■ REPORT: 2013 M&GSQ I UQAM Seminar Galleries, Museums & Climate Change

13 November 2013 University of Queensland Art Museum

60 people attended this annual seminar, which is a partnership between M&GSQ, the University of Queensland Art Museum and the University of Queensland Museums Studies program.

Arts Queensland, Queensland Art Gallery | Gallery of Modern Art, Queensland Museum, regional galleries from Queensland and New South Wales, the National Trust of Queensland and a range of industry consultants were represented.

Judith Nesbitt, Head of National/International Partnerships, Tate, UK inspired delegates with a presentation on *Environmental Sustainability at the Tate*.

Emrah Baki Ulas, Associate, Steensen-Varming, and co-author of *The Technical Industry Report on Museum and Gallery Lighting and Air Conditioning*, spoke on future options for economically and environmentally sustainable methods of lighting, and the pilot gallery lighting project for a Regional Gallery.

Julian Bickersteth, Managing Director of International Conservation Services, and co-author of *The Technical Industry Report on Museum and Gallery Lighting and Air Conditioning*, alerted delegates to the international debate on the relaxation of environmental controls on temperature and humidity in the conservation and museum community.

Dr Laura Fisher, Research team member with the National Institute for Experimental Arts, CoFA, UNSW, outlined the *Curating Cities* project and how the arts can generate environmentally beneficial behaviour change and influence the development of green infrastructure in urban environments.

Sarah Kanowski, presenter of Radio National Weekend Arts moderated the panel discussion with all speakers.

The event included networking over refreshments and a tour of University of Queensland's Global Change Institute building as an environmental sustainable showcase.

NEW GLAM: Designs for a Gold Coast Cultural Precinct

Gold Coast City Gallery 11 December 2013

Museum & Gallery Services Queensland, together with the staff of Gold Coast City Gallery, hosted a private viewing and professional networking event in conjunction with the exhibition, *The Reveal: Designs for a New Gold Coast Cultural Precinct.*

The City of Gold Coast has a vision for a landmark new cultural precinct on eleven hectares of land at Evandale. The precinct proposes a new Arts Museum, The Living Arts Centre and a landscaped outdoor Artscape, which will include a green bridge to Chevron Island. A two-stage international Design Competition was initiated by the City Council, which attracted worldwide interest, and three multidisciplinary teams were shortlisted to go into further design development.

From these three, an independent expert Jury selected a winning scheme – all of this work is revealed in the exhibition.



GLAM colleagues had the opportunity to hear about, view and discuss this exhibition of extraordinary architecture and design with key members of the project team, Tory Jones and Virginia Rigney. Visiting international Curator, Deborah Haase from Glasgow, also shared her reflections of working on a number of museum redevelopment projects in Scotland.

The winning team, led by ARM Architecture, was unanimously selected by an eight-member independent jury to win the Gold Coast Cultural Precinct international Design Competition.

ARM's design introduces a geometric 'web' – or voronoi – theme, linking:

- An expanded Living Arts Centre, incorporating a new 1,200-seat theatre; versatile 350seat black box theatre; refurbished existing performance theatre accommodating up to 600 people; a 10,000 seat outdoor amphitheatre; and a central Great Terrace;
- A sub-tropical outdoor garden Artscape, with the Evandale Lake as a focal feature, and a spiral-helix encased green bridge providing a dappled shade connection to Chevron Island, and;
- A 14-storey new Arts Museum, enticing visitors up through the galleries to take in the art, the view, and – perhaps in true Gold Coast style – a bungy jump from the external viewing platform. Reminiscent of other vertical exhibition buildings, including

the Eiffel Tower, Anish Kapoor's Olympic Tower and the Guggenheim Museum NY, the tower frees up site area for other uses – including green space.

According to City of Gold Coast Mayor, Tom Tate, "It is also flexible and adaptable in its layout which makes it ideal for staged construction, which fits with the city's plans to ensure the precinct can accommodate live site uses when we host the 2018 Commonwealth Games ... Council hopes to be able to deliver a first stage of precinct development – including car parking, a green bridge and some Artscape landscaping – in time for the Games".

Call for self-nominations to the Australia Council Register of Peers

Open until 10 January 2014

The Australia Council for the Arts is implementing a new Peer Assessment Panel system in response to the new Act. From May 2014, the Peer Assessment process will be made up of a number of permanent panels with rotating membership. This provides greater diversity and breadth of peer involvement, and increased flexibility in responding to the specific needs of each grant assessment round. Getting involved as a peer can be a very rewarding experience as well as a professional development opportunity – current peers often say it broadens their knowledge of both the sector and programs.

The Australia Council invites interested peers to set up a profile on its online system and self-nominate on the Register. You will be asked to outline your specialist expertise, provide two referees from the sector, and identify with a range of diversity characteristics where appropriate.

What does being in the Pool of Peers mean?

- Peers in the 2014 Pool of Peers may participate in a maximum of six assessment meetings, or remain in the Pool for two years, whichever is reached sooner.
- Invitations to participate in an assessment panel are based on the specialist experience and knowledge required.

- Peers participating in an assessment panel need to review all of the applications for the grant round/s they are assessing, score them against the published assessment criteria, and make recommendations for funding to the Australia Council.
- Peers receive remuneration for participating in assessment panel meetings, and the rates are outlined in the Peer Handbook.
- Peers are now eligible to apply for Australia Council grants while serving in the Pool of Peers, but will not sit on assessment panels related to grants they have applied for.

The Register of Peers will be reviewed by Australia Council staff to shortlist a diverse group of Peers with a broad range of expertise and knowledge, who will then be approved by the Board, to make up the 2014 Pool of Peers.

The new Register of Peers is open until 10 January 2014. For more information, go to the Peer Handbook and FAQs. The Pool of Peers will contain approximately 250 Peers and will be refreshed annually. Peers who are not utilised in the 2014 Pool of Peers will remain on the Register, and may be contacted if additional capacity is required.

Queensland Anzac Centenary Grants Closing date: 14 March 2014

The Queensland Anzac Centenary grants program is designed to assist and encourage Queenslanders to commemorate the service and sacrifice of men and women during the First World War. Projects may include commemorative events, exhibitions, research, community education activities and the restoration or enhancement of memorials and honour boards.

This program is one of the key elements of Queensland's commemoration, with grants of up to \$80,000 available. \$1 million will be available in the first round, with additional funding available throughout the course of the Centenary. It is expected that the majority of grants will be between \$15,000 and \$40,000 per project or activity.

Applicants are strongly encouraged to apply for funding within the round most suited to their project. In exceptional circumstances, applications for projects or activities with long lead times (to be completed after 30 June 2015) may be considered in round 1.

■ Anzac Centenary Local Grants Program

The Anzac Centenary Local Grants Program is a key element of the Australian Government's Anzac Centenary program through which funding of up to \$100,000 will be made available to support projects in each of the 150 Federal Electorates commemorating the First World War.

The Program will assist and encourage communities across Australia to undertake their own Anzac Centenary projects that commemorate the service and sacrifice of Australian servicemen and women in the First World War. The input of the local community is a key priority of this Program, and each Member of the House of Representatives (MP), and representatives of the local community selected by them, will provide input into the assessment of proposals against this priority.

Funding is available from 1 July 2013 to 30 June 2014.

Proposals should be developed with the local community, taking into account the Assessment Criteria and Guidelines. To assist this process, each local MP will be responsible for establishing an Electorate Committee consisting of representatives from community groups interested in the Anzac Centenary (e.g. ex-service organisations, educational institutions, museums, local government, etc). Contact your local MP as soon as possible to obtain the contact details of your Electorate Committee.

Applications to the Department of Veterans' Affairs (no more than \$100,000 in total) will be accepted from MPs from May 2013 and processed in order of lodgement. All applications should be submitted to the DVA by 28 February 2014.

The Community Project Grants are from a minimum of \$5,000 up to a maximum of \$30,000. Applications for the next round of Community Projects will close on Monday, 17 March 2014 for projects commencing after 1 July 2014.

The Quick Response Grants are open between February and November and applications can be submitted at any time with a turnaround of 10 business days. The grants provide assistance up to \$1,500 to individual artists for professional development or \$3,000 for organisations for community arts projects.
