

latest news – update on queensland disaster recovery:

Museum & Gallery Services Queensland extends its thoughts to the communities in recovery from the devastating widespread flooding and Tropical Cyclone Yasi. As at the beginning of March, 72 of the State's 73 local government areas have been activated under the joint State and Federal Government natural disaster relief and recovery arrangements.

Donations for disaster recovery

To support the recovery of Queensland's movable cultural collections impacted by the recent widespread flooding and Tropical Cyclone Yasi, Museum and Gallery Services Queensland is now accepting donations to its tax deductible Donation Fund. Donations of \$2 or more are deductible and will be used by M&GSQ to provide programs and services which support the development and maintenance of museums and galleries as an integral and important part of their communities.

You can donate by cheque, money order or EFT (bank account details are on the payment slip). You will receive a receipt for tax purposes.

M&GSQ will issue updates on how donations are being used in the recovery program.

Keeping informed

Throughout this difficult period, M&GSQ has been working with a range of individuals, organisations and communities to provide appropriate information and assistance to the sector. With regular updates from Christine Ianna on Q-DIS, the Museum Development Officer network and organisations and individuals on the ground, M&GSQ was able to establish a register of affected regions and organisations, which has been continuously updated as information comes



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to hand. The register is available on both the M&GSQ and Q-DIS websites (see more about Q-DIS below).

At a national level, M&GSQ has been a participant in Blue Shield Australia's (BSA) 'extra-ordinary' teleconferences facilitated by BSA in response to the widespread flooding in Queensland, Victoria and New South Wales.

While much has been done in immediate response to the disasters, the long-term implications must not be forgotten. Museums and galleries will need ongoing support and assistance over the coming months and, in some cases, years.

As well as taking donations through its tax deductible Donation Fund, M&GSQ is continuing to compile a register of people and organisations willing to donate their time, expertise, services, equipment and financial assistance to affected museums, galleries and other cultural heritage organisations. In the midst of the devastation, there are good news stories. It is reassuring to know that the hard work put into training in disaster preparedness over recent years by organisations, including M&GSQ and trainers, Christine Ianna and Lisa Jones, has paid off. More importantly, the implementation of disaster plans by the museum and gallery staff and volunteers in the face of these disasters has meant that the damage to Queensland cultural collections was greatly minimised.

M&GSQ acknowledges the extraordinary efforts of gallery and museum staff and volunteers, the Museum Development Officers in each region, conservators, local government staff, emergency services, the State and Federal Governments, and the many individuals who helped keep our cultural organisations and their workers safe.

Q-DIS: Queensland Disaster Information Network



On 9 December 2010 at M&GSQ's networking event, !ALERT! Heritage Collections and Disaster, Christine Ianna, a Queensland representative of The Australian Institute for the Conservation of Cultural Materials (AICCM),

launched Q-DIS: The Queensland Disaster Information Network, a group hosted by maNexus to facilitate the sharing of information on disaster preparedness and planning.

Throughout the floods and Tropical Cyclone Yasi, M&GSQ continued to work with Christine, who volunteered her time after hours to ensure Q-DIS was a valuable source of information on how people, organisations and collections fared, as well as a source of information on disaster preparedness and recovery. M&GSQ staff assisted Christine with the updating of the Q-DIS website.

You are encouraged to join Q-DIS to connect with colleagues across regional and metropolitan Queensland and to share information on disaster preparedness and planning. International Museum Day - Peer Talk 18 May 2011, Brisbane

M&GSQ is pleased to announce the return of Peer Talk for International Museum Day 2011. Peer Talk 2011 will feature a Review of Stages 1 and 2 of the Mercy Heritage Centre, All Hallows' Convent, 547 Ann Street, Brisbane.

Director, Peter Connell, says that the 150th anniversary of the Sisters of Mercy Brisbane Congregation is being celebrated through a number of new displays opening progressively throughout 2011. The Mercy Heritage Centre reveals the origins of the Mercy Order and its key ministries, the different layers of the building's history, the magnificent Chapel, an extensive collection of religious relics, and stories of the lives lived in this incredible place.

On 18 May, from 1:00-6:00 pm, you have the opportunity to:

- view the exhibitions;
- listen to the curatorial, design and institutional perspectives on the development;
- hear from three professional reviewers on their visit experience;
- express your viewpoint in the panel and audience discussion;
- network over afternoon tea;
- celebrate the launch of International Museum Day with breathtaking verandah views as the sun sets.

Peer Talk was an annual event in our Industry Development calendar from 2001 to 2006. The State Library of Queensland, Queensland Art Gallery, The University of Queensland Art Museum, The Workshops Rail Museum, Museum of Brisbane and Queensland Museum South Bank have all participated in past events, which were remarkable for the cooperation of the institutions; the openness and professionalism of the exhibition teams; the professionalism and independence of the exhibition reviewers; and the commitment of all participants (speakers and audience) to the development of a culture of exhibition review by museum/gallery and collections peers.

The rationale for the event is the development of a culture of productive formal exhibition criticism by museum and gallery professionals, including all those involved with developing and designing exhibitions. Peer Talk was inspired by the Exhibition Review sessions initiated by Kathleen MacLean at the Annual American Association of Museum (AAM) Conferences and subsequently established as a regular feature of the annual Museums Australia Conferences. As Kathleen McLean, author of Planning for People in Museum Exhibitions, proposed: "One way to look at museum exhibitions is through the practice of formal exhibition criticism, much like that practiced in the fields of literature, theatre, film and other communication and arts disciplines... exhibition criticism is most helpful when it is undertaken by practitioners with a deep understanding of exhibitions".

The theme for International Museum Day 2011 is *Museum and Memory*.

Peer Talk at the Mercy Heritage Centre includes sunset refreshments to launch International Museum Day. The cost is \$30, and \$25 (concessions, MAQ/RGAQ members).

Nominations can be made for Organisations and for Individuals:

- Organisation Awards are open to all Queensland public/non-commercial* museums, galleries and keeping places. Libraries, arts councils and artist-run spaces that undertake exhibition or museum practice-related activities are also eligible to nominate.
 - *Privately-owned museums and galleries that are not-for-profit are eligible to nominate. Other privately-owned museums and galleries may be eligible to nominate if they can demonstrate that they operate in a public, non-commercial manner. If in doubt, phone M&GSQ to confirm your eligibility.
- Individual Awards are open to the paid and volunteer staff of any of the above organisations.

The winners will be announced at an Awards presentation evening to be held in late 2011. Travel costs will be provided for winners and commendation recipients to attend the presentation.

All winners will receive a specially commissioned trophy by a Queensland designer, generously sponsored by Brian Tucker Accountant. Brian is sponsoring the Awards for the eighth consecutive year.

MAQ will provide a prize to the value of \$1,000 to the winner of the category, Individual: Volunteer.



M&GSQ pilot 2011 Mentorship, Exchange and Fellowship Program

Applications have closed for the pilot 2011 Mentorship, Exchange and Fellowship Program for paid staff and volunteers working in regional Queensland museums and galleries.

With the financial support of Arts Queensland through the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF), M&GSQ offered the following programs:

Three types of programs, with a total of eight opportunities, were offered to emerging, mid-career and established professionals in Queensland regional galleries and museums:

- Gallery Mentorship:
 2 opportunities @ \$3,000 each
 Museum Mentorship:
 2 opportunities @ \$3,000 each
- Staff Exchange Program | Co-Mentoring Program:
 2 opportunities [total of 4 people] @ \$3,000 per person
- International Fellowship Program
 2 opportunities @ \$6,000 each

One program, with a total of four opportunities, was offered to volunteers in museums or galleries located in regional Queensland:

 Volunteer Internship for museums or galleries 4 opportunities @ \$3,000 each

In late 2010, M&GSQ staff worked with over fifty potential applicants and over forty potential host organisations to find the best possible match for professional development placements. While not all of these resulted in applications being submitted (some applicants and potential hosts were significantly affected by the natural disasters throughout Queensland in December/January), the Program has generated rich relationships between M&GSQ and a wide range of Queensland, interstate and international organisations and their workers.

M&GSQ convened a panel of industry professionals that met last week to assess the applications to the 2011 pilot Program. In the next quarterly issue of *source*, M&GSQ will profile the successful applicants and their projects.

The M&GSQ 2011 pilot Mentorship, Exchange and Fellowship Program is funded by Arts Queensland through the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF). RADF is a joint Queensland Government and Local Government partnership to support local arts and culture.

- Debra Beattie (General Manager) visited the Bribie Island Seaside Museum on 13 February. The Museum featured Wipe Out Surfing Life, an exhibition from Surf World Gold Coast of photographic images, boards and posters of surfing in Queensland in the 60s. The Micro Cinema showed daily screenings of Bombora History of Surfing in Australia, produced by Screen Australia and ABC.
- On 23 March, at the invitation of Bev and John Shay, Ann Baillie (Manager Training and Professional Development) opened the new Cooktown History Centre on behalf of M&GSQ.

exhibition touring and development:

Metal As Anything New touring exhibition in 2011

Museum & Gallery Services Queensland is proud to be touring *Metal As Anything*, a 30-year retrospective exhibition of etchings by nationally recognised Townsville-based printmaker, Ron McBurnie. This exhibition is a place where misbehaving dogs, ducks in box kites, jumping cats and eccentric cane toad shooters feature in the carnival of characters and landscapes that the artist has created.

Metal As Anything has been curated by Perc Tucker Regional Gallery, Townsville. The Gallery received funding from the inaugural Regional Galleries Partnership Program through Arts Queensland to develop this touring partnership with M&GSQ.

Gallery Director, Frances Thomson, comments: "McBurnie has developed a distinctive style that has earned him national recognition as a

printmaker. Through the works included in the exhibition, McBurnie demonstrates his proficiency in etching. We are proud to tour the works of this prominent Townsville-based artist to a broader public".

Most striking throughout the exhibition is the artist's ability to capture the weird and wonderful events that occur in our 'mundane' suburban environment. McBurnie explains one such humorous moment in his 1988 work, *Toad Shooter*. "That was a private detective who lived in Townsville, and after coming home from busy days of insurance fraud and other such draining cases, would sit in his backyard director's chair with his Dolphin flashlight and his 22-rifle popping the toads off as they congregated around his sprinkler. His wife would later collect the carcasses and incinerate them."

McBurnie's inspiration comes from his everyday experience of the world: "Someone might tell me a story and then I might meet the people involved, and the whole thing morphs into an etching. If I am marvelling at an old print, then that inspires me. If I hear an idiotic story about a corrupt politician, then that story will inspire me. If I am playing a piece of music that takes me to an extraordinary place, then that is my inspiration. Sometimes ideas and inspiration come from the weirdest of sources".

The exhibition is complemented by an extensive catalogue of essays, images and anecdotes from the artist to provide visitors with wonderful insights into McBurnie's work. Contributing writer, Professor Sasha Grishin, Australian National University, observes: "Although one is seduced by the whimsicality of his vernacular humour and his ability to spot the uncelebrated heroes of Australian suburbia, his art engages with a broader humanist agenda and a broader historical tradition".


Metal As Anything: Ron McBurnie is a travelling exhibition developed by Perc Tucker Regional Gallery and toured by Museum & Gallery Services Queensland. This touring project is supported by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland and the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy, an initiative of the Australian, State and Territory Governments.



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Funding from the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland will also support Ron McBurnie to travel to each venue to conduct public programs and community workshops in conjunction with the exhibition.

Metal As Anything will be on display at Tableland Regional Gallery from 4 April to 1 May 2011 and will continue touring Queensland and New South Wales' venues until 2013.

In Atherton and surrounds, Mareeba Historic Society Inc was successful in its application for RADF funding for this program to be run with a group of 5 organisations.

(The Regional Arts Development Fund is a Queensland Government and Tablelands Regional Council partnership to support local arts and culture.)

In Cooktown and surrounds, Cooktown & District Historical Society was successful in its application for RADF funding for this program to be run with a group of 3 organisations.

(The Regional Arts Development Fund is a Queensland Government and Cook Shire Council partnership to support local arts and culture.)

M&GSQ has been awarded a federal Community Heritage Grant to fund Collection Management and Preventive Conservation Training in Far North Queensland. These workshops will be conducted in Atherton and Cooktown for Standards participants and other interested organisations to attend.

(The Community Heritage Grants Program is managed by the National Library. It is funded by the Australian Government through the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, Office for the Arts; the National Archives of Australia; the National Film and Sound Archive; the National Museum of Australia and the National Library.)

Committing to the year-long Standards Program requires significant dedication from participant organisations. Assisting in this process are the Standards Reviewers, who volunteer their time and professional expertise to the program. Reviewers are very familiar with the day-to-day operations of the small-to-medium museums/galleries that the Standards Program has been targeting since

2005, and act as an ongoing reference group for the program. The review process is an invaluable opportunity for participants to learn from experienced and accomplished museum practitioners through on-site reviews and through the provision of feedback on practices and policies, which is provided throughout the yearlong program.

M&GSQ is anticipating a productive year ahead as they work with 2011 participant organisations to develop positive action plans that can shape sustainable futures.

Throughout 2011, M&GSQ and M&G NSW will be using The National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries, an exciting collaboration between nine different organisations from across the nation, including: ACT Museums and Galleries, Arts Tasmania, Collections Council of Australia Ltd, History Trust of South Australia, Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory, Museum & Gallery Services Queensland, Museums and Galleries New South Wales, Museums Australia (Victoria) and Western Australian Museum. The National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries V1.1, 2010, is available for all organisations to use as a guideline for developing best practice across core areas relating to Managing the Museum, Involving People and Developing a Significant Collection. Before embarking on a career in the museum industry, Elizabeth spent several years teaching art and physical education at secondary school level and held the position of Head of Art at the Anglican Church Grammar School, Brisbane and Miami State High School on the Gold Coast.

Ken Brooks

Ken Brooks has been involved in the museum industry since 1989, with heavy involvement in the work prior to and during the restoration of Brennan & Geraghty's Store in Maryborough. The store is now a

museum operated by the National Trust of Queensland that contains in excess of 100,000 items that are all provenanced to the store. Ken has been employed on a full-time basis at the museum as curator/manager since 1992 and attends to all of the collection needs, as well as well as the general operation of the property, including visitor services.

Ken developed the National Trust digital collections register and has provided collection management assistance to other National Trust properties. He has also provided assistance to

other small community-based museums within Queensland and New South Wales. Ken has undertaken work on in-house exhibitions as well as a touring exhibition based on the history of Brennan & Geraghty's Store. Much of this work involved research, text writing, documentation of collection items and needs of fragile objects used within the displays.

Ken was involved in the redevelopment of The Australian Stockman's Hall of Fame at Longreach and undertook a variety of work included reviewing the existing displays, reviewing the objects on display and those in storage, preparing the brief for the exhibition designers to tender on, developing the thematic framework for the new displays, preparing ideas of visitor needs and visitor flow throughout the displays and the entire building. He was also engaged to handle collection management needs of the large collection of items held within the HOF Collection, and he developed ways in which the objects in storage could be used.

Working in a small museum environment, Ken is aware of the limitations of small museums and the pressures placed on both paid and volunteer workers in charge of looking after collections.



Steve Chaddock

Steve first worked in a museum in 1993 as assistant to the Curator of Archaeology at Salisbury & South Wiltshire Museum, UK. In 1994 he completed an MA Diploma in Museum Studies at University College London.

From 1995 he served as archaeologist to the UK Ministry of Defence on a nationally heritage-listed gunpowder factory in Essex before moving into private practice heritage consultancy. Steve was involved in research-led and business-focused projects including new museum developments, relocations of museums and review of existing museum operations.

Since 2005, when he and his family immigrated to the Sunshine Coast hinterland, Steve has worked in the local government and private sector. From 2006 to 2009 he developed several

council/community heritage partnerships as part of his role as Heritage Project Officer for Sunshine Coast Council, including the historic Bankfoot House property in the Glass House Mountains.

Steve is director of Timeline Heritage Consultants which has a strong focus on heritage interpretation.



Christine Ianna

Christine has worked in Materials Conservation in Queensland for the past twenty years. She has held varied positions in Conservation including Scientist (Materials Conservation) at the Queensland

Museum; Manager, Preservation Services, Queensland State Archives; and Manager, Publications Reformatting at the State Library of Queensland. In addition she has been involved in a variety of projects involving conservation, including Expo 88 sculpture; the Big Rig, Roma; The Workshops Rail Museum at Ipswich; and the Bribie Island Precinct Historical project.

Christine's early work focused on the conservation treatment of waterlogged objects and metals from maritime archaeological sites and historic shipwrecks off the Queensland coast. Griffith University Social Enterprise Workshops with Christine Ianna and Lisa Jones

For the second consecutive year, M&GSQ has coordinated training workshops as part of the Griffith University Social Enterprise Program.

The workshops provide an invaluable learning experience for the students prior to beginning their work placement with their allocated cultural organisation. This training opportunity was also open to volunteers from those organisations accepting students for their work placements.

The level of enthusiasm from the students and volunteers, along with the passion of the dedicated facilitators, were key elements in making this year's workshops a success.

Lisa Jones, Curator, Queensland Police Museum introduced students and volunteers to the policies and procedures that describe and articulate a collecting institution's purpose. The first workshop looked at collection management in general, and covered areas such as:

- * What policies should a collecting institution have?
- * What procedural frameworks should be in place?
- * Assessing the significance of objects.
- * An introduction to significance.
- * Object files the information you collect and the links you make.
- * Working through the significance criteria.
- * Statements of significance.

Students worked in groups to write a statement of significance for the diverse objects from the Queensland Police Museum's collection.

The second collection management workshop, also facilitated by Lisa Jones, focused on cataloguing paperwork and understanding the detail required

for completing a catalogue sheet. Classification and storage systems were discussed, as well as object numbering systems and materials used for applying numbers to objects.

The students and volunteers then worked in groups to complete a record sheet and physically number a variety of objects made from different materials.

As part of the third workshop, Christina Ianna, Conservator, provided students and volunteers with insight into preventive conservation principles

that underpin the use and preservation of cultural collections and the individual items held in these collecting and exhibiting institutions.

Christine's introduction to Preventive Conservation unpacked key elements of collection preservation and terminology i.e. conservation, restoration, preventive conservation.

Collection damage and deterioration was another focus of the day, where students considered the factors contributing to deterioration of collections and objects in collections. Other topic areas included:

- * Recognising causes of damage/deterioration (eg insect frass, excess light, water, mould).
- * Identifying symptoms of damage/deterioration (eg holes, fading, colour change, staining).
- * Controlling and preventing damage and deterioration factors.
- Recommended display, storage and handling guidelines.
- * Recommended display and storage materials.
- * Condition reporting.

The students completed an object condition report in pairs, and reported back to the whole group on the causes and symptoms of damage and recommendations for mitigating damage/ deterioration.

Students were asked to provide feedback on their learning experience:

"There was great care taken to deliver basic information. I thought the concepts were appropriate for an introductory course and points were made well and reiterated. The different teaching/delivery styles of Christine and Lisa were also enjoyable. There was great care taken to see that we were seated with like-minded people. The group itself was also lovely."

"Christine's delivery style allowed for great flexibility in the workshop. I loved that I could ask questions about some scenarios I might have experienced, and that the group could learn from this exchange." "I learnt about how one might treat garments which are ripped, how to treat books, and most importantly that advice varies: what is appropriate action for temperatures in Victoria is not necessarily appropriate in Queensland."

- Arts Queensland 2011 Regional Galleries Partnership Program Closes: 29 April 2011 Funding: up to \$50,000 per applicant

Applications are now open for Arts Queensland's 2011 Regional Galleries Partnership Program (RGPP).

RGPP is a three-year (2010–2013) pilot funded by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland and the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy, an initiative of the Australian, State and Territory Governments.

The Regional Galleries Partnership Program provides funding of \$200,000 per year from 2010 to 2013 to support regional galleries to develop exhibitions and associated activities. A regional gallery may be the recipient of one grant in the three-year term of the Program.

The Program was developed in recognition of the valuable contribution that Queensland's regional galleries make to the community and the visual arts, craft and design sector, and to increase outcomes for Queensland visual artists, craftworkers and designers. While mindful of the diverse capacities within regional gallery membership, for the purpose of this Program 'regional galleries' means public, not-for-proft, non-commercial galleries with a mandate to service a defined geographical area.

The Program supports the development and production by regional galleries of:

- solo and group exhibitions of contemporary visual art, craft and design;
- · artist residencies that result in an exhibition;
- publications to support exhibitions;
- collaborative projects between regional galleries.

Funding is available for projects up to \$50,000 with the expectation that local councils will contribute financially and/or in-kind to the project.

All applicants must:

- · Be a regional gallery based in Queensland;
- Have satisfied the reporting requirements of any previous Arts Queensland grants;
- Demonstrate that the project involves professional artists, craftsworkers and/or designers;
- Provide evidence of support from local council.

Further eligibility requirements are outlined in the grant guidelines.

Arts Queensland Regional Infrastructure Grant (RIG) Program 2011–2012 Closes: 20 May 2011

The Regional Infrastructure Grant (RIG) Program is offered by Arts Queensland to local councils owning arts and cultural infrastructure in Queensland. The program aims to assist regional venues with redevelopments and upgrades which strengthen their capacity to deliver arts and cultural services and experiences to the people of Queensland.

The objectives of the RIG program are to:

- Reduce gaps in the quality of arts and cultural infrastructure in regional Queensland.
- Strengthen the capacity and effectiveness of performance, exhibition, collection and creative studio spaces.

In 2011–2012 (Year 2), the focus of the RIG Program is NARPACA (Northern Australia Regional Performing Arts Centres Association) venues and regional art galleries.

For regional galleries, the RIG Program's infrastructure priority is to meet and maintain professional industry standards to enable the provision of quality programs to local communities. This includes meeting professional industry standards for the display of exhibitions and touring product, the loan of artworks, and the storage of collections.

Specific examples include the upgrade or replacement of:

- exhibition and storage spaces;
- seminar and workshop spaces;
- audio, visual and lighting equipment.

Arts Queensland will not fund building compliance, maintenance, feasibility studies, business planning activities, or consultancies.

Councils must either own the facility or be leasing Crown Land for a minimum of ten years from the date of the grant application. Written approval must be provided by the facility/land owner to undertake any facility improvements.

For regional galleries, funding is available up to a maximum of \$50,000 with funding matched by the local council. Local councils with a NARPACA venue and a regional gallery are eligible to lodge a separate application for each venue.
