### ■ 'Snapshot' of Queensland museums and galleries for 2018

Each year, M&G QLD collects statistics from the 400+ public galleries and museums across the State. Collecting these statistics is important to us. M&G QLD uses them for a number of purposes including:

- To build a 'snapshot' of visitation trends across regions;
- To analyse trends between groups of galleries and museums – eg. small, medium, large;
- · To compare these trends from year to year;
- To allow M&G QLD to build an accurate picture of the sector to inform our current and future programs, services, policies and directions

   to better service Queensland galleries and museums;
- To advocate to all levels of government about the value of museums and galleries locally, state-wide and nationally – e.g. as vital institutions within their communities, as tourism destinations within the State, etc.

In 2018, 161 public galleries and museums, including statutory bodies, responded to M&G QLD's annual statistics survey – an increase of 18% on the previous year.

The survey data revealed that, in 2018, these 161 public galleries and museums:

- Attracted a total of 7,204,058 visitors;
- Attracted 876,573 educational visitors;
- Delivered 1,042 outreach programs that engaged 1,795,020 participants;
- Presented 988 self-generated exhibitions and 156 touring exhibitions;
- Operated with a total of 1,651 paid staff and 4,833 volunteer staff.

USE launched at Redland Art Gallery, QLD on 25 January, where it was on display until 3 March 2019. Public programs during the exhibition period included a talk by Curator, Lisa Bryan-Brown, and exhibition artist Elizabeth Shaw; a Silver Etched Pendant Workshop by exhibition artist Clare Poppi; and a Drawing Machine Workshop by exhibition artist Helen Bird.

M&G QLD is touring *USE* nationally until 2021. M&G QLD Executive Director, Rebekah Butler, opened the exhibition at Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre, NSW, on 15 March and it will be on display until 19 May 2019. M&G QLD Exhibition Program Officer, Andrea Higgins, also attended the opening.

USE is a touring exhibition in partnership between Jewellers and Metalsmiths Group of Australia (Queensland Chapter) Inc. and Museums & Galleries Queensland. This project is supported by the Visions regional touring program, an Australian Government program aiming to improve access to cultural material for all Australians; the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland; the Australian Government through the Australia Council, its arts funding and advisory body; Liveworm Studio; and the Queensland College of Art, Griffith University.

# ■ YOU ARE HERE 2 (The Incredible Lightness of Being) launches at Hervey Bay Regional Gallery

A new immersive exhibition by Queensland artist, Susan Lincoln, launched at Hervey Bay Regional Gallery, QLD, on 22 March, where it was on display until 28 April 2019.

The exhibition includes installation works, works on paper, video, and large sculptural elements that explore mindfulness and relaxation and reinforce the notion of improving well-being through the arts.

The centrepiece of the exhibition, *TRR* (*Light Vehicle*), is a unique, stand-alone, built environment, which upon entering immerses the participant within a sensory experience akin to time inside spectral light.

The exhibition next travels to Mundubbera Regional Art Gallery, QLD, where it opens on 4 May 2019.

A range of public programs are on offer with the exhibition, including an Artist Talk by Susan Lincoln and Gift of Light workshops, which are artist-led youth workshops where participants

create 'light' bracelets that will be presented as a gift from one gallery to the next.

Susan Lincoln is being mentored by M&G QLD through its Artist Touring Mentorship Program, supported by the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy.

M&G QLD will tour *YOU ARE HERE 2* nationally until 2021, dependent upon further funding.

YOU ARE HERE 2 (The Incredible Lightness of Being) is a travelling exhibition organised by Warwick Art Gallery and toured by Museums & Galleries Queensland. This project is supported by the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland; the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy, an initiative of the Australian, state and territory governments; and the Australian Government through the Australia Council, its arts funding and advisory body. #### Reasonable & Necessary: prints and artist books by Artel Artists arrives in Cloncurry

Due to the extreme weather, flooding and road closures experienced across Queensland in recent months, the delivery of M&G QLD's touring exhibition *Reasonable & Necessary: prints and artist books by Artel Artists* to Dr David Harvey-Sutton Gallery in Cloncurry was delayed.

The exhibition did, however, eventually open on 4 March and was on display until 14 April 2019. It will next be on display at Coalface Art Gallery, Moranbah, QLD, from 1 May 2019.

Reasonable & Necessary: prints and artist books by Artel Artists is an initiative of Museums & Galleries Queensland in partnership with CPL and curated by Lynne Seear. #### M&G QLD Standards Review Program Commences

#### 2019 Participants

M&G QLD has welcomed 4 organisations from the Mount Isa and Cloncurry regions to participate in this year's Standards Review Program.

Partnering with Museums & Galleries of New South Wales (M&G NSW) to deliver the Standards Review Program for the fifteenth consecutive year, M&G QLD has been delighted with the results from previous years, and is looking forward to another successful program in 2019.

The Standards Review Program is an opportunity for participating museums and galleries to assess their practices and policies against National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries, with the aim of becoming valuable and sustainable community assets. The 'health check' for museums and galleries will result in each of the organisations developing a plan for the future.

The 2019 Standards Review Program participants are:

- John Flynn Place Museum and Art Gallery, Cloncurry;
- Mount Isa Underground Hospital and Museum;
- Riversleigh Fossil Centre and Mount Isa Regional Art Gallery;
- Cloncurry Unearthed Visitor Information Centre and Museum.

Committing to the year-long Standards Review Program requires significant dedication from participant organisations. Assisting in this process are the Standards Reviewers, who volunteer their time and professional expertise to the program. Reviewers are very familiar with the day-to-day operations of the small-to-medium museums/galleries that the Standards Review Program has been targeting since 2005, and act as an ongoing reference group for the Program. The review process is an invaluable opportunity for participants to learn from experienced and



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accomplished museum practitioners through onsite visits and the provision of feedback.

M&G QLD is anticipating a productive year working with the 2019 participants to develop action plans that can shape sustainable futures.

Throughout 2019, M&G QLD and M&G NSW will be using *National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries V1.5*, which is a set of principles, guidelines and benchmarks that all organisations can use for developing best practice across core areas of Managing the Museum, Involving People and Developing a Significant Collection. #### **Briefing Session**

The Standards Review Program Briefing Session was held at the Civic Centre, Mount Isa on 19 March. Deannah Vieth, Training and Professional Development Manager, and Leisha Walker, Training and Professional Development Program Officer, travelled to Mount Isa to meet and welcome the participating organisations into the 2019 Program.

The purpose of the full-day Briefing Session was to introduce participants to details of the program and to begin the important task of completing the Self Review Survey. The session allowed organisations to ask specific questions and learn how to access relevant resources for completing the Self Review Survey.

The Briefing Session also provided the opportunity for participants to highlight their achievements and aspirations and discuss expectations. At the Briefing Session participants heard from past participant, Edith Cuffe, Director, Abbey Museum of Art and Archaeology via video about the continuing value the Standards Review Program has had for the Abbey.

#### ■ 2019 M&G QLD I UQAM Seminar Perspectives on Contemporary Sculpture

This year's seminar, *Perspectives on Contemporary Sculpture*, explored topics which included the role of sculpture in contemporary art; curating sculptural exhibitions; outdoor/public sculpture; and how regional galleries can engage with artists working in this medium.

The seminar was held on 7 February 2019 at The University of Queensland Art Museum (UQAM) from 1:00–5:30 pm. It was presented in partnership by M&G QLD and UQAM.

#### Presentations included:

- Christine Morrow, Curator: Curating Sculpture;
- Greer Honeywill, Artist: Creating Light and Shadow – the artist and the exhibition space;
- Brian Robinson, Artist: Pui-Palai.

Unfortunately, due to illness, Simon Lawrie, Balnaves Curator of Australian Sculpture at the McClelland Sculpture Park+Gallery, was unable to attend. However, John Stafford presented a précis of Simon's paper, *Public sculpture – process, perception and politics*.

The afternoon concluded with a facilitated panel discussion with all presenters and moderator John Stafford, Director, CREATIVEMOVE, followed by networking over refreshments.



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55 people attended the seminar, with representatives from artist run initiatives, local governments, university galleries, Queensland regional galleries, students, artists and industry consultants.

### Opening Doors:2019 M&G QLD Conference

Opening Doors, the 2019 Museums & Galleries Queensland Conference, is a major professional development initiative dedicated to the volunteer and professional workers in Queensland's public gallery and museum sector.

Held every four years, the Conference provides a forum for the sector to come together and discuss issues affecting contemporary regional and public museum and gallery practice at a local, national and international level.

Opening Doors will explore how museums and galleries today are talking more and more about ways of engaging with our diverse audiences and stakeholders. There is an increasing pressure to grow visitor numbers and much has been written about audience research and development. But how do we as museums and galleries meaningfully engage with our communities and respond to our visitors' voices?

Connecting with visitors is one of the most important aspects of running a museum or gallery. Without a welcoming atmosphere, engaging interpretation and a wide audience reach, people will find other ways to spend their time.

Knowing and understanding who our many communities are, and then listening and communicating with them, is central to developing interpretation and exhibitions, designing relevant programs and promoting them effectively. This should also be integral to how we collect and undertake research.

Challenging ourselves to think beyond counting heads, to the quality of interactive opportunities and audience and stakeholder engagement, will be explored throughout the Conference, along with organisational changes required to become a truly inclusive museum or gallery.

The Conference will include a Welcome Reception; two full days of Keynote and Parallel

Presentations; Networking Dinners at local restaurants; Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards; and Masterclasses and Workshops.

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# A Call to Action – Revealing the Untold Stories of Women on the Land

In late 2018, Liza gave a keynote address on the Invisible Farmer Project at the Small Museums Conference in Roma. In this article, Liza explains more about the project.

Most museums across Australia hold significant but untold stories of women on the land; from the grinding stones of Australia's first farmers, Wagga quilts, butter pats and recipe books to family photographs, garden tools and agricultural equipment. While the contribution of women to Australian agriculture has a rich and very deep history, many of these stories have been unacknowledged and continue to be undervalued within museums and the broader community.

The Invisible Farmer Project is an initiative of Museums Victoria. It is the largest study of women on the land in Australia; a 3-year ARC funded project, involving a nation-wide partnership between rural communities, academics, government and cultural organisations.

Invisible Farmer emerged from over 30 years of trying to address the absence and deliberate exclusion of women in agriculture within museum collections and our broader rural narratives.

The project aims to:

- Reveal the untold stories of women on the land – both past and present;
- Create new narratives of rural Australia;
- Reframe what it means to be a 'farmer' to make this word gender neutral, to challenge stereotypes and help women be proud to call themselves 'farmers';
- Celebrate and acknowledge the diverse and vital role of women in agriculture.

Women's farm work in local and regional museums is often rendered invisible because much of it is intangible and ephemeral, is characterised by relationships and oral tradition, and dismissed as just 'domestic' work when, in fact, this work is what has often sustained families, farms and communities. The layers of invisibility are even deeper for Indigenous and migrant women.

This project is a call to action to all museums across Australia to help reveal the undervalued, untold and invisible stories of women on the land. Here are strategies for reframing and rewriting the rural narratives of Australia.

### STRATEGIES TO REVEAL THE UNTOLD STORIES OF WOMEN ON THE LAND

### Acknowledge that Australia's first farmers were Indigenous

- Make contact with local Indigenous women

   invite them to share stories about their traditional skills, knowledge, practices of land and resource management using collection items, artwork, local tours.
- Read Bruce Pascoe's book, Dark Emu, and become familiar with the many ways in which Australia was farmed prior to settlement, and how important this knowledge is to understanding the land on which we live.
- Acknowledge and celebrate local Indigenous women who have been 'farming' the land

for millennia. Involve them in reviewing and reinterpreting your local museum collection to include their stories of ongoing land management and knowledge.

### Review your collections and catalogue descriptions

- Review and edit your catalogue records that relate to women's lives on the land. Make sure your key subjects and search terms include 'farmer', 'female', 'women in agriculture', etc.
- Redefine and reimagine 'farming' to include the many hats that farm women wear: food preparation, child rearing, odd jobs, gardening, house work, book keeping, as well as every other activity normally associated with farming, community work. This unpaid and undervalued work relating to domestic and family tasks is essential to the sustainability and daily operation of farm enterprises, and is very definitely 'farm work'.
- Identify collection items that relate to male farmers and dig deeper to uncover, document and celebrate the stories of the women in their lives (wives, daughters, sisters, mothers, etc.).

### Invite community participation and partnerships

- Approach your local CWA and Agricultural Society to become an advocate for women's stories. They might have some to share that could be represented in the museum exhibitions and collection.
- Excite your local CWA to help fundraise for a book on rural women in your area – ask the Gregory CWA how they did it!
- Do a call-out for stories and photographs and artefacts relating to women on the land in your area to develop content for your displays and collections.
- Undertake oral histories with local farmers (men and women) about women on the land – mothers, grandmothers, great grandmothers, sisters, daughters, etc.

#### Celebrate women on the land

- Profile stories of women on the land from your collection in your local media.
- Make 'Women in Agriculture' a theme for your local show and town – be inspired by Vicki Petrie, owner of 'Oakey Silver Scissors' who

prepared a display in her shop foyer featuring the theme 'Celebrating women in agriculture'. She was awarded the '2018 Oakey Show Foyer Winner'!

- Initiate a local photography competition of contemporary and historical photographs of women in agriculture – including images of regular daily activities inside the home and on the land – and add to your collection.
- Get your local school involved in the Invisible Farmer Untold Education Program – this program could be a great way to involve students in collecting local stories, documenting and digitising existing collections, and creating outcomes to share with your community.

### Share and celebrate your stories and collections on social media

- Create your own Facebook account or website that features stories of local women from your community and collections.
- Follow Invisible Farmer on Twitter, Facebook and Instagram via @invisfarmer #invisfarmer!

#### CONCLUSION

Women in agriculture is not a new story – it is a foundation story that has gone missing in the work and imaginations of historians and museums. There have been many obstacles to acknowledging and valuing the incredible lives of women on the land – and now is the time for museums to seize this important opportunity to rewrite the history of rural Australia.

The challenges facing the world are big, but many of the best and most effective and meaningful responses will be at the local level. Small museums are perfectly placed to help their communities connect to the past, present and future; to excite, engage and empower through personal stories.

Story is possibly the most powerful tool for identity, connection, education and transformation. Story telling is at the heart of what museums do best. Documenting and sharing farm women's stories re-values their lives and contributions, and, by default, their stories assist in re-valuing agriculture in our daily lives and acknowledges the important contributions of rural, remote and regional communities to Australia, its past and its future.

Encouraging farm women to share their stories is not just about re-writing history, it is fundamental to securing our future.
