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



■ REPORT: Skill Development Workshop in Collection Management and Preventive Conservation Cooktown, 22–23 October 2011

With funding from a Community Heritage Grant, the *Skill Development Workshop in Collection Management and Preventive Conservation* was conducted by Christine Ianna and Lisa Jones in Cooktown in October.

Ten participants attended, with representatives from Cooktown and District Historical Society; James Cook Museum; Nature's Powerhouse; the Vera Scarth-Johnson Committee; the Rossville Historical Society; and the Cooktown Re-enactment Association. The acting Museum Development Officer for Far North Queensland, Michael Marzik, joined participants on both workshop days.

Evaluation from participants showed a 100% satisfaction rate with both workshops. Participants identified many strengths of the workshops including:

- Great communication;
- The extensive knowledge of presenters and their ability to share that knowledge;
- The 'hands on' nature of the workshops.

One participant commented, "The whole weekend was a treasure trove of wonderful, useful information. Thanks."

Organisations received a kit of preventive conservation materials to take away, a folder of notes and a USB of additional resources to further their understanding. The workshops covered topics including:

- · Collection management overview;
- An introduction to assessing significance of objects;
- Completing cataloguing paperwork;
- Object numbering systems;
- Principles of preventive conservation;
- Agents of deterioration;
- Spectrum of solutions;
- Condition reporting.

REPORT: Standards Program 2010 'One Year On' meeting at the Queensland Police Museum, Brisbane 4 November 2011

Seven of the participating organisations in M&GSQ's 2010 Standards Program met at the Queensland Police Museum on 4 November to report on the progress they had made on their action plans developed during the 2010 Program.

■ REPORT: M&GSQ I UQAM Seminar University of Queensland Art Museum 2 November 2011

Museum and Gallery Services Queensland, in partnership with the University of Queensland Art Museum and University of Queensland Museum Studies Program (School of English, Media Studies and Art History), recently presented a seminar themed Advancing Visitor Engagement in Museums.

The afternoon began with a welcome from Dr Campbell Gray, the Director of the University of Queensland Art Museum, before keynote speaker Gail Davitt began her presentation. Gail's visit to Australia was assisted by the Australian Government through the Australia Council for the Arts, its arts funding and advisory body.

Gail is Chair of Learning Initiatives and Director of Education at the Dallas Museum of Art, USA. She oversees The Center for Creative Connections, teaching and partnership programs, community engagement and access programs, family and public programs, the Museum's literary program, and gallery interpretation.

She serves as project director for in-gallery education spaces and the Museum's evaluation and visitor research projects. In this capacity, she was deeply involved in the development of the *Framework for Engaging with Art*, a matrix

used across Museum department boundaries to make institutional and programmatic decisions. The National Art Education Association named Ms Davitt the National Art Museum Educator of the year in 2004.

Gail discussed how the Dallas Museum of Art changed its institutional culture and enhanced audience engagement and learning. The museum conducted and applied the outcomes of a seven-year study that probed beyond the traditional demographics of marketing-focused research and instead used qualitative questions to uncover how visitors engage with art, as well as their comfort levels in looking at and talking about art.

Over 1,000 visitors ranked statements about themselves and art, and a cluster analysis identified four main visitor frameworks for engaging with art:

- * observers
- * participants
- * independents
- * enthusiasts

The Dallas Art Museum used this information about their visitors in all their institutional decisions, including education, curatorial and marketing. Gail gave examples of how this information was used in their exhibitions, late night events and,

in a separate presentation, discussed their SmArt phone tours that are developed and produced in-house. Gail emphasised that anyone considering undertaking a similar research program in their institution must have the support from the top and emphasised the value in the museum staff themselves grappling with the ways to apply the research learnings.

The respondent to Gail's presentation was Donna McColm, Head of Public Programs, Children's Art Centre and Membership, Queensland Art Gallery| Gallery of Modern Art. Donna is one of the staff responsible for the design of a diverse range of public programs to support and extend visitor engagement with QAG I GOMA.

Donna's response, Artist/Museum/Audience: Making art for everyone, focused on case studies from recent exhibitions and projects at QAG I GOMA and on programming areas including the Children's Art Centre, dedicated programs for people over 50, and the *Up Late* series of late night openings, which have aimed to use the Gallery as a platform to provide pathways into educational, social and cultural experiences.

The second part of the seminar focussed on 21st Century technology solutions that enable people to create their own personal experiences in museums, and included:

- Gail Davitt who discussed the SmARTphone tours at the Dallas Museum of Art which are web-based, anchored in audience research, and developed and produced in-house.
- Kate Ravenswood, Head of Access, Education and Regional Services, QAG | GOMA who outlined what works and what doesn't for QAG | GOMA's interactive tours in a paper entitled Almost... but not quite... reflections upon audiences, art galleries and the promise of new technologies.
- Tony Bennetts, Chief Information Officer, Australian Communication Exchange who discussed an innovative application for the deaf and the use of Smart Auslan by the National Sports Museum.

To conclude the afternoon, participants networked over refreshments at the University of Queensland Art Museum.

■ The Workshops Rail Museum wins two State tourism awards

■ Museum of Tropical Queensland wins two North Queensland tourism awards

The Museum of Tropical Queensland (MTQ), Townsville, took out two awards at the North Queensland Tourism Awards at Jupiter's Casino in December 2011 – the Heritage and Cultural Tourism Award and also the Tourist Attactions Award

This is the third year in a row that MTQ has won the Heritage and Cultural Tourism Category.

Gold Coast City Gallery receives national recognition in MAGNA and MAPDA awards

The Gold Coast City Gallery was the only Queensland institution to receive awards in either the inaugural Museums and Galleries National Awards (MAGNA) or the Museums Australia Multimedia and Publication Design Awards (MAPDA), both presented at the 2011 Museums Australia National Conference in November.

The MAGNA recognise excellent work nationally in the categories of exhibition, public programs and sustainability projects. The Gold Coast City Gallery's exhibition, *Kuru Alala: Eyes Open*, was presented as the Winner in the category of Small Museum Temporary Exhibition (budget over \$25,000).

The travelling exhibition was curated by Gold Coast City Gallery Curator Virginia Rigney, together with Joanna Foster of Tjanpi Desert Weavers. It has been toured by Museum and Gallery Services Queensland since 2009 when it was initially on display in the Gallery. The exhibition, developed in partnership with the Tjanpi Desert Weavers, is the product of residencies and art workshops in the NPY lands over 2008-09, made possible by generous financial support from The Balnaves Foundation. Contemporary installation artists, Maria Fernanda Cardoso and Alison Clouston, visited the Ngaanyatjarra and Pitjantjatjara Lands respectively to share ideas, experiences and skills with fibre artists from the renowned Tjanpi Desert Weavers.

Blind Men, Elephants and Foreign Countries: Challenging Assumptions in Heritage Studies and Interpretation

Heritage studies are the lovechild of a multitude of relationships between academics in many disciplines, and then nurtured by practitioners and institutions. The purpose of this paper is to discuss the importance of methodological awareness and the need for the imagination in the development of new methodologies for understanding the heritage in the context of interdisciplinary collaboration. Heritage studies are, as a consequence of their mixed parentage, the archetypal interdisciplinary study area. Methodologies are important in heritage studies because they are the hand which guides us into the past from the present, and from the social to the physical. They show us how to look and see. But they should also come with a health warning. This presentation will explore some of these issues.

History, Memory and Making the Past Meaningful The individual identifies with the past and participates in acts of commemoration and memorialisation. It is a past that is not remembered but memorialised. There is a process of internalisation in which that memorialised past is appropriated, accommodated, assimilated and it becomes owned by the individual so that that past is not experienced by the 'I' but the 'we'. "Collective memory is thus a mediated memory". In order for individual memory to be transformed into collective memory so that it can be intergenerationally communicated, it needs to be organised and made manifest through "durable carriers of external symbols and representations". This presentation will discuss this process drawing on examples from Poland, Bosnia and South Africa.

REPORT: South East Queensland Small Museums Conference Collections, Collaborations and Community

Michelle Smith; Brisbane historian and broadcaster David Gibson; and Lisa Jones, Curator of the Queensland Police Museum, President of the Brisbane History Group, President of Museums Australia Queensland, Director of Museum and Gallery Services Queensland and a Director of Brisbane's Living Heritage Network.

Former Redcliffe Historical Society President, John St Pierre, spoke of the days when the Redcliffe Historical Society Museum existed in the old bathing pavilion at Suttons Beach, between 1975 and 1998.

Long-time Redcliffe Historical Society member and Redcliffe Museum volunteer, Heather Bradford, told of how members of the Museum Project Team travelled south to visit museums in Sydney, Canberra, Melbourne and Ballarat, under the direction of facilitator Bettina MacAulay, to study various types of exhibits. Their trip was made in March 1999 – six months after Redcliffe City Council had finalised the purchase of the former Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Anzac Avenue, Redcliffe for conversion into a museum.

Michelle Smith, who came from the Northern Territory to attend the celebration, recalled her time as the museum's Curator (2003–2009), describing her work in Redcliffe as the highlight of her museum career, and fondly remembered the large and helpful group of volunteers. Michelle is now employed at the Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory.

Ron Fairfull, representing the Society and the Museum, read a letter from Peter Appleton, the Museum's first Curator (2001–2003), which described how he coped with competing interests and managed to set up a modern museum for the people of Redcliffe.

Over 100 guests then enjoyed light music and the party atmosphere, hosted by current Curator Joan Kelly (2010–present).

Queensland Museum reopens in January 2012 for 150th birthday

Following a \$14.3 million refurbishment, the Queensland Museum South Bank and Sciencentre will reopen on Friday 20 January 2012 with a weekend of special events to celebrate the Queensland Museum's 150th birthday.

Visitors will be invited to inspect the revamped and reenergised museum, with guided tours of the new-look Discovery Centre taking place over the birthday weekend. The main entrance foyer and Museum shop have been completely redesigned. The foyer will feature a unique multimedia 'Welcome to Country' that acknowledges the Traditional Indigenous owners, while the Discovery Centre will show more than 1,500 artefacts and specimens.

A new, eye-catching 'glass-box' design entry from Grey Street will serve as a dedicated entry for schools and other groups and the popular Energex Playasaurus Place will also reopen, offering a close-up encounter with dinosaurs and their prehistoric world.

My Mentorship at the Mercy Heritage Centre has been highly beneficial, providing the opportunity for in-depth discussions with professionals and gaining more specific knowledge about exhibition planning and designing, and about audience engagement across various age levels.

During my placement I was involved in assisting with content lists for Stage 3 of the Mercy Heritage Centre exhibitions and observing how Exhibition Designers use the information provided for their ultimate design (and how important measurements of objects are). The Mercy Heritage Centre staff and I looked at other features of exhibitions including the basics of text panels and some theories behind exhibition designs and I assisted with changing exhibition lights, cleaning objects and re-arranging paper documents which had moved in their display cabinet.

During the course of my two weeks I also saw several tour groups go through, and observed how the staff approached different audiences of various ages and backgrounds. I had the chance to have a closer look at the new Mercy Heritage Centre Education Kits and looked at the plans for the exhibition catalogue which will accompany the newly developed exhibitions.

Staff at the Mercy Heritage Centre also dedicated time to provide valuable lessons in collection management, which comprises the majority of my current job. Topics discussed included how to best utilise annual and exhibition budgets, making a storage plan, and conservation.

As a result of my Mentorship at the Mercy Heritage Centre, Brisbane, the Sisters of Mercy Townsville will benefit greatly from my gaining an increased knowledge of the museum sector. All the insights, in both collection management and exhibition planning and designing, will be of invaluable assistance and have therefore benefited my career goals of becoming a more learned and knowledgeable curator. Since my Mentorship, I have been able to put on a small temporary display for the local Townsville Sisters and many thanks to Brisbane for all the valuable lessons learned. The Sisters of Mercy Townsville wish to eventually permanently display their history. The Director of Mercy Heritage Centre took the time to discuss possible design strategies for the Sisters of Mercy Townsville's future public displays, based on different room size scenarios, object choices, text panels etc.

My expectations upon starting this Mentorship were to gain insights into an operating museum and to gain knowledge on exhibition planning, designing and implementation, of which all were met during my placement.
