exhibition touring and development program:

 New exhibition, Legacy: Reflections on Mabo, commences touring with M&G QLD in September 2019

Legacy: Reflections on Mabo is the first major art exhibition exploring the Mabo legacy from Indigenous and Non-Indigenous perspectives, and the first to incorporate significant curatorial direction by the Mabo family.

Co-curated by Gail Mabo, Dr Jonathan McBurnie and Kellie Williams (Director of Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts), this exhibition features both established and emerging artists from around Australia, with around a third being nationally renowned North Queensland artists.



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Legacy: Reflections on Mabo celebrates the man behind the game-changing Native Title Act, Eddie Koiki Mabo, and the ongoing influence and impact he has had on Australian society and culture. This travelling exhibition brings together 25 Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists in the spirit of reconciliation, almost three decades after this historic achievement. Each artist has responded to an aspect of Mabo they were drawn to, whether it was his life, politics, activism or legacy. The artworks come together in surprising ways, with reverence, compassion, anger, sadness and respect, celebrating a man who was both a rebel and a dreamer.

Twenty-six years since the landmark ruling, this exhibition celebrates Mabo's legacy through a diverse cultural cross-section of artists in the spirit of reconciliation, progress and diversity.

The exhibition showcases the works of 25 established, mid-career and emerging contemporary artists, working in a variety of media including sculpture, print, video, installation and painting.

The exhibition premiered in Townsville, QLD on 5 July 2019, as part of the Northern Australia Festival of Arts program.

Legacy: Reflections on Mabo is a travelling exhibition presented by Umbrella Studio Contemporary Arts and toured by Museums & Galleries Queensland. 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The National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries is a set of principles, guidelines and benchmarks that all organisations can use for developing best practice across core areas of: Managing the Museum; Involving People; and Developing a Significant Collection.

■ On-Demand Workshops, Blackall, QLD

M&G QLD was engaged by Blackall Historical Society to organise Collection Management and Preventive Conservation Workshops in Blackall, Central West Queensland. Trainers Lisa Jones and Christine Ianna delivered the workshops over the weekend of 15 and 16 June 2019 at the Living Arts Centre in Blackall.

Lisa Jones delivered a Collection Management and Cataloguing Workshop which covered:

- The Devil is in the Detail the principles of good collection management;
- Organised Collections the principles of good collection documentation;
- Part 1: Cataloguing systems PC based or online;
- Part 2: Cataloguing systems demonstration and practice.

Christine Ianna's Preventive Conservation Workshop provided participants with a general overview and hands-on experience of preventive conservation principles that underpin the use and preservation of cultural collections. The workshop covered:

- Key elements and terminology of Preventive Conservation;
- Factors contributing to deterioration of collections and objects in collections;
- Controlling and preventing damage and deterioration factors;
- Condition reporting.

Sixteen people attended the workshops, with evaluation forms providing positive feedback.

Blackall Historical Society received Regional Arts Development Funding from Blackall-Tambo Regional Council to make these workshops possible.

Opening Doors will explore how museums and galleries today are talking more and more about ways of engaging with our diverse audiences and stakeholders. There is an increasing pressure to grow visitor numbers and much has been written about audience research and development. But how do we as museums and galleries meaningfully engage with our communities and respond to our visitors' voices?

Connecting with visitors is one of the most important aspects of running a museum or gallery. Without a welcoming atmosphere, engaging interpretation and a wide audience reach, people will find other ways to spend their time.

Knowing and understanding who our many communities are, and then listening and communicating with them is central to developing interpretation and exhibitions, designing relevant programs and promoting them effectively. This should also be integral to how we collect and undertake research.

INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED LEVEL

You're about to create an exhibition. You've selected your objects. You know what you want to say. Excellent. But have you taken full account of the 3D space in which the ideas will sit and how audiences will receive them there? And are you using all the tools that storytelling offers to support memorability and learning?

When we talk about 'narrative-based exhibitions', we often mean exhibitions formed around key ideas and connections (not just a place, time, collector's interest, or the primacy of individual objects). But can narrative be more? Can our visitors even be our protagonists? Storytelling is, after all, an art in its own right, with particular considerations in the museum setting.

In this workshop, activities will include reviewing exhibition labels, looking at exhibition plans in relation to message position, and considering different storytelling forms and tools to meet objectives. We'll also touch on ways to embrace Indigenous languages to support awareness and learning.

Learning Outcomes

- The characteristics of museum visitors how they receive content in exhibitions/3D space, and what that means for how we present/ write stories;
- The importance of key ideas;

 The characteristics of effective storytelling and how they can apply to exhibitions – including what we can do in this environment that isn't possible elsewhere.

Who Should Attend

Anyone with a base knowledge of exhibition interpretation (and particularly narrative-based interpretation) who's keen to develop their thinking and approaches.

Experience Required

Some experience in museum interpretation – e.g. setting key messages, writing or editing labels, 'reading'/using exhibition plans, selecting media, etc. If you're not sure of your level, come anyway – we'll cover some fundamentals before moving onto the more nuanced areas.

Time Tunnels

Russell Milledge Lecturer in Media Arts James Cook University



INTERMEDIATE LEVEL

(This workshop will use digital imaging techniques associated with software such as Adobe Photoshop.)

Time Tunnels introduces a method of visual storytelling that reanimates historical photographic imagery. Through engagement with media arts tools, participants learn how to effectively use motion to bring new meaning and perception to static 2D images in a simple process known as 2.5D animation.

Learning Outcomes

- Understand the intermediate process of 2.5D animation;
- Repurpose historical photographic and graphic material for a contemporary audience;
- Extending meaning and perception through media arts.

Who Should Attend

Anyone with an interest in extending photographic and graphic collections into new forms of presentation. Anyone interested in the media arts, filmmaking, animation, digital signage, video marketing or motion graphics techniques.

Biography

Russell has a passion for creative arts which is expressed through the presentation of exhibitions and events annually. His artworks are in the collections of QAGOMA and Cairns Art Gallery, amongst others. He has contributed to the establishment of many of Far North Queensland's significant contemporary arts enterprises and spaces including as a founder of KickArts Contemporary Arts Ltd, Bonemap and the New Move Network.

Russell attended the National Art School in Sydney, completed a Master of Fine Arts (MFA) at Queensland University of Technology and a Doctor of Philosophy at James Cook University.

Inspired by the unique social and educational value of the arts, he has contributed to many partnerships within the sector including Cairns Indigenous Art Fair (CIAF), Cairns Festival, Indigenous Art Centre Alliance, Realtime Magazine, Ausdance, Queensland Artworkers Alliance, Regional Galleries Association of Queensland, Eyeline visual arts magazine and others.

Current JCU internal engagement includes TEDx JCU Cairns Technical Director, Research Fellow at the Cairns Institute and Lecturer in Creative Arts specialising in media art. He is Co-chief Investigator on the innovative State of the Arts Report, a partnership with Cairns Regional Council to undertake a longitudinal evaluation of the social impact of arts and culture in the Cairns region. He is the guest curator for KickArts Contemporary Arts major retrospective of Torres Strait Islander artist Billy Missi in association with CIAF 2019.

Caring for Paper Documents and Books

INTRODUCTORY LEVEL

Come along to this workshop to learn some practical skills and approaches to looking after paper and bound documents in collections. Care for photographs will be discussed briefly, however the main focus of this workshop is costeffective methods of caring for collections in line with international conservation practice and sound advice. Participants are invited to discuss examples and concerns regarding the storage of their own collections.

Learning Outcomes

- Knowledge of how to care for paper, photographs and books;
- Basic cleaning techniques for paper and books;
- Basic encapsulation for paper documents.

Who Should Attend

Volunteers and paid staff working with museum and gallery collections that hold paper documents, photographs or books.

Melanie Sorenson is an art conservator, specialising in paper and photographs, in Far North Queensland. Most recently from Canberra, Melanie loves working with community groups and collections based in the Tropics. The climate in Queensland is so diverse and offers a new suite of challenges in collection care and preservation.

It was with great sadness that we learned of the passing of Pamela Whitlock in late June. Pamela was Director of Gladstone Regional Art Gallery and Museum, QLD, from 1993 to her retirement in January 2014.



In the years leading up to her move to Gladstone, Pamela

had assisted with the establishment of Brisbane City Hall Art Gallery and Museum, which opened in 1977. She became Curator there in 1985, with responsibility for conservation. Pamela's extensive skills in paper conservation were developed in the UK, before moving to Australia in 1968.

During her time in Gladstone, one of Pamela's significant achievements was to secure a major expansion to the Gallery. In late 2013, Pamela was presented with a key to the city for her "20 years of meritorious service", recognising her substantial involvement in community life and her enormous commitment to the cultural progress of the city.

Pamela contributed to numerous industry panels, committees and reference groups, Queenslandwide and nationally.

Pamela's contribution to the sector was recognised in 2006 when she was awarded Joint Winner of M&G QLD's Gallery and Museum Achievement Award in the category of Individual: Paid Staff.

Pamela was a pioneer in our sector and will be missed.

Bankfoot House, Sunshine Coast, recognised at national awards

Heritage-listed house museum, Bankfoot House, located in the Glass House Mountains, Sunshine Coast has attracted national industry recognition, being awarded a Highly Commended at the 2019 Museums and Galleries National Awards in Alice Springs, NT, in May.

The award submission, titled *Raising the Benchmark*, highlighted the extensive work Council undertook in 2017 and 2018, designed to increase visitors to the Bankfoot House Heritage Precinct by creating new permanent exhibitions within previously under-utilised spaces and enhancing existing exhibitions.

The Bankfoot House Heritage Precinct is a two-acre property that features Bankfoot House, the Mary Grigor Centre, outbuildings, restored shed, bullock wagon and the grounds featuring stunning views to the Glass House Mountains. Minjerribah cultural centre planned for North Stradbroke Island

The Queensland Government has committed \$4.5 million to construct the Minjerribah cultural centre on North Stradbroke Island, QLD. The centre is intended to share the art and culture of the Quandamooka people with a global audience, and to become a launch point for Indigenous tours and experiences available for visitors across the island.

The centre is expected to be completed in 2021, and will bring together ancient artefacts with contemporary art, music, dance and performance.

Repairs continuing at Pinnacles Gallery, Thuringowa, QLD

Located at Riverway Arts Centre, Thuringowa, Pinnacles Gallery has been closed since it was flooded during the unprecedented monsoon earlier this year. The gallery has had to cancel a number of exhibitions, and further inspection has found more mould and water damage. Work to repair the damage began in March but the mould and water issues mean that the closure could extend into December 2019.

Gallery at HOTA (Home of the Arts, Gold Coast) closed during construction of new gallery

After welcoming more than 1.2 million visitors and 700 exhibitions over the past 33 years, the original Gallery at HOTA closed to the public on 28 April, in preparation for the opening of a brand new HOTA Gallery in early 2021. Once open, the \$60.5 million, six-level, purpose-built space will be the largest gallery outside of a major city in Australia, and will form the centrepiece of the 17-hectare HOTA precinct.

HOTA will continue to offer programs and activities during the construction period, including presentation of art in the outdoors.

Gold Coast City Art Gallery first opened its doors in 1986, as part of the larger Gold Coast Arts Centre development, and was the first time the City collection was able to be displayed in a proper gallery setting for the public to view.

The Roadmap is built on five Elements of Change: Reimagining Representation; Embedding Indigenous Values into Museum and Gallery Business; Increasing Indigenous Opportunity; Two Way Caretaking of Cultural Material; and Connecting with Indigenous Communities.
