preparation for the development of a revised Business Plan for 2008-2010. The M&GSQ Board worked closely with its member organisations, RGAQ and MAQ, to determine ways in which the three organisations can maximise their resources and expertise to the greater benefit of the sector.

My special thanks to the inaugural members of the Board who retired during 2006, Denise Neville, Ross Searle and Frank McBride, for their years of commitment, dedication and energy in seeing the company through its transition and initial period of operation. I welcome the new members, Richard Baberowski, Julie Boyd, Geoffrey Ewing, Lisa Jones, Sarah Perrot and Michelle Smith and thank them for their contribution to the company in the second half of 2006. I look forward to working with them again in 2007.

The Board would like to thank Executive Director, Suzannah Conway, and acknowledge the hard work of all the M&GSQ staff throughout 2006.

Museum and Gallery Services Oueensland develops its Business Plan for the next triennium, it will look to grow and develop the company's resources to enable serve constituents to its stakeholders with timely, relevant and innovative programs and services. M&GSQ will also look to advocate strongly for the sector and to support, promote and celebrate the outstanding work being undertaken in museums and galleries throughout Queensland.

Operations Report

In its second full year, Museum and Gallery Services Queensland's (M&GSQ) operations adhered closely to the goals outlined in the 2005–2007 Business Plan, across the following key areas:

- Industry and Advocacy
- · Information and Referral Services
- Training and Professional Development
- Exhibition Development and Touring

State and National Context

The company's 2006 activities took place within a context of change occurring at both state and federal level. In early 2006, Arts Queensland (AQ) announced its restructure, creating four new sector groups:

- Visual Arts, Craft and Design
- ♦ Dance and Music
- ♦ Theatre, Writing and New Media
- · Creative Communities

AQ also began work on developing The Oueensland Arts Industry Sector Development Plan 2007-2009, a planning document to guide government priorities and decision making for the next three years. AQ commissioned Museum and Gallery Services Queensland to undertake a Queensland Collections Sector Needs Survey to specifically identify relevant to the collections sector in Queensland — regional and community museums, galleries and keeping places with some reference to the role of libraries and archives. (See report on page 11.) During the latter half of 2006, AO began extensive consultation with the industry to feed into each of the sector plans.

At a national level, an historic gathering of State and Federal Arts funding bodies and their client organisations was held in Adelaide in March 2006 to report on the outcomes achieved to date under the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy (VACS), and identify further opportunities development in the visual arts sector. Organisations represented included contemporary art spaces, craft and design organisations, touring agencies, major events (Biennale of Sydney, Asia Pacific Triennial, Adelaide Biennial), magazines and publications, indigenous arts, new media and service organisations. The

meeting was positive about increased federal/state cooperation as achieved to date under VACS, but identified that the maintenance of current funding levels does not imply sustainability for the future and that more could and should he accomplished. **Participants** urged the Government to implement the recommendations of the Myer report, including its legislative recommendations, and suggested increases in line with the CPI to bring the next VACS funding round to \$18 million (currently \$12 million). Increased funding in the areas of visual literacy and art education was also called for. A further meeting of triennially funded organisations, focussing on Audience Development, took place at the Judith Wright Centre in Brisbane in December 2006, in conjunction with the opening of the Queensland Art Gallery's Asia-Pacific Triennial.

The Federal Arts Minister, Senator Rod Kemp, called a two-day meeting in Canberra in February 2006 to examine the current Visions of Australia program, which has been operating for over ten years. M&GSQ's Executive Director attended the meeting which looked at potential new models for funding a national exhibition program in the visual arts, museums and collections area.

The Executive Director also attended a one-day National Regional Arts Summit in Canberra in August 2006, convened by Senator Kemp to consider the future of regional arts funding, based on the outcomes of the policy document 2006 National Directions: Regional Arts.

Finance

Museum & Gallery Services Queensland's major income sources continued to be through funding derived from Queensland, the State Government's arts under fundina body, its Cultural Infrastructure Program and from the Federal Government's arts funding body, The Australia Council for the Arts through its Key Organisations program, M&GSQ also received funding through the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy, an initiative of the Australian, State and Territory

Governments. The triennial support received from both State and Federal governments provides M&GSQ with a stable operational base and allows the company to plan ahead with confidence to develop quality programs and services and new initiatives for the sector. M&GSQ thanks both Arts Queensland and the Australia Council for their continued support.

M&GSQ also derives income through its program activities, and has continued to find efficiencies in annual administration costs. In 2006, the Company achieved a small surplus of \$5,047 on an overall expenditure of \$697,150.

One of the key challenges for the company in 2006 was in dealing with increasing IT problems as the equipment inherited from the two member organisations continues to age. This issue will need to be resolved in 2007 and will be a significant financial consideration for the company.

M&GSQ Key Program Areas and Events Detailed information on the work

Detailed information on the work undertaken in each of M&GSQ's major program areas is included in this report. Also provided are reports on the company's key events for 2006 which served to promote and celebrate the achievements of Queensland museums and galleries and their workers — the second year of the Museums Alight! Program, aligned with International Museum Day in May 2006, and the third year of the Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards, hosted by the Queensland Museum in October 2006.

Marketing, Promotion and Sponsorship During 2006, M&GSQ sought opportunities to advocate for and to promote the museum and gallery sector and the company's role as its peak industry body.

In February 2006, a promotional mailout containing a new M&GSQ brochure and a flyer promoting M&GSQ's 2006 program highlights was distributed to all museums and galleries in the state.

The 2006 Museums Alight! program received greatly increased press coverage on the previous year, including seven radio interviews and eleven print articles including Brisbane's *Courier Mail* and *Sunday Mail*.

The 2006 Gallery and Museum Achievement Award winners were profiled in twelve print media, including the *Courier Mail* and *Sunday Mail*, and six radio interviews — four from Brisbane and two regionally.

This success was achieved due to a considerable push by M&GSQ staff to develop and distribute promotional materials, and represented a significant contribution of staff time. The M&GSQ Board and Staff recognise that this level of input is not always sustainable and that increased and dedicated resources are needed to realise the full potential of marketing the company's and the sector's activities.

Throughout 2006, a great deal of time and effort was invested by the Board and Staff in identifying and approaching potential sponsors both for program and project initiatives, and for the company as a whole. While this work did not show immediate results, it has raised the profile of the company in the corporate sector and has laid the groundwork for potential partnerships in the longer term.

M&GSQ was successful in its sponsorship application to Adobe for software to the value of \$3,000.

The business support and sponsorship for the GAMAAs continued in 2006 with both cash and in-kind sponsorship to the value of \$13,400.

For Museums Alight! 2006, support for the launch event was received from Museums Australia, Caxton Street Catering, Yalumba Wines and the Queensland Museum, while Avant Card produced and distributed promotional postcards at a significantly reduced cost.

Conclusion

M&GSQ achieved many successes in 2006 through quality delivery in its key program areas — meeting and often exceeding its goals and targets. The company continued to foster valuable partnerships within the industry and in the corporate sector, and received strong support from government.

The company maintained regular and critical consultation with its constituents and was a firm advocate for the sector on

issues such as funding, and also through significant research reports such as the Queensland Collections Sector Needs Survey.

This advocacy role will demand increased commitment by M&GSQ as further pressures are placed on the sector by diverse factors such as increased competition for shrinking resources, succession planning for volunteer-run organisations, proposed Council amalgamations, and the effects of the drought on community economies and tourism.

Along with its many successes, M&GSQ continues to face some of the same challenges that it has since its inception. The high expectations of the company must be matched with the resources to meet those expectations. The company's growth will rely upon increased resources to develop key areas of its strategic direction and to work towards effectively promoting the value of its constituent galleries and museums to their communities.

Museums Alight!

Museums Alight! was developed by M&GSQ in 2005 as a pilot event to celebrate International Museum Day and acknowledge the contribution ٥f Queensland's museums and galleries to our rich and dynamic culture. The event is an opportunity for museums and galleries in every region throughout Oueensland to showcase their collections and exhibitions to the public, while joining cultural institutions throughout the world as they recognise International Museum Day. In 2006 the theme for International Museum Day was Museums and Young People.

The 2006 campaign included a themed edition of Artery magazine, "Museums and Young People"; poster; post card; flier; and extensive mailout to the museum and gallery sector, Brisbane City Council local libraries, and local government representatives. A dedicated web page was created to visually link the promotional campaign to the M&GSQ website. Mayors in participating regions received a letter informing them of local events and inviting them to participate. Media releases were targeted specifically to each region highlighting participating venues.

Museums Alight! was officially launched by Dr Ian Galloway, Chairman of ICOM Australian National Committee and Director of the Queensland Museum, at the Queensland Museum South Bank on the evening of Wednesday May 17. The launch coincided with the final night of the

Museums Australia National Conference. An invited guest list of approximately 200 people was drawn from government, the museum and gallery sector and industry. The event included a cocktail party, entertainment and speeches from Lord Mayoral representative, Cr Judy Magub, and Acting Director General of Arts Queensland, Jenny Menzies.

Over 60 museums and galleries participated in the 2006 Museums Alight!— an increase on the 40 participants in 2005. Some regions coordinated events, such as Bundaberg where a city-wide tour included six venues, dinner for participants and a train ride. Brisbane's Living Heritage Network conducted a night tour for 34 participants who travelled to four key Brisbane heritage sites.

Museums Alight! received good media coverage in the *Courier Mail*, *Sunday Mail* and regional press along with a total of seven radio interviews in Brisbane and State-wide and some arts media.

Industry Partnerships

Museum and Gallery Services Queensland works with a broad range of industry partners to deliver its programs and services (acknowledged on page 26 of this report). Some of the key partners in M&GSQ's 2006 delivery included:

Brisbane's Living Heritage Network (BLHN)

In 2006 Museum and Gallery Services Queensland continued to provide office space and administrative support to the Coordinator of Brisbane's Living Heritage Network. M&GSQ and BLHN worked in partnership to develop and deliver two very successful workshops on Significance Assessment and Preventive Conservation.

Queensland Community Arts Network (QCAN)

Museum and Gallery Services Queensland combined services and resources with QCAN to support a group of people from Cherbourg in their bid to develop a significant cultural heritage program. Together with QCAN, M&GSQ applied for and was successful in obtaining a \$50,000

Arts Queensland project grant for *Beyond* the *Ration Shed*.

Museums and Galleries New South Wales (MGnsw)

M&GSO and MGnsw collaborated on the delivery of the 2006 Standards program, conducted in South-East Queensland and Northern New South Wales respectively. In 2006, M&GSQ and MGnsw worked across state boundaries sharing reviewers, planning and evaluation and producing the first Standards Community Directory. For the second year of M&GSQ's Standards Pilot, MGnsw continued to provide access to research, methodology and materials associated with the New South Wales Standards Program: sustainable community museums.

National Trust of Queensland (NTQ)

The National Trust of Queensland joined M&GSQ and QCAN as supporters of the Cherbourg Cultural Heritage Precinct project. M&GSQ assisted the National Trust of Queensland in their successful application with Cherbourg Aboriginal Shire Council to the Australian Government Indigenous Heritage Program.

M&GSQ and NTQ also collaborated to advocate on a range of issues affecting the heritage sector, such as funding guidelines and eligibility.

University of Queensland Museum Studies Program

M&GSQ supported the University of Queensland in the inaugural year of its Museum Studies Program through recruitment of participants from the sector for master classes and also participating as chair for some of the Program's key forums.

State Library of Queensland (SLQ)

M&GSQ partnered the State Library of Queensland to present *Peer Talk 2006: Reviewing Exhibitions — Divergent Notions of Treasure*, the sixth event in this series. M&GSQ also worked in partnership with SLQ on *Manhua Wonderlands*, a project for young people developed by SLQ and Multimedia Art Asia Pacific to explore the intersection between animation and video practices and contemporary literature formats. M&GSQ's involvement in the project was undertaken through its Visual Arts and Craft Strategy funding.

Gold Coast City Art Gallery

M&GSQ partnered the Gold Coast City Art Gallery on the *Stories of the Queensland Landscape* project, an education kit which links areas in the curriculum with works in collections to produce a resource for use in schools and to encourage students to visit regional collections. M&GSQ's involvement in the project was also undertaken through its Visual Arts and Craft Strategy funding.

Museums Australia (MA)

Following the devastation of Cyclone Larry in north Queensland in March 2006, M&GSQ worked with Museums Australia to raise funds at the 2006 MA National Conference for the rehabilitation of cultural sites affected by the disaster. After consulting with the north Queensland community as to the most effective use of the funds, eight diesel generators were purchased by MA for location in Cairns, Townsville (2), Innisfail, Cooktown and Malanda, and two in Darwin so that they can be moved quickly in the event of future emergencies.

Information and Referral Services

Publications

♦ Artery Magazine

M&GSQ's major publication, *Artery*, was published in May and December 2006. *Artery* is distributed to over 1,200 museum and gallery workers throughout Queensland and features programs, issues, exhibitions and new developments within the museum and gallery sector.

Articles are sourced from Queensland, Australia and internationally, with an aim to present and promote contemporary museum practice; inspire change and development; and to advocate on behalf of the Queensland museum and gallery industry.

May 2006: Museums and Young People

The content for the May issue of Artery was based upon the International Council of Museum's 2006 theme for International Museum Day, Museums and Young People. The lead article by Dr Barbara Piscitelli explored innovative programming for children and young people in Queensland galleries and museums. Other articles focused upon street art in Melbourne; a new exhibition of children's art from the Torres Strait; young people documenting their stories in Lebanon; a hip hop project between a Brisbane outer suburb and Scotland; and a new media project involving manga, anime, video games and DVD zines.

December 2006:

This issue of *Artery* included the first in a series of articles focusing upon the role of regional galleries and their collections. Other major articles reported on the activities being undertaken, at both state and national level, on the development of standards for museums. The issue also highlighted the significant stories being told by the Cherbourg Aboriginal Community in Queensland.

♦ source

M&GSQ published four issues of its newsletter, *source*, in March, June, September and December. *source* is distributed both in hard copy to constituents and on the website, and features industry news, information and resources, and updates on M&GSQ's programs, events and services, including a regular calendar of events.

♦ Update

Five issues of M&GSQ's exhibitions newsletter *Update* were published and distributed in February, April, June, September and December 2006, promoting M&GSQ's 2006 program and exhibitions available for tour.

E-Bulletins

M&GSQ's distributed over 100 e-bulletins and 40 group emails throughout the year to a recipient list of 361. The Information Officer devoted considerable time to enhancing this e-publication through regular research into funding opportunities, useful websites, employment opportunities and other information of relevance to the sector. The capacity for recipients to subscribe and unsubscribe to the e-bulletin was also added to the website.

Website

M&GSQ continued to develop and update its website throughout 2006, adding further resources and information such as expanding the guide to funding opportunities, and the introduction of Facts Sheets on a range of topics relevant to the sector.

The site comprises the following information areas:

News: A quick guide to new information and hot topics.

About Us: Staff contacts; list of Board Directors; and a brief Company history.

Publications: An overview of M&GSQ's publications including subscription and advertising information; fact sheets on industry subjects such as risk management, licensing and storage of weapons; data survey outcomes; and a Queensland exhibition touring venue guide.

Funding Opportunities: A comprehensive listing of metropolitan, state, national and M&GSQ funding programs.

Training and Professional Development: M&GSQ's program information; selected training resources; forum, seminar and conference papers; information on tertiary education opportunities; and downloadable forms for M&GSQ's devolved funding programs.

Awards and Special Events: GAMAA nomination forms and winner information; news on awards received by industry organisations and individuals.

Exhibition Services: Information on M&GSQ's touring exhibition program; links to other NETS agencies; copies of exhibition newsletter *Update*; and downloadable forms for TEPP.

Calendar: A searchable database of M&GSQ and external industry awards, conferences, forums, lectures, seminars, workshops, exhibitions, funding programs.

Museum and Gallery Finder: A searchable database of all public galleries and museums in Queensland.

Consultants and Suppliers Register: A searchable database of consultants and suppliers relevant to the museum and gallery sector.

Enquiries and Referrals

In 2006, M&GSQ staff responded to 1,138 enquiries from constituents via phone, fax, email, post and in person. Approximately 22% of these enquiries related to the Training and Professional Development area and 20% related to the Exhibition Services area.

During the year, M&GSQ staff also provided assistance in the areas of planning and design to:

- Caboolture Shire Council and architects of the proposed new cultural centre;
- Ingham Shire Council for its proposed new cultural centre;
- Atherton Shire Council for its proposed new cultural facilities;
- Architects Thom Blake and Robert Riddell for the museum/gallery spaces as part of the Conservation Management and Interpretation Plan for the Cherbourg Historic Precinct.

M&GSQ Training and Professional Development staff provided advice to Queensland museums and galleries wishing to apply for a Community Heritage Grant, including ongoing assistance to a successful applicant, the Longreach Archival and Research Group.

Staff assisted a number of member organisations of Regional Galleries Association of Queensland and Museums Australia Queensland with advice on appropriate avenues for advocacy on a range of issues affecting the sector.

Queensland Collections Sector Needs Survey

In early 2006, M&GSQ was commissioned by Arts Queensland to undertake a Queensland Collections Sector Needs Survey. The purpose of the study was to review and assess the current position of Queensland's collections sector (regional and community museums, galleries, keeping places and including some reference to the role of libraries and archives), to determine key issues and needs, making suggestions for the future direction and development of collections management in the State.

The Needs Survey aimed to provide input specifically relating to the museum and gallery sector into Arts Queensland's Sectoral Development Planning process, 2007–2009. Arts Queensland also consulted State-wide across government and with creative practitioners and arts organisations in all artforms during this period.

With a relatively short lead time to undertake the Survey and report back to Arts Queensland, consultant Anna Grega worked with M&GSQ staff to consult extensively with the sector. Focus groups were conducted in Far North Oueensland, Central Queensland, the Sunshine Coast, Downs and South-East Darling Queensland, involving 85 museum and gallery workers. In addition, comprehensive e-mail survev undertaken, as well as individual phone and email consultations and interviews with industry peers.

M&GSQ submitted the report of the Queensland Collections Sector Needs Survey to Arts Queensland in July 2006. Arts Queensland approved the release of M&GSQ's report to constituents in December 2006, noting that while the study forms the basis of the M&GSQ submission to the AQ Sector Planning process and that the work was supported by AQ, the recommendations reflect the aspirations of the sector — the members and constituents who were consulted in the process — and have not been endorsed by Government.

M&GSQ appreciated the considerable time and effort contributed by constituents in providing input into the study. It greatly assisted M&GSQ in representing the views and aspirations of the sector accurately and strongly to government.

M&GSQ also acknowledges Arts Queensland's support in providing this valuable opportunity for input. M&GSQ will be seeking to continue a dialogue with Arts Queensland in 2007 regarding the report's recommendations for the sector.

Training and Professional Development

M&GSQ Pilot Standards Program A joint program with MGnsw

In 2006, Museum & Gallery Services Queensland (M&GSQ) undertook second year of a Pilot Standards Program, funded by Arts Queensland. M&GSQ and Museums and Galleries New South Wales conducted the Standards Program as a joint program for community museums: M&GSQ working in South-East Queensland and MGnsw in northern New South Wales. The co-delivery of the Standards Program across boundaries was an exciting developmental and research tool — sharing reviewers, planning and evaluation. This Program, implemented by MGnsw and M&GSQ, supports community museums through a process of self review and industry feedback. It provides an opportunity for museums to assess their practices and against minimum standards developed for community museums.

M&GSQ gratefully acknowledges the support of Museums and Galleries New South Wales for the development of the Queensland Standards pilot through their generous provision of ongoing access to research, methodology and materials associated with the NSW Standards Program: sustainable community museums.

The six museums which participated from South-East Queensland were:

- Abbey Museum of Art and Archaeology
- Kingaroy Heritage Museum
- Landsborough Museum A Caloundra City Heritage Centre
- Logan City Historical Museum Society
- Queensland Ambulance Museums Wynnum
- Redland Museum.

In February the Queensland participants commenced the first element of the program, the Self Review Survey. In this step, a group from the museum spent four months working their way through a 35-page survey on four key areas of museum practice, guided by a detailed list of

references. The four essential areas of museum practice in this minimum standards program are:

- Museum Planning and Management
- Collections Management and Documentation
- Conservation Practice
- Accessibility and Public Participation.

The second major element of the program was undertaken by the Peer Reviewers who worked in pairs to conduct:

- Desk Reviews of the participant's completed surveys
- Field Visits to the participant's institution
- On-Site Review Visits to the participant's institution.

The Reviewers were invited to work with Museum & Gallery Services Queensland on the 2006 Standards Pilot for their capacity to represent the diversity of the museum sector and networks. All reviewers are very familiar with the day-to-day operations of small to medium museums. In 2006 the reviewers who volunteered their time for the Queensland program were:

- Lisa Jones, Curator, Queensland Police Museum
- Tamara Lavrencic, Collection Manager, Historic Houses Trust of New South Wales
- Dan Robinson, Retired Director, Queensland Cultural Heritage Program, Oueensland Museum

- Ken Smith, Past President of Hambledon Cottage
- Jan King, Director, Queensland Energy Museum

The reviewers participate across state boundaries with two reviewers, Tamara Lavrencic and Ken Smith, working with both MGnsw and M&GSQ. Two Queensland reviewers, Dan Robinson and Michelle Smith, also visited New South Wales museums. In 2006 a combined roundtable of New South Wales and Queensland Standards Reviewers was held in Sydney prior to the Field Visits.

Field Visits were a new addition to the joint program in 2006 in response to reviewers' feedback from 2005. The Field Visits enabled two reviewers and a M&GSQ representative to meet the museum personnel who are participating in the program, tour the museum, sight documents identified from the Desk Review, and provide practical advice on museum practice.

The On-Site Reviews were conducted by at least two reviewers and provided feedback to the museum on their achievements and progress towards the four key areas of museum practice. This visit had a strategic focus and the reviewers worked with participants on key planning issues affecting sustainability for the organisation and on developing an action plan to address the identified priority issue/s.

Stakeholders identified by the participating museums were invited to the On-Site Review and the final celebration event where certificates of participation were awarded by Ms Jenny Menzies, Executive Director, Arts Development, Arts Queensland.

A key outcome from the 2006 Standards Pilot Program has been the development of an improved media profile for participating organisations. These media profiles which include intriguing 'Did You Knows' on the Museum and its collection are available in full on the M&GSQ web site. Extracts are published in the 2007 MGnsw/M&GSQ **Standards Community Directory.**

Participating organisations identified the following outcomes from the program:

Improved procedures

Development of a procedure for monitoring the condition of artefacts currently on display so that a trained volunteer can monitor the displays and the artefact conservation status.

Strategic planning

Greater clarity on the future development of the Museum and its activities, including the development of a strategic plan by the Board and staff for the building of a new gallery.

Collection significance and marketingRefocusing on significant items in our collection, relating to the peanut industry, to develop and market the museum.

Relationship with Council

Through the program we have been able to portray to our shire council and community a degree of professionalism in the way the museum is managed.

Improved response from volunteers

This has been brought about by a change in structure, as well as involvement in the Standards program. It has assisted in empowering volunteers to take the reins.

Planning

News ideas for financial support have arisen from the drafting of an action plan.

Development of a strategic plan

Working through the process of developing an action plan we have begun to ascertain where we would like to be in the future.

Improved cataloguing processes

New members have trained on Mosaic and others are manually cataloguing and photographing enabling easy transfer to an electronic process.

New and improved policies and collection management standards

We now have a preservation policy to guide decisions between preservation and restoration.

Better planning documents

Our planning documents now reflect the language and principles of collection management.

Improved management structure

We developed a much more functional management structure for our organisation, relieving the management committee of most of the routine tasks which have now been delegated to functional managers.

Revised collection management procedures

We revised our procedures for collection management, and are introducing new procedures and training for object significance assessment and preservation.

100% of participants believed that participating in M&GSQ's 2006 Standards Program benefited their museum. They commented further:

- It has provided focus and direction.
- Gave us direction and strategies.
- A heightened awareness and knowledge of the requirements of museums the extent of the organisation and management details required. A deeper focus on the needs of the museum that have not yet been able to be fulfilled.

- Helped us to understand and focus into another direction.
- It assisted in providing goals for volunteers.
- We have had the help in seeing what we were doing wrong and what we should do to overcome it.
- Great method to review our museum practices.
- It has focused us on an action plan to improve our processes and become more significant to our community.
- Having nationally developed and recognised standards to introduce has given a huge amount of credibility to the process of formalising the management of ... heritage. It has also given us the leverage for heritage to be considered a strategic issue and important in the set of corporate governance framework...

In November 2006, six of the participating organisations from M&GSQ's 2005 Pilot Standards Program met to review progress on their Action Plans One Year On, and to attend a special workshop opportunity on *Planning for Change* facilitated by consultant, Ian Plowman.

In 2007, the M&GSQ Standards Program will work with six organisations in Far North Queensland, supported by the FNQ Museum Development Officer, Maria Friend:

- Cairns Historical Society
- Mulgrave Settlers Museum
- Cairns & District Chinese Association
- Innisfail Friends of the Temple
- Johnstone Shire Council Library
- Croydon Heritage Centre.

National Standards Taskforce

After the Outreach Forum at the Museums Australia 2006 Conference, a National Task Force was formed with representation from everv state in Australia currently administering Standards Program а [Museums Australia (Victoria), Museums and Galleries NSW, Museum & Gallery Services Queensland and the History Trust of South Australia], the CEO of Collections Council of Australia and the Western Australian Museum Assistance Program. This National Task Force is committed to the establishment of shared minimum standards for museums, to assist them to become sustainable cultural assets for the benefit of their communities. In 2006 the working party held meetings in Melbourne (2), Sydney (1) and M&GSQ hosted 2 teleconferences to develop an agreed set of standards to be launched in Canberra at the Museums Australia 2007 Conference. After a consultation phase, May-August 2007, these national minimum standards will be available as benchmarks to help people working in community museums across Australia understand what makes a good museum.

Indigenous Training and Development Pilot Cherbourg Beyond the Ration Shed Project

Between October 2005 and July 2006, M&GSQ and Queensland Community Arts Network worked in partnership with members of the Cherbourg Aboriginal community on the Cherbourg beyond the ration shed project funded by an Arts Queensland major grant. The project focused on cultural engagement and development of evocative interpretation using the surviving historical buildings to tell the stories of Life under the Protection Act and life today. There were three strands, each with staged outcomes:

- Introductory museum skills training
- Curatorial development
- Community trainee digital stories.

All three strands were underpinned by opportunities for the Cherbourg Community Curatorial Team to visit interpretive displays and for curators, designers, education officers to conduct behind the scenes tours.

The introductory museum skills training included community participation in workshops on preventative conservation and introductory collection management facilitated by trainers Christine Ianna and Kym Yuke. In addition to the practical advice provided over the two days, five kits of preventive conservation materials have been left with the community for their use.

Following on from visits by Lesley Williams and Sandra Morgan undertaken in 2005, five participants from Cherbourg (Aunty Ada Simpson, Aunty Sandra Morgan, Robert Bond and Jeanette Brown from

Cherbourg Historic Precinct Group and Rose Parsons from the Cherbourg Indigenous Knowledge Centre) were supported to attend the Museums Australia 2006 Conference over two days and to undertake study tour visits to Museum of Brisbane and Cobb and Co. Museum in Toowoomba.

Between December and April, Debra Bennet mentored the community curatorial research team on researching community stories of people and place. A planning workshop on directions for interpretation and ideas for displays was held in Cherbourg on 8 May with presentations from the newly incorporated Cherbourg Historic Precinct Group, Mark Newman and consultants Debra Bennet, Michael Aird and Thom Blake. Throughout this phase, it was clear that the community participants needed involvement based around practical visible outcomes. Written documentation of plans for displays was not a priority for the group at this stage. Instead engagement with display development was facilitated with a focus on staged improvements to the existing displays. This focus on learning by doing, with practical visible outcomes, was a great success.

Fourteen members of the community (adults and adolescents) worked with Robyn Hofmeyer from February to June 2006 to learn digital video making and production. They were trained interviewers and storytellers and created short films of community memories of life on the reserve. The process of digital video to tell community undoubtedly captured the imagination of the community. The weekly sessions conducted by Robyn Hofmeyer generated considerable enthusiasm and outstanding community involvement. This is reflected in the power of the community narratives on the DVD Filming our History:

- Sandra Morgan's film on Jeffrey Dynevor, Up the White Eyes;
- Jeanette Brown's film on the importance of their church to the community, Smashin' up History;
- Sylvia Bond's film on Cherbourg returned servicemen, Black Diggers;
- Dyella Morgan's film, Punishment or Paradise, about Annie Moffat's memories of being sent from the Cherbourg girls dormitory to Palm Island as punishment.

A temporary display on Jeffrey Dynevor, a boxing gold medalist from Cherbourg and the subject of one of the digital films, opened in the Ration Shed for NAIDOC on 3 July 2006. Sandra Morgan and Jeanette Brown and other members of the community worked alongside curator, Kym Yuke and designer, Peter Trail, to develop the temporary display. The digital film screenings continued throughout the week with approximately 400 people visiting the Ration Shed for these viewings.

M&GSQ has supported the Cherbourg Historic Precinct Group to seek funding for a staged realisation of their project. In February, M&GSQ worked with the National Trust of Queensland on a successful submission supported by the Cherbourg Aboriginal Shire Council to the Australian Government's Department of Environment & Heritage Indigenous Heritage Program to do a Conservation Management Plan, Interpretation Plan and Schedule of Works for the heritage precinct. This stage commenced with a planning meeting held in Cherbourg on 18 September with Cherbourg Historical Precinct Group Inc, Mark Newman, National Trust οf Queensland (Penny Cook), Consultant Thom Blake and M&GSQ (Ann Baillie and Kerri Laidlaw).

M&GSQ also supported the Cherbourg Historic Precinct Group's successful submission to Arts Queensland for THE MEMORY — a community and family digital archive of Aboriginal people who live in Cherbourg, the South Burnett and beyond. This project continues in partnership with Strong and Smart Inc.

The Cherbourg Historic Precinct Group won the Volunteer Organisation category of M&GSQ's 2006 Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards for their *Beyond the Ration Shed Project*.

Accredited Training

Museums Australia Inc finalised its Recognition Prior Learning (RPL) Pilot supported by a Queensland Department of Employment and Training contract 2005–2006. Recognition of Prior Learning assessments were undertaken by assessors visiting workplaces of eleven museum personnel who had previously

undertaken units of study via accredited training. Assessors piloted the open ended questioning and observation techniques from the RPL Assessor's Kit, A starter's kit for museum practice, developed by M&GSQ and museum industry assessors with the support of Queensland's Department of Employment and Training. This was an opportunity for candidates without formal qualifications in museum practice in Chinchilla, Thargomindah, Kingaroy, Bundaberg, Townsville, Mackay, Rivers and Brisbane to have their existing competencies assessed. Ten Certificates IV in Museum Practice and one Certificate III in Museum Practice were awarded. All RPL pilot participants were invited to M&GSQ's Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards ceremony in October where the Minister Welford, acknowledged their participation in accredited training and the Recognition of the Prior Learning (RPL) pilot.

Non Accredited Training and Professional Development

Remote and Regional Stream, MA Conference

The Museums Australia 2006 National Conference, Exploring Dynamics: Cities, Cultural Spaces, Communities, was held in Brisbane on 14-17 May, generously Department supported by the Communications, Information Technology and the Arts. A key component was the Regional and Remote Stream in which over 250 delegates participated. Sunday 14 May was a dedicated day for the regional and remote delegates and a key sub theme, Exploring Dynamics: Sustaining Invigorating the Regional and Remote, commenced on this day and continued throughout the conference.

The Regional and Remote stream of the 2006 Museums Australia Conference was co-convened by Ann Baillie and Zoe Scott, with the support of a working party (listed in Appendix 6). Minister Rod Kemp and DCITA provided sponsorship of \$12,000 towards bursaries and \$18,000 for speakers' fees for this stream. The National Museum of Australia provided \$10,000 towards bursaries. The stream included:

- Dedicated Sunday morning program featuring two overseas keynote speakers, three respondents and three case studies;
- A choice of nine skill sessions at introductory, intermediate and advanced levels — including two presented by overseas speakers and one by a respondent — or out and about options such as a Brisbane River Cruise and History Tour or a self guided tour of Brisbane City Public Art;
- A choice of 10 Fields of Fascination sessions — including behind the scenes tours, structured discussions, more skill sessions and bus trips; and
- A choice of five concurrent papers themed around R&R practical issues and strategies and an Outreach Forum for service providers and the MA vocational learning network.

Sunday plenary sessions introduced ideas for sustaining and invigorating the regional and remote through the role of creative industries, experiences for visitors to make meaning, innovation in rural communities, significance assessment of community collections, Indigenous cultural retrieval, maintenance and revival and community partnerships.

Skill sessions provided an in-depth perspective and learning experiences led by expert facilitators on Site Interpretation Signage; Meaning Making and Interpretive Planning for Museums and Galleries; Regional Development and Creative and Cultural Industries; Meetings Without Discussion; Going Beyond the Ramp: Access Resources and Strategies; Engaging Community; Collections Australia Network — Partner Workshop and an Introduction to Significance Assessment.

Fields of Fascination provided behind the opportunities and informal scenes networking opportunities around Public Art Communities in Brisbane and the Brisbane Magistrates new Court; Indigenous Dandiiri exhibitions Maiwar at Queensland Museum and State Library of Queensland Indigenous Knowledge Centre; a Tool Kit for evaluating interpretation includina quided tours: Specialist Museums; Historic Houses — strategies for sustainable operation; Brisbane's Living Heritage Network — establishment, operation and benefits, working with local government; Managing Your Own Archives — Queensland State Archives; Managing Industrial Heritage — The Workshops Rail Museum; 'The Good' and 'the Bad' Public/Education Programming in Galleries and Museums and Networking for the Standards Program Community.

Concurrent sessions with papers on R&R practical issues and strategies addressed themes such as audience development, volunteers, sustainability for movable cultural heritage projects, thematic studies and trails, Indigenous cultural heritage and learning communities.

Feedback on the Conference overall and the R&R stream was very positive and comments from three bursary recipients follow:

I really enjoyed the Community Museums SIG Tour; it was a great opportunity to talk with people during the visits and on the bus. I liked being able to get a better insight into how things worked such as the Queensland Museums Loans Department and the various types of displays at the Redcliffe Museum. I love some of the interpretation challenges and have learnt some interesting ways to do this through being able to attend the conference.

The huge choice of speakers, workshops etc. ensured I would never be disappointed. I was on a real high during the conference and enjoyed the rural, remote communities-type stuff and am sorry I couldn't fit more in. A concept I learnt is that we need to inspire rather than teach. I hope I have an opportunity to attend another conference. Thank you for empowering me to keep the fire burning.

Congratulations on a fantastic conference, the bursaries make it a reality.

The highlights of the Conference for me were the new IDEAS I gained and CONTACTS. The "Meetings without Discussion" workshop captured some basic new principles which I can implement immediately to assist achievement, and boost interest in our community.

Significance Assessment and Preventive Conservation

M&GSQ and Brisbane's Living Heritage Network delivered in partnership two workshops on Significance Assessment and Preventive Conservation in October and November. The workshops were held on the weekends over four days (2 days each workshop), 28-29 October and 11-12 November. Preventive Conservation was facilitated by Christine Ianna, professional Conservator and member of the Australian Institute for the Conservation of Cultural Materials. Significance Assessment was facilitated by Kylie Winkworth, a Director of the Collections Council of Australia, museum and heritage consultant based in New South Wales. The workshops were attended by a wide range of people from the museum, gallery and archive sectors, includina volunteers, curators managers of cultural collections. Twentythree people attended the Significance Assessment workshop, and nineteen attended the Preventive Conservation workshop, from the South-East corner and as far afield as Miles.

There were pleasing outcomes from the workshops, including the development of several excellent statements of significance, and some great examples of object research underway. The group displayed a sound understanding of the principles of preventive conservation and benefited from professional advice on appropriate methods of care for a variety of objects. Participant evaluations support the conclusion that both workshops were a resounding success.

Strengths of the Preventive Conservation session included:

- The practicalities; more practical than any other similar seminars I have attended.
- Examples talked about, wide range of items on display, suggestions on particular items. The broad range of interests was interesting. Notes for future reference.
- Explaining the importance of preventive conservation.
- Well organised great group excellent presenter.
- The strength of the workshop was to engage Christine and other people on a variety of conservation issues.
- Christine is a fantastic facilitator clear, approachable.
- Very good resource package, good presenter and discussions, interesting group interactions.
- Christine I learnt so much and could easily have spent a great deal more time listening and learning.

Participants at the Significance Assessment workshop indicated the following 'take aways' from the workshop:

- Importance of significance statements and object files and contact for people if I have further questions.
- Significance assessments and object research, keeping object files and collection research.
- Learnt a great deal of practical information about significance that I can use in a practical sense.
- The details set out for object files will make our task so much easier in the future. Now see the significance of object files.
- Better techniques for cataloguing more knowledge on looking after the collection.

- Importance of significant assessment for engaging community.
- A lot of knowledge I didn't have before and a desire to start on our collection.
- Useful advice on collection policy writing, establishing a new collection, the usefulness of writing significance statements and compiling object files.
- An enormous fund of ideas, skills and enthusiasm.
- Motivation to press on.

Networking Event

M&GSQ held а free professional development networking event at the Queensland Museum, South Bank on Thursday 23 November. Lisa Jones, Curator of the Queensland Police Museum and President of Museums Australia Queensland, and Marj Sullivan, Director of the Hervey Bay Regional Gallery, their presented recent overseas respectively experiences, exploring innovative small museums practice in the USA and the gallery's relationship with its sister-city in China.

Peer Talk 2006

On 8 December, M&GSQ in partnership with the State Library of Queensland (SLQ) presented the sixth annual Peer Talk 2006: Reviewing Exhibitions — Divergent Notions of Treasure at SLQ. This forum is based on exhibition review sessions conducted at the American Association of Museums annual meetings and at Museums Australia National Conferences held since April 2001. It was an opportunity to hear about the design and philosophy of the SLQ's redevelopment and its locally curated exhibitions. Vicki McDonald, SLQ's Director, Client Service and Collections; Timothy Hill, Donovan Hill, architectural designer for SLQ redevelopment; and three SLQ curators, Robyn Daw, Alison Wishart and Leanne Kelly, presented this view. Justine Mourik, A/Program van Exhibitions, National Library of Australia, presented the rationale for the opening travelling exhibition, National Treasures from Australia's Greatest Libraries. Three experts presented their reviews: Margaret Birtley, CEO, Collections Council of Australia Limited; Alice-Anne Boylan, past director Museum of Brisbane and Peter Spearritt, Professor of History, The University of Queensland. The panel discussion, and opportunity for the audience to respond, was followed by pre-Christmas drinks and informal networking.

Professional Development Devolved Funding Programs

Special Project Fund (SPF)

The Special Project Fund is an Arts Queensland initiative delivered in partnership with Museum and Gallery Services Queensland.

Grants of up to a maximum of \$500 are available for individual gallery and museum volunteers as assistance to attend seminars, conferences or courses being held in other regions, the capital city, or interstate. Grants can be used towards conference registration fees, associated workshop fees, travel, accommodation/living expenses during the period of the conference.

Grants of up to a maximum of \$1,500 are available to assist public gallery and museum staff, management bodies and volunteers to formulate group initiatives such as training workshops and seminars in specialist areas, for example, volunteer recruitment, board management and other specialist courses, which could be provided by consultants or other training bodies.

In the 2006 SPF grant round, eleven grants totalling \$8,078 were awarded. The 2006 recipients are listed in Appendix 9.

Regional Galleries Association of Queensland High-End Professional Development Bursaries

The Regional Galleries Association of professional Oueensland offers development bursaries for staff working in a paid position in a RGAQ gallery. The bursaries are available for financial assistance towards costs for travel, accommodation and registrations for highprofessional development opportunities of the applicant's choice, up to a maximum of \$1,000 each. M&GSQ administers this Fund on behalf of RGAQ. In the 2006 round, six applications totalling \$4,313 were funded. Recipients are listed in Appendix 10.

Regional Galleries Association of Queensland Travelling Speaker Fund

The Regional Galleries Association of Queensland offers Travelling Speaker grants of up to \$1,000 each for a RGAQ member gallery to host a travelling speaker/s at a regional seminar, including an associated regional networking event. M&GSQ administers this Fund on behalf of RGAQ. One application totalling \$650 was received in the 2006 round. The recipient is listed in Appendix 11.

Exhibition Services

Exhibition Development and Touring

Ten exhibitions were toured by M&GSQ in 2006 to 46 venues in Queensland and interstate, featuring 229 artists, with a total of 1,625 exhibition days and 176,693 visitors.

Six new exhibitions commenced touring as part of the 2006 exhibitions program. They were:

- 2006 Education Minister's Awards for Excellence in Art (Department of Education and the Arts);
- Converge, the work of twenty ceramic artists from the Northern Rivers region of New South Wales, curated by Bob Connery and Geoff Crispin for Tweed River Regional Gallery, Lismore Regional Gallery and Grafton Regional Gallery, managed and auspiced by Arts Northern Rivers;
- Sesserae, works on paper by Dennis Nona, curated by Simon Wright for Griffith Artworks;
- Home Island Home Country, fifty-two selected children's works from sixteen remote communities, curated by Paul Brinkman for Cairns Regional Gallery, with the assistance of indigenous liaison staff from the Education Futures branch of Education Queensland;
- Pattern Recognition, eight artists using pattern as an energised and expressive language within contemporary Australasian object making, co-curated by Rhana Devenport and Andrea Higgins for Craft Queensland; and
- Supercharged, twelve contemporary artists referencing the car's iconic status in Australian life, curated by Vanessa McRae for the Institute of Modern Art, Brisbane.

The following exhibitions continued to tour to regional and interstate venues during 2006:

- 2005 Education Minister's Awards for Excellence in Art
- Fireworks: tracing the incendiary in Australian art

- Regarding Retro: Reanimations of the Preloved
- sacred ground, beating heart: works on paper by Judy Watson

Exhibitions in development for 2007/8 include:

Geo project

Building upon research undertaken throughout Queensland in 2005 as part of M&GSQ's planning for its Visual Arts and Craft Strategy projects, a particular need was identified in regional galleries for assistance with public programming and audience development. During 2006, development commenced on an overarching approach public to programming that could identify connections and differences amongst exhibitions within the 2008 touring program, which explore the connected themes of environment, ecology geography.

The *Geo* project is designed to maximise community engagement and educational opportunities, particularly for younger members of the community, through the creative use of new technologies, including website and online initiatives.

The suite of exhibitions to date to be encompassed by the *Geo* project include:

- great!walks: the touring exhibition (working title); selected works from a series of residencies and workshops carried out in conjunction with the building of Queensland's six worldclass walking tracks in 2005. The curatorial rationale for these projects charts the relationship between habitat and habitus, a trajectory across ecology and culture. Selected artists currently include: Brian Robinson, Shane Fitzgerald, Glen Skien, Fiona Foley, Elizabeth Woods and Jill Chism.
- Intimate Transactions, a new media work by Transmute Collective that explores internal and personal geographies across two sites.
- Antarctica a Place in the Wilderness, an exhibition of silver gelatin

photographs by Judy Parrott taken during an Australian Antarctic Fellowship residency in 2006.

Visual Arts and Craft Strategy (VACS)

Two major exhibition projects funded through the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy continued throughout 2006.

The Manhua Wonderlands DVD zine project developed by Multimedia Art Asia Pacific in partnership with the State Library of Queensland and Education Queensland was supported by M&GSQ through its VACS funding to conduct a series of animation and gaming workshops with teachers and gallery education staff. Teachers who attended the workshops subsequently developed six on-line curriculum-based units of work for the Learning Place, Education Queensland's online environment. These will be made available in 2007 to the general public through the State Library of Queensland's website. Workshops were held in May 2006 in Brisbane and further workshops were held for teachers, students and young people in Cairns and Townsville in July 2006. The DVD zine, where four artists explored the intersection between animation and video practices and contemporary literature formats including Chinese comics, manga and zines, was launched at the MAAP festival at the reopening of the State Library in November 2006. Seven regional venues displayed the finished DVD simultaneously with the State Library or during their summer holiday programs.

The second project, Stories of the Queensland Landscape, is an education kit which draws on the Gold Coast City Art Gallery's collection, linking areas in the curriculum with works in the collection to produce a resource for use in schools and to encourage students to visit regional collections. This education kit was written and edited during 2006, trialed in schools in late 2006 and early 2007 and will be launched in conjunction with publication, Glimpse: Inside Gold Coast City Art Gallery Collection that features over 147 illustrations and texts about the history of the collection and the major

works within it, and an exhibition of the same name, in May 2007.

Both these projects have provided M&GSQ with partnerships for potential further projects: with new media, teachers and young people and curriculum-related material drawn from regional gallery collections that could be adapted for use with other regional gallery collections.

National Touring Exhibition Support (NETS)

NETS agencies met in Adelaide in March 2006, co-convened by Tony Duke (Artback) and Georgia Cribb (NETS Victoria). The agencies discussed the presentation to be given by NETS at the national VACS meeting in Adelaide, and also discussed the possibility of engaging a consultant to report on NETS structure.

Throughout the year NETS officers met via teleconference to develop a proposal for a Touring Exhibitions scoping study which will examine the role of NETS within the context of national and international touring exhibition providers. A draft was presented by Museums and Galleries New South Wales at the NETS meeting in Brisbane in November 2006 for consideration. The study will be progressed in 2007.

NETS Australia wrote to the Federal Arts Minister, Rod Kemp, urging that the level of funding recommended in the Myer Report (Recommendation 13) be implemented for all NETS agencies in the second Visual Arts and Craft Strategy round.

Touring Exhibition Partnership Plan (TEPP)

Each year, M&GSQ assigns part of its Australia Council funding to its Touring Exhibition Partnership Plan, a program devised to partner regional galleries in the early development of travelling exhibitions.

In 2006, the Gold Coast City Art Gallery was provided with \$11,160 for its exhibition *Ey! Iran: Contemporary Iranian Photography*, to cover the costs of

research, catalogue design, writer's fees, photography and educational material. *Ey! Iran*, co-curated by Mandana Mapar and Shadi Ghadirian, provides an opportunity to glimpse the lives of contemporary Iranians — surprisingly familiar family life and the suburban sprawl set against poignant observations of a culture immersed in longstanding customs and traditions.

Access Arts was provided with \$3,000 for initial curatorial research and development of a strategy to finance a touring exhibition of Outsider Art, *Australian Auteurs* (working title).

Regional Collections project

In 2006 the Staff and Board of M&GSQ accepted a proposal by Craig Douglas to research a publication documenting

Queensland regional collections, and to develop an exhibition for Queensland's sesquicentenary. This followed on from the *Tucked Away* project developed in 2004/05 by Joan Winter.

A proposal for seed funding was submitted by Craig in partnership with M&GSQ to Griffith University Industry Collaborative Scheme to develop an ARC Linkage Grant application for the project. The proposal was unsuccessful in 2006 but will be resubmitted in 2007.

Publication of an article about the Gold Coast City Art Gallery collection, drawn from the research material, was included in the December issue M&GSQ's magazine Artery.
