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IMPORTANT COVID ADVICE FOR VACCINATION ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

From 5am, Friday 17 December 2021, Queensland's public museum and gallery sector may be required to adhere to the Queensland Government's new vaccination entry requirements. Whether or not your organisation must comply is dependent upon the focus of your operations and the services you provide.

- If your museum or gallery is considered to be a tourism experience, you will be subject to the vaccination entry requirements.
- If your museum or gallery is operated by a community group such as a volunteer historical society you
 may be considered as either a tourism experience (subject to vaccination entry restrictions) or a community facility-club (subject to occupant density limits but not vaccination entry requirements). In this
 situation, the museum or gallery operators should consider which category best covers their core operations to inform their decision.
- If your museum or gallery offers commercial food/beverage services in a multi-use venue, it is subject to the hospitality provisions under the Queensland Health Direction regardless of the category above, under which your other operations are conducted.
- Workshops and/or educational classes offered and run by a museum or gallery are subject to occupant density limits, but not vaccination entry requirements.

If your museum or gallery is subject to vaccination entry requirements

Anyone not fully vaccinated against COVID-19 will not be able to enter your premises for any reason. Limited exceptions apply, for example, where there is a medical contraindication.

Staff, volunteers, visitors and contractors to your venue must continue to use the Queensland Check-In App and display the green box/tick to confirm their vaccination status. If they do not have a smart device, manual check-ins can continue, provided a copy of the person's vaccination record is sighted e.g.:

- Official Australian Immunisation Register certificate;
- Printed COVID-19 Vaccination Certificate issued by Medicare; or
- · Vaccination card issued at the time of vaccination.

All contact-tracing paper-based records must be able to be provided electronically and in a timely manner to Queensland Health authorities if requested. All information must be stored confidentially and securely in accordance with the relevant privacy law requirements.

It is important to communicate any changes to your venue's entry requirements – including the new requirements for proof of vaccination – to visitors/patrons in advance of their arrival to help reduce any potential concerns and to make entry to your venue easier. It is recommended that you notify visitors/patrons of new entry requirements via your website, newsletters and social media. Clearly displaying signage at the entrance of your museum or gallery will also assist.

What if an employee refuses to disclose their vaccination status?

While employers may request that employees disclose their vaccination status, the employee is free to decline to disclose. However, in this circumstance, the employee will be considered unvaccinated for the purposes of entering the museum or gallery. This means that the individual must be barred from entering the site.*



It was great to see the array of exhibitions being presented and to visit new gallery spaces. It was also an opportunity to catch up with the amazing gallery staff at each venue.

A highlight of the trip was the *Fresh eyes 2021* exhibition presented at Pine Rivers Art Gallery, Strathpine, which captured the environment of the Moreton Bay region by four local artists.

Next stop was 15 Artists 2021 at Redcliffe Art Gallery, the annual acquisitive prize exhibition developed to enhance the Moreton Bay Regional Council Art Collection.

One of the exhibitions on display at Caboolture Regional Art Gallery, was *Country in Mind* curated by Christopher Bassi. This exhibition was drawn extensively from the University of the Sunshine Coast Art Collection and focused on works from the central desert area, the Kimberley to the northwest, Arnhem Land and offshore islands in the far north of Australia.

While still in the Moreton Bay area, Andrea and Prue caught up with Louise Taylor and Lori Driscoll, co-ordinators at Artel Studio, CPL Choice Passion Life, to glimpse new artworks being created by the studio artists.

A short drive up the highway took Andrea and Prue to Caloundra Regional Gallery where they viewed the *Hiromi Tango: Healing Garden* exhibition, a 'growing' community garden installation made by gallery visitors that explored the many ways in which nature sustains our wellbeing.

ZOONOSES exhibition awarded Visions of Australia touring funding

Logan Art Gallery, Logan City, has been awarded funding by Visions of Australia to support a three-year national tour of the exhibition, *ZOONOSES*, by Dr Nicola Hooper.

Through drawing and lithography, Dr Nicola Hooper uses fairy-tale iconology and rhymes to explore concepts surrounding zoonoses (animal diseases that can infect humans). The exhibition ZOONOSES explores how we perceive certain animals in the context of fear and disease. The works are created using hand-coloured stone lithography including an artist book, prints, wallpaper and a mobile.

Congratulations to Nicola and Logan Art Gallery, Logan City. The tour will be managed by M&G QLD and will begin in May 2023 at Gympie Regional Art Gallery, QLD.

■ Lost in Palm Springs exhibition awarded Visions of Australia development funding

HOTA, Home of The Arts, has been awarded development funding by Visions of Australia for the exhibition, *Lost in Palm Springs*, curated by Dr Greer Honeywill, in partnership with M&G QLD.

It is an interdisciplinary exhibition bringing together fourteen creative minds – including internationally recognised artists, photographers and thinkers from America and Australia – who respond to, capture, or reimagine the magical qualities of the awe-inspiring mountainous landscape and the celebrated mid-century modern architecture found in the desert city.

Expressions of Interest sought for a new touring exhibition of works by artist Natalya Hughes

M&G QLD is seeking expressions of interest for a new touring exhibition, *The Interior*, by well-known Australian artist Natalya Hughes in partnership with the Institute of Modern Art, QLD.

The Interior is an immersive installation combining sculptural seating, richly patterned soft furnishings, and uncanny objet d'art, nestled around a hand-painted mural to generate a stimulating space to unpack our collective and unconscious biases. Appropriating the tropes of a therapist's office, The Interior invites interaction from gallery visitors.

The exhibition will consist of hand-tufted rugs, custom-made chairs, 3D printed sculptures and a hand-painted wall mural. The couches that dot the gallery will take their lush contours from the shapes of the female body, and their patterned upholstery will see motifs of eyes, rats and snakes from Freud's patient case studies ripple over the space in fleshy tones. The audience will be invited to recline and be enveloped, soothed, and held by the furniture's womanly forms while taking turns playing analyst and patient.

Throughout this bodily encounter, *The Interior* hopes to create a space where the existence of women can be re-imagined on different terms in the 'post-Me Too' world.

The artist is interested in the role of women and their historical absence from positions of power. The part-professional, part-domestic setting conjured by *The Interior* plays with gendered power dynamics between public and private space.

Natalya Hughes' practice is concerned with decorative and ornamental traditions and their associations with the feminine, the body and excess. Recent works investigate the relationship between Modernist painters and their anonymous women subjects.

Natalya is the 2022 recipient of the Michela & Adrian Fini Artist Fellowship, awarded by the Sheila Foundation. The fellowship is supporting Natalya to create a new body of work for *The Interior* that will be displayed from 30 July to 1 October 2022 at the Institute of Modern Art, QLD, before touring nationally.

Natalya won the Sunshine Coast Art Prize, QLD, in 2020 and was a finalist in both the Sulman Prize at Art Gallery of NSW and the National Works on Paper Prize at Mornington Peninsula Regional Gallery, VIC, in 2018, as well as the 2017 Ramsay Art Prize at Art Gallery of South Australia. Her work has been included in institutional exhibitions such as Queensland Art Gallery | Gallery of Modern Art; Artspace Sydney, NSW; Hazelhurst Regional Gallery, NSW; Ian Potter Museum of Art, Melbourne, VIC; and Tarrawarra Museum of Art, VIC.

Natalya completed Bachelor of Visual Arts at the Queensland University of Technology, Brisbane, in 2001 and a PhD in Art Theory at the College of Fine Art (UNSW) in 2009. She currently lives in Brisbane and is Honours Program Director, Visual Arts at the Queensland College of Art. She is represented by Milani Gallery (Brisbane) Sullivan+Strumpf and (Sydney).

Expressions of Interest sought for a new touring exhibition of works by artists Tim and Mic Gruchy

M&G QLD is seeking expressions of interest for a new touring exhibition, titled *The Brothers Gruchy*, in partnership with Bundaberg Regional Galleries.

The Brothers Gruchy is an engaging new media exhibition that features nine key artworks from Tim and Mic Gruchy's practice that focus on recurring themes of human perception, artificial intelligence, synaesthesia, memory and cultural identity. Nature and our human impact is a strong thread of this exhibition.

Tim and Mic Gruchy have been working together extensively since the mid 1980s. Most of their collaborative undertakings are in the performative arts. Together they have explored the use of video and multimedia in theatre, opera, contemporary dance, musicals and commercial projects.

Works in the exhibition include *Time & Tide*, a 3-channel video installation by Mic Gruchy

which explores the life of rivers, the tide, and changing flows and geography. The accompanying soundscape by Tim Gruchy creates a fully immersive audio-visual experience in the gallery. Using time-lapse, high-speed slow motion, above and underwater video cameras, this work is a meditation on the great Australian rivers of the Bundanon Estate Artist's Reserve in the Shoalhaven region, NSW.

In another work, Beauty Unbeauty, Tim Gruchy takes the flower as a human fundamental representation of beauty. The originating set of flowers is drawn from his large personal photo library and, utilising the artificial intelligence (AI) 'Deep Dreaming Generator', his process takes two paths: firstly to beauty, secondly to unbeauty. These two sets of AI deep dreaming are then animated and juxtaposed in different ways to explore questions of the beautiful, how human and AI aesthetics are different, and how they can work together.

A rich selection of public and education programs are available. Educational opportunities have been invested into the framing of the exhibition that utilise the artists' vast knowledge of multimedia, photography and video. The exhibition lends itself to developing partnerships and collaborations, providing numerous opportunities for in-gallery talks and workshops, as well as outreach to libraries and schools.

Expressions of Interest sought for a new touring exhibition of works by artist Bruce Reynolds

M&G QLD is seeking expressions of interest from venues for a new touring exhibition, *How Soon Is Now? Works about time and space in two and a half dimensions*, by well-known Australian artist Bruce Reynolds.

How Soon Is Now? brings together a selection of Bruce Reynolds' exquisite cast relief works with two-dimensional collaged linoleum works, to celebrate a physicality that is frequently overlooked in today's growing digital environment. Exploring how we arrived at this point – from the archaic to a language of compressed space – Bruce's work invites consideration of the ancient and the 'now'.

Bruce Reynolds' work grew from collage to relief and sculpture over a number of decades. Residencies in Rome focused both studio and architectural works on relief forms that occupy the space between painting and sculpture, between drawing and architecture. He describes it as being both archaic and a fresh place of representation. Bruce says:

"Since how we see the past reflects how we see ourselves, the works are intended to question the tableau of history with consideration of the recent and ancient together."

"The notion of the passage of time and the fixed or 'set in stone' notion is one of my interests in the making of this new series of works. This notion was born from the desire to respond with immediacy and comprehension to the cacophony of Rome and its layers."

For this exhibition, Bruce has used an antique process that favours direct material involvement to cast works from liquid to solid that, when carved, create lively manifestations of thoughts on time, deep time and everyday archaeology.

Bruce's cast works gained the Griffith University Award for Excellence in Research in 2019. Artist and RMIT Associate Professor, Mikala Dwyer, said:

"Bruce has invented new technical processes in pursuit of his many ideas. It's an exciting practice that pays close attention to the deep nature of material properties, its historical applications and then turns it upside down and inside out. This inventive playfulness is underpinned by a serious and conceptual investigation. The work is highly original as a result of his focused and enduring experiments."

Bruce Reynolds studied at the ANU School of Art, ACT, and at the Victorian College of the Arts in Melbourne. Now based in Brisbane, Bruce's career spans more than 30 years in Australia and abroad as an arts practitioner and educator (ANU School of Art through the 1980s and more recently at the Queensland College of Art, Griffith University from 1986 to 2006). A trained painter, Bruce works across 2D and 3D media, integrating the mediums of photography, painting, sculpture and relief in his practice.

Bruce has had numerous solo exhibitions in Australia and has participated in many group exhibitions around Australia and in Germany and Poland. His work is held in public collections including National Gallery of Australia; Queensland Art Gallery; Museum of Brisbane; Artbank; the High Court, Queensland; and HOTA, Gold Coast. Bruce has regularly created large-scale artworks for integration into architectural projects, and

has contributed extensively to Brisbane's public art landscape.

Hinkler Hall of Aviation

Set within the lush Bundaberg Botanic Gardens, the Hinkler Hall of Aviation celebrates the adventures and achievements of Australia's pioneer solo aviator, Bert Hinkler. The audience can become part of the story through glide and flight simulators, display aircraft, a vintage motor

vehicle, and many unique museum exhibits and interactive displays.

Be impressed as you view the immaculately restored Armstrong Siddeley vehicle from Bert Hinkler's Tour of Triumph in 1928. The vehicle was loaned to Bert to attend his appointments and dinners which were held in honour of his solo, long-distance flight from United Kingdom to Australia in 15.5 days. Explore beautiful Hinkler House, 'Mon Repos', Bert's relocated English home.

Sunshine Coast Council to manage Landsborough Museum

At the request of the Landsborough and District Historical Society, Sunshine Coast Council has agreed to manage one of the largest community museums in South East Queensland, including its collection of more than 14,000 objects.

The Landsborough and District Historical Society has operated the Landsborough Museum since 1976 and managed its collection in the former Landsborough Shire Council Chambers – a Council-owned, State heritage listed building.

Due to the ever increasing challenge of attracting a volunteer base, with the demanding skills and experience now required to manage the financial obligations of caring for the collection and running the Museum of the scope and scale of Landsborough, the society requested Council to take over the reins. In November, Council agreed to take on this responsibility, noting the significance of the Museum and its collection to the region's history, and acknowledging the enormous pressure that volunteer groups face.

Council sincerely thanked the Landsborough and District Historical Society and all past and present members who gave their time, effort and energy over 45 years of dedicated service.

The Museum's management and the collection will be funded by the Sunshine Coast Heritage Levy.

Queensland organisations successful in Building Better Regions Fund grants

Sucessful applications to Round 5 of the Building Better Regions Fund – Infrastructure Projects Stream were announced in October. The following organisations were successful in this round:

- Southern Downs Regional Council to upgrade the Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery;
- The Texas Historical Society Inc. to construct an exhibition pavilion at the existing museum complex;
- Toowoomba Hospital Foundation to upgrade the medical superintendent's house at the Baillie Henderson Hospital into a museum; and
- Murweh Shire Council to construct the Outback Museum of Australia and connect existing tourism facilities and upgrade an Airfield Museum and a World War Two era base (see below).

Outback Museum of Australia to be built in Charleville

A \$8.34m museum showcasing outback Australian life will be built in Charleville in southwest Queensland. It will champion the people and industries of the bush, and celebrate their resilience and innovation in diversifying due to drought.

Murweh Shire Council has received \$7.94m of federal government funding for the project, which will go towards the construction of the Outback Museum of Australia and upgrades to the WWII Secret Base and Airfield Museum.

The Museum will be built alongside existing tourist attractions in Charleville, and there will be an international competition to decide on the final design of the museum.

■ Construction complete on Rockhampton Museum of Art

Construction is now completed on the new Rockhampton Museum of Art. Due to open in early 2022, the Museum will feature large flexible

gallery spaces, multi-purpose education spaces, a restaurant, retail space and a function area on the top floor overlooking the Fitzroy River.

The \$36 million project has been supported with \$15 million through the Queensland Government's Building Our Regions program and Arts Queensland investment.

The next stage in the transformation of the new Museum, which is six times the size of the old Rockhampton Art Gallery, will be to relocate the Gallery's significant Australian modern art collection.

■ Vale Dr Dorothy Gibson-Wilde OAM

Townsville historian, Dr Dorothy Gibson-Wilde OAM, passed away in August 2021. Dr Gibson-Wilde was a Townsville historian and author who dedicated her life to researching and protecting the region's history and heritage, including her contribution to National Trust Queensland and the Townsville Heritage Centre. She was also a prolific author who authored and co-wrote several books.

■ New appointments/staff changes

- After sixteen years with Scenic Rim Regional Council, leading the team in Cultural Services, Bronwyn Davies has resigned effective from 10 January 2022. M&G QLD has had the privilege of working with Bronwyn and experienced first-hand her passion and drive. We wish her the very best.
- Dr Jonathan McBurnie was appointed as the Director of Rockhampton Museum of Art in November. He was previously based in Townsville as Creative Director at Townsville City Council.
- Jacquie Chlanda was appointed as Education Manager at The University of Queensland Art Museum in October.

■ Launch of the Australian Public Galleries Snapshot 2019

This new report was launched on 15 December 2021 by the National Public Galleries Alliance (NPGA). It is the second major report specifically for our sector, and captures data of 170 of our country's estimated 434 public galleries (39%).

The 2019 Snapshot highlights the extraordinary impact that small-to-medium public galleries make to the social, cultural and economic wellbeing of Australia's metropolitan, regional and remote communities.

The report shows that, in 2019, Australia's small-to-medium public galleries:

- presented over 1,700 exhibitions;
- employed around 700 FTE staff;
- supported more than 21,500 living artists;
- actively engaged over 5 million visitors in person and a further 7.5 million online; and
- received more than \$13.0 million worth of labour from its 4,500-strong volunteer workforce.

Annually, over 16.3 million people visit our country's public galleries including state, territory and national public gallery institutions.

Small-to-medium public galleries employ more than 700 FTE staff. Annually, more than 4,500 volunteers donate their time and expertise to these galleries.

In 2019, over \$4.7 million was invested in artists' fees, supporting more than 21,500 living artists.

Captain Adele Catts
Army Museum South Queensland



When Captain Adele Catts was appointed Manager of as Army Museum South Queensland in July 2013, her main aims were to open up Victoria Barracks Brisbane to the public and to recruit volunteers. This remains her passion since being appointed as Curator in February 2020.

In 2014, a severe hailstorm damaged the Victoria Barracks buildings and while they were under repair, Adele turned her attention to volunteer recruitment. She took every opportunity to speak to potential volunteers and to outline her plans for the Barracks. Within a year, one volunteer had been joined by five more, and the team now numbers thirty-three and is still growing.

Whilst undertaking this initial recruitment, Adele began planning their first exhibition, *Queensland Goes to War*. From that point on, it was a matter of engaging the public to come to Victoria Barracks, which they did. Army Museum South Queensland has evolved from this humble beginning, presenting one or two original exhibitions every year. Each exhibition has its own launch to which Adele invites military dignitaries and members of other museums and historical organisations. Adele has also developed tours which have been well received by individual visitors and groups. She regularly attends schools

and other groups, especially around ANZAC Day and other significant military events, to educate students and the public on the importance of commemorating these special days.

Adele has shown outstanding dedication to promote, educate and engage the public in military history. Leading by example, she encourages the volunteers to undertake research in planning the exhibitions, to attend courses to improve their skills in museum best practice, and to visit museums and galleries to critically observe the professional practice and displays. This has, in turn, continually improved the contribution made to Army Museum South Queensland and made the volunteers feel valued and appreciated.

Billie-Jo Ogilvie has served as Artspace Mackay's Public Programs Officer for over twelve years. This position is a pivotal role for the gallery, taking responsibility for planning, development and implementation of an innovative gallery public program that includes educational, promotional and audience development outcomes.

In 2020, during COVID-19 facility closures and imposed travel restrictions, Billie-Jo's swift,

creative thinking led to the development of a number of quality, engaging online programs and activities.

These included the introduction of 3D virtual tours of exhibitions and live Facebook streaming of the 2020 Libris Awards announcements. 'My Backyard and Beyond' was an all-ages art project calling on the Mackay community to create original works on paper and to post them via traditional postage or via a makeshift post box installed at the front entrance of the gallery during closure. Over 100 of these artworks by children and adults were displayed in the Foyer Gallery upon re-opening.

'Welcome to my Studio' introduced filmed studio tours with local artists, promoted via website, Facebook and Instagram platforms. An online BMA Kidspace program provided employment for local art workshop tutors and a local musician to present filmed art activities and entertainment that toddlers and their carers could engage with at home.

Billie-Jo consistently provides inspiration as a role model for others and encourages her Public Programs team to implement new ideas, directions and initiatives. Her decisive leadership kept Artspace Mackay connected with local communities and audiences and reminded Council of the important role that the arts can play in keeping a community's spirit buoyant in difficult times.

Jill Hogrefe

Volunteer, Girl Guides Queensland Archive

Jill's length of service with the Girl Guides Queensland Archive in a voluntary capacity is the initial, but not the only, stand-out feature that makes her achievements so distinctive. In 1999, she saw a basic gap in the Archive and stepped in to rectify it. This involved the establishment and ongoing development of a database. This important, first task paved the way for Jill to raise the management of the collection to a standard



that emulates professional museum and archival practice.

Jill cares for the large and varied collection which includes thousands of artefacts, a large paper-based and photographic collection, and a sizeable costume collection. She has been involved in many relocations of the Archives over the past twenty-two years, and has seen it through several floods and other challenges.

With her multitude of roles, Jill still finds time for research, answering enquiries, opening the Archives to the public, publishing, and acquiring items for the collection. Her extraordinary generosity of time, her quest for knowledge, and her ability to put it to good use represents an outstanding achievement.

Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts, Townsville

Legacy: Reflections on Mabo

Legacy: Reflections on Mabo is an exhibition developed by Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts. It is Umbrella's most extensive touring exhibition to date and was first presented in Townsville by Umbrella in 2019. It has since been touring nationally to regional venues across Australia.

The exhibition celebrates the man behind the game-changing Native Title Act, Eddie Koiki Mabo, and is co-curated by Umbrella's previous Directors, Dr Jonathan McBurnie and Kellie Williams, together with Eddie's daughter Gail Mabo.

The exhibition brings together a selection of 22 works by 25 Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists in the spirit of reconciliation, almost three decades after the historic achievement. Each artist responded to an aspect of Eddie Mabo that they were drawn to, whether it be his life, politics, activism, or legacy. The works come together in surprising ways with reverence, compassion, anger, sadness and respect, celebrating a man who was both a rebel and a dreamer.

Legacy: Reflections on Mabo is the first major exhibition to explore the life and legacy of Eddie Koiki Mabo from both Indigenous and non-Indigenous perspectives. It is the first to incorporate significant curatorial direction by the Mabo family, and is unique in the way that the entire show comprises commissioned artworks created specifically for this project that have never been seen before.

This exhibition's significant reach to so many galleries in regions around Australia means that the conversation about Indigenous rights, reconciliation and wider conversations continue for people of all ages.

FINALIST

Artspace Mackay Ron McBurnie: In Search of Arcadia artist-in-residence program

During 2019 and 2020, prominent North Queensland artist Ron McBurnie completed an extended artist residency with Artspace Mackay, capturing beloved landscapes and views of the Mackay region *en plein air* over several visits. In his search for landscapes to visit and to capture, Ron called upon the Mackay community to guide his quest by offering up recommendations of locations held dear. Daily Facebook posts from Ron diarised his *en plein air* adventures and called upon individuals to suggest more places to visit, draw and paint.

The residency was originally planned as a smaller project, however disruptions to exhibition programming brought about by COVID-19 saw the gallery pursue an opportunity to extend it to enable Ron to work towards a 2021 major show. Over a period of six one-week residencies, Ron created over 60 original works on paper for the culminating Artspace Mackay exhibition, *In Search of Arcadia*.

This unique program delivered many beneficial outcomes for Artspace Mackay / Mackay Regional Council and the broader community including the development of a new partnership with Mackay Tourism to create an Artists' Trail brochure, which features Ron's original artworks and promotes





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places he visited during his residency. Ron's recorded travel throughout the Mackay region encouraged visitation to the area and to Artspace Mackay, reminding visitors about the appeal and 'uniqueness' of the place and providing the local community with a sense of optimism and pride in their home.

FINALIST Noosa Regional Gallery Floating Land: point to point



Floating Land embraces the vision to be Australia's premier art in the environment event, reflecting Noosa's reputation and identity as a community that prioritises care for the natural environment. In 2019, Floating Land: point to point marked the 10th iteration of the event, with 31 artists delivering 40 artistic project outcomes and 45 associated public programs, each leaving no trace on the environment at the conclusion of the event. There were two key anchor sites for 2019 Floating Land - Boreen Point and Noosa National Park - while several sites in between were also activated with stand-alone artistic projects. Visitors were invited to experience thoughtful, challenging and environmentally aware works that engage critically and sensitively with these captivating spaces.

Projects included *Travelling Colony* by Wiradjuri artist, Brook Andrew. Under Brook's creative direction, three retro caravans were hand-painted

in collaboration with school students and First Nations artists from across the region, reflecting Brook's cultural heritage as well as his ongoing interest in popular culture.

Returning to Noosa 31 years after his first visit, internationally acclaimed Japanese artist, Masao Okabe accepted an invitation to take part in *Floating Land* with his collaborator, Chihiro Minato. Masao uses frottage to capture a record of surfaces at sites of trauma. *Trees to Trees*, his project for *Floating Land*, brought together impressions from trees in Hiroshima alongside those from trees impacted by the Peregian Beach bushfires.

FINALIST Queensland Museum I Do! Wedding stories from Queensland

I Do! Wedding stories from Queensland was a temporary social history exhibition held at Queensland Museum from September 2020 to February 2021. The exhibition explored 180 years of changing customs and social dynamics through the wedding stories of more than 40 Queensland couples, and the display and interpretation of 174 objects including 40 wedding ensembles, photographs, letters and accessories.

The concept for *I Do! Wedding stories from Queensland* began as an idea to display wedding garments from QMN's State Collection, but evolved into a survey of historical and contemporary Queensland life as QMN's curatorial team delved into the lived experiences connected to the garments.

Cultural groups featured in the exhibition included Chinese, Hmong, Sikh, Greek, Lebanese, Fijian and First Nations Australians, in addition to a broad range of social perspectives from women and the LGBTIQ community. The suits worn by the first same-sex couple to be married in Queensland catalysed the curatorial concept to show wedding garments as tangible artefacts of Queensland's ever-evolving cultural landscape and the diverse communities within it.

The exhibition also led to QMN's first ever acquisitive artwork commission from First Nations artists Simone Arnol and Bernard Singleton. The wedding dress and accessories explored the difficult and suppressed histories of arranged weddings that took place on the Yarrabah Aboriginal mission in Queensland during the 20th century.

FINALIST

Museum of Brisbane Bauhaus Now exhibition

Bauhaus Now: art+design+architecture: A legacy of migration and modernism was exhibited by Museum of Brisbane (MoB) from September 2020 to April 2021. It brought to life the little-known story of how revolutionary ideas of the Weimar Republic in Germany influenced modernist art, design and architecture in Brisbane and Australia. Curated by Professor Andrew McNamara, the exhibition revealed the migrant and refugee contribution to Australian life and art history in the inter-war period and post-Second World War years.

Bauhaus Now featured original artworks and films from this influential period, plus a series of vivid contemporary recreations that demonstrated the impact of this movement in Brisbane and Australian art history. The exhibition also revealed



how the legacy of these powerful ideas is being re-interpreted today by the city's contemporary artists. In total, 103 artworks and historical objects were on display plus support material, including digitised photographs and architectural plans.

Bauhaus Now achieved high standards of artistic and cultural outcomes for MoB, the arts and social history sector, and the community. MoB aims to be central to conversations about the evolving life of Brisbane, its histories and contemporary cultures, and the exploration of the Bauhaus' legacy in Brisbane achieved the organisation's goals, sharing a little-known story that had a big impact on Brisbane – it's art, architecture, education and communities.

The exhibition saw a high number of national loans from internationally renowned artists, including from major interstate galleries, museums and libraries, as well as artworks and social history objects from the Museum of Brisbane Collection. The display of historically significant works beside contemporary interpretations showcased the continued legacy of the Bauhaus émigrés.

Ingham Family History Association Inc. in partnership with Sandi Robb, History and Heritage Consultant

Re-Discovering Buk Ti: Chinese settlers in the Lower Herbert Valley



The Ingham Family History Association Inc. is a small dedicated group of twenty-three members. The association has been operating for a number of decades and are a valued community group within the Hinchinbrook Shire district, which includes Ingham, Halifax and several smaller Lower Herbert hamlets.

This exhibition project sought to present Chinese settler history of the late 19th and early 20th centuries to the wider Lower Herbert Valley community and to bring pride to descendants who remain in the community today. In doing so, the range of historical diversity of the region was highlighted and a light was shone onto a little-known aspect of Hinchinbrook Shire's history.

The committee and volunteers of Ingham Family History Association Inc. realised early on that their skill base did not extend to exhibition planning, professional displaying of their research, or creation of a cohesive vision to the requirements of the TYTO Regional Art Gallery where it was shown. The group partnered with history and heritage consultant, Sandi Robb, so she could develop the Association's ideas in a creative and engaging way to present the district's Chinese history to the broader community.

The project, Re-Discovering Buk Ti: Chinese settlers in the Lower Herbert Valley, built the capacity of the Ingham Family History Association as an organisation with the development of individual volunteer skills, such as computing; how to evaluate and accession loan items; and identification of Chinese artefacts. It raised confidence that, as an aging community group with high research skills and local knowledge, they now have understanding as to how to present a professional exhibition.

FINALIST

Queensland Women's Historical Association High Society 1860–1960 – an exhibition of evening attire worn to theatrical and social events in early Brisbane



The Queensland Women's Historical Association's (QWHA) costume collection has some exceptional individual pieces with demonstrated national significance, but very little of it has come to the public's attention. The *High Society* exhibition aimed to bring some of these costumes to the fore but in the context of the time when the outfits were worn. The exhibition consisted of a selection of evening costumes, jewellery, accessories, photographs, invitations, programs and memorabilia associated with the social custom of attending theatrical and evening events in Brisbane between the years 1860–1960. All of the items on display were from the QWHA collection.

The exhibition aimed to use the costumes and other items to help visitors interpret a significant part of Queensland's social history as well as giving the public a 'then and now' experience,

helping them to understand the changes in the social customs of attending a formal evening event and dressing for the occasion. Where possible, a costume was shown with a story from the era. For example, the Fancy Dress party organised by the original owners of the house (the Perry family) was accompanied by the newspaper article about the event and included a family photograph showing Mr Perry wearing a similar costume of Chinese origin as on display.

Another aim was to look long-term and show that conservation of some of the costumes on display was important in maintaining the links to history of early and colonial Queensland society. The work of Dr Michael Marendy, a conservator of national standing and a member of QWHA, enabled some significant Queensland costumes to be displayed. A podcast "The Little Black Dress" was made to talk about the conservation techniques needed to be able to display the 1890s reception dress given by the Archer family, early pioneers of Queensland. A History Grant from the Brisbane City Council enabled conservation of this and other costumes to occur.

Some of the initial plans for the exhibition, such as a Gala opening in evening dress, had to be cancelled or changed because of COVID restrictions. Instead a Virtual Tour of the exhibition was made and placed on the QWHA's website and Facebook page. This, together with the podcast, broke new ground for the volunteers involved.

Gladstone Maritime Museum
Relocation of Museum to East Shores
Parklands

The Gladstone Maritime Historical Society has an overarching aim to operate a Museum that best gives the community a view of the many facets of the maritime history of the Gladstone region. This includes Indigenous history; to Matthew Flinders' visit; to settlement and agricultural aspects to the present-day Port which handles varied cargoes associated with mining and industry.

The Society was contacted by the Gladstone Ports Corporation, the Museum's landlord, advising that



they wanted the Museum to be relocated to East Shores Parklands, to complement the Parklands which had recently been given a makeover, and because the present site is needed for further Port development. The Museum has operated for 25 years, and while this was a significant undertaking for a volunteer organisation, the relocation has enhanced its activities in many ways.

The new location is much more convenient to access and is more visible to residents and visitors. By good fortune, the new site for the Museum is adjacent to where *HMAS Gladstone* is displayed, which streamlines operations from being two separate entities.

It was recognised that the Museum had to be fitted out to a high standard to match the standard of the Parklands, and to ensure that the displays meet the needs of Museum visitors. This meant engaging some professionals to help achieve this and getting grants to purchase items such as display cabinets.

The relocation was a catalyst to review the Museum's collection so that best practice was utilised in displaying it. The project gave the volunteers a clearer understanding of their role, and enhanced the Committee's expertise within the organisation to achieve a mutually beneficial outcome.

FINALIST

Wondai Regional Art Gallery Gallery Extensions

In 2019, the need for an extension of the storage space at the gallery was becoming an issue and impeding gallery development. Travelling exhibitions in large crates need to be stored safely and securely before, during and after display. Local artists also often needed storage space for their work prior to or after their exhibitions. In addition to the storage problem, a kitchen upgrade was required to meet appropriate standards and gallery requirements.

Volunteers are an essential part of the gallery, providing all the 'workpower'. The volunteers assessed the best design to fit with the existing historic building, and once appropriate grants and other financial contributions were sourced, the next step was to plan the extension build with minimum disruption to the everyday work of the gallery and its current exhibitions.

This project has enabled the gallery to raise the standard of artistic outcomes for the region. For example, in June 2020 the gallery hosted the late artist Vincent Serico's exhibition, *Some people are stories*. This was particularly poignant for the gallery as Vincent was brought up in the region and his work is especially relevant to the local Indigenous population. It would not have been possible to host this exhibition without the storeroom to safely and securely accommodate the large number of crates. The extensions have also enabled the gallery to have a quick turn-

around of each month's exhibitions as work can now be stored securely prior to being displayed, thereby ensuring that the gallery has no 'blank walls' between exhibitions.

The kitchen extensions have meant that the gallery can store and cater for openings nights in a hygienic and food-safe workspace. They can provide for an enhanced cultural and artistic experience for the artists, volunteers and the attending community members. The volunteers have an improved workplace which is more enjoyable to spend time in, and as a result, their volunteer numbers have increased.

WINNER

Logan Art Gallery, Logan City Council Our stories and designs



Our stories and designs is the title of a Logan Art Gallery exhibition of works by local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists, curated by Amanda Hayman of Blaklash Creative. The project derived from a Logan City Council call-out for expressions of interest from local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists to submit a design for a mural to be painted on the Chester Park water tower in Boronia Heights. There was a very strong response to the expressions of interest, and gallery staff became aware of a number of local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists who were not on their database or known to the gallery. The quality of the submissions was such that gallery staff suggested a group exhibition be developed to showcase and celebrate the strength, quality and diversity of these local artists and curator.

Our stories and designs was a feature exhibition in Logan Art Gallery's Exhibitions Program, continuing an ongoing program of celebrating the cultural diversity of the local community. It not only strengthened relationships between Logan Art Gallery and local Aboriginal and Torres Strait artists and communities, it also provided opportunities for existing audiences to connect with the stories and artwork of these artists who had not previously exhibited with the gallery.

FINALIST

Brisbane City Council City-wide Outdoor Gallery Augmented Reality Art Treasure Hunt



Brisbane City Council was successful in receiving an Arts Queensland Open Air Grant as part of programming for Council's Outdoor Gallery Exhibition, 'Sunny Side Up'. This allowed increased diversification of engagement that they were able to provide in response to COVID by continuing to deliver safe cultural offerings, supporting local creatives, increasing the reach of cultural engagement, building new audiences, piloting innovative cultural offerings for the first time in Brisbane, and growing the career trajectories of the engaged creative sector.

The project provided training workshops to upskill all 13 artists, collectives, curators and project manager in creating their very own augmented reality artworks that connected to their original artworks within the exhibition. This resulted in the creation of 20 new artworks.

The project was able to reach new audiences to cultural engagement through the city-wide augmented reality art treasure hunt, capturing for the first-time purposeful engagement through QR codes and augmented reality activations that were featured as part of the exhibition.

Multiple city-wide art races encouraged audiences with an active appetite to explore the Outdoor Gallery for the first time. 'Racers' who completed the race were given a limited edition artwork by one of the emerging artists within the exhibition – for most participants starting their very own art collection.

It also delivered accessible engagement for those who physically could not attend, by creating a virtual curator's walk through the exhibition, exhibition documentation and an educators' resource.

WINNER

Australian Age of Dinosaurs
Our past, your museum. Building a
sustainable Museum of Natural History in
Outback Queensland



Australian Age of Dinosaurs has been developing in stages over 11 years. These stages were planned to ensure the long-term viability of the Museum and, as visitation increased, that the necessary supporting infrastructure (such as accommodation, food outlets and transportation facilities) in Winton would also develop to meet demand.

The final stage of the Museum's infrastructure development is its most challenging: the construction of a multi-million-dollar Museum of Natural History (MNH). Building the MNH in Outback Queensland will serve to preserve and promote Australia's geological past, helping to secure the long-term sustainability of communities throughout regional Australia. The viability of this massive undertaking has been endorsed by the completion of a comprehensive Bankable Feasibility Study, compiled by internationally recognised consultancy firm, Grant Thornton.

This Study has built the capacity of the Museum by clearly outlining the necessary steps to complete

construction of the MNH within the next three to five years. In readiness for this, plans to broaden the Museum's reach through the development of further products and experiences, such as darksky astronomy initiatives and virtual excursions to school classrooms, have now been implemented along with development of new tours and a broad range of unique merchandise options.

Likewise, the Study has highlighted the urgency to further build the Museum's fossil collection in readiness for the MNH, and a range of collecting and exchange initiatives with other museums around Australia is now underway.
