Finalist at State Awards

The Winners and Finalists of the **2019 Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards** (GAMAA) were proudly announced on Thursday 19 September at a special presentation event, held at the recently opened Cairns Performing Arts Centre, Far North Queensland.

Matthew Jackson, Volunteer with the Cassowary Coast Regional Council, was recognised as a **Finalist** for his outstanding achievement in the category of **Individuals: Volunteer**.

Matthew is recognised for his contribution and commitment to preserving and sharing the history of Cardwell with locals and visitors to the region. He has volunteered with the Cardwell Visitor Information & Heritage Centre since 2012, and during this time has presented a number of displays focusing on the region's modern history.

In January 2019, Matthew presented a display entitled *Era of Crime* which showcased three prominent local crime stories from the 1920s and 1930s, and highlighted the Italian gangster folklore of Far North Queensland. This project allowed Matthew to showcase his research skills and his interest in modern history, and provided an opportunity for him to present his work to the community.

In March 2019, Matthew presented a display, *Here Lies a Japanese Pearl Diver*, which showcased one of the local resident's kindness in restoring a grave marker on Gould Island which was set there to honour the Japanese Pearl Divers who lost their lives during the 1918 Cyclone. As part of this display, Matthew invited the local primary school children to display Japanese origami art as a gesture to the Guest of Honour, the Consul General of Japan. Through working on and presenting these displays, Matthew further developed his research and public speaking skills.
