About this report —

The Australian Public Galleries Snapshot is a research initiative prepared by Museums & Galleries Queensland and Public Galleries Association of Victoria on behalf of the National Public Galleries Alliance. The Alliance is a network of Australian state and territory public gallery peak body and industry organisations working collaboratively to advance the sector.

This report represents the first major Snapshot of Australia's public gallery sector. It has been informed by the best available, nationally consistent information collected over a twelve-month period in 2017 and 2018.

This Snapshot forms a benchmark from which the Alliance will develop a standardised methodology to capture and longitudinally report the 'complete picture' of our country's dynamic public gallery sector.

What is a public gallery?

Australia's public galleries are an intrinsic part of our social fabric, engaging audiences with art, ideas and culture. They stimulate learning, debate and critical thinking; encourage creative expression; and enrich the social, economic and cultural wellbeing of our country's metropolitan, regional and remote communities.

For the purpose of this Snapshot, a public gallery is defined as a not-for-profit, non-commercial gallery. This encompasses metropolitan, regional and remote public galleries, contemporary art spaces, contemporary craft and design spaces and art museums, including those operated by local government and universities. This Snapshot captures data from 48% of our sector. Unless specified, this report does not include state, territory and national public gallery institutions.

CAPTURED DATA

48% of 408 Australian public galleries are captured in this Snapshot.



STAFF

Public galleries employ a total of 898 full-time equivalent staff.

This equates to an average of 4.5 full-time equivalent staff per public gallery.



GOVERNMENT INVESTMENT

46% Local Government; 13% State Government; 1% Australia Council for the Arts; >1% Federal Government.



VOLUNTEERS

5,101 volunteers donate their time and expertise to public galleries each year.

69% of these volunteers work in regional galleries.

Overall, there are 6 times more volunteer staff than paid staff.



VISITATION

Annually, 16.5 million people visit public galleries and state, territory & national public gallery institutions.


