Queensland's public museum and gallery sector came together in Toowoomba, in October 2024 for its first major Conference in five years.

Museums & Galleries Queensland (M&G QLD) presented its 2024 Conference, Belonging, at the heritage-listed Empire Theatres precinct and various other locations in Toowoomba, on the lands of the Giabal, Jarowair and Western Wakka Wakka peoples from 9-11 October.

The Conference is an important industry event, traditionally presented by M&G QLD every four years. However, with the disruptions of COVID and natural disasters, Belonging marked the first time our sector had come together in five years since our last Conference, *Opening Doors*, held in Cairns in 2019.

This year's Conference was particularly special as it coincided with M&G QLD's 20th anniversary.

M&G QLD took care to structure a unique and relevant program to provide professionals and volunteers who work in Queensland's public museum and gallery sector with the opportunity to meet, network, share knowledge and learn with and from their peers.

Theme

Belonging – noun: to feel safe, happy or comfortable in a place, situation or group because you are welcomed and accepted.

Belonging – noun: a possession.

M&G QLD's 2024 Conference focused on 'Belonging' and what this means for us as organisations and our communities.

The theme of M&G QLD's 2024 Conference was carefully chosen to examine how our museums and galleries are embracing inclusivity and working with artists, collections, industry leaders and communities to drive positive change in areas of accessibility, diversity and equity.

How can we, as a sector, foster inclusion and belonging? How do we build empathy and understanding in our communities? How can arts, culture and heritage bridge divides and bring people together?

Our museums and galleries are dynamic cultural hubs and play a vital role in our communities. They inspire, tell stories and create meaningful experiences that reflect who we are, where we live, our pasts and futures. Through exhibitions, education programs and public outreach, they can navigate complex societal issues and actively engage our audiences in important conversations about the world in which we live.

Over the three days of the Conference, delegates heard from esteemed state, national and international speakers, who shared their insights and experiences of creating inclusive and equitable cultural spaces that enrich, shape and benefit society.

Location

International Keynote

Regan Pro, Deputy Director of Public Programs and Social Impact at the Lucas Museum of Narrative Art, USA, presented the keynote address, Belonging and Belongings, that posed the questions: How do the belongings in our collections create or dismantle a sense of belonging for our visitors? How can we use a more expansive understanding of what should be on our walls to help visitors see themselves more reflected in our spaces? How do works of art tell us who we are and where we belong?

The Lucas Museum of Narrative Art is a new institution being built in Los Angeles, California, with the mission and moon-shot belief that the art of storytelling helps create a more just society.

Regan's keynote, drawing on her expertise, leadership and deep knowledge in areas of education, inclusion and access, provided the perfect introduction to the Conference. By blending theory, practice and examples from the field, she invited participants to explore how their organisation's foundational objects might reflect the lived and learned experiences of their audiences and foster belonging.

Parallel Speakers

M&G QLD issued a 'Call for Speaker' proposals ahead of the Conference and the response exceeded expectations. *Belonging* featured 23 parallel sessions with 32 speakers with diverse industry experiences and expertise, including public galleries, libraries, archives, and museums at local, state, national, and international levels. Additionally, speakers came from universities, volunteer-run organisations, the education sector, consultancies, and the arts community.







Participation

M&G QLD's 2024 Conference attracted a diverse group of attendees including representatives of regional and metropolitan public galleries and museums, state and national statutory bodies, university museums, health organisations, contemporary arts organisations, peak bodies, membership organisations, suppliers and state and local government and individual artists, educators, consultants and academics.

Total number of participants: 172*

Metropolitan: 64 Regional: 95 Interstate: 11 International: 2

Each participant was counted once in the following breakdowns:

- Delegates including parallel speakers: 130
- Presenters (plenary and welcome sessions only): 9
- Trade presenters: 8
- Closing First Nations performance: 7
- M&G QLD staff and contractors: 9
- Workshop / Masterclass only attendees: 16.

The most frequent age range of delegates was 46-55 years old (32%), followed by 56-65 years (27%) and 36-45 years (20%).**

25% of delegates indicated that this was their first museum or gallery conference.**

2% identified as First Nations.**

5% identified as having a culturally diverse background.**

9% identified as having a disability.**

5% identified as LGBTQIA+.**

90% of all participants were paid cultural workers, with around 7% of these working in parttime roles in the industry. 8% were volunteers and 4% were students.

Promotion & Marketing Coverage

M&G QLD engaged Goldi Design to develop the brand concept for our 2024 Conference. This laid the foundation for all design elements, promotions and collateral associated with the event.

A Conference promotional strategy which articulated the type of promotion, content, recipients and timeframe was developed. Targeted promotion for key stages of the Conference included a call for speaker proposals, date claimer, venue confirmation, international keynote speaker announcements, social activities, masterclass presenters, sponsorship and trade show announcements, and registration.

Evaluation

M&G QLD implemented an evaluation strategy, which included hard copy survey forms for the two full days of the Conference and each of the masterclasses / workshops. Following the Conference, an online survey was distributed to delegates to further capture their feedback.

The Conference evaluation completion rate was 33%.

The Masterclass / Skills Workshop evaluation completion rate was 92%.

100% of delegates who responded rated their overall satisfaction with the Conference as 'Excellent' (84%) or 'Good' (16%).



When asked 'What information, skills or ideas will you take away from the Conference?' delegates responded with:

- 'I feel that I now have a background of knowledge to be able to state my case when it comes to the role of institutions in truth-telling, representation and equality.'

- Capturing your collection, an overview of collection object photography, presented by Michael O'Neill, Manager Collection Imaging, Te Papa Tongarewa, New Zealand.
- Preservation of paper-based collections, presented by Lydia Egunnike, Paper and Photograph Conservator at LE Conservation Services.

These workshops were actively promoted to the sector, including community and volunteer-run organisations, throughout Queensland, attracting participants from wide-ranging areas such as Brisbane, Brookfield, Bundaberg, Caloundra, Cherbourg, Cleveland, Clifton, Gold Coast, Injune, Mackay, Mapoon, Moranbah, Ipswich, Toowoomba and Tully. The workshops not only enhanced participants' skills but also fostered important networking opportunities, enabling connections that support ongoing learning and collaboration.


