

Queensland Transport Museum congratulated for their achievements in State Standards Review Program

Museums & Galleries Queensland (M&G QLD) was pleased to congratulate the **Queensland Transport Museum**, Gatton, at a **special presentation event** held on Wednesday 5 April 2023, for completing the intensive year-long Standards Review Program assessing their practice against *The National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries*.

Built in 2009, the Queensland Transport Museum is located inside the Lockyer Valley Cultural Centre, Gatton. Visitors to the Museum can explore a diversity of vehicles, memorabilia and other displays that explore the history, founders and functions of the transport industry in Queensland. Featured displays include the *Western Transport Exhibit* and *Nolan's Interstate Transport Exhibit*, as well as a display of over 200 models, including vintage matchbox cars.

The Western Transport Exhibit, for example, celebrates the transport industry's pioneering men and women and the important role they played in connecting regional towns in Queensland and nationally in the early 1930s. **Did you know** that the Western Transport fleet was the largest in Australia at its peak? With trucks and trailers exceeding 500 units, the company serviced every mainland state with depots in Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide, Perth, and Darwin.

Situated within Gatton's Lake Apex Precinct, visitors to the Queensland Transport Museum can also enjoy the onsite café, Lockyer Valley Art Gallery, Lockyer Legends and Anzac display, parklands, walking tracks, children's playground, or visit the local library.

Did you know that the 'Lights on the Hill Trucking Memorial' is also located near the Museum, on the grounds of the Lake Apex Precinct? The 'Lights on the Hill Trucking Memorial' wall and annual event honour truck and coach drivers who have passed before their time.

M&G QLD's Executive Director, Rebekah Butler, said,

"The Queensland Transport Museum is to be commended for their participation in M&G QLD's Standards Review Program. This opportunity has supported them to strategically assess the Museum's exhibitions and public engagement activities and to develop new ways of thinking to strengthen the Museum's future operations."
