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

As M&G QLD's Chairperson, I am privileged to be a part of this remarkable organisation and to support its Staff as they not only pivoted and adapted to immediate change in 2021, but also planned for the future, strongly positioning the Company for the next four years.

As the peak professional body, M&G QLD frequently engaged with local, state and federal governments about the experiences of our sector, provided data, and worked to ensure that new Public Health directives or government initiatives were shared when they were released.

I would like to thank the 400+ public museums and galleries across Queensland for their unwavering support and enthusiasm for M&G QLD's work and role in 2021. I also congratulate each of these organisations for their remarkable efforts in delivering exhibitions, activities, learning opportunities and events to engage and stimulate their audiences, and to promote strong social outcomes in their communities. M&G QLD's Board and Staff recognise and applaud the inspiring efforts and resilience of our sector's dedicated staff and volunteers in what has been a challenging year for all.

I am pleased to acknowledge the sector's member organisations, Public Galleries Queensland and Australian Museums and Galleries Association (Queensland), who continue to support the work of M&G QLD through representation on the Company's Board of Directors and other program initiatives.

M&G QLD's Board composition remained unchanged throughout 2021. This stability and imbedded corporate knowledge strongly supported M&G QLD's Executive Staff with the writing of the Company's 2022–2025 Strategic Plan and forward programming. Τ would like to thank each of my fellow Directors - Andrew Moritz, Emma Bain, Anna Thurgood, Celestine Doyle and Tony Martin for their continued support, and for their passion and commitment to both the Company and our sector.



Throughout the year, M&G QLD's Board of Directors met a total of 6 times. The Board embraces a culture of continuous improvement to ensure that high standards of conduct, governance and compliance are upheld. As a part of this, in 2021 M&G QLD reviewed existing Company policies and adopted new ones including:

- Diversity and Inclusion Policy
- First Nations Policy

These documents, along with our 2022–2025 Strategic Plan, formed part of M&G QLD's successful application to Arts Queensland for multi-year operational funding. They also inform our work practices and contribute to M&G QLD's guiding principles of best practice, professional integrity, respect, equity and access.

M&G QLD's Directors value each of our employees and their truly remarkable contributions to the Company and wider sector. In particular, we acknowledge M&G QLD's Executive Director, Rebekah Butler, and General Manager, Debra Beattie, for demonstrating exceptional leadership for the sector and within the structure of this organisation. They exemplify the passion and work ethic our sector thrives upon and the way that they have guided us through challenges and championed the value of our work is incomparable. Although much of the year was influenced by the pandemic, 2021 reinforced M&G QLD's crucial role in Queensland's arts and cultural landscape. I am incredibly proud to play a small part in this organisation.

Based on M&G QLD's conversations and engagement with industry staff, volunteers and stakeholders, I am encouraged that Queensland's public museum and gallery sector will continue to play a key role in recovery and reconnecting and that it will attract new opportunities that benefit us all.

Highlights of 2021

M&G QLD **secured operational funding** for 2022–2025 through Arts Queensland's Organisations Fund.

191 people viewed the online presentation of M&G QLD's 2021 Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards (GAMAA), celebrating the successes of the **6** Winners and **9** Finalists.

Throughout 2021, M&G QLD continued to **advocate** to local, state and federal governments and key stakeholders to advance Queensland's museum and gallery sector and contribute to **positive change**.

289 participants took part in 16 M&G QLD training and professional development activities in 2021. A further 107 participants took part in 4 sector development activities supported by M&G QLD. 17.4% of surveyed participants had not taken part in M&G QLD's training and professional development activities previously. 97.6% of participants rated these activities overall as 'Excellent' (79.3%) or 'Good' (18.3%).

M&G QLD's 2021 touring exhibition program presented **8** exhibitions to **27** venues in Queensland and nationally, attracting **40,801** visitors. M&G QLD's touring exhibitions profiled the work of **12** curators and **151** artists – this included 42 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists.

100% of touring exhibition venues rated the quality of M&G QLD's services as 'Excellent'.

100% of touring exhibition venues rated the response from participants to public programs provided by M&G QLD as 'Excellent' (96%) or 'Good' (4%).

100% of exhibition venues rated the response from the public to M&G QLD's touring exhibitions as 'Excellent' (89.5%) or 'Good' (10.5%)

M&G QLD continued the delivery of its **Artist Touring Mentorship Program** in 2021, mentoring one individual Queensland artist; a group of artists from Artel, CPL's creative industries studio, Redcliffe; and members of the Botanical Artists' Society of Queensland, to build their professional knowledge and skill base in the area of exhibition touring. **100%** agreed that they benefitted from the program.

M&G QLD Staff responded to more than **2,932** client service enquiries in 2021 – an increase of **5.4%** on the previous year.

M&G QLD launched its new website in 2021. www.magsq.com.au

- The total number of resources downloaded from M&G QLD's website in 2021 was 39,440.
 2,645 downloads were M&G QLD's COVID resources.
- M&G QLD's online film content attracted 1,230 views.
- M&G QLD's Instagram followers reached 1,310 – an increase of 19.3%.

NETS Australia's website registered **18,589** page views in 2021, up **9.2%** on the previous year.

M&G QLD's program activities generated more than **571** mentions in digital, print, radio and television media.

M&G QLD, in partnership with Public Galleries Association of Victoria, published the 2019 **Australian Public Galleries Snapshot**, on behalf of the National Public Galleries Alliance. This report collated the data of **170** of our country's estimated 434 small-to-medium public galleries.

Executive Director's Report

Building on lessons learned in 2020, the priorities for Museums & Galleries Queensland (M&G QLD) in 2021 continued to focus on the health and wellbeing of our people and the safe delivery of programs and services to best support our sector and the communities they serve.

Flexibility has been central to operating in this ever-changing environment. Throughout the year, we navigated the pandemic by being both adaptable and responsive to changing health directives and sector

needs. M&G QLD's Board and Staff collaborated with industry partners to leverage knowledge and expertise to adopt new approaches, remain accessible, and to deliver a rich annual program of hybrid activities and events.

While it has been important, and necessary in some instances, to deliver online programming and content during COVID, this period has also reinforced that people still want and value faceto-face engagement and hands-on participation, as well as opportunities to physically connect.

The past two years have changed the way many of us work, how programs and services are delivered and, for our sector in particular, how things are experienced. We are immensely proud of our sector and how it has responded to our 'new normal'. Having said this, the events of the past two years have also placed many organisations under pressure.

As the peak body for Queensland's public museum and gallery sector, we have observed how our sector has creatively responded to increased community demand despite the challenges of COVID, natural disasters and diminishing resources. We've also seen it struggle during this period. Our state's public museums and



galleries are essential to community wellbeing, delivering vital programs and services to build capacity, encourage creativity and learning, and engender a sense of place and pride. Advocating our sector's intrinsic value, M&G QLD continues to champion its importance and to campaign for measures to support its long-term viability, particularly in times of adversity.

M&G QLD's proactive response to supporting the sector during the pandemic has resulted in our Staff

being called upon to present at various industry forums to share our experiences and knowledge, and to contribute to university research into sector impacts.

Providing clarity on COVID directives contributed to the increased number of client service enquires responded to in 2020 and 2021. While enquiries were constant throughout the year, they spiked with the introduction of the Queensland Government's mandatory Check In QLD app and COVID Safe Checklist; facemask directives; SEQ and regional Queensland lockdown periods; and vaccination entry requirements – the latter causing the greatest confusion and concern, particularly amongst community and volunteerrun organisations.

In reading M&G QLD's 2021 Annual Report you will learn more about our year's activities, reach and leadership.

None of this work would have been possible without M&G QLD's remarkable Staff and Board of Directors. I also extend my thanks to all of our industry partners, stakeholders, advisory groups and individuals who contribute so much to the success of our operations. We are immensely grateful for your continued support. We experienced a few Staff changes throughout the year. Notably Prue McComish joined M&G QLD, taking on the role of Exhibition Program Officer when Rachael De Groot commenced parental leave early in the year. We were also delighted to welcome Tara Callaghan as M&G QLD's new Training & Professional Development Program Manager and, more recently, Heather Moore stepped into the Information Officer role when Melissa Fletcher commenced parental leave in September.

M&G QLD Staff undertook numerous professional development initiatives, building the capacity of the organisation through their participation in online opportunities throughout the year. A number of our Staff also undertook Cultural Capability training through the online Core Cultural Learning platform developed by the Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies. This opportunity was made possible through the Australian Museums and Galleries Association (AMaGA) with the support of The Wood Foundation and the Cartwright Douglas Fund.

To each of our Staff – Debra Beattie, Tara Callaghan, Leisha Walker, Andrea Higgins, Prue McComish, Rachael De Groot, Melissa Fletcher, Heather Moore and Karike Ashworth – I extend my heartfelt thanks. Through their dedication and hard work, M&G QLD achieved high-level engagement with strong outcomes across our state and nationally in 2021.

Some of these highlights include:

- More than 41,500 people participated in M&G QLD's 2021 programs.
- The Company's 2022–2025 Strategic Plan was finalised, setting in place key strategies to guide our next four years of operation.
- Multi-year operational funding for 2022– 2025 was secured through Arts Queensland's Organisations Fund.
- M&G QLD's new website was finalised and launched with the support of the Gambling

Community Benefit Fund, Flipnet Pty Ltd and the commendable efforts of Staff members Melissa Fletcher and Leisha Walker.

- M&G QLD's Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards (GAMAA) were live-streamed for the first time, engaging over 190 viewers and celebrating our sector's accomplishments.
- Funding was secured through The Ian Potter Foundation to engage First Nations consultant Donna Biles Fernando, supported by Debbie Abraham, to review the National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries.
- The 2019 Australian Public Galleries Snapshot was published on behalf of the National Public Galleries Alliance in December 2021.
- M&G QLD partnered with Australian Museum and Galleries Association (AMaGA) to roll out the Australian Government's \$3 million Culture, Heritage and Arts Regional Tourism (CHART) grants program in 2021–2022.

I am proud to report that we achieved a strong endorsement from the sector, with 98.9% rating the quality of our services as 'Excellent' (89.7%) or 'Good" (9.2%). It is gratifying to receive such positive feedback from our constituency, and an important measure of the organisation's role and value.

We learn from our analysis of program evaluations and apply these learnings to improve future program delivery. The findings show that our sector, participants and stakeholders appreciate the high-level support, professionalism and services that M&G QLD Staff provide.

M&G QLD closed the year in a sound financial position. This was largely due to support received through State and Federal Government stimulus packages. With COVID impacting our income earning capacity, this assisted greatly in retaining Staff and reducing the financial impacts of another challenging year. We also acknowledge the support of State Government through Arts Queensland's Organisations Fund; Visual Arts and Craft Strategy funding; project grants; and the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation in assisting us to realise our vision in 2021.

Reflecting on the year, despite temporary COVID lockdowns and disruptions to programming, there were many positives. M&G QLD remains committed to our public museum and gallery sector, delivering wide-ranging programs and services, tailored to meet the unique needs of our constituents, recognising that each organisation and community is different.

We strive to be a sustainable workplace, and in 2022 look forward to implementing our 2022–2025 Strategic Plan. This living document consolidates and builds upon our past work and successes, and provides a strong foundation for the years ahead.

As always, we value our sector's ongoing support and look forward to working with you again in 2022.

Australian Public Galleries Snapshot

In December 2021, the National Public Galleries Alliance launched the 2019 *Australian Public Galleries Snapshot*. Capturing data of 170 of our country's estimated 434 public galleries, this report reflects just over one third (39%) of our nation's dynamic public gallery network. The *Snapshot* is based on the analysis of an indepth sector-wide survey, and highlights the extraordinary impact that small-to-medium public galleries make to the social, cultural and economic wellbeing of Australia's metropolitan, regional and remote communities.

Australian Public Galleries at a glance

[Based on available data for 2019]:

- Local Government is the largest investor in small-to-medium public galleries (50% of the 170 public galleries captured in the *Snapshot* are owned or operated by Local Government).
- More than 21% (>\$21 million) of Australia's small-to-medium public galleries' income is self-generated.
- Small-to-medium public galleries employ more than 700 FTE staff. 4% of these staff are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander peoples.
- 56% of small-to-medium public galleries are housed in buildings that are over 50 years old.
- Over \$4.7 million was invested in artists' fees, supporting more than 21,500 living artists.
- Small-to-medium public galleries hold over 819,200 collection items of local, state, national and international significance, with a combined value of \$1.5 billion.
- Overall, 74% of small-to-medium public galleries' collections are digitised. Around 35% of these are publicly available online.
- Annually, over 16.3 million people visit our country's public galleries, including state, territory and national public gallery institutions.
- Annually, more than 4,500 volunteers donate their time and expertise to small-to-medium public galleries. Quantified, the value of this volunteer labour is \$13 million.

The Australian Public Galleries Snapshot is a research initiative prepared by Museums & Galleries Queensland and Public Galleries Association of Victoria on behalf of the National Public Galleries Alliance.

Members of the National Public Galleries Alliance are: Art on the Move; Australian Craft and Design Centres; Contemporary Art Tasmania; Galleries West; Museum and Art Gallery Northern Territory; Museums & Galleries of New South Wales; Museums & Galleries Queensland; Public Galleries Association of Victoria; Public Galleries Queensland; Regional Galleries Association of South Australia; Regional & Public Galleries of New South Wales; and University Art Museums Australia.

Sector Development

* CHART Grant Program

The Australian Government's \$3 million Culture, Heritage and Arts Regional Tourism (CHART) grants program assists community arts, heritage and cultural organisations in regional Australia as they recover from the impacts of COVID 19. The program is administrered by Australian Museums and Galleries Association (AMaGA).

M&G QLD's Training and Professional Development Staff are the Regional Coordinators for the Queensland element of the CHART program. This involves answering queries from all Queensland applicants and assisting them with their applications. As well as this, M&G QLD's Training and Professional Development Staff assess applications from other States.

Applications for this program opened on 5 November 2021. Individual letters and emails were sent to 300 eligible organisations in Queensland, and information was also sent to the Mayors of the Local Government areas.

By the end of 2021 there were 74 applications submitted, with 25 from Queensland and an additional 135 applications in progress. The CHART Grant Program closes on 29 April 2022.

Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards (GAMAA)

M&G QLD proudly announced the Winners and Finalists in the 2021 Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards (GAMAA) in an online presentation event streamed on 14 December 2021. 191 guests viewed the presentations. The online presentation was a new format for M&G QLD, in response to COVID impacts.

* COVID Response and Leadership

Throughout 2021, M&G QLD continued to work with our constituents and stakeholders to provide leadership, advocacy and up-to-date information to help our sector navigate the pandemic.

In June 2021, the Queensland Government replaced all COVID Industry Plans with a COVID Safe Checklist and introduced a mandatory Check In QLD app, which M&G QLD promoted widely to the sector. To support Queensland's public museums and galleries, we also offered to physically print and provide copies of the Checklist and other COVID resources to constituents unable to access this information online.

Following the introduction of the Checklist, M&G QLD consolidated its COVID sector resources into a new 'go-to/one-stop' document. This contains industry specific information and resources unlikely to change, while information that is regularly changing has been moved to the Company's website. This has proved a more effective way for managing content and ensuring that the sector is able to access the most up-todate information. With the assistance of Volunteering Queensland, M&G QLD also developed and published a Volunteer Workforce Risk Assessment Template, to assist the safe return of volunteers to the workplace.

Other activities included:

- Filtering Queensland Health Directives and disseminating information specific to our sector through M&G QLD's communication channels.
- Responding to sector enquiries.
- Advocating to State Government for continued support of our public museum and gallery sector.
- Liaising with, participating in forums and providing data to State Government.
- Participating in meetings with state and national peak bodies and service organisations to share COVID resources and strategies.
- Presenting a *Mental Health Essentials* webinar to support our sector's artsworkers.
- Working with *ArtsHub* to bring awareness to the challenges experienced by museums and galleries in Queensland. See *The real story of COVID's impact on QLD regional galleries*, by Gina Fairley, *ArtsHub*, 8 September 2021.
- Presenting at the Australian Institute for the Conservation of Cultural Material's Agents of Change: 10 Agents over 10 Months COVID and Conservation webinar.
- Contributing to university research into the impacts of COVID-19 on the arts and cultural sector.

The unpredictable nature of COVID subjected our Staff and the sector more broadly to change fatigue. During the year, programs had to be reimagined several times over to respond to the health directives of the day in any given state or territory. As an organisation, we have learned to be more strategic as to how we adapt and respond to these changing conditions.

We thank our colleagues and industry partners for their support in helping us to respond to and navigate the ongoing challenges of COVID. We also acknowledge those organisations who generously shared their COVID experiences to assist M&G QLD with advocating for greater industry support.

Industry Partnerships

M&G QLD works with a broad range of industry partners to deliver its programs and services (acknowledged on pages 45–49 of this report).

Some of the key partners in M&G QLD's 2021 delivery included:

• National Standards Taskforce

The National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries is currently undergoing a major review and update. M&G QLD is a key member of the National Standards Taskforce (NST). Over the course of 2021, our Training and Professional Development Staff undertook major sector consultation in Queensland for this review.

M&G QLD was responsible for recruiting and managing First Nations consultant, Donna Biles Fernando, and Debbie Abraham. The consultants conducted an in-depth review and update of the National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries to align with the First Peoples Roadmap for Enhancing Indigenous Engagement in Museums and Galleries. This included a major national survey and the formation of a national focus group of First Nations gallery and museum workers.

Work on updating the *National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries 2.0* will continue into 2022. It is expected that the new *National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries* will be launched in mid to late 2022.

The update to the *National Standards for Australian Museum and Galleries* has been made possible with funding from The Ian Potter Foundation.

Version 1.5 of the *National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries* is available to download from M&G QLD's website.

A list of partners in the NST is provided on page 47.

• NETS Australia

The National Exhibition Touring Support (NETS) Australia network comprises Artback NT: Arts Development and Touring; Art on the Move WA; Contemporary Art Tasmania; Country Arts SA; Museums & Galleries of NSW; Museums & Galleries Queensland; and NETS Victoria.

The NETS Australia network moderates content on the NETS Australia website for each of their respective states and territories, https:// netsaustralia.org.au

M&G QLD Staff commenced writing a *Standard Facility Report* on behalf of NETS Australia in 2020, in response to sector demand. With the continuation of COVID and other organisational priorities, work on this document was suspended in 2021, however we look forward to finalising this when time permits.

• National Public Galleries Alliance

Co-convened by Museums & Galleries Queensland and Public Galleries Association of Victoria, the National Public Galleries Alliance (NPGA) is comprised of two national networks and ten state peak bodies and public gallery membership organisations, working collaboratively to support the Australian small-to-medium public gallery sector.

In 2021, NPGA published the 2019 Australian *Public Galleries Snapshot* (see pages 12–13).

• Australian Museums and Galleries Association (AMaGA)

M&G QLD worked closely with AMaGA on the delivery of the Culture, Heritage and Arts Regional Tourism (CHART) grants program throughout 2021.

• Australian Museums and Galleries Association (AMaGA) Emerging Professionals Networking Event

M&G QLD partnered with the AMaGA Emerging Professionals National Network to deliver a networking opportunity in Queensland. The event was held at the Integrated Pathology Learning Centre, Brisbane, on 21 May 2021. It was rescheduled from late March due to COVID disruptions.

The evening featured a curator's talk and tour from Rebecca Lush, Curator of the Integrated Pathology Learning Centre. There were 8 attendees in total and the event was well received.

• Museums & Galleries of New South Wales (M&G NSW)

M&G QLD continued to collaborate with M&G NSW on the Standards Review Program for sustainable community museums and galleries.

• Queensland Art Gallery | Gallery of Modern Art (QAGOMA) *Art as Exchange* Program

M&G QLD partnered with QAGOMA and participated in the *Art as Exchange* Program on Girramay Country (Cardwell) from 15–17 June

2021. Organised and facilitated by QAGOMA's Learning and Education team, this intensive three-day workshop was attended by artists, arts workers and arts educators from around the region.

• Queensland Museum Network Museum Development Officers (MDOs)

M&G QLD continued to work closely with the Queensland Museum Network's Museum Development Officers to support and grow the capacity of the sector in Queensland.

• Queensland Statewide Peak Body/Service Organisation Group

M&G QLD contributed as an industry representative to this sector working group comprising Stage Queensland, ArTour, AusDance, QMusic, Flying Arts Alliance and M&G QLD.

• Public Galleries Queensland (PGQ) and Australian Museums and Galleries Association Queensland (AMaGAQ)

M&G QLD continued to provide office space and administrative support to PGQ and AMaGAQ's part-time Membership Officer, Karike Ashworth. This support has been ongoing since 2004.

In 2021, M&G QLD worked with PGQ on the *Building Creative Places* Seminar at HOTA Home of the Arts.

• Brisbane's Living Heritage Network (BLHN)

In 2021, M&G QLD continued to work with BLHN through mutual support and cross-promotion of programs and events.

M&G QLD Training and Professional Development Staff worked with BLHN to successfully secure funding through the National Library of Australia's Community Heritage Grant program.



M&G QLD Standards Review Program A joint program with Museums & Galleries of New South Wales

In 2021 M&G QLD undertook the Standards Review Program, a strategic approach to skills development and training, in the Bundaberg, Rockhampton and Yeppoon regions.

This joint program for sustainable community museums and galleries, implemented by Museums & Galleries of New South Wales (M&G NSW) and M&G QLD, supports community museums and galleries through a process of self-review and peer feedback. It provides an opportunity for museums and galleries to assess their practices and policies against *The National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries*, developed collaboratively by the National Standards Taskforce, and to develop a plan for their future.

Four collecting organisations participated in the 2021 program:

- Hinkler Hall of Aviation, Bundaberg;
- Archer Park Rail Museum, Rockhampton;
- Country Hospital Museum, Rockhampton;
- Capricorn Coast Historical Society, Yeppoon.

The Standards Review Program was subject to many disruptions throughout 2021, with COVID lockdowns and border closures. The Hinkler Hall of Aviation was able to complete the full Standards Review Program in 2021. The organisations in Rockhampton and Yeppoon completed half of the Standards Review Program in 2021 and the other half has been carried over into 2022.

The Standards Review Program Briefing Session was held over 18–19 March 2021 in Rockhampton and Bundaberg. The purpose of the Briefing Session was to welcome participants to the program, introduce them to details of the program schedule and the Self Review Survey.

The Briefing Session also provided the opportunity for participants to highlight their achievements and aspirations, and to discuss expectations.

In the first element of the program, the Self Review Survey, a group from each organisation spent three months working their way through the substantial survey on three key areas of museum practice, guided by a detailed list of references.

The three essential areas of museum practice in the Standards Review Program are:

- Managing the Museum;
- Involving People;
- Developing a Significant Collection.

All four organisations were able to complete their Self Review Surveys within the 2021 calendar year.

The second major element of the program was undertaken by the Standards Reviewers over the following six months, who worked in pairs to conduct:

- Desk Reviews of the participants' completed surveys;
- Field Visits to the participants' institutions and a report to the participants;
- On Site Review visits and a report to the participants.

Hinkler Hall of Aviation was able to complete this second element of the Standards Review Program in 2021. Organisations in Rockhampton and Yeppoon received their Desk Reviews from Reviewers however, due to COVID disruptions, their Field Visits and On Site Reviews have been carried over to early 2022.

The Reviewers were invited to work with M&G QLD on the 2021 Standards Review Program for their capacity to represent the diversity of the museum sector and networks. All Reviewers are very familiar with the day-to-day operations of small-to-medium museums or galleries. These industry professionals generously volunteer their time to the Standards Review Program. In 2021 the Reviewers were:

- Deannah Vieth, Museum Consultant;
- Christine Ianna, Conservator and Museum Consultant;
- Jim McCann, Museum Consultant;
- Maggi Solly, Museum Consultant;
- Robert Shiels, Queensland Museum;
- Zoe Scott, Museum Consultant.

Deannah Vieth and Christine Ianna were the Reviewers for Hinkler Hall of Aviation. M&G QLD Staff, Tara Callaghan and Leisha Walker, accompanied and supported the Reviewers on these visits.

At the Field Visit to Hinkler Hall of Aviation, Reviewers and M&G QLD Staff met participants,

toured the venue, discussed the organisation's strengths and suggestions for improvements, and provided practical advice and assistance. In addition to this, they also worked with the organisation to identify key areas for future development, and prioritised these actions.

At the On Site Review for Hinkler Hall of Aviation, Reviewers and M&G QLD Staff worked with participants to improve their museum profile, identify key areas for future development, prioritise these and develop an action plan for the issue of highest priority. In the last part of the visit, stakeholders were invited to join to hear a summary of the organisation's achievements and the agreed areas for future development.

Maggi Solly and Robert Shiels were Reviewers for Archer Park Rail Museum. Reviewers for Country Hospital Museum were Zoe Scott and Jim McCann. Reviewers for Capricorn Coast Historical Society were Jim McCann and Maggi Solly. Reviewers submitted Desk Reviews for these organisations, with Field Visits and On Site Reviews carrying over to 2022.

Standards Reviewers contributed a total of 185 unpaid hours of their expertise (including travel) to the 2021 program.

A profile and media release drafted by M&G QLD Staff and approved by Hinkler Hall of Aviation was distributed to media in December 2021 with photos of Reviewers at the Field Visits. Profiles are available at: https://magsq.com.au/standardsreview-program/

Standards Review Program 2022

2021 Events

Building Creative Places M&G QLD | HOTA Seminar

M&G QLD partnered with HOTA, Home of the Arts, Gold Coast, to present a major industry seminar, *Building Creative Places* on 4 June 2021. This was an opportunity for the cultural sector to see the brand-new Gallery and hear from an informative line-up of industry professionals who explored topics including local community engagement during a major gallery build; artistic practice working alongside infrastructure; the development and construction of a new remote Queensland arts and cultural centre; and funding and building a new gallery in a local government context. Speakers included:

- Nickeema Williams, Woorabinda Arts and Cultural Centre Manager;
- Brett Adlington, CEO, Museums & Galleries of NSW;

M&G QLD Training and Professional Development Staff undertook organisation of this Seminar in partnership with HOTA, and worked alongside Public Galleries Queensland who held their Public Galleries Directors' Forum on the same day. 66 public gallery staff, volunteers, local government representatives, industry consultants and artists from across Queensland and interstate attended. Feedback from the event was positive, with great ideas and suggestions for future Seminar topics.

93% of the attendees rated the Seminar as 'Excellent' or 'Good'. Some comments from attendees about what they learnt during the Seminar:

'Keep trying - don't let aspirations expire.'

'Advocacy for cultural infrastructure can take a long time. Grass roots projects are powerful to facilitate change.'

'Lots of things: Artist process; ideas for funding; the importance of arts and culture in real stories.'

'To be tenacious, keep championing great ideas.'

Volunteer Skills Workshops

Skills workshops were delivered at Kingaroy and Mundubbera over 22–24 September 2021. M&G QLD Training and Professional Development Staff facilitated the workshops with assistance from the teams at the Kingaroy Art Gallery and Mundubbera Regional Art Gallery.

On day 1 and 2, guest trainer Mark Creyton delivered a workshop, *Revitalising your Volunteer Program*, in each town with a specific focus on the unique opportunities and challenges of volunteer engagement in museums and galleries. On day 3, Training and Professional Development Staff delivered a specifically tailored funding workshop for the Mundubbera Regional Art Gallery team.

Day 1 workshop in Kingaroy had 23 attendees with participants from Kingaroy, Toogoolawah and Wondai. Day 2 workshop in Mundubbera had 13 attendees with participants from Gayndah, Mundubbera and Eidsvold. Day 3 workshop

in Mundubbera had 6 attendees from the Mundubbera Regional Art Gallery team.

* Mental Health Essentials Webinar

On 9 November 2021, M&G QLD's Training and Professional Development Staff organised a free mental health webinar for the gallery and museum sector with registered psychologist, Sam Sellwood. Sam presented a practical webinar focusing on 'mental health essentials', with opportunities to ask questions and discuss issues.

There was a total of 19 attendees who were all able to interact and ask questions. Attendees were sent a follow-up email with resources and links that could be used to help both themselves and others in the case of mental ill health.

Careers other than a Curator Networking Event

A networking event, *Careers other than a Curator*, was held at Museum of Brisbane on 25 November 2021, followed by drinks and refreshments at a nearby venue.

There was a total of 28 attendees who all gained knowledge and tips from the speakers, who spoke about their career journeys from different backgrounds and geographical locations. There was an opportunity for networking and socialising following the formal part of the evening.

100% of survey respondents rated the event as 'Excellent' or 'Good'. Attendees appreciated the diversity of speakers and the opportunity for informal networking and making connections.

Exhibition Development and Touring

8 exhibitions were toured by M&G QLD in 2021 to 27 venues nationally, featuring 151 artists and 12 curators, showing for a total of 997 exhibition days and attracting 40,801 visitors.

Artistic Endeavour: Contemporary botanical artists' response to the legacy of Banks, Solander and Parkinson

Artistic Endeavour is a partnership between M&G QLD and Botanical Artists' Society of Queensland (BASQ). The exhibition completed display at its first tour venue, Redland Art Gallery, QLD, at the end of January 2021 and continued on its national tour.

The year 2020 marked the 250th anniversary of the *Endeavour* voyage along the east coast of Australia by Joseph Banks and Daniel Solander, together with illustrator Sydney Parkinson. Of the 30,000 specimens of flora and fauna collected on this 'Voyage of Discovery', most were new to European science and became the 'type' that described the species.

The Botanical Artists' Society of Queensland developed this exhibition to consider the significance to Queensland of the botanical specimens collected and the emergence of Botanical Art in science. Drawing from historical sources and specimens held at the Queensland Herbarium, some of which were collected in 1770, along with living plants, the artists have created plant portraits that highlight the significance of Queensland's botanical heritage.

Scientific illustration, watercolour, scraperboard, historical media such as silverpoint and watercolour on vellum, and contemporary practice are included in the exhibition.

Co-Curated by Beth Jackson and Dr Nita C Lester, this exhibition brings a contemporary perspective to the historic *Endeavour* voyage and forms part of a world-wide program of commemorations.

Biloela, QLD; and an online workshop streamed to participants at Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre, NSW (adapted to online delivery due to COVID).

Exhibition artist, Louise Saunders, delivered a *Ferns with background* workshop at Warwick Art Gallery, QLD, and Lockyer Valley Art Gallery, Gatton, QLD.

Due to overwhelming demand, exhibition artist Tanya Hoolihan delivered two *Introduction to Watercolour for Botanical Art* workshops at Tamworth Regional Gallery, NSW.

Exhibition artist, Julia Hancock, joined Co-Curator, Beth Jackson to deliver *In Conversation*, an online sunset talk at Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre, NSW.

In 2021, M&G QLD developed an Education Resource for the exhibition, which was provided to venues for their education audiences.

A full-colour catalogue is provided at no cost to tour venues to distribute to visitors.

The BASQ exhibition project team is being mentored as part of M&G QLD's Artist Touring Mentorship Program, an initiative supported by M&G QLD's Visual Arts and Craft Strategy (VACS) funding.

* Legacy: Reflections on Mabo

Legacy: Reflections on Mabo celebrates the man behind the game-changing Native Title Act, Eddie Koiki Mabo.

Co-Curated by Gail Mabo (daughter of Eddie Koiki Mabo), Dr Jonathan McBurnie (former Director of Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts) and Kellie Williams (former Director of Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts), the exhibition brings together a selection of 22 works by Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists in the spirit of reconciliation, approximately three decades after the historic achievement.

Each artist has responded to an aspect of Eddie Mabo that they are drawn to, whether it is his life, politics, activism, or legacy. The works come together in surprising ways with reverence, compassion, anger, sadness and respect, celebrating a man who was both a rebel and a dreamer. In 2021, *Legacy: Reflections on Mabo* toured to four venues nationally: Burrinja Cultural Centre, Dandenong Ranges, VIC; Port Pirie Regional Art Gallery, SA; Nautilus Art Centre, Port Lincoln, SA; and Bundaberg Regional Art Gallery, QLD.

Co-Curator, Gail Mabo, participated in public programs and networking at Port Pirie Regional Art Gallery, SA. Exhibition artist, Sonja Carmichael, attended the exhibition opening and delivered a floor talk at this venue.

Exhibition artist, Tommy Pau, delivered two artist talks and participated in networking events at Bundaberg Regional Art Gallery, QLD. Co-Curator, Gail Mabo, attended a VIP dinner and delivered two floor talks at this venue.

Manggan – gather, gathers, gathering

Manggan – gather, gathers, gathering concluded its tour at Caboolture Regional Art Gallery, QLD, in February 2021.

Manggan is an exhibition of cultural works from the Girringun Aboriginal Art Centre in Cardwell in Far North Queensland and from the South Australian Museum. The Corporation encompasses nine tribal groups in far north Queensland: the Nywaigi, Gugu Badhun, Warrgamay, Warungnu, Bandjin, Girramay, Gulnay, Jirrbal and Djiru people.

Emerging from the rainforest canopy and a culture spanning countless generations, the work of Girringun artists attracts a lot of attention. Contemporary Indigenous weavers, painters, potters, textile artists and makers of traditional objects transform their stories and environments of this ancient culture into visual images and designs. A continuing close connection to place and honouring of Indigenous law and culture provides inspiration for their work, which embraces traditional and contemporary concepts. The Girringun artists are renowned weavers of traditional forms and they also use a fresh approach when working with the ceramic medium.

This exhibition included artworks featuring documentaries, pictures, weaving (bicornual baskets called Jawun and modern baskets), ceramic (fire spirits called Bagu) by Indigenous artists from the Girringun Aboriginal Art Centre. These contemporary artworks were displayed alongside baskets selected from the collection of the South Australian Museum in Adelaide.

* long water: fibre stories

long water: fibre stories commenced its national tour at Milingimbi Art and Culture Centre, NT, in May 2021.

Like a confluence—where bodies of water meet long water: fibre stories travels across place to bring together fibre practices of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women from different generations, experiences and ancestries.

The featured artists include community Elders, leaders, and younger artists, working in collaboration with collective and family memory or with their kin, community, or art centre to nurture, preserve, and share culture through fibre-based forms. These artists all carry a spirited attachment to water.

The places or passages traced in this exhibition are as follows: the vital fresh water rivers of Yuwaalaraay country (North West NSW); the abundant salt water and fresh waters of Quandamooka country (Moreton Bay, South East Queensland); the place where sea and tropical rainforest meet on Kuku Yalanji country (Far North Queensland); the brilliant turquoise waters and clusters of islands in Torres Strait region (Far North Queensland); and finally, the seas surrounding the spirited lands and waters of Yurrwi (Milingimbi Island, NT), and neighbouring homelands in far North East Arnhem Land (NT).

The artists in this exhibition make clear that their relationships to water are both unbreakable and complexly interwoven with all other elements that sustain life, culture, identity and spirituality. Their artworks remind us that to weave is to honour the ways of water, to care for the environment and systems that support important water sites, and to acknowledge that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures flow from a deep and eternal source—Ancestors and country.

This exhibition has been developed through relationships with artists and communities, particularly the Milingimbi Art and Culture Centre, and Moa Arts.



Pattern and Print: Easton Pearson Archive

Brisbane fashion house Easton Pearson was at the avant-garde of international fashion between 1998 and 2016. The label's success hinged on the creative relationship between Pamela Easton and Lydia Pearson, whose unique ways of working fostered inventive designs, lasting collaborations, and supported ethical manufacture. Pattern and Print: Easton Pearson Archive is a touring exhibition organised by Museum of Brisbane (MoB), toured by Museums & Galleries Queensland. It features a selection of Easton Pearson's most vibrant designs, highlighting the staggering variety of patterns, colours and materials the label employed.

Easton Pearson created its own textile designs, setting it apart from other Australian fashion houses. On many occasions, Easton Pearson worked with individual artists to create unique designs, from colourful Indian hand beading, bold digital prints of original artworks, or designs painted by hand directly onto a finished dress.

Pattern and Print: Easton Pearson Archive highlights Easton Pearson's collaborative approach, with a custom mural by Brisbanebased painter, illustrator and long-time Easton Pearson collaborator, Stephen Mok. Stephen created window designs for the label's flagship store, hand-painted patterns onto garments, and decorated accessories and props for the runway. His playful aesthetic presents the fantastical world of Easton Pearson, where both simplicity and detail shine, and artistry triumphs.

In 2021, the exhibition toured nationally to three venues: RMIT Gallery, RMIT University, Melbourne, VIC; Devonport Regional Gallery, TAS; and Signal Point Gallery, Goolwa, SA.

Artist Stephen Mok travelled to Devonport Regional Gallery, TAS, to create a bespoke blackand-white wall 'mural'. COVID travel restrictions prevented Stephen from visiting all venues, so he undertook a mentoring role with artists local to the venue's region to assist them to complete the mural work.

Designer, Lydia Pearson, delivered a well-received talk at RMIT Gallery, VIC.

As COVID prevented anyone travelling from Queensland to Devonport Regional Gallery, TAS, former Brisbane gallery owner and Tasmanian sea-changer, Roz MacAllan, officially opened the exhibition and delivered a talk about Easton Pearson. Also due to COVID travel restrictions, Rhana Devenport, current Director of the Art Gallery of South Australia, and ex-Queenslander, opened the exhibition at Signal Point Regional Gallery, SA. No public programs were able to be delivered at that time.

Reasonable & Necessary: prints and artist books by Artel Artists

Artel, CPL – Choice, Passion, Life's creative industries studio in Redcliffe, QLD, supports the development of a positive and participatory cultural identity for a group of around 40 artists with profound and complex disabilities. The studio offers space, instruction and an environment in which this particular community of individuals has been able, over many years, to express themselves as a dynamic artistic movement.

M&G QLD's exhibition, *Reasonable & Necessary: prints and artist books by Artel Artists*, curated by Lynne Seear, includes prints and artist books which are both refreshingly unpretentious and exceedingly skilled. The Artel artists present a range of artworks in familiar genres – portraits, landscapes, still-life, abstracts – using a visual language that is contemporary, distinctive and undeniably their own.

Reasonable & Necessary includes framed prints; artist books; a collection of artists' adapted tools; and a documentary film by Redcliffe filmmaker, Jeremy Ruckels, providing significant insight into the intricacies and challenging work involved (both from artist and technician) in facilitating high levels of autonomous, participant directed artwork, and insight into individual artists' lives and how Artel has changed or influenced them.

Many of the works in this exhibition have social, and sometimes political resonances and take as their point of departure: the human body, its dimensions, the spaces it occupies, the narratives that contain it and the theatre or spectacle that unfolds around it.

Four maquettes commissioned from exhibition artists, Abdul-Rahman Abdullah, Claire Healy & Sean Cordeiro, Michelle Nikou and Tim Sterling are also travelling with the exhibition. This enables gallery staff to deliver supervised handson experiences when presenting education and public programs; to augment discussions about the artist's practice; and to assist in illustrating the core foundations of sculpture – carving, casting, modelling and assemblage. The exhibition support material includes a film of a panel discussion with Curator, Christine Morrow, and eight of the exhibition artists, recorded at Logan Art Gallery by Carl Warner and David Thomas. Due to COVID-19 precautions in 2020, the film was made accessible from M&G QLD's website via a QR code displayed at the venues, instead of being accessed on iPads travelling with the exhibition.

Safe Space has its own dedicated website (safespacesculpture.com), which contains information on the exhibition artists, tour itinerary, education resource, the panel discussion video and artist videos. A full-colour exhibition catalogue is provided at no cost to tour venues to distribute to visitors. The catalogue was shortlisted for the 2020 Museums Australasia Multimedia and Publication Design Awards (MAPDA).

In 2021, *Safe Space* toured to five venues: Swan Hill Regional Art Gallery, VIC; Murray Bridge Regional Gallery, SA; Hawkesbury Regional Gallery, NSW; New England Regional Art Museum, Armidale, NSW; and University of Sunshine Coast Gallery, Sippy Downs, QLD.

Due to COVID, no public programs were delivered at Murray Bridge Regional Gallery, SA, or New England Regional Art Museum, Armidale, NSW.

Exhibition artist, David Cross, delivered a public program performance at Swan Hill Regional Art Gallery, VIC, which was very well received.

Exhibition artists, Claire Healy and Sean Cordeiro, delivered a *Lego Monster Workshop* at Hawkesbury Regional Gallery, NSW. Sean Cordeiro delivered an online version of the workshop for venues who could not conduct this public program due to COVID.

Curator, Christine Morrow, and exhibition artist, Franz Ehmann, delivered floor talks at University of Sunshine Coast Gallery, QLD.

The exhibition concludes its national tour in early 2022.

An exhibition by the Jewellers and Metalsmiths Group of Australia, Queensland Chapter (JMGQ), in partnership with M&G QLD, *USE* is curated by Liam (formerly Lisa) Bryan-Brown and features 17 contemporary jewellers and small object makers.

This JMGQ showcase exhibition is thematically focused on the concept of tools, while exploring the conceptual breadth and layers of meaning that operate within the theme for contemporary jewellers, metalsmiths and small objects practitioners.

Essential to any artisan's practice, tools provide an interesting and reflexive conceptual point of entry into contemporary jewellery and small object practices. The artists respond to concepts such as: What does it mean to work in a bespoke, handmade way in the face of the widespread uptake of modern technologies? What is the place of these new technologies for the modern jeweller? With the increase of cheaply available mass-manufactured jewellery, what is the role of hand-crafted contemporary jewellery in design? How does a jeweller's relationship to their tools, whatever they may be, influence the works they create?

The exhibition was on display at Port Pirie Regional Art Gallery, SA, in early 2021 prior to showing at its final venue in Mundubbera, QLD. Public programs at Mundubbera included a Curator Talk by Liam Bryan-Brown and an 'Earrings and Pendants' workshop by exhibition artist, Elizabeth Shaw.

During its two-year tour, *USE* was viewed by 31,214 visitors.

* ZOONOSES – Dr Nicola Hooper

Through drawing and lithography, Nicola Hooper uses fairy-tale iconology and rhymes to explore concepts surrounding zoonoses (animal diseases that can infect humans). The exhibition *ZOONOSES* explores how we perceive certain animals in the context of fear and disease.

Nicola is a Logan-based artist with a background in design and illustration. The *ZOONOSES* exhibition stems from Nicola's doctoral research and provides insightful observations into our contradictory perceptions of animals in relation to fear of disease – how we humans both despise animals for their role in spreading disease across species, yet also revere them as they provide us with the means of vaccination through scientific testing and discovery. The works are all created using hand-coloured stone lithography including artist books, prints, wallpaper and mobiles.


ZOONOSES will tour nationally from mid-2022 to mid-2025.

* Three Echoes – Western Desert Art

Approximately every four years, M&G QLD develops its own touring exhibition responding to sector consultation and identified gaps in available touring product.

For this exhibition, M&G QLD is partnering with private collectors Andrew Arnott and Karin Schack to tour a selection of works from their remarkable private collection of high-quality contemporary Aboriginal art spanning the first 30 years of the Western Desert Art movement.

The exhibition will tour nationally to 13 venues from late 2022 to early 2025.

Three Echoes – Western Desert Art *is an initiative* of Museums & Galleries Queensland developed in partnership with Karin Schack and Andrew Arnott, and curated by Djon Mundine OAM. This project has been assisted by the Australian Government's Visions of Australia program, and is supported by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland, part of the Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy.

* Lost in Palm Springs

Curated by Dr Greer Honeywill, *Lost in Palm Springs* is being developed by HOTA, Home of the Arts, Gold Coast, in partnership with M&G QLD. It is an interdisciplinary exhibition bringing together fourteen creative minds – including internationally recognised artists, photographers and thinkers from America and Australia – who respond to, capture, or reimagine the magical qualities of the awe-inspiring mountainous landscape and the celebrated mid-century modern architecture found in the desert city.

Connections between Palm Springs and Australia are remarkably strong, particularly when viewed

through the lens of the current renaissance of interest in modernist architecture. Almost half of the exhibitors have worked on both sides of the Pacific.

How Soon Is Now? Works about time and space in two and a half dimensions – Bruce Reynolds

How Soon Is Now? brings together a selection of works by well-known Australian artist Bruce Reynolds. His exquisite cast relief works and twodimensional collaged linoleum works celebrate a physicality that is frequently overlooked in today's growing digital environment. Exploring how we arrived at this point – from the archaic to a language of compressed space - Bruce's work invites consideration of the ancient and the 'now'.

Bruce Reynolds' work grew from collage to relief and sculpture over a number of decades. Residencies in Rome focused both studio and architectural works on relief forms that occupy the space between painting and sculpture, between drawing and architecture. He describes it as being both archaic and a fresh place of representation.

For this exhibition, Bruce has used an antique process that favours direct material involvement to cast works from liquid to solid that, when carved, create lively manifestations of thoughts on time, deep time and everyday archaeology.

It is proposed to tour the exhibition nationally from 2022–2024, subject to funding.

* The Brothers Gruchy

The Brothers Gruchy is an engaging new media exhibition that features 9 key artworks from Tim and Mic Gruchy's practice that focus on recurring themes of human perception, artificial intelligence, synaesthesia, memory and cultural identity. Nature and our human impact is a strong thread of this exhibition.

Tim and Mic Gruchy have been working together extensively since the mid 1980s. Most of their collaborative undertakings are in the performative arts. Together they have explored the use of video and multimedia in theatre, opera, contemporary dance, musicals and commercial projects.

It is proposed that the exhibition will tour nationally from 2023 onwards, subject to funding.

* The Interior – Natalya Hughes

Natalya Hughes' practice is concerned with decorative and ornamental traditions and their associations with the feminine, the body and excess. Recent works investigate the relationship between Modernist painters and their anonymous women subjects.

The Interior is an immersive installation combining sculptural seating, richly patterned soft furnishings, and uncanny objet d'art, nestled around a hand-painted mural to generate a stimulating space to unpack our collective and unconscious biases. Appropriating the tropes of a therapist's office, *The Interior* invites interaction from gallery visitors.

The artist is interested in the role of women and their historical absence from positions of power. The part-professional, part-domestic setting conjured by *The Interior* plays with gendered power dynamics between public and private space.

The exhibition is being developed by Institute of Modern Art in partnership with M&G QLD. It is proposed to tour the exhibition nationally from late 2022, subject to funding.

* Exhibition Advisory Panel

In November 2021, M&G QLD facilitated an Exhibition Advisory Panel to review exhibition proposals received in 2021. We acknowledge the panel's insightful comments and generous feedback offered throughout the session.

Two or three of these proposals will progress to the next stage to potentially enter M&G QLD's 2022–2023 Exhibition Development & Touring Program.

Audio-Visual Touring Exhibition Resources

M&G QLD continued to expand its initiative to further engage audiences with M&G QLD's touring program and to profile the artists and their practice. This continued to be relevant in 2021 when galleries were closed for periods due to COVID, and artists were sometimes unable to travel to deliver public programs.

Due to COVID restrictions, we continued to transition from showing exhibition films on iPads within the gallery space to displaying QR codes in venues linked to the films on the M&G QLD website.

In 2021, five films featuring *Artistic Endeavour* exhibition artists were produced and uploaded to M&G QLD's online channels. All of these beautifully crafted films were directed by Simon Woods; produced by Sonia Uranishi; and filmed by Cinematographer, Brendan Williams ACS. One of these films, featuring exhibition artists Eva Richards, Anne Hayes and Nita C Lester, won a Silver award for Cinematography at the Australian Cinematographers' Society (ACS) Queensland Awards.

Films commissioned by M&G QLD and supported by the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy, an initiative of the Australian, State and Territory Governments.

Artist Touring Mentorship Program

M&G QLD's Artist Touring Mentorship Program aims to: mentor and build the selected artists' professional knowledge and skill base to get them 'market ready', with the view to their exhibitions entering M&G QLD's touring program; to raise the artists' profiles; and to maximise community engagement with their works through the resultant touring exhibitions.

M&G QLD Staff continued mentoring the artists and coordinators at Artel, the CPL – Choice, Passion, Life – creative industries studio in Redcliffe. Artel supports a group of around 40 artists with profound and complex disabilities to engage in artistic practice, and advocates for the important contribution of these professional artists in wider society.

M&G QLD also continued mentoring the Botanical Artists' Society of Queensland (BASQ) project team in the development of their exhibition, *Artistic Endeavour: Contemporary botanical artists' response to the legacy of Banks, Solander and Parkinson.* This covered all areas of exhibition touring following the launch at its first tour venue, Redland Art Gallery, QLD, in December 2020 – January 2021.

Artist, Dr Nicola Hooper, worked with M&G QLD to develop her exhibition *ZOONOSES* for touring, obtaining knowledge on applying for funding; preparing her work for touring; freight logistics; crating requirements and construction; and public programs.

The Artist Touring Mentorship Program is an initiative of Museums & Galleries Queensland, supported by the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy, an initiative of the Australian, State and Territory governments.
