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exhibition touring and development program :

■ Tattersall's Club Landscape Art Prize exhibition commences its regional Queensland tour

In partnership with Tattersall's Club, M&G QLD is touring an exhibition of works from the *Tattersall's Club Landscape Art Prize* collection. The exhibition was opened at Redland Art Gallery by Tattersall's Club committee member, Michael Paramor AM, on 4 March and the Curator, Bernie Hollett, gave a floor talk on 6 March.

The exhibition provides a rare opportunity to view works by renowned Australian landscape artists including Gordon Shepherdson, John Caldwell, Michael Nelson Jagamara, Davida Allen, Sybil Curtis, Maureen Hansen and Joe Furlonger.

Since 1990, Tattersall's Club has conducted its prestigious national art award, which has allowed the Club to acquire significant paintings by well-known Australian artists. In 2015, Tattersall's Club celebrated its 150th anniversary. To mark this milestone and to commemorate 25 years of the Landscape Art Prize, Tattersall's Club Committee made available a selection of winning entries for a regional tour.

The 15 artworks in the exhibition have been selected because of their connection to Queensland, and present a diversity of ways of viewing and interpreting our landscape. M&G QLD will tour the *Tattersall's Club Landscape Art Prize* exhibition to six venues: Redland Art Gallery (on display until 17 April 2016), Gympie Regional Gallery, Gladstone Regional Art Gallery and Museum, Childers Art Space, Toowoomba Regional Gallery and Roma on Bungil Gallery. The exhibition is supported by an Education Resource for upper primary and lower secondary students.

■ Scanlines

On 26 February 2016, M&G QLD Executive Director, Rebekah Butler, and Exhibition Program Officer, Andrea Higgins, visited Logan Art Gallery to view the *Scanlines* exhibition and to meet with Tara Morelos, Director of dLux MediaArts (NSW). Rebekah and Andrea also met with Logan Art Gallery staff, Michael Wardell and Robyn Daw.

Scanlines is a major national survey exhibition curated by dLux MediaArts, and is the first of its kind – a comprehensive group exhibition with an education focus that surveys the heritage of new media art in Australia since the 1980s.

This fascinating, interactive exhibition featured various individual projection stations. In developing *Scanlines*, special consideration was given to the design of the exhibition and how the general public would interact with the works featured in the show.

As you approach each station, it can sense your closeness. Your proximity to the artworks

activates the audio track for each video in the installation.

A 'Key' (a textured polyhedron) is the interactive tool used to access the exhibition video content, which comprises the artwork, and three additional videos featuring the artist speaking about their art practice. Sitting the different textured surfaces on the Key, face up in the triangular recess, triggers different aspects of the exhibition to be experienced.

When you have finished viewing an artwork, the audio turns off as you move away from its proximity.

Visitors to the exhibition can also engage with the *Scanlines* archive, an evolving DNA-like structure that collects and brings together information about Australian media artists, curators, organisations and events since the 1960s.

2016 Participants

Partnering with Museums & Galleries of New South Wales (M&G NSW) to deliver the Standards Review Program for the eleventh consecutive year, M&G QLD has been delighted with the results from previous years and is looking forward to another successful program for 2016.

The Standards Review Program is an opportunity for participating museums and galleries to assess their practices and policies against *National Standards*, with the aim of becoming valuable and sustainable community assets. The 'health check' for museums/galleries will result in each of the organisations developing a plan for the future.

The 2016 Standards Review Program participants are:

- Chinchilla Historical Museum
- Gallery 107 @ Dalby
- · Lapunyah Art Gallery, Chinchilla
- Miles Historical Village Museum
- · Roma on Bungil Gallery
- Taroom & District Historical Society

2016 is the first year that some organisations are revisiting the program. M&G QLD visited Southern Inland Queensland in 2009 and two of those organisations are going to participate again in this year's Standards Review Program. It is an opportunity for them to benchmark their progress against the action plan they developed in 2009.

Committing to the year-long Standards Review Program requires significant dedication from participant organisations. Assisting in this process are the Standards Reviewers, who volunteer their time and professional expertise to the program. Reviewers are very familiar with the day-to-day operations of the small to medium museums/galleries that the Standards Review Program has been targeting since 2005, and act as an ongoing reference group for the program. The review process is an invaluable opportunity for participants to learn from experienced and accomplished museum practitioners through onsite visits and the provision of feedback.

M&G QLD is anticipating a productive year working with the 2016 participants to develop action plans that can shape sustainable futures.

Throughout 2016, M&G QLD and M&G NSW will be using the *National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries V1.4*, which is a set of principles, guidelines and benchmarks that all organisations can use for developing best

practice across core areas of Managing the Museum, Involving People and Developing a Significant Collection.

A Fire Fundraiser Night at the Beach House held by Hervey Bay Historical Society (HBHS) on 26 February was not only a great social evening for the region, but also raised almost \$28,000 to assist with rebuilding at the Hervey Bay Historical Village and Museum, following a fire in December 2015.

■ Community Heritage Grants Now Open

National Library of Australia's Community Heritage Grants are now open. Grants of up to \$15,000 are available to assist in preserving cultural heritage collections of national significance. Not-for-profit organisations, such as historical societies, regional museums, public libraries and Indigenous and migrant community groups, are encouraged to apply.

A wide range of activities may qualify for grants, including:

- * Significance assessments of collections;
- Preservation needs assessments of collections;
- * Purchase of archival quality storage materials;
- * Preservation training projects;
- Conservation activities, including cleaning, treatment or rebinding;
- * Purchase and installation of environmental control and monitoring equipment;
- Copying of material once originals have been preserved;
- Cataloguing or collection management software.

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
