

Our Year 2023 highlights



Touring Exhibiitons

M&G QLD's 2023 touring exhibition program presented **8** exhibitions to **27** venues in Queensland and nationally, attracting **124,879** visitors. M&G QLD's touring exhibitions profiled the work of seven curators and **130** artists – this included 71 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists.

91.1% of touring exhibition venues rated the quality of M&G QLD's services as 'Excellent' (86.6%) or 'Good' (4.5%).

36

Skills Development Activities

453 participants took part in **36** M&G QLD training and professional development (TPD) activities in 2023.

99.6% of program participants rated these activities overall as 'Excellent' (81.2%) or 'Good' (18.4%).





Executive Director's Report

Museums & Galleries Queensland (M&G QLD) is the leading voice for Queensland's public museum and gallery sector. As the peak body, we advocate for our sector's needs and champion its achievements.

2023 marked the second year of implementation of our 2022-25 Strategic Plan. Throughout the year, our performance has been strong which is a credit to our staff, Board of Directors, industry partners and sector.

Our close connections with the sector are essential to enhancing the efficacy of our programs and services. Each day we are motivated by the commitment and professionalism of Queensland's paid museum and gallery staff and volunteers, and the positive contributions these people and their organisations bring to their communities.

M&G QLD is fortunate to employ an incredible team which delivers far beyond what is expected. It is the commitment, professionalism, capabilities and personal qualities of our staff that makes our organisation what it is.

In 2023, M&G QLD's workforce underwent significant change:

- On 31 January 2023, M&G QLD welcomed Chantal Bennett to our staff in the position of Training and Professional Development Program Officer. Chantal worked with us until 6 October when she resigned to take up a new role with the Queensland Museum Network, as a Museum Development Officer, which will advance her career pathway.
- On 3 October 2023, Madeleine Green joined our team, replacing Chantal, working with Dandan Feng in our Training & Professional Development Program.

• On 11 August 2023, our longest-serving staff member Debra Beattie, retired from her role as General Manager after nearly 20 years with the company and previously with Regional Galleries Association of Queensland. Debra was instrumental in setting up the company in 2004 and since this time has made a tremendous contribution to M&G QLD and to the sector more broadly. Establishing the Gallery and

Museum Achievement Awards (GAMAA) and managing this program since its inception, it was only fitting that we honoured Debra at the 2023 event by presenting her with a GAMAA trophy created by Queensland artist Nicole Jakins.

- On 31 July, M&G QLD welcomed our new Business Manager, Stephen Coppard, enabling an appropriate handover with Debra Beattie.
- With the support of Arts Queensland's Industry Placement Program, M&G QLD was able to build capacity of our Exhibition Development & Touring Program, engaging Sharna Barker on a part-time basis. Sharna commenced on 2 August 2023, and following the resignation of Exhibition Program Officer, Rachael De Groot, increased her hours to four days per week.
- Rachael, who had been with us since May 2019, left to take up an exciting new role with Ipswich Art Gallery in December 2023.
- M&G QLD's Information Officer, Grace Law, finished in the role on 15 September after accepting a position with Queensland State Archives.
- Ben O'Dwyer was appointed as our new Information Officer and commenced on 6 November 2023.
- The Public Galleries Queensland and Australian Museums and Galleries

Association Queensland (PGQ/AMaGAQ) Membership Officer, Karike Ashworth, resigned in June 2023 to pursue her flourishing artistic practice and teaching. We welcomed Michele Pickering who filled the role and commenced in August.

To Chantal, Debra, Rachael, Grace and Karike, we warmly extend our thanks and appreciation for your contributions and wish you every success and happiness in these next chapters of your lives.

It was wonderful to end the year with a full complement of staff – each new team member brings their unique skillsets and knowledge to the organisation and the sector. Madeleine, Sharna, Stephen, Ben and Michele have fast become valued members of M&G QLD's team and it has been a pleasure to welcome them and see them grow in their new roles.

To our continuing staff, Andrea Higgins and Dandan Feng, my sincerest appreciation for your warmth and humour and all that you achieved in a year where change has been a constant.

To M&G QLD's Board of Directors, Karina Devine, Andrew Moritz, Emma Bain, Anna Thurgood and Celestine Doyle, I also convey deep gratitude and appreciation. Your continued support, encouragement, wisdom and expertise is highly valued, as always.

M&G QLD's Exhibition Development & Touring Program excelled, launching an unprecedented three new touring exhibitions in 2023. It was a mammoth undertaking, achieved with the greatest care and professionalism.

Throughout the year we toured eight exhibitions to 27 venues and engaged 124,879 visitors nationally. This includes M&G QLD's major touring initiatives, *Three Echoes – Western Desert Art* and *How Soon is Now?* by Bruce Reynolds.

Our Training & Professional Development Program also shone, delivering 36 programs across the state. A total of 99.6% of program participants rated the quality of M&G QLD's professional development programs as 'Excellent' or 'Good'.

Collaboration and partnerships remain at the heart of all our activities. The overwhelming levels of support we continue to attract is humbling and enables us to achieve far more that we could if doing it alone. In 2023, this equated to more than \$105,000 of in-kind goods and services. To all our industry partners, stakeholders and supporters, we extend our heartfelt thanks and appreciation.

M&G QLD held the 2023 Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards (GAMAA) at the Kingston Butter Factory Cultural Precinct, thanks to the generosity of our presenting partner, Logan City Council. It was a beautiful event which showcased the new Living Museum of Logan and the Cultural Precinct and celebrated the achievements of the six Winners and five Finalists.

The GAMAA shine a light on the outstanding work of our sector in delivering quality arts and cultural experiences and enhancing the social wellbeing of Queensland communities. They also demonstrate our sector's ingenuity and resilience.

Still feeling the impacts of the pandemic, and workforce pressures including reduced rates of volunteering, this strength was further demonstrated and tested in December 2023 with Cyclone Jasper and flooding in the north and a tornado and flooding in the south. This was followed by Cyclone Kirrily and further flooding in early 2024. We continue to work with those organisations affected by the extreme natural disasters of recent years, partnering with our amazing industry colleagues - Queensland Museum Network's Museum Development Officers, the Australian Institute for the Conservation of Cultural Materials' conservators and other stakeholders - to provide a coordinated response.

A major part of this work has been delivering a program of 24 workshops in local government

areas impacted by the 2019-20 Black Summer Bushfires - the same communities that were impacted by flooding in 2022. To launch the program, M&G QLD delivered a suite of four Mental Health and Wellbeing workshops by Mental Health First Aid provider, Lucy Harrington. In addition to providing the sector with the tools and resources to support the wellbeing and mental health safety of participants' staff, volunteers and communities, this program has also provided us with a better understanding of the needs, pressures and challenges of impacted communities. This continues to inform our work going forward. Other workshops in this series focused on Disaster Preparedness and Recovery, Contemporary Collecting, Digitisation, Collection Management and Volunteering. We acknowledge the support of the Australian Government in supporting these activities.

In March I had the pleasure of participating in the Institutions of Memory, Local Truth-Telling Workshop facilitated by Queensland's Interim Truth and Treaty Board, held at the State Library of Queensland, and being involved in conversations about how our sector can support this important work. I was also fortunate to be one of the inaugural recipients of the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation and The University of Queensland Leadership Program and thank them for this experience. The opportunity to take time away from the office, review our operations and network with and learn from other not-for-profit leaders and business academics was truly valuable.

Exciting plans are in place for 2024. Not only does it mark 20 years of the company and presentation of the Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards, M&G QLD will be delivering our state Conference in Toowoomba. Titled *Belonging* and exploring themes of inclusion, diversity, access and equity, it will be a significant opportunity to come together, hear from an inspiring program of speakers and experience the rich cultural offerings of the Toowoomba region. We look forward to seeing you there!

Advocacy

* Contribution to National and State cultural forums and reviews

During 2023, staff and Board members of M&G QLD contributed to a range of cultural forums and reviews, to ensure that the museum and gallery sector's voice was represented in the development of new policies, strategies and programs at a state and national level. M&G QLD also advocated on behalf of the sector and its constituents. Staff and Board members:

- Contributed to the review of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Classification of Occupations (ANZSCO), which describes the data of all occupations in the Australian and New Zealand labour markets for governments, industry, and businesses to inform and shape educational pathways, skilled migration programs and workforce strategies that equip Australians with skills to get jobs and stay employed.
- Made a submission to the Australian Government's National Cultural Policy Inquiry to bring attention to the moveable

cultural heritage sector, and to advocate for increased support for our sector in times of natural disasters.

- Contributed to a consultation conducted by Greenshoot Consulting on behalf of the Australia Council for the Arts, who is developing a range of governance resources including templates, policies and case studies to be hosted on the Australia Council's website.
- Contributed to Jobs Queensland's Anticipating Future Skills forum.
- Contributed to an ArtsHub article written by Rochelle Siemienowicz, titled *Dismay* as James Cook University proposes closure of creative arts in North Queensland, published 15 September 2023. This formed part of M&G QLD's advocacy on behalf of constituents in North and Far North Queensland following the announcement of staff redundancies at the university in Townsville and Cairns, and the potential closure of its Creative Arts teaching program at the end of 2023.
- Contributed to the National Exhibition Touring Support (NETS) Australia's submission as a part of the Australian Government's National Cultural Policy Inquiry.
- Wrote to Griffith University conveying deep concern at the proposed closure of Griffith University Art Museum (GUAM) and attended the public protest held at the South Bank campus in December 2023.
- Published an article on the proposed closure of GUAM, and subsequent 12-month review, in the summer edition of *source*.
- Co-authored a letter on behalf of the National Public Galleries Alliance, expressing the sector's deep concern at the proposed closure of GUAM.

* Mentorship and Internship Program

Open to Queensland's museum and gallery staff and volunteers, M&G QLD's Mentorship and Internship Program offers a unique opportunity to grow the expertise, industry knowledge and professional networks of people working in our sector and to enhance their career pathways.

Supported by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland, M&G QLD's Mentorship and Internship Program offered two types of professional development opportunities for volunteer, emerging, mid-career and established professionals working in Queensland's public galleries and museums:

- Gallery and Museum Mentorship
- Volunteer Internship

M&G QLD received 29 applications totalling \$80,058 and we were able to award 15 placements from our funding pool of \$35,800, highlighting the strong demand for this type of professional development program within our sector.

Planning commenced for M&G QLD's 2024 Conference, which will be held in Toowoomba from 9 to 11 October 2024. M&G QLD's Executive Director and Training & Professional Development Program Officers, Dandan Feng and Chantal Bennett travelled to Toowoomba on 16 June, where they met with arts and cultural leaders from the region and viewed sites for potential Conference program activities.

The 2024 Conference will coincide with the 20-year anniversary of the formation of the Company and 20 years of the GAMAA, which will be held concurrently.

M&G QLD was the recipient of a 2023 Community Heritage Grant (CHG). This funding will support us to offer three free skills workshops to volunteer-run organisations as a part of the Conference program.

The CHG program provides non-profit community organisations with funding to assist with the preservation of locally owned, but nationally significant collections. The grants also aim to make these collections more publicly accessible. CHG is funded by the Australian Government through the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts.

M&G QLD Standards Review Program A joint program with Museums &

Galleries of New South Wales

M&G QLD Standards Review Program takes a strategic approach to skills development and training, supporting the sustainability and growth of our sector's museums and galleries through a process of self-review and peer feedback. It provides an opportunity for museums and galleries to assess their practices and policies against the *National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries*, developed collaboratively by the National Standards Taskforce, and to develop a plan for their future.

Participating in the year-long Standards Review Program requires great commitment from participating organisations.

2021 Standards Review Program

The One-Year-On event for participating organisations in M&G QLD's 2021 Standards Review Program – Archer Park Rail Museum, Capricorn Coast Historical Society, Country Hospital Museum and Hinkler Hall of Aviation – took place on 22 and 24 August 2023 via Zoom.

In this forum, participants shared what aspects of their Action Plans they have achieved to date following completion of the Program.

For example, Hinkler Hall of Aviation, Bundaberg has greatly benefitted from the knowledge they gained to support their collection and possible grants they could access. After completing the Standards Review Program, they successfully secured funding from multiple sources including:

- Regional Arts Development Funding for their oral history project on Lex Rowland;
- CHARTS grant funding for their Disaster Management Kit and Collection Management Items; and
- Community Heritage Grant funding to

undertake a significance assessment and are working towards the next stage, which is preservation.

The 2021 Program was carried into 2022 following the disruptions of COVID, which in turn delayed the One-Year-On event.

The delivery of the Standards Review Program in Rockhampton was supported by the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF), a partnership between the Queensland Government and Rockhampton Regional Council to support local arts and culture in regional Queensland.

2022 Standards Review Program

In 2023, our 2022 participants from the Lockyer Valley region completed M&G QLD's Standards Review Program. The Program was carried over into 2023 following the disruptions of COVID and natural disasters in 2022.

The two organisations completing the program in 2023 were Lockyer Valley Art Gallery, Gatton and Queensland Transport Museum, Gatton.



- Involving People
- Developing a Significant Collection
- Desk-top Reviews of the participants' completed surveys.
- 3. Field Visits to the participants' institutions, with a follow-up report prepared by the Reviewers and M&G QLD and provided to the participants. At the Field Visits, which took place from 11 to 23 August, Reviewers and M&G QLD Staff met participants, toured the venues, discussed the organisations' strengths and suggestions for improvements, and provided practical advice and assistance.
- 4. On-Site Review visits, with a follow-up report prepared by the Reviewers and M&G QLD and provided to the participants.

At the On-Site Reviews, held from 28 October to 9 November, the Reviewers and M&G QLD staff worked with participants to improve their organisation's profile, identify key areas for future development and prioritise these to inform their Action Plans.

The final Debrief and Celebratory Event for 2023 Standards participants will be held in February 2024.

We extend our thanks to the Standards Reviewers who contributed a total of 261 unpaid hours of their expertise (including travel) to the program in 2023.

2023 Standards Workshop, Collection Management

As a part of the 2023 Standards Review Program, M&G QLD organised a skills development workshop focused on collection management. The focus of the workshop was identified through consultation with the program participants, Reviewers and the completed program activities. The workshop was presented at The Centre, Beaudesert, on 4 October. The workshop was presented by Lisa Jones, Curator of the Queensland Police Museum, who shared her extensive sector knowledge on best practice collections management. Lisa covered topics including collections policies, acquisition and deaccessioning practice and collections care. It was an informative workshop that provided valuable networking opportunities for participants. These included staff and volunteers from the Templin Museum, Beaudesert Historical Museum, Canungra & Districts Historical Association, Rathdowney Museum, Harrisville Museum, Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery, Logan City Historical Museum and the Queensland Horse Racing Museum.

88% of participants rating the overall workshop as 'Excellent' or 'Good'.

2023 Events

The University of Queensland Museum Studies Lecture

M&G QLD's Training and Professional Development Program Officers, Dandan Feng and Chantal Bennett , supported by M&G QLD Executive Director delivered a lecture at UQ for Master of Museum Studies students on 23 May 2022.

14 students attended this interactive lecture.

The lecture covered:

- An introduction to Museums & Galleries Queensland and the work we do with and for the sector.
- An introduction to the National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries with an accompanying activity.
- An overview of the First Peoples: A Roadmap for Enhancing Indigenous Engagement in Museums and Galleries with accompanying real-world examples.

* Workforce Wellbeing Workshop

On 9 August 2023, M&G QLD partnered with Public Galleries Queensland and Australian Museums and Galleries Association Queensland to deliver a one-day Workforce Wellbeing Workshop at the Queensland Museum, South Bank. The presenter, Lucy Harrington, a Principal Master Trainer with Mental Health First Aid Australia, covered a multitude of essential workforce wellbeing aspects including duty of care, common mental health issues such as anxiety and burnout and how to support oneself and others.

Lucy facilitated thoughtful and engaged conversation among participants, highlighting that while our sector has an increasing number of health and wellbeing programs for audiences and communities in museums, galleries and keeping places, it is vital that we do not overlook the wellbeing of the sector's dedicated staff and volunteers.

100% of participants rated the workshop overall as 'Excellent' or 'Good'.

When asked 'What will you take away from the workshop? What did you learn personally?' participants responded with:

'Presenter was amazing, approachable,

knowledgeable, and down to earth.'

'Psychosocial safety and how to have a conversation with someone about it.'

Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Workshop Series

M&G QLD received funding through the Australian Government's Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants Program to offer a *Museum and* Gallery Recovery and Preparedness Workshop Series to public museums and galleries in local government areas impacted by the 2019-20 bushfires. Due to COVID and flooding events in 2022, delivery of these workshops was held over until 2023.

In 2023, M&G QLD's Training & Professional Development staff successfully delivered our *Museum and Gallery Recovery and Preparedness Workshop Series* of six workshops to public museums and galleries in each of the local government areas listed below – a total of 24 workshops supported public museum and gallery staff and volunteers in these regions: Somerset, Lockyer Valley, Scenic Rim and Southern Downs.

In order of presentation across the year, the workshops were:

- 1. Mental Health and Wellbeing Essentials with Lucy Harrington.
- 2. Collection Management 101: Understanding and Managing Museum Collections with Josh Tarrant.
- 3. Contemporary Collecting with Elspeth Hocking.
- 4. Disaster Preparedness with Christine Ianna.
- 5. Digitisation and Access with Josh Tarrant.
- 6. Revitalising Your Volunteer Program with Mark Creyton.

Mental Health and Wellbeing Essentials

Lucy Harrington is a Principal Master Trainer with Mental Health First Aid Australia. Her workshop provided an overview of strategies to support our sector's staff and volunteers' own wellbeing and ways to help others, including:

- Information and examples about common types of mental illness across the lifespan.
- How to identify early signs of mental health problems and how to speak with someone in a supportive and appropriate way about their mental health and wellbeing.
- Options for accessing further assistance.
- Self-care strategies for personal resilience.

100% of participants rated the Mental Health and Wellbeing Essentials workshops as 'Excellent' or 'Good'. When asked what they took away from the workshops, participants' responses included:

'How to better check in with people and support those struggling with their mental health, both on a personal and community level.'

'I feel more empowered to tackle the issues around mental health.'

Collection Management 101: Understanding and Managing Museum Collections

Josh Tarrant is part of the Queensland Museum Network's Museum Development Officer Program. As the Senior Museum Development Officer – South East Queensland Region, he works with community-focused organisations to assist them with the management and interpretation of their museums and collections.

This workshop provided participants with an overview of collection management principles, including cataloguing, storage and collection handling.

100% of participants rated the Collection Management 101 workshops as 'Excellent' or 'Good'. When asked what they took away from the workshops, participants' responses included:

'New information, awareness and understanding processes around recording and maintaining collections.'

Contemporary Collecting

This workshop aimed to equip participants with sound and practical knowledge about collecting objects, photographs and oral histories of events that have happened in recent times, such as local natural disasters, as well as storage and handling of sensitive materials. The workshop was presented by Elspeth Hocking, Senior Museum Development Officer – Southern Inland Queensland, Queensland Museum Network.

100% of participants rated the Contemporary Collecting workshops as 'Excellent' or 'Good'.

When asked what they took away from the workshops, participants' responses included:

'Too much to write here – the best is the need to review policies/museum statement and re-focus with committee/members on our aims etc.'

'Food for thought on what is history. I had not given much thought as to how quickly things can change and records need to be kept.'

'The knowledge and ability to delve into the digital world in setting up a museum for public display.'

Disaster Preparedness

These workshops were presented in July by Preservation Consultant, Christine Ianna, and helped participants to understand how to effectively plan and prepare for natural disasters and how to care for their collections and organisations.

100% of the workshop participants rated the Disaster Preparedness workshops as 'Excellent' or 'Good'.

When asked 'What will you take away from the workshop? What did you learn personally?' participants responded with:

'The fact we need to be prepared no matter what level or organisation we are at.'

'It was great to hear that any level of preparedness is better than none.'

'The importance of keeping records of items and having a kit in preparation.'

'This workshop has given me the confidence to take the information further and put a procedure in place.'

'Hints and tips for our particular museum e.g., backing up computer data regularly, and how to keep papers and books dry.'

'Need to check on disaster policy and gather a group together to pass on info to discuss ideas. How to begin to think about how to go forward with a disaster plan.'

Digitisation and Access

Presented by Josh Tarrant, Senior Museum Development Officer – South East Queensland Region this workshop covered collection digitisation, digital access for the public and the safety of digital records of the collections in case of natural disasters. The Digitisation and Access workshops were delivered in August and September 2023.

100% of the workshop participants rated the Digitisation and Access workshops as 'Excellent' or 'Good'. When asked 'What will you take away from the workshop? What did you learn personally?' participants responded with:

'My eyes were opened to new opportunities for my future learning on how computers operate.'

Revitalising Your Volunteer Program

This workshop was presented in November 2023 by expert consultant, Mark Creyton, whose extensive knowledge stems from his career in developing and enhancing volunteer programs across the country.

His workshop explored subjects including:

- Understanding the new landscape of volunteering.
- Approaches in contemporary volunteer engagement.
- Succession and forward planning considering current and future trends.
- Designing volunteer roles and enhancing volunteer experiences for the future.
- How to attract and sustain volunteers.
- Strengthening volunteer programs.
- Enhancing volunteer experiences within your organisation.

100% of the workshop participants rated the Revitalising Your Volunteer Program workshops as 'Excellent' or 'Good'.

When asked 'What will you take away from the workshop? What did you learn personally?', participants responded with:

'It's a great time to revitalise our volunteer program!'

'I learned about re-engaging episodic volunteers (and why), the place and importance of the motivators and how to acknowledge and reward them, and how challenging all this can be.'

'The change in social volunteering and the fact our organisation needs to change our recruitment process.'

'That we need to understand that what we have always done may not work in this new climate. We need to change with the world.'

Exhibition Development & Touring

Eight exhibitions were toured by M&G QLD in 2023 to 27 venues nationally, featuring 130 artists and seven curators, showing for a total of 1,169 exhibition days and attracting 124,879 visitors.

* Three Echoes – Western Desert Art

Curated by Djon Mundine OAM FAHA, *Three Echoes – Western Desert Art* is a stunning exhibition exploring the poetic notion of echoes – how metaphorically and metaphonically we can echo a thought, a sentiment, or a consciousness. In the 1970s Australian Aboriginal people from the desert began talking to the world through art, transferring their creation stories of the land and people to canvas. Now in the 2020s, this foundational echo is going back and forth. No longer a onesided, outward calling, it reverberates multidimensionally within wider Australian and global communities.

Three Echoes - Western Desert Art and its catalogue showcase 81 stunning paintings, prints and batiks by 57 acclaimed artists heralding from Ikuntji (Haasts Bluff), Papunya and Utopia Aboriginal communities in the western desert regions of the Northern Territory. While works in the exhibition are drawn from the early 1970s to early 2000s, Three Echoes – Western Desert Art celebrates the world's oldest continuous living culture and artistic traditions that span tens of thousands of years.

Legacy: Reflections on Mabo celebrated the man behind the game-changing Native Title Act 1993, Eddie Koiki Mabo. Co-curated by Gail Mabo (daughter of Eddie Koiki Mabo), Dr Jonathan McBurnie (former Director of Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts) and Kellie Williams (former Director of Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts), the exhibition brings together a selection of 22 works by Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists in the spirit of reconciliation, approximately three decades after the historic achievement. Each artist has responded to an aspect of Eddie Mabo that they are drawn to, whether it is his life, politics, activism, or legacy. The works come together in surprising ways with reverence, compassion,

A total of 3,973 people attended 46 community engagement activities including artist workshops, curator floor talks, group tours and children's activities associated with the exhibition.

Legacy: Reflections on Mabo *is a travelling exhibition* presented by Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts and toured by Museums & Galleries Queensland. * Pattern & Print: Easton Pearson Archive

Brisbane fashion house Easton Pearson was at the avant-garde of international fashion between 1998 and 2016. The label's success hinged on the creative relationship between Pamela Easton and Lydia Pearson, whose unique ways of working fostered inventive designs, lasting collaborations and supported ethical manufacture. Pattern & Print: Easton Pearson Archive was a touring exhibition organised by Museum of Brisbane (MoB), toured by Museums & Galleries Queensland. It featured a selection of Easton Pearson's most vibrant designs, highlighting the staggering variety of patterns, colours and materials the label employed.

Easton Pearson created its own textile designs, setting it apart from other Australian fashion houses. On many occasions, Easton Pearson worked with individual artists to create unique designs, from colourful Indian hand beading, bold digital prints of original artworks, or designs painted by hand directly onto a finished dress.

Pattern & Print: Easton Pearson Archive highlighted Easton Pearson's collaborative approach, with a custom mural by Brisbanebased painter, illustrator and long-time Easton Pearson collaborator, Stephen Mok. Stephen created window designs for the label's flagship store, hand-painted patterns onto garments, and decorated accessories and props for the runway. His playful aesthetic presents the fantastical world of Easton Pearson, where both simplicity and detail shine, and artistry triumphs.

The exhibition concluded its national tour at Rockhampton Museum of Art, QLD on 14 May 2023.

Artist Stephen Mok travelled to Rockhampton Museum of Art to create a bespoke black-andwhite wall mural for the exhibition. Stephen undertook a mentoring role with local artists to assist him to complete the mural at this venue.

Lydia Pearson attended the opening event on 17 February and delivered a Designer Talk at Rockhampton Museum of Art on 18 February 2023.

From March 2021 until May 2023 the exhibition travelled over **9,790kms** to seven national venues and engaged a total of **54,825 visitors**. A total of 960 people attended 27 community engagement activities including designer floor talks, group tours and children's activities associated with the exhibition. 100% of venues rated the response from the public to the exhibition as 'Excellent' or 'Good'.

* ZOONOSES – Dr Nicola Hooper

Through drawing and lithography, Nicola Hooper uses fairy-tale iconology and rhymes to explore concepts surrounding zoonoses (animal diseases that can infect humans). The exhibition *ZOONOSES* explores how we perceive certain animals in the context of fear and disease.

Nicola is a Logan-based artist with a background in design and illustration. The *ZOONOSES* exhibition stems from Nicola's doctoral research and provides insightful observations into our contradictory perceptions of animals in relation to fear of disease – how we humans both despise animals for their role in spreading disease across species, yet also revere them as they provide us with the means of vaccination through scientific testing and discovery.

The works, including artist books, prints, wallpaper and mobiles, were all created using hand-coloured stone lithography.

ZOONOSES was displayed at five venues in 2023: Bundaberg Regional Art Gallery, QLD, Grafton Regional Gallery, NSW, Manning Regional Art Gallery, Taree, NSW, Bayside Gallery, Brighton, VIC and Devonport Regional Gallery, TAS.

Dr Nicola Hooper travelled to each of these venues to assist with the installation of the exhibition, attend the opening event present an Artist Talk and deliver *Polyester Plate Lithography* Workshops.

ZOONOSES received excellent coverage with Dr Nicola Hooper contributing a 2000-word essay to *Imprint Magazine*, a quarterly art journal dedicated to contemporary printmaking, artist books and works on paper.

* Lost in Palm Springs

Curated by Dr Greer Honeywill, *Lost in Palm Springs* was officially launched with a Palm Springs-inspired gala event at HOTA, Home of the Arts, Gold Coast on 11 March 2023, with many of the Australian artists in attendance.

This interdisciplinary exhibition brings together 14 creative minds, including internationally recognised artists, photographers and thinkers from America and Australia, who respond to, capture, or reimagine the magical qualities of the awe-inspiring mountainous landscape and the celebrated mid-century modern architecture found in the desert city.

Connections between Palm Springs and Australia are remarkably strong, particularly when viewed through the lens of the current renaissance of interest in modernist architecture. Almost half of the exhibitors have worked on both sides of the Pacific.

M&G QLD received funding from the Australian Government's Visions of Australia and Arts Queensland's Touring Queensland Fund to tour the exhibition to 12 venues from 2023 to 2025.

Dr Greer Honeywill has presented a curator talk at each venue with the exception of Biloela, where her talk was recorded and presented online.

* How Soon Is Now? - Bruce Reynolds

An initiative of M&G QLD, *How Soon Is Now?* brings together a selection of works by well known Australian artist Bruce Reynolds. His exquisite cast-relief works and two-dimensional collaged linoleum works celebrate a physicality that is frequently overlooked in today's growing digital environment. Exploring how we arrived at this point – from the archaic to a language of compressed space - Bruce's work invites consideration of the ancient and the now.

Bruce Reynolds' work grew from collage to relief and sculpture over a number of decades. Residencies in Rome focused both studio and architectural works on relief forms that occupy the space between painting and sculpture, between drawing and architecture. He describes it as being both archaic and a fresh place of representation.

For this exhibition, Bruce has used an antique process that favours direct material involvement

to cast works from liquid to solid that, when carved, create lively manifestations of thoughts on time, deep time and everyday archaeology. How Soon Is Now? launched at Ipswich Art Gallery, QLD on 12 August 2023, where it attracted over 13,700 and then travelled to Gympie Regional Gallery, QLD.

M&G QLD received funding from the Australian Government's Visions of Australia program to tour *How Soon is Now?* to 11 regional centres in Queensland, New South Wales, ACT and Tasmania throughout 2023 to 2026.

How Soon is Now? is a Museums & Galleries Queensland touring exhibition presented in partnership with the artist, Bruce Reynolds. This project has been assisted by the Australian Government's Visions of Australia program and is supported by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland. Museums & Galleries Queensland is also supported by the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation and recieves funds from Creative Australia through the Australian Cultural Fund.

* The Interior – Natalya Hughes

The Interior by artist Natalya Hughes, is an immersive installation combining sculptural seating, richly patterned soft furnishings and uncanny *objet d'art*, nestled around a handpainted mural to generate a stimulating space to unpack our collective and unconscious biases.

Interested in the role of women and their historical absence from positions of power, the part-professional, part-domestic setting conjured by The Interior plays with gendered power dynamics between public and private space. The couches that dot the gallery take their lush contours from the shapes of the female body and their detailed upholstery sees motifs of eyes, rats, and snakes from Freud's patient case studies ripple over the space in fleshy tones.

Audiences are invited to recline and be enveloped, soothed and held by the furniture's womanly forms while taking turns playing analyst and patient. Throughout this bodily encounter The Interior hopes to create a space where the existence of women can be reimagined on different terms in the post-Me Too world.

Curated by Tulleah Pearce, *The Interior* commenced its national tour at Logan Art Gallery, QLD, in March 2023 after which it travelled to Warwick Art Gallery, QLD, then on to Mornington Peninsula Regional Gallery, VIC, where it continues until February 2024.

Natalya Hughes and her assistant Savannah Jarvis have travelled to each venue to paint the exhibition's mural and assist with the installation. As a part of the mural painting process, Natalya has worked with and mentored local artists providing a rare and valuable professional development opportunity for participating artists. Natalya has also delivered an artist talk and rug tufting workshop at each venue.

These artists use diverse media, including collaborative works on paper, sculptures, paintings, interactive digital and moving-image works, crafting personal iconographies from the detritus of the human epoch in alternate time and space. * The Brothers Gruchy

Curated by Bundaberg Regional Galleries, *The Brothers Gruchy* features key artworks by acclaimed digital artists Tim and Mic Gruchy which focus on the intersections of technological innovations with biological forms, human perception, artificial intelligence, and synaesthesia.

In a technological environment characterised by hyper-communication and social networks, the brothers explore sensuous visions of an enhanced and rapidly changing world, while also considering its dissolution. Their subject matter ranges from familial connection, to great Australian rivers, to the environmental impacts of development and industry, to the degradation of the decommissioned Baoshan steelworks, Shanghai, once one of the largest steelworks in the world. Tim and Mic Gruchy's practice focuses on recurring themes of human perception, artificial intelligence, synaesthesia, memory and cultural identity. A strong thread of the exhibition is nature and our human impact.

The exhibition will commence touring in August 2024.

* Billy Missi'n Wakain Thamai

Billy Missi'n Wakain Thamai is an exquisite, bilingual retrospective exhibition honouring the artistic legacy of Billy Missi, a prominent figure in the establishment of the Torres Strait Island printmaking movement.

Billy Missi is remembered as a prolific artist and proactive maintainer of language and culture for his people. Rare and never-before exhibited monoprints and etchings are included in the exhibition, alongside iconic lino prints. The exhibition presents contemporary Torres Strait Islander culture and customs, paving the way for audiences to appreciate the rich collection of images and stories that speak to the artist's way of life and legacy.

Working with the family and friends of the late Billy Missi, the Curator, Russell Milledge, and NorthSite Contemporary Arts, Cairns, QLD, developed and presented this retrospective exhibition in 2020.

Partnering with NorthSite Contemporary Arts, M&G QLD developed a 13-venue national tour for the exhibition which, subject to funding, will tour from 2025 to 2028.

Billy Missi'n Wakain Thamai was developed by NorthSite Contemporary Arts, Cairns, and curated by Russel Milledge. The touring exhibition will be presented in partnership with NorthSite Contemporary Arts, Gab Titui Cultural Centre and Museums & Galleries Queensland.

* Wild Women Wild Clay

During the global pandemic lock-downs, Queensland ceramicist, Larissa Warren began researching the lives and work of local midcentury potters from Tamborine Mountain.

The COVID lockdowns allowed her time to research these women's stories, mostly through oral histories with the artists' relatives, neighbours, the local heritage centre and art historians in particular Glenn R Cooke, former Research Curator, Queensland Heritage at Queensland Art Gallery | Gallery of Modern Art (QAGOMA) and curator of *With Heart and Hand: Art Pottery in Queensland 1900-1950*.

Through this inquiry she found the original clay sites these women used, along with new clay locations. It also inspired her to contact 11 contemporary Australian ceramic artists she admires.

The objective was simple: to share stories and to connect during an isolating time (COVID), like the Tamborine women of the past had done. Tamborine Mountain clays were sent to these artists, to work with. The artists' individual and distinctive style and approach to the making and firing of the clays saw different conceptual approaches applied to the use of the clays. The resulting ceramics are diverse in nature and will allow visitors to compare and contrast different approaches to contemporary ceramic production.



Artist Touring Mentorship Program

M&G QLD's Artist Touring Mentorship Program aims to:

- mentor and build the selected artists' professional knowledge and skill base to get them 'market ready', with the view to their exhibitions entering M&G QLD's touring program
- raise the artists' profile
- maximise community engagement with their works through the resultant touring exhibitions.

M&G QLD staff continued mentoring the artists and coordinators at Artel, the CPL (Choice, Passion, Life) creative industries studio in Redcliffe. Artel supports a group of around 40 artists with profound and complex disabilities to engage in artistic practice, and advocates for the important contribution of these professional artists in wider society.

M&G QLD continued mentoring Dr Nicola Hooper through her exhibition *ZOONOSES*, to obtain knowledge on freight and touring logistics and public programs.

M&G QLD also continued to mentor members of the Botanical Artists' Society of Queensland following the conclusion of the national touring exhibition, *Artistic Endeavour: Contemporary Botanical Artists' Response to the Legacy of Banks, Solander and Parkinson*, in November 2022. Mentorship was provided in key areas of artwork dispersal, end of tour reporting and how to successfully acquit funding.

The Artist Touring Mentorship Program is an initiative of Museums & Galleries Queensland.
