'Did You Know' - intriguing facts about the Museum

- An historical museum was set up in Bundaberg on June 17, 1889 but when the museum closed after World War 2, its collections were completely dispersed.
- In today's museum you can see a collection of rare birds captured in the 1870s around the Bundaberg region and then preserved by Charles Skyring.
- The collection also includes a litter from the 1907 Bundaberg Ambulance Brigade.
- Today's museum is in the top 10 most haunted buildings in Queensland according to the Queensland Paranormal Society.
- On display there is a gold fob watch belonging to local man, Tom Miles. In 1927
 Tom won the Stawell Gift Australia's oldest and richest short distance running race.

Our Profile

The Bundaberg and District Historical & Museum Society Inc. collects and preserves the heritage of the Bundaberg region.

The original Museum's collections may have been dispersed in the 1940s but the current Museum keeps memories alive by displaying the heritage associated with the Bundaberg's many industries and its social life.

The extensive photographic and archival collections include a wealth of local knowledge from the 1800s to the present day; capturing, amongst other things, people's lives, buildings and events. The archives are available for research and can be accessed by anyone for a small fee.

The collection includes significant objects such as the "World Quilt" sewn in 1933 by Margurite Vuichoud; the unique Lucke Quad's Cyclops designed pram, as well as a magnificent display of birds collected locally and taxidermied by Charles Skyring in the 1870s.
