The stunning 2015 GAMAA trophies were created by Queensland artist, Madeleine Brown, made possible by the continuing generosity of our trophy sponsor, Brian Tucker Accounting. Madeleine worked with poet David Stavanger, who contributed the words that Madeleine has placed swirling inside the cloche (you can read the poem on the M&G QLD website). Madeleine also worked with designer/maker Mark McCarthy who produced the timber bases, sourced from the remnants of an upgrade to the famous Southport sand pumping jetty. A species of satin ash that was felled on Fraser Island many years ago, the wood is believed to be well over 100 years old, the small dimples created by salt intrusion over a long period.

M&G QLD thanks everyone who nominated in the 2015 GAMAA for your time and effort, and if you did not make it to the Finalists this year, we encourage you to try again next year.

REPORT: Exhibition Skills Workshops Emerald, Wondai, Caloundra

In response to sector demand, M&G QLD initiated three regional exhibition skills workshops, held in December 2015 and supported through our Visual Arts and Craft Strategy funding.

Emerald Art Gallery:

A Curating and Exhibition Skills Workshop was held at Emerald Art Gallery on 12–13 December, presented by Bettina MacAulay. The workshop covered curatorial and exhibition skills, including how to establish and run an art prize.

Eighteen participants attended the workshop on 12 December, with fourteen participants returning on 13 December. Attendees came from Emerald, Dysart, Clermont, Rubyvale and Blackwater.

When asked what the strengths of the workshop were, responses included:

'It was very much directed at what the group needed... involvement, questions and discussion.'

'The professionalism of the presentation [by Bettina MacAulay] and knowledge base of information.'

'I will take away new confidence about hanging an exhibition.'

'I must commend the gallery/organisers for the opportunity to increase community skills at a grassroots level.'

Wondai Regional Art Gallery:

An Exhibition Skills Workshop was held at Wondai Regional Art Gallery on 14 December, presented by John Waldron. Topics covered included development of small to large-scale gallery exhibitions and the role of the curator.

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Caloundra Regional Gallery:

An Essentials of Good Guiding Workshop was held at Caloundra Regional Gallery on 14 December, presented by Sheona White (formerly from the Art Gallery of New South Wales), covering public speaking, appreciation and interpretation of art, and guiding principles.

Twenty-three participants attended the workshop. Feedback included:

`Good combination of audience participation, content and presentation.'

'I found the workshop very interesting as it contained many aspects covering a wide area of guiding and a way to look at art from the perspective of the observer.'

'[I learnt] how working with others extends your skills.'

REPORT: M&G QLD Standards Review Program Celebration

Participants and stakeholders attended a final debrief and celebratory event for M&G QLD 2015 Standards Review Program in Noosa on 30 November and in Mackay on 8 December.

Artspace Mackay

Did you know Mackay-born contemporary Indigenous artist, Danie Mellor, has a strong relationship with Artspace Mackay? The gallery now owns a number of significant works by the artist including locally themed artworks commemorating 150 years of European settlement in Mackay.

An outcome identified by participating in the Standards Review Program:

'It was a real chance to stop and reflect on the gallery's purpose, our staff, our community, needs of stakeholders, and to take a realistic approach to our direction for the future.'

Message to future participants:

'The gallery staff felt this process was an extremely important one. It gave us a



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crucial opportunity to survey the services we provide to our community. It also highlighted the fact that our service is not only our local Mackay Regional Council catchment, but also that we have an important role to play in the wider gallery sector.'

Greenmount Homestead

Did you know Greenmount Homestead celebrated its centenary in 2015? This marked 100 years since the homestead was built.

An outcome identified by participating in the Standards Review Program:

'The professional guidance and input that we have received during the Standards Review has helped us identify areas we need to focus on in the short, medium and long term. This will assist in providing the best experience possible for visitors and volunteers alike.'

Message to future participants:

'The program appears daunting, but it is worth the effort. The Reviewers help you to focus on what really matters and inject fresh ideas and enthusiasm into your facility. Yes, there is paperwork to do but for us the real benefit came from those conversations we had during the field visits – that's where the real benefits of this program really come to the fore.'

Did you know Mackay Regional Council Libraries – Heritage Collection hosts an extensive collection of images depicting Mackay's people and places throughout the decades? Over 550 of these images have been digitised and are available for viewing via the Mackay Regional Council Libraries website.

The Edge of Change was the 2015 seminar presented annually in partnership by Museums & Galleries Queensland, The University of

Queensland Art Museum and The University of Queensland Museum Studies Program.

This year's seminar theme focussed on digital engagement, and the use of technology to innovatively enhance audience engagement with collections and individual artists' works.

104 people attended the seminar, including representatives from Arts Queensland, Queensland Museum, State Library of Queensland, Museum of Brisbane, regional museums and galleries from Queensland, industry consultants, and students.



Wendy Burne, School Programmer, Auckland War Memorial Museum I Tamaki Paenga Hira, presented delegates with a case study of *Gallipoli in Minecraft*®. It was a project that started in 2014 which engaged young people to recreate the Gallipoli landscape in Minecraft®, to mark the 100th anniversary of the Gallipoli campaign in WW1. The Museum's collection was used as reference material and a public exhibition was developed utilising elements from the game platform.

Dr Andrew Yip, Postdoctoral Fellow, Laboratory for Innovation in Galleries, Libraries, Archives and Museums (iGLAM), National Institute for Experimental Arts, University of New South Wales and Art Gallery of NSW, inspired delegates with case studies of new media technologies developed for artists, researchers and GLAM such as interactive virtual and augmented reality systems.

Scot Cotterell, Digital Media Coordinator, Museum of Old and New Art (MONA), Tasmania, presented project summaries of new media artworks, exhibitions and projects by MONA which augment visitor experience through requiring visitors to digitally engage with the tools and projects.

Dr Graeme Were, Convenor, Museum Studies Program, The University of Queensland moderated the panel discussion with all speakers.

The event concluded with networking over refreshments.

MATERIAL MATTERS

Material Matters is the culmination of artist Kay S Lawrence's PhD research into the use of 'women's work' and digital technologies to address global ecological and social issues.

At the heart of the exhibition and research is the exploration of 'women's work' – needlework techniques and other textile techniques (m)aligned with females, including embroidery, knitting, crochet, and binding – and the inherent materiality of these mediums beyond their obvious aesthetic attributes.

The exhibition artworks and installations created from found objects, hand-made textiles, and digital photography are tactile and engaging. *Material Matters* reflects on the meanings and potential strength contained in textile traditions and processes, being aware of textile tropes and the potential for making meaning through their disruption.

By merging the history, materiality and sensuality of textiles with the advances of digital technology, this exhibition offers a rich language for self-expression and contemplation. Notions of impermanence, contingency and the fragility of our natural environment are also



addressed. Digital mediums function as lines of communication which are woven together, like threads, to connect the subject and viewer.

Many of the works in *Material Matters* evolved from artist residencies at Geidai University, Tokyo; Red Gate Gallery in Beijing; Queensland Environmental Protection Agency, Peel Island; Crane Arts, Philadelphia; Sandavinci School of Art and Design in Aimoto, Japan; and Contemporary Yunnan in Kunming, China.

Studying part-time while working as an accountant, Kay S Lawrence obtained a Bachelor of Fine Art with First Class Honours in 2009, with majors in Visual Culture and Sculpture & Intermedia. She then commenced a research doctorate full-time and was awarded her PhD in 2014 from Queensland College of Art, Griffith University.

Kay S Lawrence has had an active history of exhibiting both within Australia and internationally. During 2015 she undertook a residency at ANU, Canberra, and an overseas residency in Iceland.

In this exhibition, Richard Tabaka combines his two passions - photography and flying. On a trip from Ballina to Birdsville in his open cockpit small aircraft, he captures the patterns, beauty and essence of the Queensland Channel Country landscape.
