Welcome to the Standards Community 2017

What is the Standards Review Program?

This program, implemented by Museums & Galleries of NSW (M&G NSW) in 2003, and since 2005 in partnership with Museums & Galleries Queensland (M&G QLD), supports museums and galleries through a process of self-review and external feedback.

It provides an exciting opportunity for museums and galleries to assess their practices and policies against the *National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries*. The program aims to establish a long term network for sustainable community museums and galleries as well as acknowledging the hard work undertaken by volunteers and paid staff to maintain Australian heritage.

What are the key components?

- Working with regional service providers to develop ongoing support for museums and galleries
- Self-assessment by participants guided by the National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries
- External peer review (Standards Review Committee M&G NSW / Standards Reviewers – M&G QLD)
- Identification of desired outcomes and on-site advice
- Practical tools to assist participants in addressing key
 planning needs such as: volunteer succession planning
 strategies, community engagement strategies, collection
 management policies, access to funding; working with local
 government, business and research opportunities
- Promotion of participants' achievements: certificate presentation, communication with participant stakeholders, media releases
- · Continuation of support and review.

In 2017, M&G NSW and M&G QLD will continue working in partnership on the Standards Review Program. M&G QLD will partner with local government agencies to deliver the program to museums and galleries in the Sunshine Coast and Noosa regions. M&G NSW will partner with several local government agencies to deliver the program to museums and galleries across NSW. This will see the "Standards Community" grow to include these new participants and enable participating organisations to broaden their operating networks.

The Standards Community Directory features a profile of each museum and gallery that has gone through the Standards Review Program. The profile includes a description of each organisation, contact details and how they benefitted from participating in the Standards Review Program.

Overview

In 2016, three museums participated in the NSW Standards Review Program and three museums and three galleries participated in the Queensland Standards Review Program.

Australian Golf Heritage Society Museum

Standards profile

The Australian Golf Heritage Museum has a diverse and fascinating collection of golfing artefacts dating back to the early days of golf in Australia in the second half of the 19th century. Highlights of the collection include golf clubs by Old Tom Morris, 1930s film footage of Don Bradman receiving golf training, Frank Eyre trophies, a driver owned and used by Jack Nicklaus and a 'periscope' golf seat.

Test your putting skills with a range of heritage putters. Golf historians and writers are welcome to use our extensive research library (by appointment).

The museum is proud to offer a travelling display of golf clubs, balls, trophies and other artefacts, for golf clubs in Sydney to host free of charge (donations welcome). The display was nominated in the 2015 Imagine Awards. We endeavour to include an object or information specific to the history of the host club and will deliver, install and pack down the display. The museum offers talks to golf clubs and historical societies and can help golf clubs organise their own hickory golf day. Advice can be provided on collecting, restoring and preserving old or antique golf clubs and other golfing artefacts.

Bathurst District Historical Society Museum

Standards profile

The Bathurst District Historical Society Museum and Archives is located in a wing of the heritage classified courthouse, designed by Colonial Government Architect James Barnett in 1880.

Formed in May 1947 the Society's first collections document important regional developments such as the growth of the garrison town, contact with explorers and surveyors, the first gold discovery in NSW, the formulation of Cobb and Co., and the region's colourful bushranging history.

It is home to the Penzig Collection a large collection of material relating to bushrangers and in particular, Ben Hall, and comprises paintings, pictures, drawings, objects and costumes amassed by renowned bushranger enthusiast, collector, author, actor, and cartoonist Edgar Penzig, and his wife over a lifetime of collecting.

Additionally over 65,000 photographic images, glass plate negatives, and other related ephemera form a significant part of the collection.

There are also two carved trees or dendroglyphs in the collection which are a unique feature of traditional Australian indigenous culture. The Wiradjuri carved ceremonial tree was found near O'Connell about 25 kilometres east of Bathurst and is thought to have marked a ceremonial site or grave.

The second carved tree is a River Red gum that once stood at the mouth of the Mandagery Creek at the junction of the Lachlan River. In June 1815, explorer and surveyor George Evans marked this tree to show he had reached the furthest westward point of any British explorer at the time.

There is also a collection of militaria from various theatres of war involving Bathurstians, discrete collections of objects that have been donated to the Society, such as a collection of bird's eggs, and a collection of stuffed and mounted birds, furniture from historic and heritage buildings and properties in the Bathurst district, two scale models of landmark sites in Bathurst, an early X-ray machine developed by a Roman Catholic priest in Bathurst.

Henry Kendall Cottage and Museum

Standards profile

Henry Kendall Cottage and Museum is located at West Gosford. The Cottage is the second oldest surviving building in the Gosford District. Convict Peter Fagan arrived in 1821 from Ireland and purchased 24.28ha of land at West Gosford. The Cottage was built using convict labour c1836-1840. It was known as the Red Cow Inn and a short time later as Cooranbean. In the late 1870s, the Fagan brothers befriended the celebrated poet Henry Kendall who lived for a short time in the cottage while working for the family.

The museum is undertaking a full reinterpretation of the permanent collection display. The extensive collection includes local artefacts and a memorabilia, capturing life as it once was, including an old printing press, a bullock dray and unique items, salvaged from local shipwrecks. Also featured is a 19th century relocated local slab shed that holds a significant collection of artefacts from the thriving timber getting, ship building and citrus industries.

We hold regular temporary exhibitions, open days and excursions. We are also developing our school excursion and public program content in partnership with other venues in the region. The Museum is set in over two acres of peaceful park-like grounds with picnic tables and electric barbecue facilities. Parking is also available in the grounds.

Henry Kendall Cottage Museum is owned and operated by the Brisbane Water Historical Society. In 1959 the Society purchased the cottage and worked to ensure its preservation. In 1961 the Cottage museum opened dedicated to the pioneers of Brisbane Water. A second museum building opened in 1983.

In 2014 we celebrated the 175th anniversary of the building of the Cottage, as well as the birth of Henry Kendall in 1839. Over a thousand visitors attended. The Museum was presented with the Gosford City Council Award for Interpretations Projects and Heritage Events in 2015.

Chinchilla Historical Museum

Standards profile

Come to the Chinchilla Historical Museum and stand in the place where the fight against the scourge of prickly pear was instigated, read about the development of the experimental station and the first plant killed by the larvae of the cactoblastis moth.

Find the unique, local petrified wood called Chinchilla Red, which can be dated to the Jurassic Period (140 - 180 million years ago) and learn about the local timber industry at the Cyprus Pine Interpretive Centre.

Discover the perils of country policing and see one of the only remaining, fire damaged police cells in Australia. See many examples of historical machinery including a unique Mogul tractor. An extensive collection of family and local history information, photographs and newspaper articles can be found in the Kathleen Emmerson Library, which is located in the museum grounds and can be visited by making an appointment.

Come for a ride on the mini train and get a fabulous view of the entire museum grounds or just bring a picnic and relax in peaceful surroundings.

Did you know that a man's moustache could be kept safe from becoming wet if a moustache cup was used? This is a teacup with a protective semicircular ledge on the inside.

Did you know that a 'meat safe cot' was popular in pioneering days because it kept babies safe from snake and insect attack? You can view a 'meat safe cot' at the Museum.

The museum has many items in its collection which are important to the local area, we have begun to research these as adding well-researched stories to collection objects brings history to life and enhances visitor experience.

Having transformed the original timber floor and squash court walls into a modern gallery space, these features can still be seen today. The building was also the Council Chambers for 20 years. Lapunyah Art Gallery

Standards profile

Lapunyah Art Gallery is located in the Cultural Precinct in Chinchilla's Central Business District. Recognised as a warm and welcoming space for exhibiting artists and visitors, Lapunyah has a changing program of local and touring exhibitions across two gallery spaces.

Entirely managed by a team of dedicated volunteers, the Gallery increases the profile of local artists and provides thought provoking contemporary exhibitions for the community. The highly skilled volunteer staff provide professional development support through exhibition opportunities complimented by community workshops.

With a focus on strong teamwork Lapunyah develops the professionalism of their volunteers through a unique in house exhibition mentoring program and regular skills training.

The Lapunyah Art Gallery holds images of local Acacia and Fungi by Grace Lithgow and works by significant artists such as Hugh and Anthony Sawrey, Rex Bacchus-Smith, Tom McAulay, John Morrison and Paul Ching-Bor.

Did you know that Lapunyah Art Gallery has been entirely managed by dedicated volunteers since the Gallery's inception in 1999? The volunteer staff would love to welcome you to Lapunyah Art Gallery and introduce you to Chinchilla and the creative life of the region.

Did you know that the Gallery's *Monitor* has links to the new industrial era of the region? Peter Kosina created the sculpture from scrap metal sourced from the Kogan Creek Power Station, built in 2007 under the Queensland State Government's Clean Energy Policy.

Did you know that the facility was originally the Chinchilla Shire Council Library? With the repurposing of the Cultural Precinct, it became the Chinchilla White Gums Gallery. It has now been rebranded Lapunyah Art Gallery.

Message to new participants

Miles Historical Village Museum (Standards 2)

Standards profile

The Miles Historical Village Museum was officially opened in 1971, and over the years has developed into one of the premier tourist attractions within the region: a place for connecting to memories of a disappearing country lifestyle.

There are currently over 35 buildings in a streetscape with amazing collections and links to a bygone era...if you remember it, we have it! Featured original buildings include the Hippong Slab Hut Homestead, Columboola Hall, Dalwogan Railway Siding, Andersen's Smithy, Jimbour CWA, Village School, Dairy, Gaol, Dulacca Presbyterian Church and the Australian Bank of Commerce. Recreated buildings in the streetscape include The Red Rose Café, a replica of the first Greek café built in Miles in 1925, the boot maker, union hotel, hospital, butcher, barber shop, laundry, garage, post office, bakery and printery – The Murilla Express.

Visitors are welcome at Miles Historical Village Museum every day except Christmas Day. Come along and explore a slice of history in this unique setting!

The name of the Miles Historical Village Museum main street, 'Dogwood Crossing', was the original name of the town of Miles until 1878 when the Railway went through. At this time it was renamed 'Miles' as a mark of respect to Sir William Miles, the owner of the famous Dulacca Station. He was elected to State Parliament in 1865 and took an exhibition of Queensland, and the Murilla Shire, to Philadelphia in 1876.

Message to new participants

As second time participants Miles Historical Village Museum has once again been blown away by the positive outcomes in being involved in the Standards Review Program. The support, advice and encouragement provided by Museums & Galleries Queensland are outstanding. Having industry expertise on hand through the Reviewers' visits is daunting, challenging and also refreshing and rewarding if your organisation goes into the program with an open mind and a willingness to share, embrace, change, progress, grow and learn. Taroom Museum

Standards profile

Follow explorer Ludwig Leichhardt's 1844 footsteps into the rich farming country around the Dawson River and visit the Taroom Museum. The Taroom Museum holds a collection of objects specific to Taroom and the surrounding district.

Wander through museum buildings, including St Mary's Church of 1893, the Boathouse and Jongh Tai Shue's Confectionary and Bakery shop.

Our diverse collections include objects from early businesses, a Blacksmith's forge, and a fabulous piece of jewellery belonging to Sarah, wife of John Becker the Bootmaker c1870.

Experience a 19th century round pole and slab house, which was the Reynolds' home and also the township's general store. Feel what it was like to be confined in the original Taroom lockup. You can also see a variety of machinery from pioneering days.

Did you know St Mary's Church was cut in half and moved by bullock wagon two kilometres to Bonner's Knob (Gilbert's Lookout) in 1920? In 1970, it was then cut in half again and moved to its current location, which was the site of the original Taroom state school.

Did you know in April 1874 our rowboat and boathouse was mentioned in the 'Dalby Herald and Western Advertiser', even though the boat house hadn't actually been built? Three publicans, with businesses adjacent to the river, could not agree on where it should be situated and this caused a furor.

Did you know that local identity, Miss Eunice Clarke, could type up to 300 characters a minute on the Mignon AEG #4 typewriting machine and drive a tractor while wearing a dress? See both the Mignon and the tractor at the Museum.

Come and see our wonderful collection, bring a picnic and enjoy the grounds.

Message to new participants

Is the Standards Review Program relevant to small museums/galleries run by volunteers? Most Definitely. We found there is a wealth of information to be accessed and the Standards Review Program facilitators are most knowledgeable and always accessible. We have benefited in so many ways, there is just not the space to point them all out. So don't just think about joining... Do It. It is an opportunity of a lifetime for your organisation.

Program outcomes

Greater understanding of managing a museum

The Standards Review Program has made us more focused on up-to-date documentation and presentation in our museum, including a collection management plan, updating our acquisition register, better understanding of textile preservation, and the importance of proper care and display techniques.

Eskbank House Museum

Standards profile

Eskbank House was built in 1842 on Wiradjuri land for magistrate and politician, Thomas Brown, and his wife Mary. It has been at the heart of Lithgow's history including the mining and iron industries. In 1966 Eskbank House was opened as one of the first house museums in New South Wales.

The museum houses furniture and decorative arts from Eric Bracey, founder of the museum. Displays also feature the nationally significant Lithgow Pottery Collection and many objects from the history of Lithgow's ironworks including 'Possum the Locomotive' and items that tell the social story of the region.

Visitors can enjoy a group tour of the museum or wander by themselves amongst the buildings and gardens. The 'Courtyard Gallery' hosts regular changing art exhibitions devoted to community and professional art.

Eskbank House also hosts music concerts, plays and themed events such as Garden Parties, Steampunk Eskbank and a Halloween Fashion Parade. The grounds and enclosed courtyard are available for hire for events and weddings.

Message to new participants

It was really good at focusing us on where our gaps were, but also really rewarding because of the things we realised we were doing right.

Program outcomes

We have learnt a lot about conservation and cleaning our collection. We are now planning to do a yearly clean which we will open up to the public as well.

We are going to implement a new program of volunteer training with bi-monthly meetings, a tour guide training course and regular excursions.

Hawkesbury Regional Museum

2015 Imagine Awards.

Standards profile

Hawkesbury Regional Museum is located in Windsor, Australia's third mainland settlement (after Sydney and Parramatta). It is the only publicly-run, professionally staffed museum in the Hawkesbury and, indeed, in the wider area including the Blue Mountains, Penrith, Hills and Blacktown local government areas. Entry is free to visitors, and groups are welcome with prior arrangement, please call during opening hours for bookings, costs and further information.

The museum collection has built up over 60 years and comprises almost 6000 objects significant to the history of the Hawkesbury. They include convict tools excavated at the site of the World Heritage Listed Old Great North Road, objects relating to the Hawkesbury's special role in shipbuilding in the 'Secret River' days, original settler land grants telling of the early colonial Governors and indigenous tools that show the skills of the Darug and Darkinjung people that cared for the land around the Hawkesbury for many thousands of years.

Here you can also see things you won't find anywhere else, from the celestial globe that belonged to internationally-renowned astronomer John Tebbutt, to the building level used in building Australia's oldest church at Ebenezer, also a 1870s original flood boat and not to mention that uniquely Hawkesbury creation, the flabbit.

The museum has won awards for the new building (opened 2008), for collection management and conservation, for tourism, for its volunteers, and for the exhibition Flood! (2015) and also offers regular public programs.

Also on site is Howe House, built in the colonial style on land granted by Governor Macquarie in 1811, and now fitted out and interpreted in ways that reflect its many uses over more than 200 years of history. The house is open for tours on weekends and at other times by appointment for booked groups. It plays an important role in a range of education programs operated by the museum.

Message to New Participants

We found the program to be a great opportunity to look at the museum with 'fresh eyes'. The self-reviews, onsite visits and forward planning, we found to be very beneficial for us and the direction of the museum.

Lithgow Small Arms Factory Museum

Standards profile

The history of the Lithgow Small Arms Factory is about people - their aspirations, disappointments, and achievements, the economic and social hardships endured, the influence of our British heritage on Australia in the early 1900s, and sheer human stubbornness.

It is also about the introduction of new technologies into the emerging new nation. The Lithgow Factory was Australia's first high precision mass production facility.

This museum, located on the original Commonwealth Small Arms Factory site, houses a fascinating collection that showcases the industrial heritage of our nation, and the finest firearms display in the Southern Hemisphere.

You may be surprised to recognise some of the diverse array of commercial items manufactured by the factory as it struggled to stay viable between the wars.

The Museum is doing a fantastic job identifying and telling stories that are about Lithgow, its community and the history that intersects with the factory. This way the museum is able to provide stories that resonate with all types of visitors not just those interested in the design and manufacture of firearms.

They have successfully pulled out the social history aspects of the factory and are working on telling these stories in an innovative and engaging way.

Lithgow State Mine Heritage Park and Museum

Standards profile

The Lithgow State Mine Heritage Park is an open-air museum which tells the story of one of Lithgow's original coal mines. The site has a fascinating collection of former mine buildings that house an array of industrial, mining and railway related exhibits. The site also includes a railway branch-line that extended from the Eskbank Locomotive Depot.

There are a series of outdoor interpretive panels that tell the story of the colliery, including its huge poppet head, through engaging text and historical images.

The former State Mine Office has been successfully developed as the Park's Visitor Centre and incorporates a 'Mining Museum' where various rooms boast thematic displays related to the history of the colliery and coal mining generally. These displays are supported by fascinating objects, historical timelines and story-boards. The Mine Office also includes limited collection storage space, an administration and collection cataloguing room, and a volunteer staff room/kitchen.

One of the most appealing and successful operations of the site is the Bathhouse Building. This building has a large enclosed area which is currently used for storage and functions and is supported by catering facilities. On the internal perimeter of the building are original shower facilities which were used by the miners after their shifts – this history is complimented by a well-designed story-board. One part of this 'shower block' area has an amazing spectravision display called Fire in the Mine, which features a moving historical figure, Marion Curry, who tells her dramatic story of the dangers faced by miners in their everyday work. This spectravision display brings to life the human aspect and dangers that mining communities once faced.

Not far from the Bathhouse are the original colliery Workshops. These buildings were once utilised as blacksmithing facilities, machine shop and electricians' workshop, as well as the main store for the mine. Today, a large part of the workshops is occupied by a blacksmith who operates on site most days. In various parts of these workshops (including upstairs) are an array of machine and industrial pieces. It is also used for storage of the collection and miscellaneous items.

Message to new participants

The Museum Standards Program encouraged and energised our Board and volunteers by highlighting our many organisational strengths.

Program outcomes

The program has helped us to identify opportunities for improvement and the assessors helped us to develop plans for improvement.

We have particularly focused on improving collection storage and are now developing a room specifically for the storage of small artefacts.

Mt Victoria & District Historical Society Museum

Standards profile

This amazing museum is set in sixteen rooms of the heritage listed 1868 Mount Victoria Railway Station. It is part of the railway to the west which was built across the rough terrain of the Blue Mountains.

A display to commemorate the bicentenary of the crossing of the Blue Mountains has sketches, paintings and artefacts showing the work of the explorers, road builders, tradesmen and convicts.

The struggle of the settlers is shown by the nature of the tools and farm equipment, whose construction, use and maintenance required enormous physical effort.

The changing domestic scene is illustrated by costume and accessories, pottery, historic railways tableware, musical instruments and furniture. Development of the area as a tourism destination and industries such as mining are also depicted. Displays and information on unique local schools are a highlight. Many natural history items depict local and exotic wildlife.

An hourly train service from Sydney to the door runs at weekends. Wheelchair access to ground floor and car parking are readily available.

Message to new participants

Advice stemming from a close examination of the museum's operation was beneficial but be prepared the whole process is very time consuming.

Program outcomes

Discussing a disaster plan galvanised our members to ensure that our plans to provide safety if a fire broke out were improved.

Having experts look at how you are operating and giving feedback both positive and negative was helpful.

Murrurundi Historical Society Museum

Standards profile

The museum is in three buildings. A pioneer cottage which was removed from a farm at Timor and sited on council land in the main street (it is also the New England Highway). The second is an old wooden Presbyterian church which is used as an exhibition centre housing an important WWI exhibition. The old church was removed from its original site and situated alongside the third building, the former Literary Institute and now a museum.

Exhibition Centre:

The building is housing a four-year running exhibition of WWI highlighting the region's involvement in the Great War. Specially researched story-boards and borrowed objects make for an interesting visit. This year the building is also housing a Quilt exhibition which will run till mid-year followed by a display honouring the Vietnam War's Long Tan battle which occurred 50 years ago. Next year the hall will hold a special display of the light horse battles including Beersheba, which will go for the full year.

Pioneer Cottage:

The most interesting of Murrurundi's many historic buildings is the Pioneer Cottage in Remembrance Park on the New England Highway. This cottage was built around 1889. It is constructed of hardwood slabs faced on one side by a back breaking process with a pit saw. The other side of the slabs are left in their original round back state. The framework is of rough hewn hardwood all taken from the property or surrounding area.

The roof is of corrugated iron, the floors of milled cyprus, perhaps added at a later date. Earth floors were often used in those days.

Former Murrurundi Literary Institute:

The former Murrurundi Literary Institute at 127 Mayne Street is the home of the Murrurundi & District Historical Society.

Housed in one of the oldest towns in the Upper Hunter, Murrurundi museum was described as "a museum in itself; a museum without walls."

The building sits on the site of the old Court of Petty Sessions and Watch House which was a wooden structure presided over by Edward Mayne (the main street was named after him).

Message to new participants


The direction and assistance has put us in contact with other museums and art galleries in the region which has increased our awareness and lead to focused involvement with both community and regional programs.

Norman Lindsay Gallery & Museum

Standards profile

Discover the work of an illustrious local – visit the Norman Lindsay Gallery and its landscaped Roman-style gardens!

Once the home of artist and writer Norman Lindsay (1879-1969) this sandstone cottage and extensive grounds, located at 14 Norman Lindsay Cres, Faulconbridge, is now a gallery run by the National Trust, displaying the artist's impressive practice including watercolours, oils, etchings and ship models.

Perfect for a sunny afternoon stroll, the grounds are dotted with Lindsay's sculptures and fountains. A cafe provides an idyllic setting to dine in after viewing the gallery and exploring the grounds and picturesque bushwalk.

Changing exhibitions ensure that no two visits are the same. The 2015/16 exhibitions include: Billjims and Brothers (WW I); Fantasy of the Sea; and 'This Shrine-The Single Nude in Norman Lindsay's Art.'

Our guided tours offer exclusive access to Lindsay's painting and etching studios as well as his renowned Magic Pudding characters. Offered every hour, hear stories on Lindsay's life and career from our personable and knowledgeable volunteer guides.

The Norman Lindsay Gallery is a venue for many special events such as Life Drawing summer schools, Art and Literature workshops for Children, Jazz in the Garden, Winter Jazz and Winefest, or Christmas Carols.

Message to new participants

I would suggest to future program participants that we found it was a very useful process to be able to work our way through the things we wanted to put in place, and also to recognise the things we were already doing well.

Program outcomes

Based on recommendations from the Onsite Review, we carried out an assessment of our signage and have introduced two new signs at the entry to the property and plan to replace more of the old signs as funds allow. The outcome is that we now have signs which are much clearer and easier to read.

Our desire to have the full collection back on site at the gallery has also been achieved with the recent cleaning and return of all the artworks kept offsite for over 10 years, due to our inadequate storage facilities. The newly refurbished storeroom has meant that we are able to plan and work much more easily on providing interesting changing exhibitions.

Nestled alongside the heritage-listed Sydney Cricket Ground Members Pavilion, beneath the Ladies Stand, the SCG Museum is dedicated to the unique sporting and social activities that have occurred in the precinct since the 1850s.

The SCG Museum is accessible as part of the dynamic SCG Tour Experience, a 90 minute behind the scenes historical journey through the Sydney Cricket Ground, Allianz Stadium and the SCG Museum.

The museum is also open to Members and their guests on Test match and select domestic cricket match days.

The museum collection and our distributed collection of movable heritage located throughout the SCG and Allianz Stadium precinct focus on items that illustrate the development of the grounds and Sydney Cricket and Sports Ground Trust, as well as the sports men and women, presenters and entertainers who have performed at the grounds with state, national and international recognition

Program outcomes

One team member has taken on the role of developing a Disaster Preparedness Plan, working with staff across the Sydney Cricket Ground Trust, to integrate the museum's disaster preparedness with the broader emergency planning policies of the stadium.

Staff have begun writing comprehensive collection documentation process manuals so that volunteers can work in the confidence that all the documentation will be consistent. This is important as the SCG Museum moves to having all its collection available online.

The SCG Museum is accessible to the public via the SCG Tour Experience, a 90 minute walking tour of the SCG, Allianz Stadium and the SCG Museum.

Tarella Cottage Museum

Standards profile

Tarella is a house museum occupying a spectacular setting with easterly views from the Blue Mountains to Sydney.

The house, one of the earliest in Wentworth Falls, was built as a summer retreat in 1890 for the McLaughlin family who bequeathed the house and collection to the Blue Mountains Historical Society in 1967. Many of the objects on display are provenanced to the the family - of particular note is the collection of military memorabilia belonging to Geoffrey McLaughlin who served in both Gallipolli and the Western Front during WWI and was awarded the military cross.

Come and visit us and experience the evolution of family life over 90 years – hear the Brunswick Gramophone played in the parlour, sit by the fire in the original kitchen in the colder months and ascend the steep staircase to the tiny bedrooms on the first floor!

On this same site, the Blue Mountains Historical Society (formed in 1946), operates a research centre which has an extensive archive of photographs, books maps, objects, digital and paper archives relating to the Blue Mountains and further afield. These are available for research.

Throughout 2016 Tarella Cottage Museum will be the venue for a series of exhibitions which will be on display as part of our regular Open Days on the last Sunday of each month. Everyone is welcome to visit on these days to see exhibitions which not only reflect the life and times of the McLaughlin family, but also depict aspects of Blue Mountains and Australian social history.

Tarella is owned and managed by the Blue Mountains Historical Society Inc. and our friendly and knowledgeable group of volunteers are here to welcome you.

The Cottage Museum now has its own dynamic Facebook page which is regularly updated and well worth a visit and a "like".

Message for New Participants

Although organisations considering future participation in the Standards Review Program might be initially hesitant as they consider the task and the process which lies ahead of them, they should not be deterred by the unknown. Instead they should be aware that the M&G NSW organisation abounds with experienced, friendly and helpful people who are intent on assisting them to achieve the greatest amount of learning and the best possible outcome for them and their particular organisation.

Program outcomes

A great deal was gained from the opportunity to spend time with members of other similar organisations who were engaged in the same process of reassessment and redirection as we were, to have the opportunity to learn from each other's experiences.

It was extremely beneficial to have access to professional people with wide-ranging experience and understanding and to have them come to visit our space with its particular requirements and guide us on our journey towards achieving a new and revitalised direction.

Since 1975 the historic town of Thirlmere in Sydney's southwest has been home to significant rail heritage collection, including over 100 rolling stock items, associated with the history of railways in NSW.

The 5-hectare rail corridor site and much of the collection is owned by the state of New South Wales and is managed by Transport Heritage NSW.

Be enthralled by the luxury of the palace on wheels, the Governor-General's luxurious, private carriage, used by the Queen in 1954, and be astounded by the sound and light show telling the long story of shunting locomotive 1021 in the theatrette Be awed by the giant Garratt 6040, the largest type of steam locomotive in Australia, and captivated by the tiny pay bus, which was a mobile pay office for the workers on the railways. Take a walk up to the Roundhouse, our operating workshop where you can view the staff and volunteers maintaining our vast collection of running locomotives and carriages.

Come on a Sunday and enjoy a steam train ride up the historic Loop Line to Buxton during steam season, or join us for one of our fun-filled events, such as our ever-popular Days Out With Thomas.

Program outcomes

Staff used the opportunity to focus on policies and procedures. Documents had been written on an ad hoc basis over the past few years, but now everyone has a better understanding of the policies that have been written and which are important to develop in the near future.

The curatorial team has started the process of planning for a redevelopment of the displays and an interpretation plan will be developed.

Message to new participants

The gallery staff felt this process was an extremely important one. It gave us a crucial opportunity to survey the services we provide to our community. It also highlighted the fact that we service not only our local Mackay Regional Council catchment, but also that we have an important role to play in the wider gallery sector. Our collection holds national significance, and because of this, it's important that we also consider how we can provide effective access for people across Australia, or even worldwide to our prestigious collection.

Program outcomes

Self-awareness for the gallery

The Standards Review Program gave us the much needed directive to 'make time' (where time is often the hardest thing to find) to take a long look at our 'reasons for being'. It was a real chance to stop and reflect on the gallery's purpose, our staff, our community, needs of stakeholders, and to take a realistic approach to our direction for the future.

Collection significance

We developed an action plan to enable the gallery to recatalogue all items in the Mackay Regional Council Art Collection. This process will ultimately lead to better quality access for staff, the wider community, and academia to our nationally respected collection. It included a goal to have our collection accessible online.

This unique homestead is one of the only of its era in Australia still with a living connection to the family.

Be surprised by the art deco bathroom, moved by the children's drawings and fascinated by the architecture of a Queenslander. Walk through the impressive lead light and timber door into the cool and quiet interior and experience Albert Cook's vision for his family home. Explore the homestead, and discover everything from tea sets to the Model T Ford and relax with a picnic in the grounds.

Did you know Greenmount Homestead was a successful cattle stud? You can see ribbons, trophies, medals and other awards. Even the records still sit in silent testimony to the Cook family's endeavours.

Did you know that the grounds are a popular venue for weddings and other special occasions?

Did you know Greenmount Homestead celebrated its centenary in 2015? This marked 100 years since the homestead was built.

Message to new participants

The program appears daunting, but it is worth the effort. The Reviewers help you to focus on what really matters and inject fresh ideas and enthusiasm into your facility. Yes, there is paperwork to do, but for us the real benefit came from those conversations we had during the field visits – that's where the real benefits of this program really come to the fore.

Program outcomes

Planning and focus

The professional guidance and input that we have received during the Standards Review has given us a better sense of direction in terms of how we manage the collection at Greenmount, and in particular what areas we need to focus on in the short, medium and long term. This will help us to identify what resources are required to help us to achieve our goals, as well as providing our volunteer group with direction, motivation and ownership in the future of the museum.

Organisational structure

The review program has reinforced our need to become an incorporated body to provide our volunteers and visitors the best experience we can. Through an incorporated body, all volunteer policies and procedures will be reviewed, standardised and agreed by our management committee.

Accessing expert advice and working closely with the independent Reviewers and the M&G QLD staff helped the gallery make use of an appropriate phase of review, following the de-amalgamation of Noosa Council from its larger host council. During this review phase, the gallery (and Council) was more receptive to be challenged on the notion of reviewing the legacy of past operations and ascertain its collection position.

The process also encouraged us to think and act on strategy development to provide the gallery with direction to secure a firm position in its future within council and its role in the community, ultimately resulting with a sound case for a facility upgrade (including more prominent signage).

M&G QLD's support and delivery of the Program, and working with the independent Reviewers was very rewarding and validating.

Program outcomes

New Strategic Plan

A schedule of actions to develop a new Strategic Plan - a first for the gallery, providing direction and strength to firmly position its future and ultimately, a facility upgrade (including more prominent signage).

Clarity around having a Collection or not

A recommendation that artworks in council's possession undergo a significance assessment and not be considered a gallery collection, with the large archive of Floating Land digital images to be catalogued and accessioned into the Heritage Library collection.

Pioneer Valley Museum at Mirani

Standards profile

The Pioneer Valley Museum tells stories of the Valley, yet our rich history can resonate for all of Queensland.

Come and visit the heritage hub of the Valley. Explore stories about personalities, places and objects that help tell our history and give fascinating glimpses of our past.

Our heritage embraces Aboriginal and South Sea Islander culture, the rich industrial tapestry of cane, cotton, tobacco, timber and even gold, of the region and our natural environment. The museum boasts truly unique specimens including the Pallimnarchus gracilis fossil and rare cultural objects like the Amalgamated Workers Association Flag and the very first diesel loco to haul cane in the Mackay Region.

The personalities and identities of the Valley are entwined with the rich history that we share. If you are from near or afar, our collections and stories are here for you to explore.

Mackay is home to the largest community with Australian South Sea Islander heritage in Australia. Many members of this group are the descendants of men who were indentured to the sugar cane industry from the late 1800s. The Museum houses a display of authentic South Sea Islander artefacts collected by one of these families from their home islands.

The Township of Mirani once had a Magistrate's Court servicing the Pioneer Valley. Significant pieces of dressed pine furniture, including the prisoner's dock, a witness stand and Magistrate's chair from this Court House are now displayed in the Museum.

Message to new participants

It has been a very worthwhile exercise. As we progressed through the various stages of the Standards Review, we found that we gained a better understanding of procedures in managing a small rural museum and the challenges of future proofing our organisation. Our Reviewers were particularly encouraging in helping us to plan for potential changes to our Museum.

Program outcomes

The Standards Review Program reinforced the direction that our group is taking in developing the stories of local identities, particularly as this has already encouraged increased local interest in the Museum.

Discussions with the Reviewers have encouraged us to plan and undertake the process of the digitisation of the collection working in conjunction with the other museums in the Mackay Council region.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program has woken us up to a lot of areas of museum work and the reviewers have suggested things we hope to implement. With the help of volunteers we're hoping to get all our plans done next year.

Program outcomes

New Museum Plan

The top priority is to develop a new museum plan. The strategic plan will cover exciting things like education programs for children and adults as well as new story boards allowing visitors to learn from the collection without a volunteer having to lead them through.

Nambucca Valley Museums

During the Standards year all the Nambucca Valley museums got together for a meeting that went really well. We're looking forward to working together in the future. We have discussed issues like sharing what is in our collections, which could lead to deaccessioning collection items and distributing them to other museums in the Valley where they will work better.

Bunker Cartoon Gallery

Standards profile

The Bunker Gallery Cartoon Collection is possibly the largest collection of Australian and International cartoons in Australia. It numbers nearly 19000 cartoons (and growing), including historical cartoons from the early 20th century, as well as entries from the Rotary Cartoon Awards.

Over the last few decades, the technologies which have been introduced to the art of cartooning have changed dramatically. Contemporary cartoonists have a whole new tool box and palette to work with. What was once referred to as 'Black and White Art', due to the use of brush, pen and ink on white paper, usually worked over a pencil sketch has changed with the digital graphic art revolution. Cartoonists use the internet to source a wide variety of software programs, images and fonts as well as to send their works to publishers worldwide at the click of a mouse.

Hand coloured cartoons are now in short supply which makes the original hand drawn works produced prior to the digital age rare and historic in the use of drawing media. The most significant cartoons in the Bunker Cartoon Gallery's historical collection are:

- Two lithograph cartoons by Stan Cross
- A Percy Lindsay cartoon from 1930
- A Jim Russell original caricature of Uncle Dick from "The Potts" from 1950
- · Monty Wedd's illustrations from the Stamp News
- Mark Lynch's cartoons which comprise 8 percent of the whole collection

Visitors can view exhibitions, learn about the history of the building, which is a WWII Bunker, and view cartoons in folders and purchase copies and use the cartoon reference library.

The Gallery also hosts local and emerging artists' displays and touring exhibitions. Please check the website for current and upcoming shows.

The Gallery is operated by Coffs Harbour City Council Community Services.

Message to new participants

Participating in Standards has been very beneficial to me in my role as Coordinator of the Gallery. I felt that I could sit down and have frank discussions with the Reviewers and gain some perspective. It has highlighted areas of my practice which are due for review, but it has also been great to get the boost from positive feedback about our exhibitions and database.

Program outcomes

Volunteer Recruitment

Next year we'll focus on getting together a volunteer recruitment policy. In the past we have waited for the volunteers to approach the Gallery, however, there does come a point where you need to look at the skills your volunteers have and actually go out and try to find those people in the community who have the skills that you still need.

Disaster Planning

We will also work on establishing the Significance of the collection. A flow on from this would be the emergency evacuation procedures for the collection. We will develop a priority list of which cartoons would be rescued first.

Coffs Harbour Regional Museum

Standards profile

The aim of the Coffs Harbour Regional Museum is to reflect the social and cultural history of the Coffs Harbour Region with a primary, but not exclusive emphasis, on developing collections and exhibitions reflecting the relationships between the region's residents and the area's maritime and hinterland waterways.

Our vision is to bring Coffs Harbour's history alive!

The Museum has been divided into exhibition spaces with different themes that take the visitor on a journey from the area's earliest days, right up to the present. Coffs Harbour's maritime history will literally wash over visitors through the coastal soundscape that will greet them as they learn about life as a Solitary Island lighthouse keeper and enjoy a huge range of exhibits that show how our early city forebears lived.

Local Indigenous culture also takes pride of place in the new Museum with important objects from the museum collections and a new short documentary on Tony Hart, who is considered to be one of the area's finest Indigenous artists and craftspeople.

There is also a 'Communications Room' that houses a Morse code machine, phonograph rolls and a phonogram, a stereoscope and the magnificent ,and quite enormous, projector from the famous TASMA cinema – to show the way we've listened, watched and learned has changed over time. Also on display are many of the unique and beautiful clothes collections from the nineteenth century onwards that local families have donated and, of course, our important archive of objects related to the city's 'founder' Captain John Korff.

The Museum has now converged with the Coffs Harbour library and gallery and this will enable us to provide a more professional and upgraded resource for our local community in the future. We will be able to move forward with digitising the collection and making it accessible to all. We have already been working with the library on our Picture Coffs Harbour project. We have been scanning and cataloguing our large collection of over 10,000 photographs. The web address for this is www.picturecoffsharbour.org.

Don Dorrigo & Guy Fawkes Historical Museum

Standards profile

The visitor can explore the stories of early settlement and the development of logging, sawmilling and dairying on the Dorrigo Plateau through themed displays. Temporary photographic displays related to annual town events, festivals and commemorations are a regular feature of the museum. Volunteers involved with the ABC Open Projects have produced short films that the visitor can view in the museum.

An extensive digitised photographic archive includes the A.C. Bennett Collection (circa 1911-16), Waterfall and A.E. Murray original glass negatives, community organisations, timber, dairying and farming industries, WWI & WWII soldiers, families, natural disasters, sporting events and the Dorrigo-Glenreagh Railway. Other important objects and collections include the Wharfdale Printing Press for many years used to print the Don Dorrigo Gazette, Buddy Williams' connection with Dorrigo, and the Dorrigo Hydro Electricity Scheme.

The Dorrigo Museum's primary focus is the collection and display of historical and contemporary material that encompasses objects, photographs, local histories and stories of people and place in both print and digital media as well as videos that capture the natural beauty of the Dorrigo landscape.

Since 2013 we've been engaged in a very successful program of regular theme-based visits to the local hostel. The program was established as a social event to tap into the memories of the residents. Other on-going projects include recording and documenting the histories of the Dorrigo Butter Factory, the Dorrigo Telephone Exchange, history of the western Plateau, and the local Red Cross.

In 2014 we were engaged in reviewing all museum practices through the M&G NSW Standards Review Program. In 2015 we'll be setting up a series of digital photo frames to complement major displays.

Message to new participants

Being involved in the Standards Program was a positive and productive experience. The program provided an opportunity to enhance our understanding of best practice museum management.

Program outcomes

During the Program we discussed with the Reviewers the operational differences of the Museum and the Historical Society. A positive outcome has been the establishment of a separate museum management committee.

The installation of six digital photograph fames to complement exhibitions. A VIM Grant provided funds to purchase metal shelving to install a typological exhibition of domestic items.

Kempsey Museum explores the stories of the Macleay River District from Aboriginal prehistory to today, and its inhabitants in a 1983 Sir Zelman Cowen Commendation award winning building designed by Glenn Murcutt.

Some of our more significant displays relating to local history include the timber industry, local military history, maritime history and the Macleay River, indigenous inhabitants, domestic life and textiles, music, sporting and natural history, dairying, communications, farming and land transport.

Take advantage of our research facilities. We hold family research files, books, maps, microfilm and audio visual materials. As well as having access to the archives of the Macleay Chronicle and Macleay Argus, we also hold the nationally significant Angus McNeil Collection of glass plate negatives.

Come and experience the working model steam sawmill, marvel at the rowing skiff used by champion sculler Tom Saul, visit the schoolroom or Settlers Cottage or just sit and enjoy our recreated cottage garden.

The Kempsey Museum is managed by the Macleay River Historical Society.

Message to new participants

We were hesitant at first to join up because of our shortage of volunteer resources. As part of the program however we introduced a new induction package and guidelines for managing volunteers, and have actually increased our volunteer numbers in addition to other outcomes of the Program.

Program outcomes

Networking

Networking with other participants resulted in new ideas and sharing of these, for example a volunteer from Coffs Harbour attended one of our Educational Open days as an observer. We also produced a glossy brochure similar to one we saw from one of the other participants which has resulted in increased visitor numbers.

Documentation

The call for key documents for Activities 1, 2 and 3, resulted in a reorganisation of our Museum documentation, which has facilitated future Grant Applications. We now also have better documentation for volunteer training.

Mary Boulton's Pioneer Cottage & Museum

Standards profile

Sister Mary Boulton (1914-2003) had a long career in nursing and midwifery in the District. Her family connections to Macksville go back to the 1860s when her grandfather arrived in the area. Mary was inspired by a visit to America, where she experienced first-hand various forms of museums and public history, she decided to create a museum of her own in her local community.

Today, visitors can encounter the living conditions of the Nambucca Valley pioneers: the early 19th century furnished cottage in a delightful garden setting; a timber-getter's bark hut, a dairy where cans of cream were stored; tools and implements from the dairy, beef, banana and farm crop industries. Among the displays are household and personal items - including clothing that would have been cleaned using a 'blue bag' for whitening in a timber laundry trough.

Early businesses have not been forgotten with the meat processing display prominent; a seat from the first hotel and a rake used to harvest oysters. Parish maps of the district and charts of early town sub-divisions, numerous local history books, files and photographs, and staff to assist with research.

An Open-Day is held each year and a pioneer plaque wall is an on-going project.

Admission fees apply. The grounds are available for hire for marriage and naming ceremonies. Morning and afternoon tea catering is available for group tours.

This wheelchair friendly complex is managed by a volunteer committee.

Nambucca Headland Museum

Standards profile

The Nambucca Headland Museum in Nambucca Heads invites you to inspect their huge and interesting collection of local artefacts and memorabilia.

The Museum records and displays the history of the Nambucca Valley. There are several key features: one of the main ones is the 1916 Aboriginal School from Stuart Island, now incorporated into the Museum.

Other objects relate to the early timber and shipping industries and photographs of the trees and timber-getters and ships and shipping. The Royal Tar is especially interesting as it was not only the largest ship built on the coast of NSW when it was launched in 1876 but was purchased in 1893 by the New Australia Settlement Association and sailed to Paraguay.

The clothing and textile collection including fine lace and embroidery is a good record and counterbalance to the male industries on display.

Message to new participants

The reviewers really spurred us on. None of us are from the Valley, so we feel a big responsibility to respect the past members who have looked after the collection since the 1960s. But now we have four museums in the Valley, so we need to focus on our significant themes. The reviewers strengthened us by giving us great practical points.

Program outcomes

Rearranging and Deaccessioning

We have started to do some rearranging of displays and storage and have even begun deaccessioning. This will help us put on better displays of our more significant objects. In the rearranging process, we have come across objects that don't have relevance to our region at all! We have started developing new displays and have emptied out a corner of the school room for children's activities.

Focus on Indigenous Displays

The school building in the museum is the old Mission School building and was built in 1916. We have decided to focus on the building for its centenary in 2016. We have also developed a new interpretive panel with a Small Grant and also smartened up the indigenous display.

Kronosaurus Korner

Standards profile

Kronosaurus Korner is Australia's premier marine fossil museum, featuring over 1000 different and well-preserved fossils from Richmond in outback Queensland. The fossils on display provide fascinating insights into the creatures that survived in the ancient Eromanga Sea which covered Richmond 100 million years ago.

Marvel at one of the largest collection of marine fossils in the Southern Hemisphere. Come face to face with one of the largest pliosaurs that ever lived – *Kronosaurus* – a 10 metre long predatory marine reptile which had enormous terrifying crocodile-like jaws. Meet 'Penny' the plesiosaur – one of the most complete vertebrate fossils in the world, 'Wandah' – Australia's largest fish fossil, 'Minnee' – the most complete baby ichthyosaur yet found and 'Marlin's Beastie' – the limb bones of a completely new, long-necked sauropod dinosaur.

Dive in deeper with Kronosaurus Korner's audio tours. You can explore how these creatures moved underwater in the theatrette and see first-hand the preparation of fossils with direct viewing into the preparation laboratory. You can also see the only reproduction/animation in the world that shows how Kronosaurs moved.

Take up the unique opportunity to accompany Kronosaurus Korner's resident palaeontologist on the 'Digging at Dusk' field trip to Richmond's famous fossil sites. These are held from May to August. Bookings can also be made for a week long 'CSI: Cretaceous Sea Monster Investigation' dig in July.

Enjoy the best coffee around and a bite to eat at the Moonrock Café and pick up a souvenir in the gift shop. With all this and more, Kronosaurus Korner is a not-to-be-missed highlight of the Australian Dinosaur Trail.

Message to new participants

We thoroughly recommend the Standards Program for any small museum wanting to improve their practices, whether it be for developing specific areas or advancing an organisation across the board. The Standards Program staff and reviewers were not only professional and accessible, but imparted invaluable information which will undoubtably take our museum to the next level.

Program outcomes

Education Kit

Our new education kit will include strands from the Science learning area of the Australian Curriculum. Learning outcomes for foundation to year 10 students will relate to themes within our museum.

Maritime Museum of Townsville

Standards profile

Indulge your fascination with the sea...

Set on the banks of the picturesque Ross Creek, the Maritime Museum of Townsville holds many interesting treasures and tells the story of the maritime history of Townsville and surrounds. Friendly volunteers will greet you as you begin to explore the Museum.

Immerse yourself in the story of the SS Yongala and its fateful encounter with a cyclone in 1911. Tragically there were no survivors but eerily the mailbag washed ashore and after being dried, the letters were posted. You can see some of these in the display. There are also portholes, hatches, crockery and the evocative ship's bell from 'North Queensland's Titanic'.

The Yongala was a coastal passenger ship, which in the era before rail travel, provided a vital service to the coastal towns of Australia and her loss was widely felt. The mysterious disappearance of the Yongala triggered reports of a ghost ship often seen between Townville and Bowen until the wreck was eventually discovered in 1958.

There is a fabulous model ship collection, which shows the intricacies of miniature shipbuilding. Many of these models were built using original ships' plans and are correct to the smallest detail.

You can also see the Bay Rock Lighthouse, Beth – an authentic harbor tender, the clinker built dinghy used in the movie Australia and an anchor purported to be from the *l'astrolabe*, French explorer La Perouse's ill fated ship.

Relax on the deck overlooking the sailing boats or have a picnic in the beautiful grounds where the kids can run around. You can purchase a souvenir or two and then head to the nearby Palmer St cafe precinct for a coffee.

Message to new participants

Our museum has undergone extensive changes in staffing throughout the review. This necessitated activities being reassigned to uninformed new staff. Despite this, the learning experience for those involved has been beneficial, providing the information, advice and motivation needed to continue.

Program outcomes

Participation in the Standards Review Program has increased our sense of pride for the enormous contribution made to the community over the past 28 years by those involved with preserving the maritime history of the region.

Museum representatives have thoroughly enjoyed their involvement in the Standards Review Program which has been both stimulating and challenging but what we most enjoyed is meeting the Reviewers who we found very professional, extremely helpful and very good company. They provided a wide range of information, experience and invaluable advice.

Come and find out about Z Force and their collapsible canoes or see first-hand the cramped conditions on Pearling luggers and imagine swimming in cumbersome dive suits.

Get hands on – touch, smell and experience part of Brisbane's early maritime history. The Museum grounds boast the fascinating colonial dry dock and pump house with huge sandstone blocks and great acoustics. And don't miss out on the Bulwar Lighthouse and collection.

Bring your picnic lunch, sit on the grass and enjoy the fantastic river views. There is room for the kids to run around and plenty to see. Message to new participants

The home has been beautifully restored to its 19th century décor and furnished of the era.

Adjacent to 'Currajong' is the 'Worker's Cottage', circa 1884. This quaint 1-bedroom dwelling gives visitors a great sense of the pioneering spirit of North Queensland. Your guided tour brings to life these marvellous dwellings set in carefully maintained spacious heritage-inspired gardens and expansive lawns.

View the fascinating Green collection of ceramics from the first Japanese Consulate in Australia, which was located in Townsville.

Message to new participants

Inviting someone in to review your organisation is a big step but the rewards are great. We now appreciate all of the activities we do well and have had professional advice, help and references that will help us improve other area that have been a concern for many years. The Standards Program is a real confidence booster.

Program outcomes

Collection Management

While our collection is well managed, we have revised our proposed collection storage areas and evaluated the appropriateness of these in terms of temperature and access. The Program has provided references to help us manage the collection more professionally.

Heritage Centre Management

As a first step towards recruiting more volunteers we have identified a set of work areas and are in the process of developing job descriptions for these.

Zara Clark Museum

Standards profile

Visitors can relive the history of Charters Towers at the Zara Clark Museum. A large collection of everyday objects, historical machinery and photographs, tells the story of life in the area over time and illustrates the excitement of Charters Towers' development since the discovery of gold in 1871.

The museum is housed in a heritage listed, late Victorian building reflecting the affluence and confidence of Charters Towers' golden past. From the late 19th century many companies have operated within the building, providing essential goods and services to the businesses, pastoralists and miners within the area.

Items on display are organised around a series of themes, offering something of interest for every visitor. Popular displays include a rare example of a Lampson Aerial Cash System from the old Stan Pollard's store in the main street, the gaming machines from a SP bookmaker's shop offering to tell your future at a price, and the Charles Wallace Collection, showcasing the town's proud military history from the Boer to the Vietnam wars, which holds a poignant story concerning a pair of unfinished socks from World War I.

Friendly volunteers are always on hand at the museum to share their special stories, present guided tours and demonstrate some of the equipment on display.

Message to new participants

The Zara Clark Museum group had some reservations when involvement in the Review was first proposed because of our fairly unique situation being a volunteer group responsible to the National Trust of Australia (Queensland).

We found the program to be of great benefit though, with some recommendations already put into place and others being worked upon at the present time.

Program outcomes

Involving People

The Standards Program has assisted us with ideas to use in the recruitment of more volunteers and to encourage further interest from those who already are involved.

Collection Development

The program highlighted a need to revise our Statement of Purpose, Collection Policy and Significance Statements to meet the requirements of the new National Trust of Australia (Queensland) Incorporated body.

Albury Library Museum

Standards profile

This award-winning Albury LibraryMuseum brings state-of-theart technology, engaging interactive exhibitions, reading and research together at one location.

The building was designed by nationally renowned architects Ashton Ragatt McDougall and is the first facility of its kind in Australia to house a library and museum under one roof.

The LibraryMuseum is a fantastic showcase for national and international touring exhibitions, and incorporates works from the Albury City Collection in our permanent exhibition Crossing Place. This world-class exhibition, told through an engaging collection of objects, oral stories and film, weaves together the story of Albury from its first contact with the Wiradjuri people, traditional owners of the land, to the city we know today. Crossing Place traces the settlement of Albury by land and water - its growth into a city through rapid post World War II immigration from the Bonegilla Migrant Centre, its federal ambition and the role of de-centralisation government policy on the region. Integral to the story is the Murray River, where children can explore a river installation via a special 'kids only' display of river artefacts, animals, sounds and smells.

Crossing Place is the starting point for many of the education programs offered by the LibraryMuseum. There is an education resource for school teachers, audio tour available and guided tours can be arranged for members of the public.

Message to new participants

We found the M&G NSW Standards Program very beneficial. The opportunities provided for self review, forward planning and organisational analysis were important for the LibraryMuseum and our strategic planning.

The process also, enabled us to work more closely with other museums in our region and build on these existing relationships.

Program outcomes

Self analysis

The process of identifying all existing AlburyCity policies, procedures and documentation that are relevant to the Albury LibraryMuseum was highly valuable. Having an existing checklist from M&G NSW, enabled us to cross reference against our existing policies and documentation and identify any outstanding gaps.

Valuing our volunteers

Our organisation has always acknowledged the skills and time provided by our local volunteers. However, the M&G NSW Standards Program highlighted the on-going volunteer contributions, their dedication, energy and support for the LibraryMuseum. In particular, the Albury and District Historical Society's relationship with the LibraryMuseum is essential to the care and documentation of the collection and our on-going success.

Berrigan & District Heritage Museum

Standards profile

Berrigan is proud to be credited with several "firsts". Civic minded Berrigan men took the lead in organising the first Corowa Conference on federation in 1893. The first Rural Fire Brigade in NSW was formed in Berrigan in 1901. The first Parents and Citizens Association in NSW was established in Berrigan.

Oral histories, federation information, fire brigade memorabilia and material relating to the Berrigan RSL, including guns, medals and uniforms are important features of the Museum. The Museum also houses the service records of Berrigan men and women who served in World War II, plus some from World War I.

There is an extensive collection of photographs and press cuttings of early farming and the coming of irrigation in 1939 via the Mulwala Canal. As well as materials relating to the Berrigan Schools, there are photographs and information on several district schools, which were active but have been closed for many years.

A heritage town walk brochure is available in full colour. This links with the main street buildings and corresponding wall plaques.

The Museum is still gathering oral histories and cross referencing those already in the collection. More wall plaques are being prepared for significant buildings and will total 20 on completion.

Berrigan and District Heritage Museum is managed by a committee of volunteers.

Message to new participants

It is well worth participating. Until our museum was subjected to inspections and suggestions, we volunteers were unaware of how we could improve our displays.

Program outcomes

Participating in the program demonstrated the need to simplify displays. Instead of having everything out at once, it is more interesting to store some items for a while.

We had several old double sided display cabinets. By cutting these in half we could put them against the walls to make the room look more spacious.

Bishop's Lodge Historic House and Garden

Standards profile

Bishop's Lodge Historic House is a remarkable iron house and outbuildings designed and built in 1888 by Bishop Sydney Linton and architect, John Sulman. It incorporates innovative design ideas for mitigating Hay's extreme summer heat.

Bishop's Lodge is surrounded by a heritage garden featuring a remarkable collection of historic roses, some of which are unique.

The focus of the collection is the iron house built in 1888 as the residence for the Anglican Bishop of the Riverina. The small but significant collection is based around the families who lived there, its use as a hostel for school boys in the 1930s and 1940s, the heritage roses and the work of the committee since 1985.

Current programs include the labelling of the collection of heritage roses, school holiday programs, seasonal public programs around aspects of the collection and regular fundraising programs.

Bishop's Lodge welcomes visitors six afternoons a week and arrangements can be made for group visits at other times with prior discussion.

The volunteer management committee acts on behalf of the Hay Shire Council which purchased the property in 1985.

Message to new participants

The value of the program is in being able to hold extended discussions with reviewers who have wide experience in a range of museum settings and develop ideas and practices within this bigger picture.

Program outcomes

Investigation of volunteer recruitment programs

The action plan discussed on our final site visit should provide good guidance for developing a formal volunteer recruiting, training and recognition program.

Understanding success

We often don't recognise what our achievements and successes are in our small, isolated rural community. We need to rejoice in all achievements, be they small gains or significant forwards steps!

Corowa Federation Museum

Standards profile

Corowa's Federation Museum tells the exciting story of Australia's historical progress from being a group of independent, uncooperative colonies through to their people voting to form a unified federation. The critical role that the 'break through' 1893 Corowa Conference played in this outcome resulted in Corowa being recognised nationally as 'The Birthplace of Federation'.

On a walk down Corowa's main street you will see that the extensive Federation display in the Museum, is complemented by two major historical time lines and 14 historical plaques, all designed by the Museum's volunteers.

Australia's iconic painting, Tom Roberts' 'Shearing the Rams' was painted at Brocklesby Station near Corowa in 1890. A copy of the painting, together with details of its genesis and the personalities depicted, is featured near our shearing shed display.

We proudly display works by Tommy McCrae, a local 19th century Aboriginal artist, now nationally recognised.

Other significant displays include historical clothing, life through Corowa's first 150 years, agricultural equipment, a blacksmith's shop, saddlery, old medical and dental equipment and a mint condition, 1929 A model Ford car.

Our totally volunteer-operated museum is located in the very impressive purpose-built, Border Brass Band Building (1915) – its entry foyer being used for continually changing displays sourced from our extensive collections.

Historic Corowa with its unique Federation Museum is a 'must visit' for all Australians – young and old!

Message to new participants

While we were apprehensive about the demands involved with participation being placed upon our small numbers of volunteers, we quickly realised that the effort to be genuinely introspective and committed to a positive practical outcome.

Program outcomes

Increased positive focus on our strengths and weaknesses

Development of a more systematic approach to all aspects of our activities, prompted by the need to complete the Standards Questionnaire and our exposure to alternative ideas etc.

Acceptance of the benefits flowing from external inputs

While we were aware of problems with our collections, the Standards Program, plus input from others, forced us to directly address this subject now.

Deniliquin & District Historical Museum

Standards profile

Our museum was built in the 1880s as a residence for Police Inspector John Dowling Brown, whose territory spanned a large part of south-western New South Wales. Occupancy by members of NSW Police ceased in the 1970s, after which the building fell into disrepair until the mid 1980s, when it was acquired by the Deniliquin & District Historical Society. With the support of Heritage Funding and many volunteers the building has since been increased in size and brought back to much of its early condition. It was opened to the public in 1994.

The Museum, which remains the property of Crown Lands, is managed by a group of trustees from within the Historical Society.

Since establishment the Museum has also served as a research centre. While both interests are still followed there is now a greater interest within the public and our members towards the collection and display of items of all ages.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program is well worth the effort. This program directs the membership/staff of your organisation to take a close look at how things are being done and how improvements can be made. The skill and knowledge of the reviewers has been beneficial to our museum.

Program outcomes

Volunteers

There is a renewed enthusiasm among the volunteers at the Museum. This in turn has led to an increase in the number of volunteers attending and contributing to the reorganisation of the Museum. A very positive outcome!

Support from M&G NSW

The reviewers were understanding of the limitations of our membership and supportive of our ideas and planning. The reviewers worked with us on suggestions to improve our museum and attract more visitors and volunteers. These suggestions have already benefited our society.

Dunera Museum Hay Prisoner of War Interpretive Centre

Standards profile

The Museum houses exhibits, photographs and stories about the experiences of internees, Prisoners of War and the townsfolk of Hay.

In July 1940, the Commonwealth government agreed to accept 6,000 internees from the United Kingdom. German, Italian and Japanese civilians internees and Prisoners of War were kept in three Prison Camps at Hay between 1940 and 1946 including the Dunera Boys. They were guarded by more than 600 members of 16th Australian Garrison Battalion.

The SS Dunera brought 1,984 German Jewish refugees aged between 16 and 45, who had escaped from Nazi occupied territories. Also on board were 200 Italian Prisoners of War and 250 Nazis. They arrived at Hay on September 7, 1940 as the first internees of the British Government World War II policy in Hay.

The collection comprises various objects including a soccer jumper, newsletters, passport, artworks, a suitcase and documents.

Program outcomes

A future project is to build a new, solar powered, shed to be used as storage and a conservation space. We plan to offer some of the storage space to the other Hay museums.

Griffith Pioneer Park Museum

Standards profile

Explore the history of Griffith and the Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area as you walk around—and into—an extensive collection of buildings and artefacts from the region.

Within these and throughout the Park are many of the machines, tools and other artefacts from the history of Griffith and the construction of the Riverina's 'food bowl'.

From the 'Mallee Roller' used to clear 1300 acres of scrub through to unique harvesters, there are original inventions and many examples of the ingenuity that contributed to making the region productive.

Recent additions include museums dedicated to Italian migrants and local wineries, as well as an increasing number of historical items from Griffith such as dresses that feature on a national register and the famous Knitted Garden exhibit.

GPPM is staffed by a (part-time) Curator, Business and Administration Coordinator and a Technical Officer.

We also have a management committee who meets monthly and approximately 20 volunteers who undertake the day to day operation of the Museum, including shop front, catering, gardening and general maintenance.

Message to new participants

New participants will only benefit from this program. There is nothing better than a visit from our city peers – they bring with them ideas and encouragement. No question or problem is too big for M&G NSW, they go out of their way to supply you with information and good advice.

Program outcomes

Facilities operations, internal procedures and policy updates

Standards Reviewers reviewed our updated policies and offered several suggestions and invaluable comments. We plan to have these documents completed and passed and are currently working towards utilising volunteer's work hours better in all operational procedures of the Museum.

Networking and professional advice

M&G NSW have passed on achievements and inspirational ideas from rural museums, thus expanding our knowledge of other museums' success stories. Having the opportunity to seek advice from professionals in the museum field has given staff and volunteers a greater understanding of sound museum practices.

Griffith Regional Art Gallery holds two major collections which include the Griffith Couture Collection by designers Ross Weymouth and John Clarringbold. This collection includes 12 winning garments from the Australian Gown of the Year Awards and the Masters of Fashion Awards. The National Contemporary Jewellery Collection is our other significant collection which includes acquisitions from the Gallery's biennial National Contemporary Jewellery Award.

The size of our exhibition space allows us to show one exhibition at any given time and can include up to ten exhibitions annually. Our program includes collection exhibitions, touring shows, exhibitions by local artists and community shows.

Complementing our exhibitions, the Gallery programs a variety of public and educational programs for our region that caters to all ages. Our public programs include workshops, master classes and artist and curator talks.

The Gallery is located in the right wing of a classic 1930s art deco building designed by Architect Arthur Buckley Long and is situated in the heart of Griffith's city, designed by Walter Burley Griffin. The Gallery is a cultural facility of Griffith City Council and is supported by Arts NSW.

Message to new participants

Griffith War Memorial Museum

Standards profile

The Griffith War Memorial Museum is managed by a committee of volunteers. The Museum has permanent exhibitions in a heritage building in Banna Avenue Griffith.

A Roll of Honour celebrates and acknowledges those members of the Griffith community who lost their lives in Australia's campaigns. Photos and service records are on display for each of those servicemen.

Each Anzac Day a new exhibition is set up to feature a different aspect of Australia's military campaigns and the involvement of members of the Griffith community. In 2012, the Museum celebrated the 70th anniversary of the Women's Land Army with an anniversary luncheon and launch of a special exhibition. The Land Army permanent exhibition includes service records, photos, letters, uniforms and diaries associated with members of the Land Army who were stationed in Griffith during WWII.

The 2013 Anzac Day exhibition features Australia's participation in the Korean War with an additional exhibition focusing on the contribution of members of the Indigenous community in Australia's military campaigns.

Australia's involvement in military campaigns in WWI, WWII, Vietnam, and Afghanistan are presented with displays of military equipment, uniforms, maps and photographs.

Message to new participants

We have been provided with information and ideas to bring our museum in line with acceptable museum management practice and not been intimidated in the process.

Program outcomes

The Standards Program provided us with information about museum and exhibition management and administration. We have been provided with ideas and projects which will attract volunteers.

Over the last century, it operated as a gaol, a maternity hospital, a locked hospital for the insane, a prisoner of war detention centre for Japanese and Italian prisoners, an institute for girls and now finally a museum. Come and explore Hay Gaol and find out its history!

Wander through the gaol and discover stories of its past. Learn how the prisoners of war were able to escape from such a tight fortress. See the van that the girls were transported in under the darkness of night. Think about what it was like to spend time in the solitary cell.

Through objects and stories, Hay Gaol Museum explains the social history of the Hay district and its people. See the significant farming and plant equipment in the Nickless collection, marvel at the old Clyde wooden windmills and find out why the National Maritime Museum has one of the region's Aboriginal bark canoes. These are some of the many stories at the Hay Goal Museum – there is something for everyone.

The Apex Park in the Gaol grounds is a great place for a picnic, and it has play equipment for the kids too.

The Gaol Museum is the hub of Hay's stirring Australia Day celebrations, which start with a hearty breakfast, flag raising ceremony and presentation of the town's citizenship awards.

Hay War Memorial High School Museum

Standards profile

Hay War Memorial High School Museum is located in the original building of the Hay War Memorial High School which was built in 1923 as both a high school and the town's war memorial to honour those who served in World War I. It is managed by the Hay War Memorial High School. The collection preserves stories of Hay and District war service and the life of the school.

The Museum is currently developing a digital project. The HWMHS Museum was chosen as a prototype for the NSW Office of Veterans' Affairs Anzac Community Grant Scheme. The digital project aims to engage school students and young people with their Anzac heritage and promote greater understanding of this. One of the outcomes of the project will be a series of professionally produced video clips about individual Hay service personnel across the twentieth century. The designers are also providing the school with a template for the continued production of these clips. Another aspect of the project has been the development of a comprehensive photographic record of the many HWMHS ex-students who have joined the armed services, from World War II through to the present day.

Holbrook Submarine Museum

Standards profile

Our prize exhibit is a genuine WW II "Jolly Roger" flag from a British submarine, it is one of only three dozen world-wide that remain from over 300 British and Australian submarines that operated in time of war.

We have the original above water line superstructure of the Oberon Class submarine HMAS OTWAY set within beautiful parkland. Also, a large scale model of Lt. Norman Holbrook VC's submarine B11.

We have recently completed re-building HMAS OTWAY'S original Wardroom (Officer's quarters) in front of our control room within the Museum. The 7 original masts are back on the Otway with the Radar mast rotating during daylight hours.

In the Museum you will see the extraordinary Hologram in which Mrs G. Holbrook tells the fascinating story of her husband's brave exploits on B11 in 1914 and the subsequent name change of the town (the theatre seats forty and is wheelchair friendly). You will see an original torpedo tube with a torpedo mounted. Both rooms are full of interesting artefacts and information.

Then to finish (without having to go underwater) you will enter the main passage from HMAS OTWAY and be able to sit in the officers wardroom and experience what it would be like to live in a submarine, before going aft into the red lights of the control room. You may look through the periscope to see 360 degree views of Holbrook and take as many photos as you like.

Near the exit there is a photographic exhibition showing how the Otway was transported and re-built here in Holbrook. Then don't forget to sign the guest book!

We are at a stage where we needed to be better organised in all departments and lift the Museum's profile. By participating in the Standards Program we have added knowledge to achieve our aims in the future development and running of a quality submarine museum.

Australian Stockman's Hall of Fame and Outback Heritage Centre is an excellent museum and cultural facility located in Longreach, western Queensland. Welcomed by the impressive bronze statue of the ringer, symbolic of rural heritage, the visitor is taken on a journey into the heart of Australia: 'A vision splendid of the sunlit plains extended and the wondrous glory of the everlasting stars'.

The five high quality displays provide an insight into Australia's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage, the early exploration and rural expansion, the pioneering settlers and their hardships, the development of the great pastoral empires and how the marvellous Royal Flying Doctor Service overcame isolation. For the urban visitor it opens a fabulous window into a significant Australian story.

Significant objects and artefacts include: wool wagon, stockmen's equipment, pastoral property journals, early explorer's artefacts, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artefacts, artwork, hawker's wagon, rural sports and 16,000 images. Small collections from prominent Australians such as Sidney Kidman, Smoky Dawson, Jimmy Sharman, Hugh Sawrey and R.M. Williams give depth to the collection.

Visitors can take advantage of light refreshments in the Wool Bale Café or a lovely meal at the Cattleman's Bar and Grill. There is also the Outback Traders that carries a range of souvenirs, crafts, hats and books and jewellery.

Message to new participants


Organisational recognition

Emerald Art Gallery provides the local community with a high profile exhibition space, located in the Central Highlands Regional Council offices in Emerald. The gallery is managed by a group of dedicated volunteers who promote art in the community through programs including exhibitions, floor talks, visiting artists, openings, competitions and workshops.

The exhibition space is large and bright with impressive hanging space and regularly shows paintings, photography and sculpture. The Emerald art collection was established as early as 1970 and has steadily grown through an annual acquisitive art award. The collection consists predominantly of oil or acrylic painting on canvas. Longreach Powerhouse Museum

A hidden gem, the Longreach Powerhouse Museum boasts a state-registered heritage complex that showcases the rare technology of gas-fired electrical generation.

Visit the well-preserved generation buildings to see the gasproducers, eight enormous generators from different periods, and explore the plant as it was on the last day of operation. Look out for the quirky details – the works siren, the Shift Manager's "office" or the only 1600 class Diesel locomotive on display in Queensland.

While visiting the Longreach Powerhouse Museum, you can find out more about the history of Longreach, the capital of the outback. Go back in time at Nogo cottage where the life of yesteryear is seen in all its rustic glory. The local history of Longreach, settled in the 1870s, is presented with a recreated schoolroom, and interesting artefacts from pastoral, commercial, social associations, and an unusual airport control centre from the 1970s. In the grounds we feature a collection of rural machinery with the unexpected extremes of a 1930s Thomson River flood boat and the local fire engine from the 1960s.

Come along Tuesdays to Fridays from April to October, to experience this unique destination or make the most of our vibrant open days, twice a year. Book ahead for informative group tours.

Qantilda Museum

Standards profile

A visit to the Qantilda Museum is the essential Winton experience. Operating since 1972, Qantilda has been a part of the Waltzing Matilda Centre since 1998, until a tragic fire at the centre in June 2015.

It showcases an extensive collection drawn almost exclusively from the Winton region. Visitors can explore:

- The treasure trove of history within Christina MacPherson Cottage
- The lives of some amazing women of the outback
- Tools for working the land in the Machinery Shed and Vehicle Shed
- How Winton rode 'the sheep's back' in the Shearing Shed
- A BB 18 Class Steam Locomotive resting at the original Chorregon Station
- A mini Reading Room in the Railway Carriage
- The air conditioned Sarah Riley theatre, to view a film telling the story of Waltzing Matilda and plans for the future

In the bottle room you will find a bottle for every occasion – drink bottles, perfume bottles, water filtering and ornamental bottles.

The Chorregon Railway display features the BB 18¼ Class Steam Locomotive. Queensland Rail donated this locomotive to the museum. It is situated adjacent to the old Chorregon Railway Siding, which from 1927 until January 1987 was one of the principal sidings situated on the Winton - Longreach Railway Line. The siding was dismantled and moved to the museum in 1994. The carriage, which contains a first and second class compartments, was also donated by Queensland Rail. This carriage and other railway exhibits form part of the display.

Message to new participants

While it involves quite a deal of work, the M&G QLD Standards Review Program offers great benefits to participants in terms of knowledge of your collection and its value to your local community as well as to the community at large. It is also an opportunity for members to realise that as volunteers, they have created displays that rank reasonably well alongside other small museums across the state.

Program outcomes

Significance and relevance

We now have a much better idea of the significance of our collection, both in terms of overall collection and individual items.

Caring for our collection

As a group we received many practical tips and procedures for better conserving and preserving our collection as well as displaying our more fragile objects.

Our knowledge from the Review Program has been invaluable in the treatment of historic artefacts salvaged from the fire. The support received from professionals post-fire has enhanced the skill base of our volunteers.

QANTAS Founders Museum

A visit to the QANTAS Founders Museum takes you back to where a national icon began. The Queensland and Northern Territory Aerial Service originated in outback Queensland in 1920. The Museum commemorates the founders of QANTAS and, centred around the original historic 1922 hangar, tells the story of the only surviving airline in the world to have built its own aircraft. This account of struggle, perseverance and success is truly an Australian story.

The Museum houses quality exhibitions that include historic photographs, objects, memorabilia and inspirational stories. Film clips of QANTAS advertising provide an entertaining insight into the fashion and values of past decades. There are also multimedia displays, interactives and flight simulators. You can see everything from wheel chocks to china cups and models to the real thing.

Take one of the amazing tours of the plane enclosure and be awe inspired as you walk under, through and maybe even on, the wing of a 747. Walking through the 707, use your imagination to picture what it would have been like to be on tour with Michael Jackson in this very aeroplane.

Don't leave without visiting the McGinness Restaurant for tasty eats and the Founders gift store for quality souvenirs.

Message to new participants

We went into this process because we believe in the importance of striving to be the best we can be in all parts of our operation. We learnt we're doing well but we now have access to mentors whose knowledge, experience, enthusiasm and support is making it possible to progress to an even higher level than we'd imagined. Ram Park

Standards profile

Ram Park is an historical complex located in the main street of Blackall, which hosts a number of relocated buildings important to the region including Navena Homestead, Yalleroi Railway Station and the Yalleroi School. Also set in the relaxing surrounds of the complex is the Blackall Visitor Information Centre housed in the historic Blackall Railway Station.

Take a step back in time and visit the Navena Homestead complete with personal objects used by the McLean family during the operation of their extensive property. Relocating buildings is a long established Queensland tradition. In the 1900s the homestead was relocated in four parts from Mount Morgan to Blackall by bullock wagon over a distance of 615 kilometres.

You can also see the Blackall Queensland Ambulance Transport Brigade rail motor, a rare survivor from Queensland Ambulance history. Originally built in 1923 it was used effectively when roads were closed due to flooding.

Displayed at the front of the complex is the Big Ram from whom the complex takes its name. It symbolises the importance of the sheep and wool industry for the development of Blackall and surrounding regions.

A visit to Ram Park is a must when visiting Blackall. It complements other historical attractions including the Black Stump, Jackie Howe Museum and the Blackall Woolscour.

Message to new participants

At first the idea of joining the program was daunting, but the benefits soon became very evident. We have learnt and benefited in so many different areas and the resources and help were always on hand. A most constructive and productive program. Recommended for everyone!

Program outcomes

Collection significance and display

Staff now have a greater understanding of the significance of some of our collection and how to display items to their best advantage.

Organisation and work structure

Adelong Alive Museum

Standards profile

Visitors to Adelong Alive Museum are greeted by unique security screens depicting early Adelong history and inside will find three permanent galleries showing the gold mining era, social and commercial development, and the role of the CWA in the growth of the town since its proclamation in 1858. There is also space for travelling and in-house exhibitions, normally changed every six months.

The permanent collection includes selected objects associated with the main museum themes but concentrates on documentation and photographs to accommodate storage and exhibition space.

A celebration of the museum's first decade included an invitation which listed the major achievements in exhibitions, public programs and funding infrastructure.

The museum is closely associated with the heritage listed Adelong Falls Gold Mills Ruins. One very exciting feature in the museum which attracts visitors of all ages in a scale model of the Reefer processing mill and several items associated with the processing of gold-bearing ore.

Adelong Alive is a volunteer initiated museum founded in 2000 and located in the former Country Women's Association (CWA) rooms in the main street of Adelong.

Its management is by an elected committee with advice from a professional Museum Adviser.

Significant items and themes of the collection include:

- · Restored 1932 Dennis Fire Brigade
- Mountain Maid Cannery
- Australian Women's Land Army
- Batlow's Hydro Electric Power Supply
- Stained Glass Window from the 1826 Scot's Church Sydney.

The Batlow Museum also commemorates the life and achievements of Herbert Velvin Smith OBE. H.V. Smith, as he was known, was a visionary who made things happen.

His name can be associated with:

- The formation of the first cool store in NSW
- The formation of Co-operative Fruit Marketing
- The development of the railway to Batlow to allow market access
- Mountain Maid Fruits
- Birds Eye Fruits
- · Organising the Women's Land Army in Batlow
- Supplying dried vegetables to the allied troops from a cannery in Batlow
- Organising the Lady Wakehurst Hostel for land army girls
- Later turning that Hostel into Batlow Hospital
- Arranging and lobbying for Willigobung soldier settlement blocks
- Lobbying for the abolishment of Compulsory Government Acquisition.

The Museum provides exhibitions for local festivals, dinners and events and recently provided the backdrop for the book launch of local author Sulari Gentill's book Miles off Course.

A major development is about to commence to expand the premises and house the original Batlow Hydro Electric Power Station.

Batlow Museum is operated by Batlow Historical Society in the disused St Andrews Presbyterian Church at 12 Tumbarumba Road Batlow. The Historical Society owns the Church.

Message to new participants

Don't be afraid, only good can come from the Standards Program. At times it seemed daunting, but in the end the help and mentoring received from our Reviewers gave our Society a new lease on life, and inspired us to turn our collection of old objects into a Museum of objects, subjects and significant items.

Program outcomes

Our collection and significant items

The program renewed the enthusiasm of the whole committee. We have started turning our collection of old things and things not so old into a museum collection. The renewed enthusiasm has seen our membership increase by 55%.

Managing the Museum

Standards 2012 has highlighted shortfalls in the way we manage our collection and Society. We see an urgent need to upgrade policies or write policies that did not exist. Working with the reviewers has enabled us to maximise our profile.

Our most significant collection relates to Brookong Station; a nationally important story that illustrates changes in land tenure, land use and the character of rural settlements from when they were first settled in the 1840s through to the 20th Century.

Other collection highlights include WWI and WWII memorabilia, garments made from locally developed Bond Wool, farm machinery, a working Lamson Cash Exchange System and an archive of family and district histories.

We are also home to the Doris Golder Gallery of layered wool art, a unique and fascinating art form consisting of portraits and landscapes constructed in natural coloured fleece wool. Donated to the people of Lockhart by the local artist, this collection has become a focal point for tourists to the area.

The Pioneer Women's Hut

Standards profile

The Pioneer Women's Hut (PWH) is recognised nationally as a unique museum dedicated to preserving rural women's heritage. Professor Donald Horne in The Intelligent Tourist cites the Pioneer Women's Hut as the most innovative small museum in Australia.

The PWH concentrates on collecting the everyday objects that were used in the home, embracing the many stories from the women who made and used these objects. The collections are displayed in themed displays relating to rural domestic history.

The diverse collection ranges from a "Swaggie's" jam tin pincushion to quilts that have crossed the oceans with stories to tell. The make-do-and-mend-ethic is particularly strong including examples such as a truck driver's rug made in the 1960s, a patchwork dressing gown from around 1920, packing case furniture, decorations made from kerosene tins and the rich collection of quilts from all around Australia.

The strength of the quilt collection led to development and launch of the internationally acclaimed National Quilt Register in 1995, and the opening in 2011 of a new Heritage Quilt Museum and it's first exhibition "Gift of Thrift".

Message to new participants

Make the most of every opportunity offered by the reviewers. They understand small museums and the challenges and limitations we face - they are always encouraging, provide sensible solutions and are never disparaging. Museums throughout the state will reach a new, higher and exciting level as a result of Standards.

Program outcomes

Temora Rural Museum

Standards profile

2013 Imagine Awards. Winner, Exhibitions: 1-2 Staff

The Temora Rural Museum is the centrepiece of Temora's vibrant new social heritage precinct, the Bundawarrah Centre.

Set in landscaped grounds, the Museum offers an amazing variety of exhibits and working examples of rural technology that recall the historical experience of living and working in the Temora community.

The many features of the display include a cottage of hardwood slabs that was the first home of Australia's best known cricketer, Sir Donald Bradman, a one room public school, bush church, country dance hall, printing works, flour mill, ambulance station and fire station.

The memorabilia of noted boxing promoter and showman, Jimmy Sharman, a comprehensive working display of sound technology and a fully furnished pioneer cottage complement a gallery dedicated to the impressive rock and mineral display created by Temora businessman, the late Athol Stean.

Decades of collecting and restoration have provided the Museum with an outstanding array of tractors, vehicles, stationary engines and agricultural machinery, much of which is maintained in working order.

A dedicated temporary exhibition space, named for Temora's first European settler, Valentine Lawler, hosts visiting exhibitions and feature displays drawn from the Museum's large collection of clothing and textiles.

Each year on the second Saturday in March the Museum celebrates its anniversary with a packed program of live exhibitions featuring cottage crafts, bush trades, music and vintage machinery demonstrations.

A highlight of the day is the grand parade of classic tractors led by a 1915 Jelbart.

Message to new participants

Standards helped us appreciate the need to identify and address issues we do not manage as well as we can, even with resources we already have. This timely review will have lasting benefit for us as museum managers.

Program outcomes

The focus of Tumut Museum is on our collection of Miles Franklin memorabilia, the Historical Photographic Collection and items of agricultural machinery relating to the Tumut district. We also collect other items of significance to our community.

In the past few years, with grants from the Tumut Community Foundation, we have followed a refurbishment program to update each room in the Museum to improve access to the collection and display areas.

We received a Community Heritage Grant in 2011 for a Significance Assessment of the collection focusing on our Miles Franklin Room. A Heritage Grant from Tumut Shire Council has allowed us to begin to restore an historic Columbus engine which was used in early agriculture.

Recently Tumut Museum launched the Doctors, Nurses & Midwives exhibition and have begun gathering material to publish a book on Tumut – the Early Years.

The Tumut Museum is managed by the members of the Tumut & District Historical Society which was formed in 1964. It is run by a small but dedicated committee of 25 members.

We work closely with the Tumut Shire Council, Tumut Family History Group and Adelong Alive and Batlow Museums. We are supported by Tumut Shire Council and our Museum Advisor, Annette Brown.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program has given us the opportunity to rate our museum practice against national standards. By self assessment and peer review we have gained valuable insights into best practice for community museums. A very worthwhile program.

The Up-to-Date Store and Cultural Precinct, located in the heart of the historic township of Coolamon, is owned by the local Shire Council and managed by a committee of volunteers.

The collections include the:

- Lamson Cash Railway System in the Up-To-Date Store.
- The diary of H.G. Fosse (1886-1960), who landed at Gallipoli on 25th April 1915, in the RSL Museum.
- A John Bull wagon built in 1916 by Bennett Wagons in the Garth Jones Agricultural Exhibition.
- The first garment and a recording of Mavis Furner telling her story in the Mavis Furner Collection of Crochet and Knitted Garments.

Wyalong Museum

Standards profile

The Wyalong Museum is situated in the historic Wyalong Court House. The building, with unique interior and exterior features, was erected in 1900 by renowned architect Walter Liberty Vernon and shows many of his innovative ideas on light and ventilation. The heritage court room with cedar woodwork and holding dock is in its original pristine condition. School children are encouraged to role play in a mock court case to better understand the procedures and legalities of a courtroom.

The Museum features seven rooms with kitchen, dining and bedroom. There are displays of domestic, social and rural objects. Military memorabilia is a key exhibit focusing on local VC winner from World War Two, Corporal Reg Rattery. There are also temporary exhibitions and public programs.

The collection of early wagons, tractor and sulkies are housed in a purpose-built shed on the precinct. The Museum holds extensive archives of the history of the area, including over 2000 photographs of pioneers and early Wyalong streetscapes. Newspapers from 1894 to 2000 are also held at the Museum.

The Mining Room features the town's long association with gold mining including the story of Mr Fred Neeld the founder of gold in 1894, which led to the development of the township.

Message to new participants

We didn't know what we were doing when we first started, however as the Program progressed we began to recognise what we had achieved and what we needed to work on for our Museum to become more professional and successful.

We are aware that this will involve some hard work, however the Reviewers have structured us a program to show us the way and we feel confident of achieving our goal!!

Australian Sugar Cane Railway

Standards profile

At the Australian Sugar Cane Railway, located in Bundaberg's Botanic Gardens, qualified personnel operate restored sugar cane coal fired steam and diesel locomotives hauling cane wagons modified to carry passengers. Accredited with Queensland Transport and registered with Workplace Health and Safety Queensland, their award winning volunteers provide train rides along two kilometres of the narrow gauge track every Sunday, during school holidays and by arrangement.

Skilled members of the Bundaberg Steam Tramway Preservation Society Inc carry out maintenance and restoration of the locomotives largely on site. In 2008 ASCR's four-year restoration of the Invicta won the Association of Tourist and Heritage Rail Australia's Steam Locomotive Restoration Award after members with a myriad of skills contributed in excess of a million dollars worth of labour.

Also operating is the first steam locomotive purchased by Millaquin Sugar Mill to replace horse haulage in 1914, known locally as Germany. Two Bundaberg Foundry built locomotives, No 1 and No 3 complete the steam fleet. A diesel hydraulic locomotive built by E M Baldwin & Sons, Castle Hill, Sydney named Valdora, purchased when Nambour's Moreton Mill closed in 2003, shows the progression of transportation from the field to the mill.

Message to new participants

The meetings with the review committee were well attended by society members most of whom had not been exposed to the ideas of correctly managing a working museum.

Members and management were impressed with the quality of information given to them by M&GSQ reviewers. These discussions certainly changed the doubters in the group and have turned the organisation around in as far as realising the importance of the rolling stock we are preserving.

The society was quite impressed that on review days we were shown items we never had thought of as worthwhile pieces of interest such as old tools that we still use today maintaining the steam locomotives.

We learnt so much from the Standards Program that we would thoroughly recommend it to other museums particularly "Historical Operational Railways".

Program outcomes

Community partnerships

We are involving the regional council with greater understanding of the railways operation and management particularly with regard to interface agreements required for road crossings within the gardens complex.

Disaster planning

Shared responsibilities with the regional council in regards to emergency procedures has been ongoing with good cooperation in the best ways to manage potential disasters.

Standards profile

The Bundaberg and District Historical and Museum Society Inc. collects and preserves the heritage of the Bundaberg region.

The original Museum's collections may have been dispersed in the 1940s but the current Museum keeps memories alive by displaying the heritage associated with Bundaberg's many industries and its social life.

The extensive photographic and archival collections include a wealth of local knowledge from the 1800s to the present day; capturing, amongst other things, people's lives, buildings and events. The archives are available for research and can be accessed by anyone for a small fee.

The collection includes significant objects such as the "World Quilt" sewn in 1933 by Margurite Vuichoud; the unique Lucke Quad's Cyclops designed pram, as well as a magnificent display of birds collected locally and taxidermied by Charles Skyring in the 1870s.

Message to new participants

We enlisted to undertake the Standards Program as a benchmark we wanted to attain for our museum. We were pleasantly surprised to find how much we already had implemented. The Program assisted our members to ensure we were on the correct path to continue improving our museum's practice to preserve our local history.

Program outcomes

The Standards Program gave members the opportunity to look at our displays in a new way. Improvement ideas were discussed and implemented.

Review of our policies and procedures

Eidsvold & District Historical Complex

Standards profile

Eidsvold Station was taken up in 1848 by the Archer brothers, naming it after Eidsvoll, Norway. In 1887 when the goldfields were proclaimed, the bustling gold mining town of over 2000 was named Eidsvold.

Eidsvold Historical Complex is located in country redolent with memories of sheep, cattle and gold mining days from families whose descendants still live in the district. A highlight is their country hospitality which can be organised for booked groups.

On site is the surviving detached kitchen of Knockbreak Homestead – a slab and shingle hut of the Sinclair family from the 1860s. Guthrie Sinclair worked on the Archer brothers' Eidsvold Station as a shepherd. Paid in sheep, he tendered for a run and moved his family and flocks to Knockbreak, named after his district in Scotland. Other buildings relocated to the complex include the old station buildings of Clonave, the Calrossie store and meat shop and the Riverleigh Railway Fettlers' Cottage.

Amongst the displays in Riverleigh, is the Iris Bancroft Soldiers Corner: a collection of the photographs and memorabilia of the local men and women who served for Australia from the Boer to the Vietnam Wars.

Two extensive collections held in trust in the complex are the George Schafer collection of geological specimens assembled by this local bushman over 50 years and the Schultz/Duncan collection of bottles and tools from rural Queensland post 1880s.

Message to new participants

We started the Program unaware of the massive workload in a year already committed to celebrate 125 years of our goldfields. We realise we have to do more planning, highlight the history of more objects and have prominent signage for our visitors. M&GSQ staff have assisted us with working through the Program. In the long term, as we implement applicable ideas, our museum complex will reap the benefits.

Program outcomes

It is important to identify significant items within our collection and to display the known history with the objects.

Participation in the Standards Program reinforced the need for the museum to have more involvement from Council and the community and to have up-to-date policies guiding the volunteers.

Hervey Bay Regional Gallery

Standards profile

Hervey Bay Regional Gallery was established in 1997 and is a cultural initiative of the Fraser Coast Regional Council. As of December 2012, the gallery operates from a new purpose-built venue, the Fraser Coast Cultural Centre, adjoining a Discovery Sphere. This signature development will set a new standard of activity for the gallery. As the major Category A regional gallery in this area, exhibitions include touring shows from major galleries and museums throughout Australia, and unique state and regional exhibits.

HBRG also provides a professional platform for local artists, creative groups and organisations. Programs include: official opening events and floor talks; ArtChat professional development presentations by visiting artists; children's programs including Mudskippers Art Adventure sessions and Pipis early childhood sessions once a month. The volunteers program involves up to 60 volunteers in reception duties, installation and catering. They also hold up to four bus trips a year to other galleries and cultural events.

The gallery currently has two major business sponsors, one of which supports the Senior Student Art Bursary program initiated by the gallery in 2011. Another highlight is a cultural exchange program of exhibitions and artists visits with sister cities in China and Japan. The Gallery Shop features beautifully created objects by mostly local artists, while the gallery reference library provides art books and periodicals for the community to peruse or borrow. Other community services include lists of art classes, available tutors and Queensland art valuers.

Message to new participants

If you choose to undertake the program we're sure you will find it a very interesting and in-depth process, providing you a plethora of resources to enhance activities and practices at your gallery/museum. Yes, it is a huge commitment, but a very valuable and educative process well supported by M&GSQ staff and their excellent reviewers.

Program outcomes

Highlighting strengths and weaknesses

In working through the Standards program, Hervey Bay Regional Gallery received well deserved acknowledgement of the excellent programs presented, while helping to clarify what areas of museum practice needed some attention, particularly as we move into a new venue.

Working with industry peers

Working with the peer reviewers was an invaluable experience and provided much-needed clarity on areas to focus on as we move into a new venue. It gave us the chance to see things with fresh eyes.

Hinkler Hall of Aviation

Standards profile

Hinkler Hall of Aviation is a nationally significant tourist attraction and aviation adventure experience. More than a museum, the Hinkler Hall of Aviation celebrates the pioneer solo aviator Bert Hinkler and the wonders of innovation, spirit and adventure.

Step inside a soaring exhibition hall featuring interactive exhibits, flight simulator, the Globe Theatre and five full-sized replica aircraft. Climb into the Avro Baby bi-plane replica and email a photo of yourself as a flying ace to your family and friends. Engage with the detailed and rich history of Bert Hinkler and see the world through his personal effects, and documents and letters of the time. The powerful archival footage and historic photos bring the story to life.

Brick by brick, Bert's English home, Mon Repos, was moved to Bundaberg from Southampton in 1983 by Hinkler House Memorial Museum and Research Association. Named after Mon Repos beach near Bundaberg, the location of his early aviation experiments, the house links Bert Hinkler's professional endeavours with his personal life.

Hinkler Hall of Aviation and Mon Repos are set in the tropical surrounds of the Bundaberg Botanic Gardens. Visit Café 1928 where you can overlook the lake and lawns. Also home to the Bundaberg Historical Museum, Fairymead House and the Australian Sugar Cane Railway, the Botanic Gardens are a wonderful destination encompassing a broad history of Bundaberg.

Message to new participants

The Hinkler Hall of Aviation has been enriched by participating in the self-review assessment. At the beginning we did not understand we were taking on such an enormous task but, we have been overwhelmed by the facilitators networking support and advice throughout the program. It has been a great experience.

Program outcomes

Collection significance and preservation

Our collection about local hero pioneer solo aviator Bert Hinkler is of national significance and we would like to showcase some of our original artefacts in changing temporary displays for the enjoyment of our community and international and Australian visitors.

Monto Historical and Cultural Complex

Standards profile

The Monto Historical and Cultural Complex is a well-presented facility, with a pleasant garden frontage located on one of the main thoroughfares into Monto. The overall aim is to preserve and present the culture, heritage and history of the Monto district and its people. The complex includes a museum and art gallery housed in a modern, air-conditioned building. Half of the internal space is dedicated to changing cultural displays of photography, textiles, art and craft from local artists and societies. Historical displays, exhibits and photographs are located in the other half of the building.

The historical collection extends beyond the main building into the grounds of the complex. A group of pioneer buildings include a Cania goldfields slab hut and the Goody family's Birnam Homestead kitchen, which dates from around 1910. The slab hut and Birnam Homestead kitchen are original buildings relocated from surrounding rural properties. There's a lot to see including an unusual timber jack honed from one log, an early railway carriage with historical railway memorabilia and the Cynthia station siding. Also featured is a remarkable array of horse-drawn vehicle replicas, built by Harold Ware, and a wheelwright's workshop where visitors can watch demonstrations by Harold, an enthusiastic and highly skilled member of the Monto Historical Society.

The modern building with its cultural, art and craft displays, the historical collection, the original pioneer structures, Harold's demonstrations and picnic possibilities in the museum's grounds offer the visitor a fulfilling experience to remember.

Program outcomes

We have learnt so much through the review process that we would recommend it to anyone who is trying to run a museum or gallery. Everyone has been so helpful, so easy to talk to and so full of knowledge. Every single activity has held something of interest.

From being completely lost at the very beginning and wondering if it was really for us, we have been converted to eager volunteers ready to take on the enormous tasks ahead of us and feeling like we have direction and an understanding of where we want to be and how to get there. We know where we can access help when we need it. We are no longer alone but part of a whole network of helpful like minded people.

Mount Perry Museum

Standards profile

Coffins, Min Min lights, corrugated iron rollers, operating tables, electric washing machines, stamper batteries. Florence Broadhurst, Lieutenant Perry, failed railway lines, corporate scandal, colonial copper, gold and settlers. All this and more at Mt Perry Museum.

Situated in the original 1880s Mt Perry Shire Council Chambers, the Mt Perry Museum houses a collection of heritage objects specific to Mt Perry and the surrounding districts. Mining is an important part of that heritage and our collection features historic and operational mining equipment from across a district where mining heritage is all around, including remnants from the earliest days of the copper mines in the 1860s.

Mining brought new settlers who developed a range of businesses to service the community including an astounding 25 pubs at one time or another, cordial factories, dressmakers, butchers and haberdashers. Elements from some of these businesses can be found on display in the museum. People came from everywhere, from countries across the world and our embroidery collection reflects this wonderful diversity. A scary collection of historic hospital equipment from the renowned Mt Perry Hospital is also on display.

The township of Mt Perry has a diverse collection of original buildings and within the grounds of the museum stands Madsen's kitchen, an original slab structure from nearby Drummers Creek which has been restored. The evocative interior depicts the kitchen as it was when it was used in the 1860s, with domestic objects from across the life of the building.

The Mt Perry Heritage Walk brochure guides visitors along the streets of Mt Perry and identifies where early buildings were once located and the histories of some of these buildings are supported by objects within the museum.

The museum boasts a working stamper battery, curvilinear table and blacksmith's forge, all of which can be seen in operation by prior arrangement. Come and see our wonderful local collection with connections to every part of Mt Perry and districts' past.

Message to new participants

When we attended the first session we thought that this is way too big a job for our small museum. It appeared to be a very daunting project to an extremely small committee that has been running the museum with limited resources. However we found the M&GSQ staff and reviewers enthusiastic to help us with simple and achievable advice and processes that suit our small museum. It also made us aware of what processes we need to put in place to not only be more sustainable in the future but also to conserve Mt Perry's heritage.

Program outcomes

Strategic direction

The program has confirmed our future direction, given us a focus on what is Mt Perry's heritage story, and given us a great knowledge base in museum operations.

Museum operations

For a small museum it was great to be told that some things we are doing are right, and it was great to be shown achievable ways to do other things better.

The Old Pharmacy

Standards profile

The bustling town of Childers in the North Burnett was first opened up to timber-getting during the 1850s and 1860s. As the township developed, it drew Thomas Gaydon, who opened the chemist shop in the town in 1894. Gaydon was Childers' first chemist, dentist, optician, vet and photographer.

A devastating fire in 1902 destroyed much of the central business district including Gaydon's chemist shop. It was rebuilt later that year and the internal shop fittings were made of local cedar and highly polished. Laid without grout, the decorative tiled floor remains intact today and is a reminder of the beauty added to early commercial premises.

Change was slow in Childers and modernisation kept to a minimum. However, Gaydon continued to improve his business and installed a new National Cash Register, which he purchased for sixty pounds. It cost the same as a three-bedroomed house in Childers at that time.

After Thomas Gaydon's death in 1935, the chemist shop continued to dispense medications until 1982 when the last chemist died suddenly. His wife continued to trade in soaps, perfumes and gift lines leaving the dispensary closed with its contents untouched. She continued trading until 1987 when she retired and sold the intact collection to the local council, who quickly identified its historical importance to the region.

Located in the centre of historic Childers, the chemist shop now operates as a museum named The Old Pharmacy. It houses an enormous collection left over from Thomas Gaydon and is one of only two intact early chemist shops in Australia. Visitors to the Old Pharmacy can now view the mysterious potions and early handmade medications from 1894 and changes in pharmaceutical practices up to 1982. The internal original fixtures and the beautiful mosaic tiled floor offer a visual escapade into an earlier time. Combined with the guided tour, which presents the history of the shop and dispensary in an interesting and engaging manner, the demonstrations, including pill-rolling and label-making, complete a comprehensive and educational visitor experience.

Message to new participants

We are so pleased to have been involved with this valuable program. A bit daunting at first, but with the help of Museums and Galleries Staff and professional reviewers, we devised a step by step program to follow, which will stand The Old Pharmacy in good stead into the future. If you have the opportunity to become involved - grab it with both hands.

Program outcomes

Collection Management

Being involved with the review of The Old Pharmacy made us aware of the importance of keeping accurate records of all items in our collection. Steps have been put in place to achieve this outcome.

Collection Significance

We really benefitted from the calibre of Reviewers who undertook The Old Pharmacy review and having them confirm what we believed, that our collection is very rare and every effort should be made to retain it for generations to come.

Portside Centre

Standards profile

The Portside Centre reveals the history of the Port of Maryborough and how the City developed around the Port. It is a complex of 3 heritage-listed buildings: Customs House, Customs Sub-Collectors Residence and Bond Store. Located in an enviable area of Maryborough renowned for its wonderful heritage buildings, the Centre is a gateway experience for visitors to the city and further afield into the region.

Maryborough Customs House is an attraction within the Portside Centre. The Customs House delves into Maryborough's eclectic and rich history. Visitors can learn about immigrants who had braved a long sea voyage into the unknown, the city as a place for innovation and national influence in heavy industry, and the birthplace of an internationally loved author.

Next door to the Customs House is the Bond Store Museum. This facility explores a complimentary and distinct history of Maryborough, focusing on the operations of Maryborough as a port. The MV Ella is an important—and large!—part of the experience as a boat that was built and operated for its whole working life out of the Port.

At its location adjacent to Queens Park and the Mary River, the Portside Centre gives visitors the opportunity to discover the significance of the Port and the customs revenues to the growing city.

Message to new participants

The program is a great opportunity to network. I had a chance to bounce ideas off other museum professionals and it renewed my enthusiasm for Council's museums.

Program outcomes

The Standards Review Program enabled me to refocus on Council's museums.

Bega Pioneers' Museum

Standards profile

Located in a historic hotel built in 1858 the building sets the ambiance of the Museum. As you step through the door, you feel as if you are stepping back in time. The extensive pioneer portrait collection hanging on the walls creates the feeling of days gone by.

With its extensive and varied collection, Bega Pioneers' Museum is a place of discovery. It contains many items of interest and of historical significance.

The Museum has a good collection of war memorabilia, the most significant of which are two flags – one which flew at Gallipoli where a number of local boys were serving. The other flag is from Tobruk and signed by over 200 Tobruk garrison soldiers, 11 of whom were local.

There are numerous rooms to explore in the Museum showcasing the history of early settlement of the Bega valley and surrounds. One room is a beautiful display of textiles and garments.

The grounds surrounding the building hold further treasures. One being the Trad wagon - Bega's first horse drawn ambulance which then became a mobile shop by a Syrian hawker named Trad. When being cleaned after being donated to the museum, 100 ten pound notes were found behind the panelling. The Museum's collection also includes a large wooden wagon believed to be brought to Australia by German settlers in the middle of the 1800s.

The Museum has digitised its extensive photographic collection and has recently reviewed their collection and is transferring the data to the MOSAiC Collection database.

The Bega Pioneers' Museum is managed by the Bega Historical Society. A small number of volunteers carry out the day to day running and the management and preservation of the collection.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program has given us a great opportunity to look at all aspects of our museum with fresh eyes. The suggestions made by our very helpful reviewers were greatly appreciated, especially with regard to displaying our collection to its fullest advantage. Being involved in the Standards Program is without a doubt the best thing that has happened to us, it has given us encouragement and direction and a host of valuable ideas which will enable us to go into the future with a new vigour and enthusiasm, and knowledge that we would not have had if we had not participated.

Bermagui Museum

Standards profile

Discover the past history of Bermagui at the Bermagui Museum located in the Information Centre. The Museum is the proud owner of approximately 5,000 digitised photographs and documents relating to the life, work and families of the Bermagui district. Step back in time and see through the photographs what life in the town was like, the importance of fishing to the community, what life was like on the goldfields and in the local timber industry and the ships that stopped at its port. The photographs can be searched on a database by topic or name.

The Museum also displays some intriguing artefacts including an Elizabethan whipping stool (c. 1870) believed to be used at the Montreal Goldfields. Also on display is the recently restored sulky from the early 1900s that belonged to local icon Sam Sinclair. Sam owned and operated the general store and amongst his professions was town's blacksmith, dentist and undertaker.

The Museum has produced books on local history which are for sale along with a walking tour and a driving tour of the area. Copies of the old local photographs are for sale along with calendars using archival photos to depict life in Bermagui during earlier times.

To involve the community the Museum runs film nights for visitors, as well as hosting evenings with a traditional authentic Aussie hot meal

The Museum is owned and operated by Bermagui Historical Society and is opened by volunteers.

Message to new participants

Don't be scared or put off in the beginning!!! We were for a while and didn't think it was relevant to our Museum. It's a lot of work but worth it in the end. Try it and you will see.

The Corrective Services NSW (CSNSW) Museum at Cooma prides itself in being a link between its staff, inmates, and the community at large. By interacting with the community, the Museum aims to preserve and present the history of Corrective Services in New South Wales. The Museum strives to provide an inviting, educational and welcoming environment for its visitors.

The Museum holds a significant collection of Corrective Services NSW artefacts, participates in community events and sets up displays at various locations. The management of heritage assets and all things related to the organisation remains the focal point. Apart from having a display unit for its valuable collection, the Museum also has a repository unit where all valuable historical items and artefacts are stored.

Visitors to the Museum are provided with a learning experience on the past and present history of Corrective Services NSW. The Museum also has displays of a variety of inmate crafts, a large photographic collection, textiles, and a significant range of quality historical publications dealing with the correctional history from the transportation period to date. Objects on display include timber items, decorative ornaments, contraband items, plaques, machinery, Aboriginal and landscape paintings, as well as leather crafts and ceramics.

Inmates are involved in a coordinated manner in the collection, inventory, restoration, identification and storage of heritage items. They also serve as tour guides to visitors.

Eden Killer Whale Museum

The Eden Killer Whale Museum has consistently developed over its 80 year history. Their "raison d'etre" and main attraction is the skeleton of the killer whale "Tom". The story is told of the cooperation between the orcas and the whalers in the local Twofold Bay. In season, whales can be seen from the museum balcony. Other stories told include the local importance of Morse code, local fishing and local timber gathering. Touring exhibitions from metropolitan museums are regularly featured.

The Museum's collection comprises many thousands of items with the most significant being from local shore based whaling, coastal shipping and local timber and fishing industries including indigenous history, reflected in the themes of the exhibitions. The collection was recently assessed as having national significance and a large percentage is recorded digitally. The Museum's library boasts a comprehensive collection of maritime/local history books and has information on locally significant families.

The Museum is an integral part of the local community and is involved with organising Australia Day activities, book launches, community art and craft exhibitions and even has a siren to announce to the locals when the whales are in the bay.

The Museum is a publicly owned, self-funding, not for profit facility managed by a small and enthusiastic voluntary committee. The volunteer Friends of the Museum assist by guiding, researching, catering and gardening along with exhibition development.

Moruya & District Historical Society Museum

Standards profile

The Moruya Museum, based in a pioneer house, displays a wealth of memorabilia of the everyday life of the town's local population and their occupations from earliest pioneering days until the mid-twentieth century.

The geographical breadth of the collection ranges across original cheese moulds for the famous Bodalla Estate 40lb cheeses to relics from the goldfields of Araluen.

The collection also reflects Moruya's most famous export, 'Moruya Granite', used for many prominent monuments in Sydney, including pylons for the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

The Moruya and District Historical Society (founded in 1970) is a non-profit organisation run by dedicated volunteers.

Located on the site of a heritage listed two-storey brick home built by pioneers in 1875, the Society has almost completed a microfiche record of the Moruya Examiner from 1881 to the present, and has archived many other maps, documents and photos of the area, as well as publishing an extensive pioneer directory and other local history works.

The Society's genealogy section provides Eurobodalla Shire's only specialised facility for family history research.

Message to new participants

We found the Museum Standards Program a comprehensive and informative program that inspired reinvigoration of our Museum's presentation.

The program enabled us to work systematically, using the mechanisms of updated museum management, to reinvigorate our approach to our collection, develop a clearer focus on what needed improvement, and plan how best to achieve desired changes given our circumstances.

The Old Courthouse Museum

Standards profile

Though he didn't actually land, Lt James Cook appreciated a good Bay when he saw one, named it Bateman after a colleague, and sailed on. The Walbunga peoples remained in peace until 1821 when Lt Robert Johnston discovered the Bay to be the estuary of a fine river, which he called the Clyde. Imagine the wow factor on recently discovering we not only hold Johnston's maritime trunk – but his great great granddaughter works three doors away.

Our collection focuses on local and social history, providing a key resource for our community. Housed in the town's former courthouse and police residence, we are located adjacent to the town's Water Gardens. Collection themes include, costume, education, healthcare, domestic life, forestry and timber tales, Men's Tool Shed, crime and punishment. We maintain a keeping place for our local Aboriginal Land Council. 2013-14 will focus on documenting the Clyde oyster industry and extensive cataloguing in MOSAiC.

As forestry and fishing fade, tourism and retirement service industries become major economic forces. We are the storehouse of our community's history, so encourage school visits, have an outreach programme to community groups, and support heritage events throughout the year.

The Museum is operated by Clyde River and Batemans Bay Historical Society Inc.

Message to new participants

The program initially required more paperwork than most of our team had seen since school days! But the end result has been the establishment of a benchmark for our ambitions against which we can proudly match our recent achievements, and develop strategic plans to ensure a viable future for this key community resource.

Program outcomes

The program forced a review of policies and revealed member skills in project management. It demonstrated the value of volunteer training and encouraged more be undertaken.

Finally, it provided an objective 'pat on the back' for work achieved by our members, which can be overlooked in the hurly burly of daily operations.

Old School Museum

Standards profile

The Old School Museum is located in a beautifully restored heritage listed stone building dating from 1873 that is unique as it is one of the few surviving school buildings in which the school master's cottage is attached to the class room.

Collections on display consist of objects and photographs that tell the stories of Merimbula. It is unique as it was developed as a private town based around the "Maizena" to grind fine cornflower developed by Matthew Munn. The story of the Munns is told at the Museum. Other industries of importance were grazing, dairying, gold mining, oyster fishing and forestry.

A key feature is the importance of Merimbula as a port and the history of the steamship that travelled down the coast from Sydney.

Items of interest in the collection include an 1857 ambrotype of the mutineers from the American ship "Junior", a writing desk owned by Sym Covington, who sailed on the "Beagle" with Darwin and subsequently lived in Pambula, and a day dress from the 1860s, of which few examples remain today.

Members of the Merimbula-Imlay Historical Society have managed the Museum from the mid 1970s and mount annual displays to celebrate Heritage Festival and History Week.

To connect to the community the Museum mounts historical displays from various groups in the community through a display cabinet at the local RSL. It also collects local histories, and collects these in a research archive.

Queanbeyan Museum's mission is to express the sense of history, place and identity in the Queanbeyan region. It does this by operating a museum, developing a collection and promoting historical activities that are interesting, educational and relevant to both residents and visitors.

The Museum has a strong focus on the history of Queanbeyan and surrounding district, with a collection of over 5,000 items that includes furniture, textiles, technological objects, costumes, pictures, maps, objects, and photographs. There is an active program of changing exhibitions with regular opening hours and events. A series of exhibitions to tell Queanbeyan's Story has been developed: The Ngambri and Early Settlers, Bushrangers, and From Settlement to Town.

Queanbeyan Museums' treasures include William Farrer's piano, JJ Wright's Store Journals from 1860 and Mick Jagger's armour from the film Ned Kelly.

Recent achievements are the construction and fit out of a collection store and renovations to the Museum building.

The Queanbeyan Museum was established in 1969 by the Queanbeyan and District Historical Museum Society and is located in the historic Police Sergeant's Residence, 10 Farrer Place, Queanbeyan, constructed in 1876. The Museum is managed and operated by QDHMS members, in partnership with the Queanbeyan City Council.

Queanbeyan Printing Museum

Standards profile

'Preserving the Past for Future Generations'. The Queanbeyan Printing Museum is understood to be one of the few museums in New South Wales with fully operating printing machines. It was officially opened on 23 October 2004 and generous support comes from the Queanbeyan City Council.

The Queanbeyan Printing Museum displays letterpress printing technology spanning over 100 years and traces the history of Queanbeyan's first newspaper.

First published as "The Golden Age" on 15 September 1860, the paper was renamed "The Queanbeyan Age" in 1864, and has been published continuously for 150 years.

Important pieces of printing equipment on display are the Linotype machine, the Wharfedale flat-bed press and the Chandler & Price platen press.

The Alexandra Hand Printing Press is similar to that used to print the first edition of "The Golden Age". Built in 1887, this printing press was badly damaged in 1890. Kept in storage, the Alexandra press was donated "as is" to the Museum in 2009 and fully restored to working order by volunteers.

The Museum has established a background of expertise in the restoration of printing equipment.

The authentically outfitted photographic darkroom highlights the importance of photo-journalism in the production of newspapers.

A library of printing industry publications has been established, which together with the printing "hardware", provide the facilities for research into printing industry history.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program provided the framework for documenting the collection and operation of the Queanbeyan Printing Museum. Analysis of this documentation by our Reviewers (Ellie McFadyen and Sam Malloy) is greatly appreciated as we now have a clearer direction for the future.

Snowy Scheme Museum Adaminaby

Standards profile

The building of the Snowy Mountains Hydro-Electric Scheme was a pivotal event in Australia's history. Whilst creating one of the engineering wonders of the modern world, it also laid the foundations of a uniquely multicultural nation. The Scheme allowed the development of Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area, and generated clean renewable electricity for the eastern states, along with giving migrants from a devastated Europe a fresh start.

The Snowy Scheme Museum Adaminaby is the first comprehensive attempt to pay tribute to this truly awe-inspiring project and to tell its stories. We aim to do this through exhibits ranging from equipment like the Le Torneau Scraper and a TD 24 Bulldozer, a fully restored "Utah" Ute, Tunnel Train, "Surveyors Camp" through to laboratory testing equipment and a Surveyor's tent camp to memorabilia, photographs and the Commissioners private collection.

At the official opening on 15 October 2011, the Governor-General Quentin Bryce paid tribute to the 10 year commitment to build and open the museum and was genuinely engaged by the history on display and the warmth of the old snowy workers and locals who were part of the opening ceremony.

The Adaminaby Snowy Scheme Collection Association is an incorporated body with tax-deductible gift recipient status. The Committee and sub-committee members are all volunteers.

The Museum is located on the Snowy Mountains Highway in the township of Adaminaby in the NSW Snowy Mountains.

The Thredbo Ski Museum displays a wide collection of historic items covering areas such as significant dates, geography, alpine pioneers, personalities, skis and alpine equipment, photos, clothing and fashion, films and books. It also has an expansive research library including a comprehensive set of Ski Year books.

In addition to the permanent displays of the above items, the Museum features changing exhibitions depicting the rich history of the development and progress of Australian alpine history, Thredbo Village and the NSW Alpine regions generally.

Museum features include an early Kiandra ski, an Australian 1976 Winter Olympic uniform designed by Prue Acton and Laurie Seaman's camera from his ill-fated trip to Mt Kosciuzsko.

The Thredbo Ski Museum is operated by volunteers of the not for profit Thredbo Historical Society. It is centrally located in the Thredbo Village square and easily accessible by resort holiday makers, day tourists and bus groups.

The Society conducts annual social events with a historical theme in Thredbo and at RAHS History House in Sydney, for members and the public.

Message to new participants

By participating in the comprehensive program, we gained valuable information on museum management. The experienced reviewers were very helpful especially in the areas of conservation and presentation. Atherton Chinatown

Standards profile

The National Trust property, Atherton Chinatown, incorporates an interpretive centre and the Hou Wang Temple. The museum is located in the old Atherton Post Office building.

The exhibitions orient visitors to the Atherton Chinatown site. Information panels, images, objects and interactive displays give the visitors relevant historical insight into Chinese culture and adaptations to day to day life in far north Queensland. Important temple objects including the official temple seal are also on display.

The Hou Wang temple is the only remaining Chinatown building. It is also the only original timber and iron Chinese Temple in Australia and New Zealand. Guided tours of the temple are a highlight of a visit to Atherton Chinatown, however visitors are also able to stroll the grounds and gardens as part of a self guided tour following the interpretive signs at their own pace.

Message to new participants

Nothing is gained without effort. The Standards Program will allow a comprehensive view and pin point those areas of museum management which need to be improved. It will also provide the means or examples of answers to these problems so that future pathways are planned, accountable and progressive.

Program outcomes

The Standards Program provided access to a more comprehensive and accountable approach to collection management. A more succinct focus on exhibition and display development and future acquisitions has resulted.

Current organisational structures were reinforced but also extended to include a broader more efficient volunteer policy which clearly defines the expectations, roles and responsibilities and obligations of both volunteer and host organisation.

Cooktown History Centre

Standards profile

The Cooktown History Centre resides in the former Shire Offices in Charlotte Street. Built in 1876 as the first Post and Telegraph Office in Cooktown, it is the oldest surviving building in Charlotte Street.

The Centre is the location for a number of functions and facilities of the Cooktown and District Historical Society (CDHS): Cooktown through the years: A comprehensive display details the history of Cooktown's establishment; archives and research facility; storage for original materials; a library of publications about Cooktown and District; staff office and facilities; local publications and souvenirs for sale.

The archive and research centre is the key function of the CDHS. It stores originals and copies of images and documents pertaining to Cooktown and Palmer River history, dating from 1874. All information continues to be entered into databases for ease of searching. To date, there are about 50 tables with over 60,000 names. CDHS offers research assistance for anyone enquiring about family history and also local history.

The display is a more recent addition to the function of the CDHS. The current exhibition is a product of all of the research by the CDHS into Cooktown's events, natural disasters, people, local Indigenous history and involvement in the First and Second World Wars, using over 600 images. A diorama of Cooktown in 1874 brings together a collection of 14 images of Cooktown's beginning, gathered from a number of Australian libraries for the very first time.

A dedicated team of 14 volunteers undertakes the work of the Centre, including the management.

Message to new participants

The Cooktown Historical Society was quite sure that the Standards Program would not be relevant to our small organisation. But all volunteers have benefited from the program with knowledge gained and networks established. Take the challenge it will be worth it.

Program outcomes

There has been reinforcement of the structure and plans of the Centre. The knowledge base of the volunteers has been enhanced so that future decisions are better informed.

Herberton Mining Museum

Standards profile

Herberton Mining Museum is located on the historic Great Northern Mine site where a tin-rush took place in 1880. Within a year over 150 mines were being worked and Herberton became the first town on the Tablelands. The site is recognised for the rarity and intactness of the surviving steam haulage machinery, which surpasses any other mining place in Queensland.

The Great Northern Mine has a significant place in Queensland's mining history for its central role in the development of the mining industry on the Atherton Tableland and the development of Cairns as a major port in far north Queensland.

The Museum explains how tin mining developed in Herberton via an interpretive mine walk through the adjacent bush and a diverse collection of mining objects in its displays. The Museum's collections illustrate Herberton's mining history from the 1880s when tin ore was discovered and the 'tin rush' started, until commercial operations ceased in the 1960s. Both alluvial and hard rock tin mining are displayed and interpreted for visitors. The Minerals room houses several collections of minerals, rocks, precious metals and gemstones. A unique rock collection of tin ore specimens has recently been installed. This is a geologist's collection which contains cassiterite samples in many forms from all over the world.

Hands-on activities are located in the outdoor courtyard, where visitors and school groups can try their hand at rock drilling (by hammer and chisel) and tin panning.

Although its primary focus is tin mining, the Museum also includes displays on supporting industries, such as timber and transport, as well as Herberton social history - which reflects the continued support and interest in heritage values in the local community and their desire to see their heritage preserved for the benefit of future generations. A local archives area is available for more in-depth research.

Outside the Museum building, in addition to the impressive GNM archaeological remains, visitors can also enjoy the Gordon Gardens which feature a Tom Risley sculpture, a miner's cottage garden, a botanical walk, explorers' memorial plaques and the Women's Seat- a traditional lookout point across the picturesque, historic and hilly town of Herberton.

Message to new participants

We enrolled in the M&GSQ Standards Program keen to learn where we could make improvements. Our anticipations were rewarded with a wealth of information and advice. The trainers helped us focus on the collection themes; visitor participation; the values of the heritage listed site and the importance of interpreting our collection as integral to the site. The program provides excellent value for your effort.

Program outcomes

We now realise that the heritage listed site with its mining equipment and cultural landscape is the most valuable asset. The museums collection complements and interprets the site.

Our museum is not just a collection of facts and objects, but it is about interpreting them by telling stories of history and people in various ways.

James Cook Museum

Standards profile

Housed in a stunning 19th Century convent building, the James Cook Museum in Cooktown showcases the fascinating history of this remarkable town. The museum follows the story of Captain James Cook's enforced seven week stay at the Endeavour River, during which the first meaningful contact between Europeans and Indigenous Australians took place, to the days of the Palmer River gold rush, as well as personal stories from Cooktown's early residents.

The museum's exhibits are rich and varied. The Endeavour Gallery gives a fascinating insight into the time Cook and his crew spent at the site of modern Cooktown repairing their ship after their catastrophic grounding on nearby Endeavour Reef. The highlight of the gallery is the original anchor and cannon from the Endeavour, jettisoned from the ship in 1770 and only retrieved from the reef in the early 1970s. The Endeavour Gallery not only explores the fight for survival Cook and his men faced on the reef, but also documents the many discoveries made by the scientific team during their stay at the Endeavour River. Integral to Australian history and identity is the interaction between Cook and the local Guugu Yimithiir people – the most extensive he experienced in Australia – and this story is told from both perspectives.

Other galleries explore the changing face of Cooktown. The galleries on the first floor – former classrooms and the school hall – house objects from pupils and sisters who called the convent home, tales from the Palmer gold rush and a display dedicated to the rich Chinese heritage of the region. The Nun's cells and student's dormitories on the upper floor are home to exhibits detailing the strong maritime history of Cooktown and the personal stories and objects from local families who endured hardship, loneliness and isolation but who nevertheless carved out a life in this remote location. The Indigenous Gallery gives a unique insight into the culture and history of the Guugu Yimithiir people.

The museum is surrounded by the Sir Joseph Banks Garden, in which can be found some of the 170 species Banks identified and named in the region in 1770.

Message to new participants

The opportunity to take part in the Standards Program not only gives access to expert advice and assistance, but also enables participation in a wider cultural heritage network. For small or regional and remote museums, this is invaluable.

Program outcomes

A significant outcome for us has been access to funding to target areas raised during the review process. This has enabled us to purchase environmental monitoring equipment (data loggers and light/UV meters) to more effectively monitor the environmental conditions in our display and storage spaces. Already this is yielding significant data which will inform exhibition planning and impact long term on the management of the collection.

Mareeba Heritage Centre

Standards profile

Mareeba Heritage Centre is a vibrant museum and visitor information centre established in 1995 and well supported by its diverse multicultural community. Its collection of over 5,000 items owned, used and proudly donated by members of the community form the basis of its comprehensive and ingenious displays reflecting the heritage and culture of Mareeba and its district.

Mareeba Heritage Centre is the custodian of Australia's best tobacco industry collection. Mareeba-Dimbulah was the centre of tobacco growing in Australia. A new display tells this powerful story of hard work, ingenuity and entrepreneurial spirit. Anonymous donations of homemade tobacco 'chop-chop' and the farmers locally invented machine, used to chop tobacco for home use and in some cases for the black market, capture the reality of local experiences of cat and mouse with authority.

Another rare item of state significance is the Mareeba Hospital Board's Rail Ambulance, which continued to operate until the 1970s. Of the 29 operating in Qld, it is a surviving example all the more significant because of its original condition.

The Museum presents a timeline of their district through their Heritage Walkway including Aboriginal artefacts, early explorers and settlers, early 20th century school room, the railway, mining, tobacco, timber, WWI, Elegant Living between the Wars, the Mareeba Rodeo and Mareeba Hospital Board's Rail Ambulance. Also included are the early 20th century local businesses such as Fenwick's Blacksmith, Sherning's Saddlers, Kelly Peters Butchery, the Carriers Arms Hotel, J C Jacobsen Watchmakers, the Jack & Newell General Merchants and other local Mareeba businesses.

Message to new participants

At the beginning of this program the ground work seemed daunting but we persevered and found it well worthwhile. We obtained a better understanding of our organisation and therefore we were in a better position to identify our key strategic objectives for our management plan.

Program outcomes

Refocusing our museum on its key strategic objectives and guidelines to formulate a 'Strategic Management Plan' for the next three years.

The Standards Program has given us guidance with regard to our museum policies and procedures, which will be reviewed and included within our 'Strategic Management Plan'.

Message to new participants



Nature's Powerhouse

Nature's Powerhouse is an innovative building located in the beautiful, heritage listed Cooktown Botanic Gardens and includes the Cooktown and Cape York Peninsula Visitor Information Centre, Vera's café, a gift shop, Charles Tanner Gallery and the Vera Scarth-Johnson Gallery.

The Cooktown and Cape York Peninsula Visitor Information Centre is the most northerly accredited visitor information centre on the east coast and provides comprehensive visitor information 7 days a week.

The Vera Scarth-Johnson Gallery displays the only collection of original botanical illustrations of flora from the region. Many plants can be found in the adjoining Botanic Gardens.

The Charles Tanner Wildlife of Cooktown Display offers visitors a close look at some of Cape York Peninsula's more notorious reptiles along with specimens of birds and butterflies.

Nature's Powerhouse also hosts a wide range of community events and activities including concerts, nature presentations, educational programs and walking trails and tours in the Botanic Gardens.

Message to new participants

A rather unwieldy discussion overseen by M&GSQ and Standards Reviewers early in the program initially highlighted the many problems involved in better promoting and utilising the wonderful facilities and displays which make up Nature's Powerhouse.

The major underlying factors were how to operate at a financially sustainable level and to better promote the strengths of the facility. The Standards Program has assisted greatly in focusing our planning and has built confidence to embark on implementation of new directions.

Program outcomes

The program has brought together all stakeholders in Nature's Powerhouse to determine the identity and form a shared vision for the future direction of the facility.

A review of the use of space within the facility is planned. This will define the physical space and determine how to maximise efficiency, make the facility more sustainable and broaden the market appeal.

Tableland Regional Gallery

Standards profile

The Tableland Regional Gallery is situated in a region of diverse landscapes including World Heritage Wet Tropics, expansive Savannah country along with a variety of agricultural and pastoral farmlands. This environment has attracted a thriving arts community of fibre artists, potters, photographers, sculptors, artists and teachers. The Tableland Regional Gallery was established in March 2008 to promote regional art and to encourage both emerging and professional artists. It is the only regional gallery in an area slightly larger than Tasmania with a population of 42,000 and it has become an important part of cultural life in Atherton and on the Tablelands.

The Tableland Regional Gallery is operated by the Tableland Regional Council with one paid staff member and a large team of volunteers. It is situated in a Library-Gallery complex with a common entrance off the new workshop space extension. Staff and volunteers also operate the Foyer Art Gallery and Old Atherton Post Office Gallery.

The annual exhibition schedule provides a regularly changing program of local artists work and travelling exhibitions across the three gallery spaces. The newly created undercover open access space at the Tableland Regional Gallery will host a dynamic series of workshops, opening events and performances.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program provided a great brainstorming process for the team. Our volunteers benefited immediately by training which in turn has increased their enthusiasm for volunteering. The facilitators of the program are incredibly helpful and always available if required.

Program outcomes

The Gallery has formed a volunteers group who will meet informally once a month. A handbook is being collated that will include all policies and procedures to ensure smooth operation of the volunteer program.

The Standards Program reinforced the positive direction of the gallery and made suggestions such as curating local artists' responses to notable historical events eg: war artists who worked on the Tablelands during WWII.

Brewarrina Aboriginal Cultural Museum

Standards profile

The Brewarrina Aboriginal Cultural Centre (BreACC) offers visitors and community members the chance to experience Aboriginal culture first hand in the very spot where local tribes have gathered for thousands of years.

School groups, families and individuals can visit the museum to learn about Dreamtime, tribal language, local culture, and traditional artefacts. Tours can also be arranged for hour or dayvisits, as well as special week-long camps during school holidays.

The Centre is housed in two purpose-built gunyahs; domes shaped to represent traditional Aboriginal housing. The displays include the story of Balame's Ngunnhu-you can see the footprint and understand the shape of the country as the Ngemba people know. It will increase the knowledge of every visitor to the way of life that existed here in the time before European settlement.

The Cultural Centre stocks a range of paintings, crafts, artefacts and books for sale with all proceeds going to support the ongoing operation of the Centre. Local Aboriginal artists are paid for their artistic endeavours by the Centre. The Centre also has products from national and regional Aboriginal companies, making it one of the most versatile Aboriginal retail outlets in the country.


The Brewarrina Business Centre is proud of the Aboriginal Cultural Centre and the opportunity it affords indigenous and non-indigenous people alike to celebrate a rich, ancient culture and Aboriginal spirit.

The Centre is dedicated to the Aboriginal people, their heritage, and their pride in it.

Program outcomes

With the reopening of the Brewarrina Aboriginal Cultural Museum in 2010, it was always very important to us to achieve and maintain a high standard. This was important not just for the displays and what the public sees but for all that goes into running a quality museum well. The Standards Program has been fundamental in assisting us to do this. Cottage Museum, Rylstone

Standards profile

The Rylstone and District Historical Society precinct is located in the main street of Rylstone and consists of the Cottage Museum, the Thyme Out Community Garden and the handsome heritage listed Bridge View Inn.

The Rylstone district was explored soon after the settlement of Bathurst in 1818. In search of good grazing land, explorers pushed north and found the rich Capertee, Cudgegong, Lue and Bylong valleys. Flocks and settlement followed. The village developed as a centre serving large pastoral properties. By the 1870s and 80s, wealth from fine wool, horse breeding, fat cattle and the nearby Turon River gold fields saw Rylstone become a social and government centre, with numerous Victorian sandstone buildings that continue to give it great charm today.

The Cottage Museum is housed in a simple 1890s weatherboard home built for local blacksmith, James Nash. The museum displays focus on domestic and rural life. They include costume, rustic furniture, kitchen and small farming tools, schooling and musical instruments. Also on display are photographs of pioneers, the town and district encompassed by the old Rylstone Shire boundary.

The Bridge View Inn hosts a yum cha café, wine tasting room, barbershop and B&B. Built in 1871, the dining room features one of Australia's few surviving murals of the period. The mural is believed to have been painted by Augustus Baker Peirce (1840 - 1919) and has been recently conserved.

The Society hosts lectures, workshops and exhibitions; organises excursions and heritage events; and continues to research local and family history drawing on the resources of the community as well as the Society's archives and collection.

Program outcomes

The Museum Standards program activities certainly challenged us and changed our perspective regarding our collection.

The Committee appreciated the feedback from our museum reviewers who were very generous in sharing their time, experience and knowledge.

Coo-ee Heritage Centre

Standards profile

The Coo-ee Heritage & Visitor Information Centre won the 2006 Most Outstanding Visitor Centre at the Inland NSW Tourism Awards and more recently was the NSW winner in 2009 ABC Regional Museums Award.

It aims to entertain and educate by representing the cultures and lifestyles, past and present, of the people of the Gilgandra district. The Centre demonstrates themes of local, regional, state and national significance.

The Centre houses three permanent exhibitions and a changing exhibition gallery.

The Joy Trudgett Gallery exhibits "The Australian Collection" a unique collection of Aboriginal and natural history artefacts from Queensland and Northern Territory. Collected by local couple Gwen and Snow Collison between 1964 and 1989 and later acquired by the Gilgandra Shire Council.

The Coo-ee March Gallery depicts the journey of 35 men who left Gilgandra in 1915 to attract recruits for service in WWI. It includes artefacts of national significance including The Union Jack Flag carried by the marchers.

The Allan Wise Gallery is devoted to the history of local families. Of significance is the Gilgandra and District WWII personnel service records.

The Federation Gallery is a changing exhibition space that provides opportunity for artists to exhibit their work and hosts travelling exhibitions.

Program outcomes

The M&G NSW Standards Program has proved an invaluable resource for us to continually utilise and draw upon when facing the many challenges museums and galleries face in small communities. The Standards Reviewers were excellent in understanding our needs and gave us a clear direction and provided useful information which we will incorporate into our five year plan. Overall an excellent program in which the benefits will be seen for many years to come.

Gilgandra Rural Museum

Standards profile

The large windmill at the front of the building easily identifies it. This large Southern Cross windmill is one of the biggest in NSW with a 7.3m (24ft) mill head.

An extensive and exciting range of agricultural plant and machinery is housed in the Museum. Items of interest include Howard Rotary hoe, Ridley stripper, Rushton Proctor steam traction engine, Titan tractor, Ajax gas producer, McKay harvester and McCormick Deering tractor. A display of Aboriginal history is also included.

Within the grounds of the Gilgandra Rural Museum can be found Tooraweenah Police Gaol, Uargon Subsidised School, the famous Berida Sheep Station bookkeeper's office and residence and the Bullagreen Station shearer's quarters.

These buildings contain local items from bygone days from kitchenware to doctor's instruments and hospital equipment. In the display/meeting complex can be found many local photographs, musical instruments, and sewing machines from past times. Local history books, such as Marion Dormer's The Bushman's Arms, are also available for sale.

The Rural Museum is located on the Newell Highway (Dubbo Road) on the southern approach to the town of Gilgandra. There are toilets on site, including disabled access. Entry to the Museum - adult \$5 and school aged children and under, free. Variations are negotiable for groups, with catering available by prior arrangement.

Message to new participants

Get your team together and, with assistance and encouragement from M&G NSW staff and reviewers, all your efforts will be worthwhile. Enjoy the journey!

Program outcomes

We have a vast and diverse collection of horse drawn vehicles, machinery, textiles, printing equipment and photographs. The Museum also has a first rate local history research facility.

An exciting recent development has been the enlargement of our museum property to include an interesting variety of precincts. Our new front entrance allows for better access for coach groups and visitors with physical disabilities.

Our current projects include the upgrading of exhibitions, ongoing conservation, volunteer recruitment and maintaining our research/archives facility.

Our museum is run by volunteers as members of the Gulgong Historical Society Inc, with a management committee and people who specialise in conservation and information management.

Program outcomes

We have learned so much from the Standards Program. It gave us a really objective viewpoint as a foundation for future development. We understand so much more about significance and as a result are improving our displays to make them more meaningful for our visitors. Lightning Ridge Heritage Cottage Hospital Gallery

Standards profile

"Lightning Ridge Population?" is the sign welcoming you to the opal fields. At the historical society we research, record, maintain and share local history to explicate the "?". People come to the Ridge seeking opal, the landscape and legends. It's a lifestyle.

Our complex is located just past the Crocodile Caravan Park at the beginning of town. The 1932 miner's hut – Heritage Cottage – is 'a step back in time' when you walk through the front door onto dirt floors then follow the cat's footprints in concrete into the kitchen. It is bulging with memorabilia of the era and we sell our historical booklets plus select craft.

You are at the correct Cottage if Brett Garling's life-size bronze of Charlie Nettleton, founding father of the Black Opal Industry, stands in front. He looks as if he just walked out the door and people passing, have even been known to greet him, "Good'ay Mate!"


The relocated and refurbished 1915 nurse's cottage in the backyard – Heritage Cottage – is a tribute to all bush nurses. The lit Nurse Lucy tableau in the front windows attracts attention daily and permanent and changing displays extend onto the wide verandah as a place for reflection. The patio is spacious with comfortable seating and the backyard features mining icons in a garden setting. This is a quiet place off the main street for conversation and/or lunch.

The 1932 miner's cottage (Heritage Cottage), furnished in the era, is a shop for the Society's and locally-written historical publications, also original post and note cards plus select local craft. The 1915 Bush Nurse Association cottage (Hospital Gallery) was relocated to the back and restored as a tribute to the bush nurses of Lightning Ridge and holds other permanent displays. Each building collection has one item but hundreds of 'props'. Photographs and family history are managed from the on-site office.

Program outcomes

I am so glad we could participate and be sure we are on-track with what we are doing. I have a lot of fine-tuning now, behind the scenes organisation – nose to the grindstone! I know where I am headed with this nudge towards professionalism.

Molong Museum

Standards profile

The Molong museum is housed in a delightful stone building on the corner of Riddell & Gidley Streets and was built in 1860 as an hotel. It was then called "The Golden Fleece". It is known that a rubble mason and also his son lived in Molong at that time and were responsible for several other stone buildings in the town.

The building has had a checkered life as after being a hotel it later became home and surgery for several doctors over many years. Some of the old surgical instruments of one doctor, Doctor Andrew Ross, are in the Museum's collection. After the doctors exit from there it was turned into flats by the then owners and was this way for many years and in time was sold to the Molong historical Society for the rates owing.

The building is large and accommodating and in 2009 received a Federal Government Jobs Funding Grant of \$89,000 which was used to repair and refurbish the building using local tradespeople. During this time everything needed to be packed up and then replaced. It is still said that we have a "work in progress" as there are still repairs needed but from the structural work carried out it is hoped that it will be sound for many years to come.

Apart from the building itself, the display attracting the most interest is the Fairbridge Room. Fairbridge was farm and home for children from the United Kingdom from the early 1930's until 1975 and was located approximately 5 ks on the Mitchell Highway towards Orange. Research was done by interviewing old identities from Fairbridge and older Molong people who remember the farm and school as a thriving little community.

One of the interesting questions asked, by people in the know is, "have you ever seen the ghost?" - No we haven't but several members have had some strange experiences so on leaving the building at lockup time we usually talk to "her" and say goodnight. There is a lovely atmosphere throughout the building so we think "she" is happy and content as "she" can see care for the building.

Message to new participants

Always welcome visitors and members are only too happy to be of help with any questions so hope to see many more in the coming years.

Program outcomes

Since the Standards Program we have gone from strength to strength. We won a NSW Government Heritage Award in 2012 and it gave all members some excitement when the local member for Clare Andrew Gee MP presented the award.

Narromine Aviation Museum

Standards profile

Visit Narromine Aviation Museum, a captivating exhibition of artefacts, documents and photographs which tell the story of aviation as it unfolded on one of Australia's most historic aerodromes.

Many people are surprised to learn that flying at Narromine started as early as 1919. Australia's first regional aero club, which is still active, was formed there ten years later. A host of famous aviators made regular visits during the 1920s and 30s, and were enthusiastically hosted by the townspeople.

During the Second World War, the aerodrome was upgraded to host firstly a large RAAF flying school, and in 1945 a unique RAF Mosquito bomber squadron. The post-war years saw QANTAS conduct much of its pilot training there, as well as using the aerodrome as an alternative to Sydney's Mascot for international flights.

The sport of gliding, too, has roots at Narromine which go back to the 1940s. Today, the region is considered to be among the world's best soaring sites.

The Museum is managed by the Committee which comprises representatives of community organisations plus members elected by the members of Narromine Aviation Museum Inc. The daily operation of the Museum is by a group of about sixty-five volunteers who assist visitors and are available to explain the displays.

Program outcomes

An excellent program which provided much useful information. The advice of the reviewers was pertinent and put us on the correct method of accepting donations.

Two significant pieces of information we have learned from the Program include:

- 1. A museum is a business and has to run as such.
- 2. The administrative procedures are as important as the displays if the admin is sloppy the ability for the Museum to fulfil its educational role is in jeopardy.

Old Dubbo Gaol

Standards profile

With a history spanning over 150 years from 1847-1966, the Old Dubbo Gaol is a snap-shot in time of a bygone era. Stepping through the gates of the Gaol you are taken back to a time of bushrangers and pioneers, down on your luck stories, and of villainy. The Gaol is home to a large display of animatronic models that provide a realistic and fascinating insight into the hardship of prison life.

Old Dubbo Gaol holds NSW's largest collection of Hangman's ropes, the only complete hangman's kit, and a state of the art holographic exhibition which is based on the NSW Executioner Robert 'Nosey Bob' Howard and the art of hanging. On site are a large number of artefacts ranging from a whipping stool and cato'-nine tails, to a strait-jacket.

Visitors are able to experience the loneliness and solitude of the dark cell, view the condemned cell where eight men waited their final punishment at the gallows, view the padded cell and walk into the "bird-cage" remand yards. A fully erected gallows stands in the middle of the Gaol. Group tours and guided night tours are also available.

The Old Dubbo Gaol is a facility managed by Dubbo City council.

Program outcomes

The Program has offered a fresh perspective from industry professionals, people with vast experience in the field. We got very valuable advice on a range of subjects, particularly the important area of volunteering. Another positive outcome is the tremendous contacts that have been developed.

Oxley Museum

Standards profile

Oxley Museum's collection reflects the European settlement of Wellington and its district and features a Chinese room, a military room, trades and commercial room, medical room and a room with a display of costumes. Several rooms on the ground floor have been set up as a Victorian House – bedroom, kitchen, pantry and laundry. In the grounds of the museum, the visitor can see a one room school house which was removed from Windora and reconstructed, and a slab cottage once occupied by the Stinson family on a property outside Wellington and subsequently removed and re-erected on its present site. There are also two sheds with farm machinery, horse drawn vehicles and large items (printing press etc).

A feature item on display is the Centenary of Federation Signature Quilt with over 700 signatures of Wellington residents which was completed in 2002.

Thanks to a generous bequest, new display cases have been installed in the museum, giving a much better visitor experience. We also hope in the very near future to have a "virtual tour" facility for visitors who cannot climb the stairs to our first floor displays. Members are working on the cataloguing, conservation and digitisation of photographic proofs and negatives from the "Wellington Times" newspaper.

Oxley Museum is managed by members of the Wellington Historical Society who work on a volunteer basis.

In recent years, the Historical Society has published three books: Pictorial History of Wellington in 2003, Pictorial History Booklet in 2008, and Gould League Centenary Booklet in 2010.

Message to new participants

Highly recommend participation for a more professional approach to museum management, especially for small volunteer-based museums.

Program outcomes

We gained confidence in the knowledge that we are on the right track. Some achievements already, some still to come. We can approach the future more positively and professionally.

The Program also allowed us to network and meet with other people whose museums have similar problems eg. volunteer shortages and lack of funding etc.

Brisbane Tramway Museum

Standards profile

The Brisbane Tramway Museum is set in beautiful bushlands in a park with picnic facilities in the northwest of Brisbane. The unique feature of the museum is the collection of Brisbane tramcars and trolley buses.

A tramcar collection dates from a 1901 California Combination four wheel tram through the mighty twelve ton Dreadnought (or Centre aisle tramcar), to the well known Dropcentre tram which many visitors remember riding from the city to the Valley to the modern streamlined four Motor (FM) tram. The museum holds a collection of 22 tramcars of which 6 have been restored and available for people to ride on when the museum is open to the public. Many visitors comment on remembering the days when these tramcars supplied public transport to the people of Brisbane and the efficiency with which they moved people to and from the city centre.

Museum volunteers are in the process of restoring the prototype FM car built in 1937 and a Dreadnought tram built in 1913. The museum also has a trolley bus display, of which one has been restored and visitors can walk through.

The power supplied to the trams at the museum is by Mercury Arc Rectifiers which is the only one operating in a museum in Australia. The museum also holds a large collection of uniforms and other tramway memorabilia from the tramway era for public viewing. The volunteers proudly wear period tramway uniforms when operating tramcars for the public.

Message to new participants

We were not sure at the beginning of this program if this program would suit our museum but the information supplied and help given was fantastic. It has given our museum the chance to re-examine itself and for outside people not connected with the Museum to look at how the museum operates. This has assisted our collection, recruiting of volunteers and running of the museum. We would encourage any other small or medium museum to participate within this program.

Program outcomes

The Standards Program has helped our organisation to identify the significant items within our vast collection and to assist our organisation to focus on the preservation needs of these items.

The Program has helped the museum to re-evaluate our recruiting of volunteers and to look at new ways of recruitment and reinforce this recruitment with job statements.

Commissariat Store Museum

Standards profile

The Commissariat Store Museum is housed in the only occupied convict-built structure in Brisbane and holds a significant collection spanning Moreton Bay's penal colony, early free settlement in Queensland and social history in Brisbane and Queensland up to the 20th Century.

We offer a hands-on heritage experience to our visitors and provide informative and interesting guided tours detailing Brisbane during the years of convict settlement. Aside from a significant collection of convict items on display and available for handling, such as leg irons, keys, cooking utensils and convict made bricks, our collection also includes various items from St Helena Island, a substantial collection of furniture and household items bought to Queensland by our early free settlers, significant arts and craft items, such as pieces by L. J. Harvey and Muriel McDiarmid which reflect Queensland's unique arts movement in the early 20th Century, and various items which uncover the state's early shipping and maritime history, such as items from the Government paddle steamer The Lucinda and the Queen of the Colonies shipwreck.

Additionally, the building itself is the star feature of our museum as it is the only occupied convict-built building in Brisbane. The Commissariat Store was constructed in 1829 through convict labour under the direction of Captain Patrick Logan; an individual who played a significant part in the establishment of the state of Queensland through his role as commandant of the penal colony between 1826 – 1830.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program can seem like a daunting challenge at first but it is well worth the hard work. The expert advice and guidance you will receive from the reviewers and M&GSQ staff is invaluable.

Go into the program with an open mind and make the most of the opportunity as the year will fly by!

Program outcomes

Participating in the Standards Program was a productive exercise for our museum volunteers to recognise our significant achievements with the museum so far, despite limited resources. This can give all involved a confidence boost and the assurance that we are heading in the right direction.

The Standards Program has made us aware of the opportunities presented by other organisations and individuals, such as M&GSQ, Museums Australia, our reviewers and university students, to assist us with the operation of the museum and specific projects.

Diamantina Health Care Museum

Standards profile

The Diamantina Health Care Museum Inc. is housed in the oldest building in the grounds of the Princess Alexandra Hospital: the heritage listed former Dispenser's House which was built in 1909. The site was originally used as an Aboriginal healing place by the Koorpooroo people of the Jagara group.

The museum celebrates and interprets a rich history of health care, the people and staff of hospitals built on the site. The museum displays a variety of photographs of previous years, furniture and equipment dating back to the Diamantina Hospital for Chronic Diseases days and makes available information booklets about the hospital's past, its people and equipment.

The Museum has John Kemp's bark realism of "The Lords Last Supper" which was the largest bark artwork in Australia, and made with bark collected from Wynnum Creek and the surrounding area. It was donated to the Hospital in 1973 for the newly built chapel.

Message to new participants

We were unsure if the program would be suitable for us, but found the reviewers were so helpful and we have been so encouraged by the knowledge gained that we feel we will be more professional in the future.

Program outcomes

Acting on knowledge received during the Standards Program, we have greatly improved our practice:

- The InMagic Cataloguing program was purchased and we are now actively cataloguing our items.
- A Donation Form was designed and is now used for all donations, it is also helpful in collecting the history of the item. A Loans Form was also designed.
- A handout of the Floor Plan was made to assist Visitors.
- A column was added to the Visitors Book asking how they had heard about the museum to assist us with advertising.

Gympie Regional Gallery

Standards profile

The Gympie Regional Gallery promotes the development of the arts as an integral part of the local community bringing educational opportunities, cultural enrichment, economic and social benefits to the entire region. The Gallery is housed in the heritage listed School of Arts Building built in 1905. The stories of the building are told through the twelve "Windows of Memories" display boxes produced by artist Nyria King.

It presents a dynamic range of exhibitions and public programs tailored to the interests of the community. The Gallery has a Category A Rating, meaning that it has the professional staff and facilities to cater for everything from major national travelling exhibitions to locally curated exhibitions that highlight the artists and local stories of the region. The Gallery supports a range of community initiatives such as the Gold Rush Art Competition and the Heritage Art Competition as well as showcasing the works of local secondary students at the annual Hi-Artworks exhibition.

A range of public programs are developed by the Gallery to engage a broad cross-section of the community in arts and culture. Art groups actively utilise the workshop space to share, learn and create. The popular and long running school holiday programs of the Gallery offer children and youth an opportunity to experiment with different artforms.

The Gallery also supports the development of public art, housing two public art pieces in the grounds of the building – "Crate" by Richard Newport and "Pinnacles" by Stephen Newton.

The Friends of the Gallery (FOG) are a vital part of the organisation providing volunteer resources to support the gallery's programs. The FOGlets is a wonderful regular arts program for children over 6 years.

Program outcomes

The Standards Program reinforced our direction for the future as a non-collecting institution focused on dynamic public engagement. The Action Plan guides our Strategic Business Plan which defines the core business of the gallery and provides a framework into the future that builds resources and capacity.

Staff have identified the need to look at tapping into different areas of the community to extend and develop new audiences. One strategy that is already in place is to extend the length of the exhibitions to offer quality over quantity and reduce strain on resources.

Message to new participants

It is when you see your business through other peoples eyes and especially peers in the industry, that you really see the amount of work we do as something special. Being part of the Standards Program and being under the microscope has enabled the Gallery to take a good look at its operations and plan for the future. We encourage other galleries and museums to think about being involved as it is a very cathartic and rewarding experience.

Mercy Heritage Centre

Standards profile

Step into the atmospheric Mercy Heritage Centre and explore the life and work of the Sisters of Mercy in one of Brisbane's oldest surviving buildings. The core of the existing building, Adderton, was built in 1858 by John Petrie for Dr George Fullerton.

Purchased as the first permanent home of the Sisters of Mercy in Queensland, Adderton was renamed Convent of Our Lady of Mercy, All Hallows', on 1 November 1863. It was the Mother House of the Brisbane Congregation, and the base for a broad network of health, education, and social welfare programs throughout the state. With extensions to the original building in 1891, 1913, and 1919, it remained a major residence of the Sisters of Mercy until 2007. Visitors now have the unique opportunity to explore this historic convent, gaining insights into the Sisters of Mercy daily life through intimate encounters of the nun's living conditions and instructional training.

The Sisters of Mercy are a group of religious women, dedicated to serving the poor, sick and uneducated. The order began in Ireland in 1831, and the Brisbane group was founded shortly after Queensland's separation from New South Wales.

The mission of the Mercy Heritage Centre is to continue the legacy of the Sisters of Mercy through interactive and educational exhibitions, demonstrations and guided tours. Revealed is the full breadth and depth of the rich and diverse history of the Sisters of Mercy Brisbane. The Mercy Heritage Centre also reveals the origins of the Mercy Order and its key ministries, All Hallows' School and rare aspects of Catholicism.

In addition visitors can discover the different layers of the building's history, the magnificent Chapel and an extensive and diverse collection of religious relics.

Message to new participants

Think hard about what it is your museum really needs to achieve, then go for it. The expertise is there to ensure there is something to gain in this program for every museum regardless of size, funding or collection.

Program outcomes

The Reviewers were invaluable at guiding us through the process of bringing 2 major projects to fruition. The result being that we have now completed our education kits and final stage of exhibitions.

We also continue to develop different marketing and communications strategies - another recommendation from our Reviewers.

Miegunyah -The Queensland Women's Historical Association

Standards profile

Built in the 1880s when local tradition was at its most opulent, Miegunyah is one of Brisbane's most accessible Heritage Homes. Richly decorated with iron lace balustrades, filigree columns and friezes, and furnished in the style of the late 19th century, Miegunyah is a living example of Victorian elegance and charm. Step through the wide cedar doorway into the House Museum, be fascinated by exotic collectables from travels afar, learn about the people who lived at Miegunyah and ghosts that never left. Even glimpse the labours of 19th century housekeeping

Miegunyah is open to the public for tours and morning / afternoon teas.

Miegunyah is also available for group visits, special interest groups, corporate and private functions. The Queensland Women's Historical Association (QWHA) monthly talks are held in the formal dining room. The QWHA archives and research facilities are held at the House Museum in a secure climate controlled environment. Access to these is available to researchers by appointment. The QWHA also produces a range of books and other publications.

Miegunyah House Museum, the archives, research and publishing activities are maintained by The Queensland Women's Historical Association as a Memorial to the Pioneer Women of Queensland.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program has given us valuable insights into our organisation and its management. It has shown us what we do well and where we need improvements. It allows for review of policies and procedures in a positive way.

Program outcomes

Improved communication

The Standards Program led us to examine our purpose and our mission statement. We have developed subcommittees to improve communication pathways between volunteers and the management committee.

Managing the collection

We have planned an audit and data base of our collection. We have implemented a de-accessioning policy and procedure. We have reduced our insurance running costs. We have planned and scheduled a training day for volunteers.

Museum of Nursing History

Standards profile

The Museum of Nursing History is a rich object and archival collection of the practice of nursing and health care at the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital. 9331 records of all nurses trained at RBH from 1886 to 1993 comprise a comprehensive archive of nursing training and practice on the site.

The personal collections of nurses contain archival material such as competency and registration certificates, lecture notes, diaries, scrapbooks, poems, newspaper clippings, texts, small reference books such as nursing dictionaries, photographs of individuals and groups, small items of uniform such as caps and aprons and artefacts including badges, medals, and small pieces of nursing equipment such as thermometers, watches and syringes. They denote the experiences of individual nurses but they also illuminate the general process of training itself and how it changed over time.

10,000 images, 850 reference books, 50 uniforms, 1200 objects and the extensive archival collection provide a wonderful resource for the telling of stories of nursing and medical care. The gold pocket watch presented to Sister Annie Miller in 1868 by the Duke of Edinburgh for her nursing care of him following an assassination attempt is a fine example of the quality of the collection.

Strong provenance and valuable research material provide a great resource for interpretive displays of the significance of the site and the development of nursing practice in Queensland and makes a valuable contribution to the history of health care in Australia.

Message to new participants

The Museums Standards Program is an excellent program for increasing one's knowledge in museum practice. It was an unknown journey but through the guidance of the professional staff of Museum & Gallery Services Queensland and the Reviewers, it culminated in the production of an action plan. We would recommend the program.

Program outcomes

A revised collection policy and procedures

The Standards Program reinforced the need for a revised collection policy and procedures.

More participation from volunteers in the management of the Museum

The Standards Program highlighted the need to formalise the role of the volunteers, listing the different activities carried out in the museum and instituting a recruiting and training program.

Queensland Police Museum

Standards profile

The Queensland Police Museum includes 25 displays describing police heritage, Queensland crimes, police investigative techniques, medals, the history of police women, operational equipment and transport, amongst others. Our simulated murder scene is a popular attraction - come in and try your hand at solving this crime.

We are the only official Queensland Police Museum in the state and are the repository for police related memorabilia, images and archives from around the state. Other small collections exist but are usually focused only on uniform, badges and patches.

Our research library is home to a monograph collection, as well as archival material and images that date back to 1864. Our education programs are linked to the new Australian Curriculum for Science and cater to students in years 5 - 12.

Message to new participants

We were eager to partake of the Standards Program because of its excellent reputation for partnering reviewers skills and knowledge with the needs of participants. Although it's quite a lot of work, we feel that the Program helped us bring all of our collection management resources and policies together and has given us a fresh outlook on what we have been accomplishing and where we hope to be in the future.

The Arms of Australia Inn Museum

Standards profile

The Arms of Australia Inn Museum in Emu Plains was once a coaching inn. It was first licenced to John Mortimer as the Australian Arms in 1841. The Inn catered for travelers heading across the mountains to Bathurst and the gold fields. The Cobb & Co. coaches that plied the road day and night stopped at the inn, as did many bullock team drivers taking stock and provisions over the mountains.

Today, the Inn is operated by the Nepean District Historical Society as a museum. It has artefacts, some dating from the 1790s, including many objects found under the floor during restoration work, objects depicting lifestyles in the Nepean district and a collection of Aboriginal and South Pacific artefacts, known as the Bunyan collection.

On display in and around the adjoining barn are agricultural equipment, early farmhouse paraphernalia, old grindstones, hand washing mangles, wood stoves, ice boxes, a blacksmith's forge and general early farm equipment.

The Museum's education program makes history a living experience for school students. Students take part in 'hands on' activities using equipment from the early days.

Each July, the Museum has a festival and open day to commemorate the day William Cox started the road across the Blue Mountains in 1814. The museum also conducts ghost and area tours, and is a unique venue for weddings, corporate functions, special occasions and meetings.

Program outcomes

To gain the knowledge and assistance to enhance all the operations and facets of the Museum. To become a more professionally run museum. To be able to plan for the future of the Museum development in line with the vision in the N.D.H.S. mission statement.

Carisbrook House Museum

Standards profile

Carisbrook House Museum, built in 1884 at Lane Cove, is Sydney's only 1880s house museum.

Built from local sandstone, heritage-listed Carisbrook is Italianate in style, its asymmetrical façade, faceted bay window and low-pitched slate roof being motifs that were popular with Victorian architects and clients.

Carisbrook's magnificent gardens and grounds still run down to Burns Bay, connecting the house with the river which was such a vital element in settlement and transport in its earlier days.

Lane Cove Council purchased Carisbrook in 1969 for the benefit of the community and continues to maintain the house, garden and grounds. The house is managed by the Lane Cove Historical Society through the Friends of Carisbrook.

Furnished to the Victorian period, the house features an extensive collection of antiques including many fine Australian cedar pieces, an 1822 Tomkison piano and the Radke family collection of household items.

The Friends of Carisbrook are responsible for guided house tours, exhibitions, recitals and other special events. The gardens are available for hire through Lane Cove Council.

Standards profile

Ever wondered where the iconic Victa, Aussie rotary mower, originated?

Mervyn Victor Richardson took "borrowing your neighbour's lawn mower" to a whole new level when he laid eyes on the petrol-driven rotary mower designed by neighbour Lawrence Hall, a Marine Engineer, in 1948. Hall invented it so he could easily mow his mother's lawn and the grounds of the Cabarita Speedboat Club. It was the first of its type made in Australia and the one on which all modern mowers are based. Richardson was so impressed he gained permission to "borrow" the idea and went on to build and develop the Victa Mower, the Aussie icon which "turned grass into lawn".

Visit our museum and see both the original Mowhall mower and the 128th Victa made.

The Parramatta River is over half of the City of Canada Bay's boundary and played a very important part in the region's early history. Being able to bring supplies in and ship finished products out made the area very enticing for the many industries, such as AGL and Nestles, that set up along the shore, and later the railway brought in many others such as Arnotts and Bergers.

The rest of the boundary is the Parramatta Road, originally a rough bush track between Sydney Cove and Parramatta. The Longbottom Stockade, a halfway stopping place for convicts walking to Parramatta, also played an important part in our history. It was at times a prison, police barracks, government farm and timber mill. It was here, in 1840, that the French Canadian Exiles were housed following the uprising in Canada.

Message to new participants

We needed 'know how' and, oh boy, did we get it!! It showed us the direction we needed to go and how to get there. It was hard work but results were worthwhile. We've certainly benefited in so many ways.

Program outcomes

As a museum that had been in limbo for many years, the Standards Program gave us greater clarity to guide its future development and we now have the knowledge and means to pass on this information to future volunteers.

The program showed us how to better present displays in order to tell the area's history and heritage and gave us practical advice on assessing the significance of our collection and documenting it.

Don Bank Museum

Standards profile

In the midst of modern bustling North Sydney, surrounded by high rise office buildings, sits Don Bank; a place where visitors can escape into the 19th century.

This timber slab cottage built circa 1840s was saved from the bulldozer by community support and opened to the public in 1981. A heritage listed community-based museum, staffed by volunteers, it is managed by North Sydney Council's Historical Services Department.

Wandering through the rooms of the house will give a taste of earlier times with permanent displays interpreting the fabric of the building and telling the stories of its former residents. Regular exhibitions of community art and photographs are held throughout the year.

Don Bank is the starting point for a self guided walking tour of North Sydney and Crows Nest which explores the house's association with the early land grants of Edward Wollstonecraft and Alexander Berry. Group bookings can also be made for conducted tours of the museum and gardens.

The facilities of Don Bank offer a venue for the regular meetings of a variety of community groups.

A database of artefacts donated to Don Bank Museum and stored at the North Sydney Heritage Centre at Stanton Library is available online. This contains over 1,000 images of costumes, textiles, domestic objects and other items relating to the history of North Sydney from the 19th century through to the present day.

Eryldene Historic House & Garden

Standards profile

Eryldene was the home of scholar and connoisseur Professor Eben Gowrie Waterhouse, his wife Janet and their four sons. The house was designed by architect William Hardy Wilson in 1913 who continued to work with the Waterhouse family over twenty years to create the property that you see today. Waterhouse, professor of German at the University of Sydney, earned world renown for his work on camellias, especially their classification, naming and propagation.

Eryldene demonstrates the particular life and interests of Professor and Mrs Waterhouse with their support of art, architecture, horticulture, linguistics, and their own lively cultural circle of friends and international visitors. It is also typical of middle class suburban life in the first half of the 20th century where self sufficiency, careful management of the household budget and the upbringing and scholastic achievement of the four Waterhouse boys was nurtured and encouraged. Eryldene is listed on the NSW Heritage Register and the National Heritage list.

It comprises the house, garden, other buildings and structures including Hardy Wilson's teahouse, garden study, pigeon house, walled fountain and tool shed, the furnishings comprising plant material, artefacts, art works and the collection of documents and photographs. In 1979 the Eryldene Trust was established to purchase the property and to conserve, manage and present it for public education and enjoyment. It is open on the second weekend of every month between April and September, when the camellias are at their best, and is available for booked tours, weddings and functions.

Eryldene celebrates its centenary in 2014.

Message to new participants

Fitzroy Falls is a magnificent waterfall located in the Southern Highlands of NSW, within Morton National Park. The waterfall is accessible from the Southern Highlands and Kangaroo Valley. It is on a popular tourist drive through this area.

The Fitzroy Falls Visitor Centre is a National Parks and Wildlife Service Visitor Facility managed by the Office of Environment and Heritage - NSW State Government. Each year 250,000 local and international visitors enjoy the well presented Environmentally Friendly Visitor Centre.

The centre is designed on Eco-Tourism principles using solar power and environmentally friendly building materials including recycled bridge timbers and local Bundanoon sandstone.

Visitors enjoy extensive bushwalks around the waterfall encountering many beautiful native plants and animals, including the musical lyrebird that is regularly sighted on the walk to the Falls.

The Visitor Centre provides visitors with a window into the National Parks of NSW and the local area, providing interesting up to date information on all things environmental.

An Eco-Tourism principle of involving local artists/craftspeople and small cottage industries of the Southern Highlands and South Coast Region to exhibit work at the centre, provides the visitor with the opportunity to enjoy and purchase local products including photography, ceramics and silk that are displayed and changed monthly.

Major touring exhibitions such as Nature Personified by Helen Leitch, the Wollemi Pine display and Indigenous art exhibitions offer the visitor a wider view of current environmental and cultural delights. The centre provides guided tours with Discovery and Indigenous Rangers, fees and bookings are applicable.

Visit the Hornsby Shire Historical Society (HSHS) Museum in Kenley Park, Normanhurst to experience hands-on living in the 1930s.

Managed by members of the Society, the Museum's permanent displays focus on a typical childhood in a rural district, while the temporary displays highlight the changes in work and leisure in Hornsby Shire. Together they provide a memorable experience for families, leisure groups and schools (HSIE appropriate program available on request).

Exhibiting objects from both domestic and work spheres, our collection includes a silk wedding dress with tiny matching shoes, a Metters revolving pantry and a schoolroom display of the 1930s.

Our extensive collection of photographs has recently been digitised and is now easily accessible to both casual viewers and researchers.

Adjacent to the Main Northern Railway and sited in a large shaded park with a children's playground and public toilets, the Museum is easily accessible by rail and bus and has plenty of free parking.

Message to new participants

Our museum approached the five tasks with a positive outlook, and gained enormously from the opportunity to analyse our museum, volunteer and collection management practices. The guidance from our knowledgeable reviewers and the staff at M&G NSW made the year achievable, enjoyable and productive.

Program outcomes

A two year strategic plan with goals and action plan has been achieved by HSHS Museum management with help from our reviewers. This addresses an identified need for document review, ongoing training for volunteers and management, and a significance assessment of the current collection.

Hunters Hill Museum

Standards profile

The Hunters Hill Museum is working at creating a seamless link between the community and its history. The Museum's program of history walks guided by volunteers is popular with visitors from all over the state. The Broadband Internet Kiosk has brought more participants.

The contribution of the Italian community to Hunters Hill was celebrated with a commemoration of the Garibaldi Hotel and its founders the Cuneo Family with a museum display and a street walk ending at the former hotel for refreshments and Garibaldi biscuits.

The discovery in the Museum archives of an album of cartesde-visit compiled by a young woman in Hunters Hill from 1864 became the subject of a display featuring life-size enlargements of some of the people of the album. This has created interest for family researchers.

The resources of the Museum were used by a number of groups, including the Hunters Hill Council, in the celebration of the municipality's sesqui-centenary in 2011.

The new opening hours (five mornings a week) made it possible for visitors to call and have their research queries attended to by volunteers using the archives.

The council sponsored the publication of a Historical History of Hunters Hill by Linda Emery and this is made up almost entirely from the Museum's collection of images and files.

With financial assistance from a sponsor, forty bronze plaques were commissioned by the Society for installation by the council at historic sites commemorating both heritage houses and the persons who founded the suburb. A booklet was published and this has led to a greater awareness of Hunters Hill's unique past.

The centenary of the birth of the artist Nora Heysen, first woman to win the Archibald Prize for portraiture was celebrated by the Society commissioning a bronze bust. Heysen spent more than half her life in Hunters Hill and the bust, sponsored by a donor, was installed in the courtyard of her favourite coffee shop.


Message to new participants

A popular destination for thousands of local and interstate visitors each year, the Museum & Gallery is a hub of continuous community activity presenting talks, programs, special events and ever changing exhibitions.

Hurstville Museum & Gallery is dedicated to preserving the unique history of the St George region as well as working with local multicultural communities to develop exciting art and history exhibitions and public programs. The particular emphasis is on the domestic and working lives of the St George community in the 19th and 20th centuries with a permanent exhibition titled Living on the Water's Edge: Stories of St George.

Our collection includes Indigenous objects, Packham's Bakery objects, collection items from World War II, examples of household items from large ovens to refrigerators, a sugar art and cake decorating collection (one of three in the world!) and even a child's sampler from 1794.

The Museum & Gallery is accessible for people with a disability. Public and education programs are designed for all ages from preschoolers' to seniors. Admission is free.

Laperouse Museum

Standards profile

The Laperouse Museum sits within a spectacular historic landscape on the northern headland of Botany Bay within the Botany Bay National Park. The dramatic view extends east to the Pacific Ocean, south across the sheltered waters of Botany Bay to the landing place of Captain Cook at Kurnell, and west to the distant industrial landscape of Port Botany. The Museum is located in the historic 1881-1882 Cable Station on the headland at La Perouse. The building originally provided accommodation for Cable Station staff. At different periods it provided a home for nurses and soldiers. From 1944, it was a Salvation Army refuge for women and children.

The Museum opened in 1988 and tells the story of the Laperouse expedition, its arrival in Botany Bay in 1788 and encounter with the First Fleet, and eventual shipwreck in the Solomon Islands. Through a program of changing temporary exhibitions, the Museum also looks at the Aboriginal, environmental and local history of La Perouse. The Laperouse Museum collection contains nearly 2,000 items, relating to either the Laperouse expedition, French 18th century maritime navigation, the Cable Station building itself, or local history.

One of the most significant collection items is a complete atlas of the voyage of Laperouse, consisting of 72 coloured drawings and maps, featuring places the expedition visited between 1785 and 1788. Significant heritage items may be visited in the immediate vicinity of the Museum and include the Macquarie Watchtower, the Laperouse Monument and the tomb of Father Receveur, the first Catholic priest to be buried on mainland Australia. Nearby is the historic Bare Island Fort, and several idyllic beaches and walking trails.

The Laperouse Museum is managed by the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Group within the NSW Department of Environment and Climate Change.

Manly Art Gallery & Museum

Standards profile

A cultural facility of Manly Council, Manly Art Gallery & Museum is magnificently situated on Sydney Harbour and four minutes walk from Manly Wharf. Opened in 1930 as the first metropolitan based regional gallery in NSW, extended in 1982 to house the museum, the facility has become a popular destination for thousands of visitors each year.

The Museum is dedicated to preserving Manly's unique history as one of Australia's most loved beach resorts. The collection includes historical photographs, maps and documents relating to the Manly area, as well as a collection of swimwear, surf craft, and beach memorabilia.

The Gallery houses several collections: Australian Ceramics since 1945 on permanent display; the largest collection of paintings by Antonio Dattilo Rubbo in Australia from 1909-1955; a collection of 20th and 21st Century works on paper including prints, watercolours, photographs and drawings by Australian artists. Two new websites are also being created to make all of our collections more accessible to the public.

The Gallery holds exhibition related public programs on Sundays@ the gallery as well as special activities such as Kid's Art Adventures, public art tours and the Manly Arts Festival events.

Many volunteers assist the staff at the gallery as receptionists and as curatorial and exhibition assistants. The Manly Art Gallery & Museum Society raises funds through social events to acquire artworks for the gallery and other needs of the gallery/museum.

May Gibbs' Nutcote

Standards profile

Nutcote is the former house and garden of May Gibbs, creator of Australia's classic children's story, Snugglepot and Cuddlepie.

Nutcote was designed by prominent architect Bertand James Waterhouse and built for May Gibbs and her husband James Ossili Kelly, in 1925. May occupied the house for 44 years until her death in 1969.

The house has been listed on the New South Wales State Heritage Register and the National Estate and has been furnished to reflect the style of the 1920s and 1930s and includes effects owned by May Gibbs, such as her easel, paint box and folio stand.

Nutcote is open to the public Wednesday to Sunday, and staff provide guided tours of the house to visitors. Nutcote provides refreshments to visitors through the Bib and Bub Tearoom, run by volunteers, and offers children's activities such as monthly story and rhyme time for toddlers, regular school holiday programs and children's birthday parties on Saturdays.

Group bookings are available by appointment. Private hire of the garden for functions is also available.

Penrith Museum of Printing

Standards profile

The Penrith Museum of Printing is a unique "working museum" established in Penrith NSW in 2001.

The Museum is managed and staffed by volunteers who are primarily printing tradesmen. The aim of the Museum is to collect, conserve and showcase letterpress printing machinery and equipment from around the world so as to keep alive the knowledge and skills of letterpress printing for present and future generations.

The Museum has been designed to give the appearance of a 1940s Australian printing establishment. Our collection showcases 22 pieces of working printing machinery and equipment as well as pre-press "composing room" equipment that includes many different type fonts gathered from Australian print shops.

Some of our most significant items include a Wharfedale flat bed printing press (1890s), Model 5 & Model 8 linotypes type setting machines (1920s), Chandler & Price platen presses (1905 – 1912) and an 1864 model Albion Press.

Museum management are particularly proud of a number of achievements in our short history, that include:

- The recent complete restoration of a Model 5 linotype typesetting machine.
- The recent introduction of a number of typography courses for those interested in learning hand type-setting techniques.

The Museum hosts group tours that are particularly enjoyed by community groups, service clubs & schools that are designed to provide the participant with a unique glimpse into the world of letterpress printing.

Sutherland Shire Historical Society Museum

Standards profile

Operated by volunteers, Sutherland Shire Historical Society's Museum serves the schools, families, leisure groups and visitors to our Shire. We aim to preserve the history of our unique place in Australia's past as the location of Captain Cook's landfall in nearby Botany Bay.

Come and view, and touch if you wish, a section of the actual ballast from Captain Cook's ship the HMB Endeavour. Experience our 'journey in time through Sutherland Shire' when you can follow the evolution of our area from prehistoric times to the present day.

Step back from the busy world of today as you discover the history of our Shire. From the early formation of our coastline 250 million years ago, to the Indigenous lifestyle and thence the arrival of the seafarers, settlers and all that followed.

We have an extensive photographic collection. Past members, Rupert Gough and George Heavens have contributed material dating back to the late 19th century. Nearby Royal National Park is the oldest in Australia, second in the world, its evolution from untouched bush to recreational parkland has been lovingly recorded by them.

The entire Shire has been photographically recorded by our members and we have a valuable archive which is available to all.

The building itself is typical of early 20th century architecture and situated conveniently two minutes walk from Sutherland railway station and opposite the main bus shelters. Street parking is available.

2013, has seen a completely new presentation of our museum. With the assistance of Museums & Galleries of NSW we have brought our display up to contemporary standards.

The Shire's history has now been put in perspective, with displays highlighting pre and post colonial history, pioneer settlement, and the post war boom in population that transformed its bucolic existence into a vibrant part of the modern city of Sydney.

Remember the famous quote 'the past is a foreign country, they do things differently there' ...come and experience the past with us.

Program outcomes

Raising professional standards

Due to a grant from M&G NSW for professional expenditure we were able to hire a consultant to assist with our museum refurbishment. They were pivotal during this process. We have also started cataloguing our collection.

Greater staff involvement in developing policy and activity

The Standards Program has fostered wide ranging discussion about the role of the Museum. Museum opening hours have increased 400% meaning we have expanded our number of volunteers (Friends of the Museum).

The Willoughby Museum interprets the local history of Willoughby City, the first local government area on Sydney's North Shore (from 1865). Housed in Boronia, a 1913 Federation cottage in the South Chatswood Conservation Area and located adjacent to the Chatswood central business district.

Feature items in the collection include displays of Regal Mashman artware pottery, a wide range of traditional trades tools and the iconic products of Willoughby industries, such as a Hallstom 'Silent Knight' refrigerator, Buz meccano sets and Speedo swimwear.

The Museum is owned and operated by the Willoughby District Historical Society Inc. The Society researches, interprets and documents the rich social, industrial, commercial and environmental history of the City of Willoughby and advocates this history within our community and to policy-makers.

The Society's website provides updates on current activities and documents the history of Willoughby.

The Museum is only a short walk from Chatswood railway station, the bus interchange and the shopping precinct.

Message to new participants

Our participation in the Standards Program provided a watershed between existing and becoming a dynamic museum that attracts visitors and promotes our history effectively.

Program outcomes

Improved collection management

A comprehensive Collection Management Policy was adopted in 2010. With support from M&G NSW, museum volunteers worked with a museum consultant to develop a Collection Management Manual.

Effective museum displays

With guidance from the museum consultant, our volunteers have enhanced the presentation of displays, with the 2011 exhibition, Tales of Flat Rock Creek, winning the 2011 IMAGinE Award for volunteer-run museums and galleries.

Chinchilla Historical Museum

Standards profile

2012 Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards. Special Commendation, Organisation: Volunteer Run

Chinchilla Historical Museum is dedicated to the natural resources of the Chinchilla area and the history of their use. It offers a glimpse into farming and local industry with key displays including: the 'Cypress Pine Centre', which tells the story of the saw milling industry that established the town of Chinchilla (it is believed that the town name comes from the Aboriginal word 'Jinchilla' which means Cypress Pine); the 'Green Plague' exhibit, explaining the devastation caused by the Prickly Pear cactus and the development of the local cactoblastus moth breeding program; and, the Melon Festival display, celebrating Chinchilla as the 'melon capital' of Australia, and telling the story of this important industry and its contribution to the economic and tourist growth in the town.

The Museum has strong social history collections and buildings on site include Chinchilla's very first homestead 'Wongongera Cottage' (built in 1880) and Goombi Hall. Once the hub of community life, the Hall captures the atmosphere of country social life: the dances, weddings, kitchen teas, balls, meetings and sporting events that were central to the cultural and social life of many small country towns.

The Museum also interprets the area's natural history. Highlights include: living tree specimens, the Chinchilla White Gums; the Field Naturalists Display, of the indigenous botany and wildlife in the area; Beneath Chinchilla's Soils - an extensive display of petrified wood, some unique to the area, such as Chinchilla Red; and, the Jurassic Mural and Garden – developed in conjunction with local TAFE students.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program allows you to question your beliefs of how things should be run and attitudes as to whether you are prepared to make the changes to meet National Standards. No longer is "near enough good enough" - if you want to meet the benchmarks set by other organisations. It's confronting but, hey, it is also rewarding so go for it.

Program outcomes

Organisational structure

The Standards Program has emphasised the importance of policies, procedures and documentation. It has refocused our attention on the purpose of the Museum and has enabled us to identify the significant portions of our collection and the areas that require attention.

Significant stories

We have gained a better understanding of our significant stories, particularly in relation to the natural resources collection.

Carbethon Folk Museum & Village

Standards profile

The Crows Nest Historical Society manages the Carbethon Folk Museum & Village. The Society was formed in 1973 and volunteers have developed the museum to the present. Comprising over 20 buildings including memorabilia, both domestic and agricultural from the area.

"Carbethon" built circa 1890 was moved to Crows Nest in 1978 and officially opened as a folk museum in September 1979. The original Ray White shed was the first office of Ray White when he started his business at Crows Nest in 1902 and is of national interest. The shed was moved to the Carbethon Folk Museum & Village in 1994 by the Ray White family. The shed was refurbished in 2010 providing panoramic displays of the Ray White business. The Ray White shed has been accepted for inclusion in the Heritage Treasures booklet through the Toowoomba Regional Council. Ray White's family home has also been located at the village and has been themed as a period display. The house also includes a photo gallery of local people.

Other buildings include the replica one-teacher school, wireless shop, printery, photographic studio, butchers and an ecumenical church. The members are currently undertaking a refurbishment program by updating and extending displays.

The Crows Nest Historical Society undertook a significance assessment in 2011, with RADF funding. Training was provided by the Museum Development Officer for Southern Inland Queensland. Members are currently implementing and working on the recommendations from that assessment.

Message to new participants

Our museum put Standards to the side while people were not able to work on them and now that there are people who want to use the Standards process we are able to continue.

Program outcomes

Following changes in the executive, there will be a return to focus on meeting standards.

Upgrade displays to follow themes and upgrade labelling. A new storage shed will thin out our displays. The Program has highlighted the need for a display plan to identify the key themes and thus to upgrade the interpretation of the site to enhance the visitor experience.

Discover Eumundi Heritage & Visitor Centre is housed in the old Methodist Church and is one of the most visited museums on the Sunshine Coast with an estimated 10,000 visitors per year.

The museum displays start with its collection of Aboriginal artefacts. Significantly, two local Aboriginal groups, the Undambi and the Dalungbara, have given their agreement for the Eumundi Museum to be a keeping place for their artefacts.

Well designed and produced displays depict the area's natural and social history including early white settlement, development of the area and many industries such as timber getting, dairying, the railway and the hospital. Eumundi's world famous markets, established 1979, feature in the museum's contemporary history displays.

Discover Eumundi's extensive collection of historic photographs is accessible for family research and reference. Over 3,500 photos capture the natural, social and commercial environment of Eumundi and surrounding districts from the 1880s to the present.

Message to new participants

Program outcomes

Increased feeling of ownership of Discover Eumundi by volunteers

Miles Historical Village

The Miles Historical Village was officially opened in 1971, and over the years has developed into one of the premier tourist attractions within the region: a place for connecting to memories of early 1900s rural lifestyle. There are currently over 35 buildings in a streetscape with amazing collections and links to a bygone era...if you remember it, we have it!

Featured original buildings include the Hippong Slab Hut Homestead from just north of Miles, a property whose name is derived from an early Chinese shepherd, Hip Pong, and the Columboola Hall, Dalwogan Railway Siding, Andersen's Smithy, Jimbour CWA, Village School, Dairy, Gaol, Dulacca Presbyterian Church and the Australian Bank of Commerce. Recreated buildings in the streetscape include The Red Rose Café, a replica of the first Greek café built in Miles in 1925, the Boot Maker, Union Hotel, Hospital, Butcher, Barber Shop, Laundry, Garage, Post Office, Bakery and Printery – The Murilla Express.

Other significant collections displayed include:

- The War Museum: a tribute to Australian service men and women from the Boer War to Vietnam displaying photos, documents, uniforms and life size models.
- The Morgan Shell collection: one of the largest collections of shells in a regional museum in Australia, presented by Mr & Mrs G Morgan, former Miles residents.

Message to new participants

Initially we were very daunted and reluctant as to how we would shape up! However the Standards Program has been nothing but outstanding and positive. It has enabled us to look more closely at ourselves, our facility and where we are headed. We were able to identify the areas we need to work on, but more importantly our vision and insight was strengthened in terms of our own perceptions. Being involved in the Program helped us to realise what wonderful things we are achieving, as often we feel very overwhelmed by the massive task ahead. Having skilled, supportive and encouraging relationships also strengthened our experiences. We feel very confident in recommending the Standards Program to one and all!

Program outcomes

Greater understanding

We now have a much clearer picture in terms of how we perceive our extensive Museum and its Collections. We now realise that our streetscape style is extensive and significant, as well as the specific collections (Lapidary, War Museum, Shell, Condamine Bell etc). This will in turn assist us with significance, interpretation and marketing.

Interpretation

We identified through the Standards Process that interpretation was of a high priority. Milne Bay Military Museum

Standards profile

Milne Bay Military Museum, the official 25/49 Battalion History Room as recognised by the Army History Unit, began as a collection of artefacts belonging to 25th Battalion veterans who had served during World War I and II and in the Battle of Milne Bay in 1942. The collection has grown over the years to include all theatres of World War II, as well as the Boer War, World War I, the Korean and Vietnam Wars, and more recent conflicts.

Interesting features of the Museum include:

- Individual soldiers' stories.
- Full size replica World War I trenches including a soundscape of exploding shells, and showing the command post and hospital bay.
- A replica of the Red Barron's Fokker DR1 tri-plane, with lifelike imitation machine gun fire and theatrics.
- An extensive collection of uniformed mannequins, providing a strong reminder of the human face of conflict.
- A large display of firearms, daggers, swords and knives dating from the late 1800s.
- The Conflict Gallery displaying weapons, uniforms, medals and aircraft used in conflicts between 1951 and 1972.
- A dedicated 25th Battalion History Room and Wall of Remembrance with its Roll of Honour above a stained glass window commemorating the members of the 25th Darling Downs Regiment who died in battle at Milne Bay and Bouganville.

Message to new participants

The Milne Bay Military Museum would strongly recommend the Standards Program to any museum, that is if you want a revamped operation that will echo your achievements within the community.

Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery

Standards profile

Opened in November 1987, Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery came into being from the hard work and dedication of the Stanthorpe Art Gallery Society, created in 1972. The collection has been developed progressively. Key pieces include early works by Gordon Bennett, William Robinson, Suzanne Archer, David Rankin and David Aspden, with donations by Pamela Bell OAM of texts from her personal art library, and by William Bowmore AO of works by Pablo Picasso, Charles Blackmore, Margaret Olley and Sam Fullbrook.

The gallery is also fortunate to hold five ceramic works by Gwen Hanssen Pigott from across a 20 year working period, demonstrating the diversity in the practice of Australia's most acclaimed potter.

Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery frequently contributes works from its collection, for example Green Grapes by Margaret Olley, early 2013, to touring and single venue exhibitions across the country. Works in the collection by Picasso, William Robinson and Andrew Sibley have been noted in the national press 2012-2013. The Gallery hosts exhibitions of both national and local importance and fosters a strong program of regional artist exhibitions and displays that are relevant to the history and character of the Granite Belt region. These include shows especially curated from the Region's wide-ranging permanent collection of traditional and contemporary paintings, works on paper, ceramics, sculpture, fibre and textile artworks. Much of this strong collection of noted artists' work is sourced from acquisitions made during the long-running biennial Stanthorpe Art Festival. The next festival will be in 2014.

Quality national touring exhibitions encompass displays varying from contemporary jewellery, textiles, ceramics, painting, sculpture, and mixed media installations displaying the work of noted Australian artists and talented emerging and young artists.

Message to new participants

The Standards program was of immense value to the Gallery. The process of self-examination requiring total honesty was demanding but worth it. It was a clear reminder that galleries must strive constantly to be not only relevant but also indispensable to their communities.

Program outcomes

Greater community access to the collection

The collection as a resource for education, research and inspiration was under utilised. We are developing facilities and programs to give the community a sense of ownership, with the aim of creating lifelong audiences for the gallery.

Organisational development

Through serious self-examination, with the tools that the Standards Program provided, we continue to identify where operational improvements are desirable.

Transport and Main Roads Heritage Centre

Standards profile

Take a journey through time with the only road-building museum in Australia.

Located on Mutze Street opposite the Toowoomba Airport Terminal, the Transport and Main Roads Heritage Centre offers a unique perspective of road building history in Queensland. One of a handful of museums in Australia that exhibits the history and culture of a state government department, the museum showcases all facets from administration to construction. The collection ranges from photographs to survey equipment providing stark contrast to the working machinery of graders and rollers. Representing the human element, the museum's oral histories from employees and volunteers (past and present) compliments the collection.

Exhibition areas provide the visitor with an understanding of the processes involved in building roads – then and now – targeting audiences of all ages with cartoon characters and interactive children's trail helping to teach kids about what has gone into making 'the black stuff'. Volunteers have restored a number of 'show piece' vehicles indicative of types used by the department and have reconstructed structures found in many road camps including working blacksmith shop and bridge pile-driving scale model.

Looking to learn something different? Come and discover how Queensland's road network has been developed over the past 94 years, from the conditions under which road workers laboured, to the modern plant and equipment you see on roads today.

Let the museum tickle your memories. You'll be surprised at what you'll discover.

Message to new participants

The program is a great 'crystallising tool' and helps you identify key areas of need in your organisation. The resulting Action Plan provides a clear map for the future - very useful for gaining support from those with the money! The subsequent review 'One Year On' is a great way of looking back at what has and hasn't been accomplished.

Standards profile


The Armidale Bicentennial Railway Museum is managed by Armidale Dumaresq Council. It commemorates the vital role that the railway played in Armidale's social and economic history.

Until the 1960s, the railways were the city's largest employer and, at one stage, employed almost 10% of its breadwinners.

The Museum depicts the days when the railway was the nation's common carrier, transporting "everything from a needle to an anchor". It also looks at the everyday work of railwaymen – you can try your hand with the hand operated rail saw, or drill a hole with a "ratchet and post".

A comprehensive collection of fettlers' track vehicles shows how employees went to work on the most isolated stretches of line. They range from the hand pump tricycles of the 1880s to modern powered vehicles. The Museum gives a real insight into the skills required to operate the Main Northern Line in the heyday of railways.


The Armidale Folk Museum is managed by Armidale Dumaresq Council and traces its origins back to 1933.



Bingara Museum

The Museum complex comprises several significant buildings in a very pleasant setting. The buildings include the Post Office Hotel, where Sir Henry Parkes stayed in 1893 on his tour drumming up support for the federation process.

The Boonda one teacher school transported from its original location gives us a glimpse into how country children went to school. Interestingly, this school opened with 12 pupils in 1915 and closed with 12 pupils in 1960.

The Bingara Blacksmith's Shop was dismantled and reassembled at the Museum. Significant gem and mineral items are housed in their own building.

The Bingara Museum also contains a large photographic collection, many other objects and comprehensive local family history records. The Bingara District Historical Society can provide assistance with local family history research. It is also fortunate in having a significant range of quality publications dealing with the local history and people.

The Emmaville Mining Museum currently has over 4,000 mineral specimens and covers nearly every mineral sample in the world. In addition, the Museum has a large gem display.

430 photographs are on display dating back to the 1880s. These photographs consist of mine workings and machinery with local history events and people.

A replica general store originally established in 1895, with groceries, clothing, hardware and tools dating back to the early 1900s, is on display. There is also a comprehensive exhibition of 1,500 bottles of various shapes, sizes and ages.

The Museum's achievements include winning the 2007 Glen Innes Community Tourism Business Award, and the District Exhibit Award at the 2008 Glen Innes Show. Our current program is to construct a machinery shed to restore and display old mining machinery in working order.

Hillgrove was a town which grew, flourished and died in the Eastern New England district between 1880 and 1920.


The deep underground gold mines which it serviced showed great promise but their eventual closure sealed the fate of this once-busy settlement.

Land of the Beardies History House Museum & Research Centre

Want to see what early health services were like? How we lived when horse power predominated? Enjoy a complimentary cup of tea? This and much more in the fascinating exhibits that fill the former hospital building that started life in 1877 as a six bed men's ward and was continually extended until 1956.

Now the 2,000 square metre museum, only a few minutes from the town centre, displays thousands of items. They include dioramas like the Victorian dining room, parlour and bedroom, a colonial kitchen, a school room, and original slab cottage from the 1850s, the original hospital kitchen. Other exhibits include themed medical equipment, tools of trade, and the services memorial room. On our 1.5 hectares are also two agricultural machinery sheds.

The vast research centre houses some 350,000 index cards, 10,000 photographs, local newspapers from 1874, maps, Government Gazettes, property business, mining and family records etc.

Coach groups are welcome to book for tours, with morning, afternoon teas or lunch. And that free cuppa at 10am and 3pm!

McCrossin's Mill Museum

Standards profile

McCrossin's Mill Museum and Function Centre is owned and operated by the volunteers of Uralla Historical Society Inc. The Museum's primary exhibit is the precinct, three superbly restored buildings: the Flour Mill (1870), the Stables/Store (c 1878) and the Chaff Shed (1881). The exhibitions have an unusual empathic quality and tell compelling stories...moving, thought-provoking, even slyly and wildly humorous. Our philosophy is that a museum should be vibrant, stimulating and educative. Our museum is not a mausoleum.

Significant space is devoted to the life and legend of Thunderbolt, the last of the NSW bushrangers. The Chinese exhibition is of national significance, as is Trickett's Triumph, a tribute to Australia's first world sporting champion. Corporal Cecil Stoker, which honours a young soldier's sacrifice, is particularly moving. An evocative diorama offers a subtle but heartfelt apology to the Aniwan people, traditional owners of the land. She'll Be Right Mate is a typical 'folk museum' exhibition, but with unusual artefacts and a laconic sense of humour. The Museum includes other exciting, insightful exhibitions, some of which are currently being redeveloped.

The Society operates an increasingly popular Function Centre on the ground floor and gardens.

Message to new participants

We were nervous as kittens, but finished the program like tigers! All credit to the staff of M&G NSW for their patient, understanding assistance. In the process our team rediscovered itself, is making refreshing new plans, and earned its stripes. Grrr! Grrr!

Quirindi Historical Cottage and Museum

Standards profile

With varied displays of domestic, social and rural exhibits, the Quirindi Historical Cottage and Museum has something for all interests and all ages.

Owned and managed by the Quirindi & District Historical Society, the 1887 Cottage is one of the main exhibits, having been built from bricks made locally at Price's Brickworks.

The collection and records reflect the Quirindi district – the pastoral beginnings, followed by closer settlement and broadacre farming, the mining ventures, and the development of Local Government in this area. Visitors interested in amateur radio, military memorabilia, medical history, bridal or christening gowns and toys will be fascinated by these exhibits.

Unique displays include a 19th century bell from Warrah Station, the MacLennan-Phillips Collection of Aboriginal artefacts, the former Quirindi Town Clerk Percy Pryor's collection of gifts presented to him during his 42 years of service, a model of Quirindi railway yards, and mementoes of Kingsford Smith's 1935 visit to Quirindi.

School children are made aware of how it was possible to live comfortably before electricity. Those searching for family are frequently surprised and delighted at the Society's extensive archives of family histories and district records, including published local histories and all Quirindi newspapers.

Message to new participants

We have found there are short term and long term benefits from the program, and the facilitators are helpful and encouraging. The Quirindi & District Historical Museum is now a member of the Powerhouse Museum Dress Register.

Program outcomes

Collection significance

The program has made us assess the significance of our collection and the presentation of items on display. We have developed a training program and provided an information folder for our volunteer guides.

Record keeping

The Standards Program reaffirmed the importance of record keeping, to have accession details, location of items on display or in storage, and condition. A database for our collection has been initiated.

Tamworth Powerstation Museum

Standards profile

The Museum is owned and operated by the Tamworth Regional Council. It is a working re-creation of the Tamworth Borough Council's 1888 steam power station on its original Peel Street site. It permanently marks Tamworth's place as the first municipality in Australia to light its streets using electricity.

The Museum houses a comprehensive collection of historic, domestic, industrial, trade and commercial electrical items from the 19th and early 20th century. An archive contains a collection of historical books, catalogues and records pertaining to the development of the electrical industry.

The two restored John Fowler semi-portable under-type steam engines of the same type and era as the 1888 originals are the only two of their type surviving in the world which are operational.

The Museum is a popular tourist attraction for visitors to the region and is used as an educational resource for primary, secondary and university students. The Museum's volunteers are always available to provide comprehensive guided tours, including times outside regular opening hours, by prior arrangement.

Winners of the 2009 NSW Cultural Heritage Award of Keeping Australia Beautiful, the Museum was assessed in 2010 by professional historians and museum curators who reported that this museum has national significance for its conservation of Australian heritage.

During 2011 an intern completing a Masters in Museum Studies produced an oral history book The Night the Lights Went On. This was launched at the Museum on its 23rd anniversary open day – 9 November 2011, while also celebrating the 150th anniversary of the electric telegraph in Tamworth on 9 November 1861.

Message to new participants

Be diligent and honest with completing the self review survey. It will reveal things you need to know that have not yet occurred to you.

Focusing on the 'Key Areas for Future Achievement' has enabled several of the desirable outcomes identified by the Program to be achieved since 2008. This has raised both the profile and the inherent quality of the Museum.

Tenterfield Centenary Cottage

Standards profile

Built as a private residence in 1871, Centenary Cottage is a fine example of colonial architecture. The Cottage was constructed by Thomas McGauran for Michael Egan on land bought in the first sale of town land on 9 March 1854.

The Cottage now houses a large collection of memorabilia and historical material relating to Tenterfield and its surrounding district, with the Cottage building being the nucleus of the complex.

Within the complex is the General Sir Harry Chauvel Gallery. It was built with money donated by his sister Lillian Chauvel, a famous and talented artist. Lillian also gave 38 of her own paintings to be displayed in rotation.

The Museum tells the story of the formation of the NSW Mounted Infantry, whose headquarters were in Tenterfield. The story of the Light Horse Volunteers who went to the Boer War and WWI is told in detail. Tenterfield's three professional soldiers in WWI were General Sir Harry Chauvel, Lieut Colonel Charles Lee, and Colonel Michael Bruxner DSO, a Captain at Gallipoli. All three men served at Gallipoli. Lieut Colonel Charles Arthur Lee served as leader in the Camel Corp, but died in Tenterfield in 1918. He suffered from gas and influenza. Sir Harry Chauvel continued his career in the Army and Colonel Michael Bruxner went on to be MLA for New England for 41 years.

Petrie Cottage, an 1860s cottage, is also a part of the complex. With its two front rooms made of local pitsaw hardwood, sassafras slab and battens with board roof, this Cottage reflects a typical workman's lifestyle of the 1860s.

Please join in, we can all learn something.

Program outcomes

The Standards Program reinforced the direction our association was and is taking.

Strategic and action plans put in place were encouraging.

Beaudesert Historical Society, a volunteer organisation, was founded in 1961 to collect and record the history of the shire. Today they operate the Beaudesert Historical Museum and Visitor Information Centre in Brisbane Street Beaudesert. The site houses a number of buildings from the area and a collection of more than 10,000 donated objects, photographs and archival records relating to local settlement, industries and community history.

A favourite photographic opportunity for visitors is the Milbanks Pioneer Cottage built in 1875 by Patrick Milbanks on his Kerry district selection out of local timber. The cottage was donated to the society by the grandchildren of Patrick and Margaret Milbanks (the local midwife) and relocated to its present site in 1979.

In 2008 another significant building was acquired for the site - a tent hut used for the accommodation of railway workers. In 1888 when the Beaudesert Branch Railway opened, the town became a prosperous transport hub for the region's industries. The tent hut is an example of an individual detached bed-sitter tent hut for single men, prefabricated and portable, of a size readily transportable on narrow gauge railway wagons. The ventilated roof structure is of technological interest as an example of practical climate control.

Message to new participants

When first starting the Standards program we thought what have we got ourselves in for?! Well after doing the Standards Program we can recommend that if you have a museum or gallery, it is in your best interests to do this wonderful program. We have learned so much and the support given by M&GSQ's team, has been fantastic. We have many goals to work towards over the next five years and M&GSQ services have made things much easier with their resources and support. Go on do it, it's a bit of hard work, but with a great return at the end of the program.

Program outcomes

Committee structure

Through the assistance of M&GSQ we developed a working Executive Committee. This means that we could work on the recommendations made on the field visit. Outcomes since then include:

The tent hut now houses a display of railway-ana highlighting the Beaudesert Tramway and the Kyogle to Brisbane line history.

A digital index of local history and a digital catalogue of artefacts are both now well established.

Beenleigh & District Historical Society

Standards profile

Old Beenleigh Town (previously known as Beenleigh Historical Village) has over 20 buildings on site with historical significance to the local area. These include the original church, school, bootmakers shop, railway station, post office, jail, council chambers, and several historic cottages from the Beenleigh area.

The heritage buildings and village grounds contain: local farming & sugar machinery; artefacts connected to pioneer families; family photos and histories; a Beenleigh rum distillery display; a photographic record of Beenleigh Shire and Albert Shire; original war documents including a POW dog tag from Changi and an American Civil War display linking to the Beenleigh area.

Old Beenleigh Town encourages school groups to visit by providing hands on activities for children including old-fashioned washing, blacksmithing, bush-painting, caring for farm animals and lessons in the late 1800s school.

Old Beenleigh Town caters for weddings in the historic St. George's church, and runs other events throughout the year. These include an annual Celtic Day and Oktoberfest. The entry point to Old Beenleigh Town is the Beenleigh Visitor Information Centre, an accredited visitor information centre offering a one-stop shop for travel information.

Message to new participants

The Program was hard work but things drop into place at unexpected moments. All museums should do this program. It gives your museum meaning!

Program outcomes

Planning

We learnt the value of planning projects and research before all else. We are currently setting up different sub-committees so that basic work can be planned and big things achieved.

Networking

We found our involvement in the Program invaluable for the networking opportunities, particularly visiting other museums and seeing how they do things. We gained new ideas, many of which were so simple, we wondered why we hadn't thought of it!

Garden Hill at Lost World Museum

Standards profile

Garden Hill at Lost World Museum is situated on a small property located in the Lost World Valley, about 32km south of Beaudesert. The Museum buildings are mainly split slab and galvanised iron and have been re-erected. These have been adapted for use as exhibition spaces for historical displays and art.

The Museum has a wide-ranging collection drawn from the Kerry Valley and rural Queensland which includes farming machinery, timber industry equipment, horse drawn vehicles, harness and saddles, tools, household items, toys and photographs.

One building is used as a refreshment room, and a second accommodates changing displays drawn from the collections. Artworks on consignment are featured. The Museum is open to the public for special events or by appointment.

Message to new participants

Gold Coast & Hinterland Historical Society Museum

Standards profile

The Gold Coast & Hinterland Historical Society museum is situated on Gold Coast heritage listed land in a side street off Bundall Road creating an oasis from the hustle and bustle of traffic using this busy major traffic thoroughfare less than two kilometres from the Surfers Paradise coastline.

The grounds were the site of an Aboriginal gathering place and are positioned on a remaining section of an extensive section of a sand dune that was formed 120,000 years ago. In addition to being the site of an Aboriginal midden, and a developing historical garden, the grounds were used as a cemetery for local sugarcane workers and remain a consecrated site though rezoned in 1972 for use as a Historical Society.

The gardens have been developed to represent pre & post European history on the site. These include wallum, littoral rainforest and banksia woodland and an edible plant path is planned. The museum was involved with the ABC Open Garden scheme in 2009.

The Museum precinct consists of specialist display buildings, replica pioneering home and an original heritage building.

These include the original studio of Vincent Sheldon, a prominent Queensland etcher; "Boowaggan" a reproduction of the Veivers family home, pioneers from the area; Dolan's Barn, housing a collection of farming tools and machinery; Steam Engine building that displays two sawmill engines from the original Johnston and Freeman sawmill established in Southport in 1876; John Elliott building, which is the museum's principal display area and new extension that houses items from the Pacific Cable Station Bauer St, Southport and is the display area for the extensive photo collection.

Message to new participants

We undertook the Standards Program with trepidation but we have benefited tremendously, and we have certainly moved forward, achieved a lot and enhanced our image.

Program outcomes

Cataloguing our museum collection

Cataloguing of the collection was started following our participation in a series of Collection Management Workshops (funded by a Community Heritage Grant), and has been assisted greatly with the expertise and diligence of volunteers from the Gold Coast community, Volunteering Gold Coast and Griffith University.

Strategic planning

Our planning has resulted in the completion of a new building late 2011. With the guidance from important M&GSQ Reports undertaken in 2011 and 2012, we have begun a long term project to upgrade the John Elliott Building to appropriate Standard levels.

Rathdowney Historical Museum

Standards profile

The Rathdowney Historical Museum was opened in November 1984 and is housed in the Information Centre building, formally the Commercial Bank of Australia, Rathdowney Branch 1911-1978.

The collection relates to local history including pioneering families, pioneering women, timber and dairying industries, and artefacts from the local region since settlement from the 1860s onwards.

A collection of historic buildings from around the local area include the Rathdowney Tramway Station, Glenapp & Dulbolla Railway Sidings and a Hut from the Palen Creek Prison Farm. These buildings house an interesting range of objects that were used in everyday life and include a horse-drawn buggy, bullock wagon, drays and wagons.

The annual Rathdowney Heritage Festival celebrates the region's pioneering days with demonstrations including a working bullock team, wood-chopping, tent-pegging, working sheep dogs, whip cracking, blacksmithing, wheelwrighting, steam engines, leather work, washing and ironing the old way, working horse gear (cutting hay into chaff), shelling and cracking corn, butter churning, paper making, spinning, weaving and tatting. Displays include period costumes, old tools, machinery, historical photographs (including local families, education and industries), dairy and kitchen.

The Museum is located approximately 90 kilometres south of Brisbane on the Mt Lindesay Highway within the Scenic Rim Regional Council.

Message to new participants

Rathdowney Historical Museum (RADHA) has been motivated by the Standards Program even though we began with trepidation. We can thoroughly recommend it to all.

Program outcomes

Significance

The Standards Program has helped us to refocus and identify significant items in our collection, which has assisted us in the development of a marketing strategy.

Documentation

Being involved in the Standards Program has reinforced the need for documentation, cataloguing, identifying and recording the provenance of objects in the collection.

Tamborine Mountain Heritage Centre

Standards profile

The Tamborine Mountain Heritage Centre is dedicated specifically to the history of Tamborine Mountain. The collection is housed thematically in a number of buildings: Pioneer Hall (a weatherboard re-located church), the Auditorium (meeting space, storage for documents and archives), Machinery Hall, Shop, Dairy and Blacksmith, Slab Cottage and an open style machinery shed. The shop, slab cottage and blacksmith shop are reconstructions of typical structures of the period of early settlement, from the 1880s onwards. The dairy is an actual relocated dairy typical of the structure and machinery used on Tamborine and in much of Southeast Queensland.

Pioneer Hall incorporates a "Fashion House" with a significant collection of early clothing worn by settlers on the mountain including a dress worn to the opening of federal parliament. There is also a scale model of the water-wheel which drove the Curtis sawmill, ingenious displays representing pioneer settlement lifestyles.

The historical society's collection includes a number of early photographs, documents and tape recordings of interviews of the families of early settlers.

Message to new participants

This program provides a valuable opportunity for museum workers to really assess all aspects of museum management, including collections and public interaction. It is highly recommended.

Program outcomes

The Standards Program has emphasised the need for more documentation regarding the collection including details of acquisition, preservation and restoration of particular items, as well as significance.

We have realised the need for a consistent approach to interpretation of the buildings and displays. We are developing standardised signage to aid visitors to better understand the buildings and displays in terms of the chronological context of the settlement of Tamborine Mountain.

Upper Clarence Historical Society Pioneer Cottage & Bicentennial Museum

Standards profile

The Upper Clarence Historical Society was established to collect and record the history of the region and to provide a resource of knowledge, ideas, stories and memories of its early settlers.

The Upper Clarence Historical Precinct contains two buildings: a pioneer cottage and the bicentennial museum. The cottage of Cuthbert and Mary Lamb was constructed of local timbers at Legume in 1892 and was moved to its present site in Urbenville in 1977. In 1980 (in time for the cottage's centenary celebrations in 1982) its separate kitchen building was also brought to the site. The cottage buildings display a collection of early pioneer local domestic life and memorials of local World War I servicemen.

The Bicentennial Museum houses collections reflecting the region's gold mining, timber and dairy industries as well as the social history of the local communities. The historical society is currently researching the significance of the collections in order to better display the objects and their local stories.

The Society is looking forward to celebrating the centenary of Urbenville in 2012 and also the 120th birthday of the Pioneer Cottage.

Message to new participants

We became aware of the Standards Program in 2007 and eagerly sought to become involved. This program was to be a source of information, networking and more importantly guidance as the new committee for the reformed Upper Clarence Historical Society struggled with the complexity and enormity of its task as custodians of its collection. We are from a small village in northern NSW close to the QLD border and were welcomed into the Program by Museum & Gallery Services QLD.

Collection significance

The Yugambeh Museum is committed to the conservation and promotion of the cultural heritage of the traditional Aboriginal people of the Yugambeh Language Region. The region extends from the Tweed River in the south to the Logan River in the north and west.

The Museum's collections include ancient and contemporary artefacts, art pieces, family histories, archival records and photographs and an extensive library of books, audio and video tapes and CDs relating to the shared Aboriginal and European history of the region. Great emphasis has been given to the collection of records relating to Yugambeh and other languages of southeast Queensland. It prides itself on being a keeping place for information relating to the local Yugam language, which Museum founders have gathered since it was thought extinct in the 1980s.

Research by the Museum's founders has also led to the establishment of a number of "modern" traditions including an annual Black Diggers Remembrance Ceremony honouring Aboriginal men and women from the frontier wars of the 1800s to Australian military service in world wars and overseas campaigns since the Boer War. The Drumley Walk is another major event for the Museum. This three day walking pilgrimage through the traditional lands of the Yugambeh Aboriginal peoples includes story-telling and interpretive guiding. Participants in 2008 reached into the hundreds.

Message to new participants

The Standards Program has helped us to identify the strengths and weakness of our organisation and to maximise the opportunities that are available to us. A great return for the time and effort.

Program outcomes

Museum management

The Standards Program brought home to us the importance of formal guidelines for management. The Yugambeh Museum will regularly review and update its Policies and Procedures Manual and ensure it is readily accessible to all staff.

Significance assessment

We have realised that the significance of an object can be greatly enhanced by the addition of relevant data eg provenance, type of material, ownership, age etc. In the future the Yugambeh Museum will ensure that all known information about an object is recorded on the database for curator use.

Australian Motorlife Museum

Standards profile

The goal of the Australian Motorlife Museum is to display to the public the history of motoring, especially in the era pre 1940. Later vehicles will also be exhibited and collected, keeping the overriding quantities of the exhibitions to this period. Collections will include motor accessories, tools, service station and motor garage equipment, photographs and literature including books.

Alongside the motor vehicles, exhibitions of typewriters, telephones, gramophones and early radios will be displayed, as items which also had a major impact on everyday life and the way it was lived. Displays will aim at providing a perspective view of parallel technological development, particularly of the period 1880 to 1940.

The Museum will continue to build on its library of motoring and related books and other literature, and to make the information therein available to historians and restorers. During early 2009 the museum's 16 year battle to save the 'Paul Butler Collection' from dispersal ended. The collection is now stored at the museum and will very soon be moved into a purpose designed conservation and storage area (480sqm) which has been added to an initial 2000sqm. Further exhibition space (750sqm) is to be constructed.

Illawarra Museum

The Illawarra Museum represents late 19th century Illawarra. The collection is housed in the 1882 Post and Telegraph Office, a very fine example of late colonial architecture.

The Museum collection conveys a sense of life in the days before Wollongong was dominated by heavy industry. The upper floor is furnished in the period when the postmaster was in residence. A bedroom and parlour have been furnished to display late 19th century life. The Museum also has displays of crafts, agricultural machinery, a blacksmith's workshop and school room typical of the period. There are also objects including the massive Telegraph Office desk in the foyer.

The Museum is conducted on a voluntary basis by members of the Illawarra Historical Society who, through collection, preservation and exhibiting material, present a picture of the past to the general public, school groups and visitors.

Old Wollongong Court House

Standards profile

The Old Court House is the oldest public building in Wollongong and represents the era when Wollongong Harbour was the main port. Built in 1858, it is a rendered brick building with an elegant sandstone arched portico. In 1885, the building was used as a customs house servicing the coastal shipping trade. Following federation, the site was transferred to the Wollongong City Council and a management committee was established to oversee the building's restoration and on-going management.

The site includes the Weatherboard Customs Office built on Brighton Lawn in c1880 and moved across Cliff Road to the Old Court House site in 1938. The restored buildings house the offices of the Illawarra Shoalhaven Branch of the National Trust and Conservation Volunteers Australia.

The Old Court House is within the Belmore Basin Conservation Area, which includes Wollongong Harbour, Flagstaff Hill, Osbourne Park, Smiths Hill Fort and the North Beach Precinct. Plaques provide information for a self-guided walking tour of this historically significant and visually impressive Conservation Area.

Program outcomes

Site interpretation

The Program provided an opportunity to discuss possibilities for site and building interpretation with experienced peers.

Port Kembla Heritage Park

Standards profile

Step into the past, present and future at Port Kembla Heritage Park. Located adjacent to the Eastern Breakwater of Port Kembla Outer Harbour, the heritage park precinct has been and remains an observer of the development of the region from Aboriginal times through to the present and into the future. Overlooking the working port of Port Kembla, the park incorporates Maritime, Military and Aboriginal Heritage that all belong on the site.

The Aboriginal middens on the site are being linked by a new Aboriginal trail connecting them with other important Aboriginal sites nearby.

The Breakwater Battery building and gun emplacements are key structures of the command centre for Fortress Kembla used during World War II. The pilots and signal station represent maritime heritage, with an interpretive exhibit to be completed by mid year.

A self-guided Heritage Trail with explanatory signage is accessible seven days per week with a brochure guide available from Tourist Centres at Wollongong, Shellharbour and Kiama, or by contacting us directly.

Tongarra Museum

Explore the history of Shellharbour through changing exhibitions of local Aboriginal and European culture. Collect a heritage trail map and take a walking tour of historic Albion Park.

Tongarra Museum endeavours to record the history of the settlement of the City of Shellharbour: its people, their way of life, and development and progress in relation to the natural, cultural, social and historical environments of the area. The Museum collection features artefacts, photographs, oral histories, maps, lithographs and historic documents that form a comprehensive representative sample of items pertaining to the history and development of the Shellharbour City area and its people.

Significant items include a 1900s Victoria Automatic Sock Knitting Machine used to knit socks for WWI soldiers, a handmade cot quilt sewn by pioneer Sarah Thomas (c 1830s) and framed hand-coloured photographs of Lake Illawarra in 1928.

Shellharbour City Council operates the Tongarra Museum with the assistance of the Tongarra Heritage Society.

Message to new participants

Good luck to all participants! Tongarra Museum is happy to have participated in the Standards Program. Thanks to the staff at M&G NSW and the great review team – we now have a clearer direction for the future and the motivation to achieve these goals.

Program outcomes

Purchase of MOSAiC Plus through funding from M&G NSW

Tongarra Museum will soon begin digitising our collection through the MOSAiC software. This large undertaking has been made much easier for us through the development of our Object Files for collection items; a suggestion from the M&G NSW Standards team. This database will be an invaluable tool for our Museum.

Developing our online presence

Tongarra Museum has updated its web pages on Shellharbour City Council's website to include information on our museum programs, resources and local history information. Wollondilly Shire is located between the mountains and the sea. Contemporary displays tell the thought provoking stories of the D'harawal and Gundungorra and of the working lives of the men and women from many nations who worked on the land, in mines and homes and villages.

The museum holds the unique indexed Burragorang Valley Scrolls which document the amazing history of the Valley & Yerranderie. The Catholic Bushwalkers had a retreat in the area which held an unusual Welsh Folding Bed for use by the visiting priest. This now has a central position together with the story of St Joseph's convent school.

Coal mining is represented in an interactive display and beautiful painted Nattai Union Banner. Visitors can see eggs and apples graded and packed for market and see a display of local apple box labels. This includes the stories of Estonian migrants who made a significant contribution to the poultry industry.

The centre is operated by volunteers from the Oaks Historical Society and has excellent access for people with disabilities, a large car/coach park, a community access room with audio visual and P/R facilities, a kitchen, shady verandahs and landscaped native gardens, a reference library, catalogued archives and a well stocked Museum Shop. We are famous for our home cooked Devonshire teas which are available to pre-booked coach groups!

Australian Fossil and Mineral Museum

Standards profile

Situated in the heart of Bathurst, the Australian Fossil and Mineral Museum is the home of the internationally renowned Somerville Collection. Housed in the 1876 Public School building the Museum features some of the finest and rarest examples of minerals and scientifically significant fossils from Australia and around the world.

Warren Somerville (AM) found his first fossil at Borenore near Orange when he was just nine years old, an event which inspired him to embark on a lifetime of collecting. Now, more than sixty years later, the Somerville collection of fossils and minerals is one of the most spectacular in the world.

Hundreds of different mineral crystals are beautifully displayed in the Mineral Gallery. From the largest–a metre tall geode lined with large Amethyst crystals, to the smallest of over 100 tiny, perfectly formed thumbnail specimens–all the colours and shapes imaginable are on show.

In the Fossil Gallery you can see fossils from every stage of life on Earth, from the first single-celled life in the ancient oceans billions of years ago, to the egg of Madagascar's extinct Elephant bird only thousands of years old. The main attractions of the gallery are the Tyrannosaurus rex skeleton, Australia's largest collection of fossils in amber and a collection of Australia's unique opalised fossils.

The Museum has a temporary exhibition space with a regularly changing program.

Bathurst District Historical Society Museum

Standards profile

The Bathurst District Historical Society Museum and Archives is located in a wing of the heritage classified courthouse, designed by Colonial Government Architect James Barnett in 1880.

Formed in May 1947 the Society's first collections document important regional developments such as the growth of the garrison town, contact with explorers and surveyors, the first gold discovery in NSW, the formulation of Cobb and Co., and the region's colourful bushranging history.

It is home to the Penzig Collection and comprises paintings, pictures, drawings, objects and costumes amassed by renowned bushranger enthusiast Edgar Penzig and his wife over a lifetime of collecting.


Highlights of the collection include a selection of Chifley memorabilia acquired from long term resident of Bathurst, Joseph Benedict Chifley (1885-1951), Australia's 16th Prime Minister.

Additionally over 65,000 photographic images, glass plate negatives, and other related ephemera form a significant part of the collection.

There are also two carved trees or dendroglyphs in the collection which are a unique feature of traditional Australian indigenous culture. The Wiradjuri carved ceremonial tree was found near O'Connell about 25 kilometres east of Bathurst and is thought to have marked a ceremonial site or grave.

The second carved tree is a River Red gum that once stood at the mouth of the Mandagery Creek at the junction of the Lachlan River. In June 1815, explorer and surveyor George Evans marked this tree to show he had reached the furthest westward point of any British explorer at the time.

Chifley Home

Standards profile

Discover the life of one of Australia's great Prime Ministers and the challenges of the 1940's in a World War II house museum.

Chifley Home at 10 Busby Street in Bathurst was the only residence of Prime Minister Ben Chifley and his wife, Elizabeth. Today, this modest semi-detached terrace still contains its original collection of household furnishings and personal effects dating back to when the Chifleys first occupied the house in 1914.

The home is located in the working-class railway district of Bathurst where Ben himself served twenty-five years as a railway worker before entering Federal Parliament in Canberra in 1928.

Ben and Elizabeth's home is a testament to the frugalness of the times when the hardships of the Great Depression, wartime rationing and austerity measures, dictated how people led their ordinary lives. The collection also contains an assortment of ceremonial gifts presented to Chifley in his roles as Prime Minister and Treasurer.

After Ben died in 1951, the house continued to be occupied by Elizabeth, until her death in 1962. The house, with its collection, was bequeathed to the Presbyterian Church until it was later sold in 1972 to Bathurst City Council.

Cairns & District Chinese Association

The Cairns and District Chinese Association is the custodian of the Lit Sung Goong Temple Collection, a significant collection of over 240 items from the temple which operated in Cairns between 1886 and 1964.

The Lit Sung Goong Temple collection is an outstanding example of the material culture of Chinese-Australian religious practices. It comprises a range of artefacts, most produced in China and brought to North Queensland in the late nineteenth century. Objects include timber furniture, deity statues, decorative panels, altar table and canopy, printing and fortune telling materials and metal incense burners and processional items. The collection is accessible to the public by appointment and enquiries welcome.

This fantastic collection does not have a permanent home. It is our goal to establish a contemporary Chinese Cultural & Heritage Centre in Cairns to permanently store and exhibit the collection with the North Queensland Chinese heritage stories for the enjoyment of all.

The North Queensland Chinese Cultural and Heritage Fund, established in 2009 enables us to accept tax deductible donations. In 2010 the fundraising committee developed a website for this project.

They also established the name and logo for the proposed centre, check it out on the website. We look forward to growing this building fund.

Cairns Historical Society Museum

Standards profile

The Cairns Museum, part of Cairns Historical Society, is housed in the School of Arts building, one of the oldest heritage listed buildings in Cairns. The School of Arts building celebrated its one hundred year anniversary in 2007 and was originally established as a library and a place of education for the Cairns public. The Historical Society was established within this framework to collect and preserve Cairns' written, photographic and oral history. The museum continues this charter by displaying the history of the region.

The Museum displays a unique collection of Aboriginal rainforest artefacts, including swords and shields found only in the North Queensland area, photographs of Aboriginal people with their weapons, basketry and dwellings taken by a well-known photographer of the time, Alf Atkinson and photographs of the construction of the Cairns to Kuranda railway. The Cairns Historical Society Library has an extensive collection of over 20,000 documents and 16,000 photographs, available to researchers. Many of these have been digitised and are available on a searchable database.

Message to new participants

We started this program with great trepidation but found it to be of great benefit not only to the Museum but mostly to our volunteers, giving them a better understanding and appreciation of the work they are doing.

Program outcomes

Improved storage and acquisition policies

The storage of our artefacts is now being reorganised. Artefacts are being sorted and excess items will possibly be offered to peer organisations.

Improved display and exhibition labelling

All labels in the Museum are being redesigned, enlarged and colour printed to make them more visitor-friendly.

Croydon Heritage Centre

Standards profile

Croydon Downs, a 19th century Queensland Gulf cattle station, became a bustling centre of fortune, progress, industry and hope when it was declared a goldfield in 1885. Its living legacy is a 19th century heritage precinct containing civic and government buildings that are restored as museums; magnificent displays of steam machinery; historic cemeteries; a reconstructed railway station and unique heritage rail lines; the last hotel and General Store from the goldfield; replicated and original street lights, hand hewn sandstone gutters and bridge ramparts and an in situ mining museum - all free to the public.

Croydon's status of being one of the largest rural Chinese settlements in Queensland during the gold rush is interpreted in the museum displays, at the Chinese Temple archaeological dig site and lives on in the remaining descendants of Chinese families.

Croydon True Blue Heritage Centre has a Croydon family genealogy database dating from 1886, a movie shown in the theatrette and more museum information and archives. It has sculptures, machinery, antique cars and mining architecture in its botanical gardens.

Access to collections

Croydon Shire Council's large collection of historic documents and objects are being recorded, preserved, displayed and archived in the Croydon True Blue Visitor Information Centre and other Croydon museum locations.

The Library collects newspapers, photographs, printed and audiovisual material relating to the history of the old Johnstone Shire area, including the hard copy of the "Innisfail Advocate" newspaper, as well as a microfilm version, from 1928 to 1980.

The Library collects modern reference books on Art Deco design, including architecture and other topics such as Art Deco jewellery. They are a useful reference for understanding the development of this style of architecture, which is prevalent in the design of public buildings in Johnstone Shire.

The Library collection includes photographs of the aftermath of cyclones from 1918, 1986 and 2006. Innisfail has suffered the effects of several major cyclones and these photos show the power of such events.

The Library also collects works produced by local authors and organisations. The collection includes original photographs of the local area including photos relating to northern area Cassowary Coast Regional Council staff and activities.

Message to new participants

Awareness of community

Lit Sing Gung Temple

Standards profile

The Lit Sing Gung Temple is an original art deco building constructed in 1940 by the renowned construction firm the Romano Bros. after the original Temple was badly damaged in several cyclones, flood & fire. Most of the Temple artefacts date from 1896 and originate from China. They represent deities of the Taoist, Confucian and Buddhist traditions.

Until recent years the Temple was the home of Ah Buks, elderly Chinese men who lived out their lives in exile in Australia, supported by the Chinese community, as they had failed to make their fortune from the gold rushes and could not rejoin their families empty handed.

The Temple is still open 365 days a year and is the only one in Far North Queensland providing an authentic haven for worship and celebrations. On appropriate days, candles and joss sticks are lit and gifts of symbolic paper money are burnt in the offering urn (ding) in the Temple garden.

Message to new participants

Go ahead and join the program. There is a wealth of information to be accessed. The facilitators of the Standards program are helpful, knowledgeable and are available to answer any queries. It's also a great opportunity to network.

Program outcomes

Stronger networks

By building stronger networks we will be able to pursue the proposal to work on the history of the local Chinese community. We have commenced work on this project and will meet with the local librarian to assist us.

Expanding volunteer program

We plan to run a feature article in the local newspaper and invite members of the community to become involved in volunteer work with Friends of the Temple Inc.

Mulgrave Settlers Museum

Standards profile

2005 Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards. Winner, Organisations: Volunteer.

The volunteer operated Mulgrave Settlers Museum is set amongst the sugar cane fields of Gordonvale, next to the Mulgrave Central Mill. The museum displays objects, photographs and stories relating to the settlers of the then Mulgrave Shire. Displays depict objects, photographs and stories from the Aboriginal people of the area, the early gold miners and the timber cutters. These are set against a rainforest backdrop painted by Ivy Zappala, a well known artist. The settlers home features furniture and homemaker's aids in the pioneering women's domain, demonstrating the ingenuity and craftsmanship of the era.

Significant objects in the collection include a fully equipped blacksmith's shop; a hundred year old gunpowder log splitter; a linen tablecloth from a church function held during the Second World War bearing signatures of guests and some of the 503rd Paratroopers. The collection also includes memorabilia from both World Wars together with a display of artefacts from the time the 503rd Parachute Infantry Regiment trained in Gordonvale.

Message to new participants

It really is an enlightening journey and I thoroughly recommend it to all.

Program outcomes

Improved interpretation

We secured a grant and had a Significance Assessment done. Recognition of our blacksmith's shop and other artefacts including records from the Mulgrave Central Mill were recorded. All of our material is recorded on the computer under the MOSAIC Program and we are working on object files to complement this. Community interaction has bolstered our American 503rd Parachute Infantry Regiment records and recently we published a book recording these. Another book, titled "From Plain Camp to Gordonvale", will be available in 2013.

Improved practice

We intend to have regular planning meetings and to improve communication. We have selected five objects of significance that will be of assistance in promoting the museum.

Glenreagh is the oldest village in the Orara Valley, and has retained much of the atmosphere from its early years as a gold mining and timber area. The Glenreagh Memorial Museum is located in the School of Arts building, dating back to 1915. Our collection embraces the many aspects of life as it was in the valley from the heady days of gold mining to the thriving early timber industry, education and social events. Many visitors enjoy their walk down memory lane, whilst visiting children have fun with the butter churns and pats.

The Museum is a fine arts and archaeology museum with international collections derived from Britain's first social history museum (1934-45).

It contains significant and varied collections of medieval, renaissance and Pre-Raphaelite stained glass (including glass from Winchester Cathedral); prehistoric antiquities dating back 500,000 years; Egyptian, Mesopotamian, Persian and classical antiquities; Old Masters including works by School of Sassetta, Rubens, Van Honquist, Tintoretto and others; some fifty 19th century paintings by the Royal Watercolour Society; Japanese swords and armour; picture books by Shigemasa and Hokusai; wooden sculpture from Cheveley Manor, a post-Stuart ducal house; masonry from the Rosary Palace of Edward II (c. 1320); a large collection of British Bronze Age weapons; 12th century sandstone sculptures from Java; a series of medieval illuminated manuscripts from Europe and Asia and a rare miniature of Charles I following his execution (1649).

The Museum also hosts its famous winter event – the Abbey Medieval Festival that annually attracts over 30,000 visitors and participants.

Kingaroy Heritage Museum

Kingaroy's landmark "Peanut Silos" tower over the Museum, creating a magnet for the visitor seeking information about these giants and the industry they symbolise.

The Museum is housed in the old Kingaroy Power House Building (1925-1952), and the main focus of the museum is the history of the peanut industry. This is depicted by the collection of agricultural machinery showing the ingenuity and inventiveness of local farmers and tradesmen.

The Museum's comprehensive collection includes machinery invented by locals out of a need for suitable implements to plant and harvest the peanut crops. Machinery includes a Bicycle Powered Thresher, built in 1909, an American made wheat thresher, converted by a local farmer to thresh peanuts, and a Stationary Peanut Thresher designed and built on a local farm by the farmer Mr Harry Young, in the late 1920s.

The collection also includes a rare and unusual boomerang, which was presented to the first Kingaroy Stationmaster in 1904, by the local Aboriginal people.

Along with photos and objects relating to the people who founded the town and those who grew up under the shadow of the silos, the Museum provides an experience of Kingaroy's significance in Australia's History.

Message to new participants

The Logan City Historical Museum Society Inc, a volunteer organisation, shares the old Kingston Butter Factory building with a Craft Centre, performance space and a refreshment kiosk. The Kingston Butter Factory was built in 1906 with production of butter commencing in 1907. Peak production was reached in 1934, with 3,367 tons of butter produced in that year. Production ceased in 1983 owing to urbanisation, ending an important era in the development of Logan City.

The most important items in the collection are without doubt the full set of Southern Queensland Dairy Cooperative records from 1906 through to close of operations.

Queensland Ambulance Museums – Wynnum is the first of its kind to be established in Australia and is now one of several within Queensland. The museums demonstrate a tradition of close reciprocal support between the Ambulance Service and the community, through the presentation of the story of close community relations, community operations, clinical links, educational links and strong community support that feature in the history of Queensland Ambulance.

The exhibits show the progress of ambulance development, which has taken us from the simple first aid kits, and basic clinical practices of the nineteenth century to the defibrillators and complex clinical practices of the twenty-first century. The museum shows the transition from the hand held stretcher, through the hand-wheeled litter, jingles towing litters, to motorised ambulances.

The Museum has several historic ambulance vehicles in the collection, including a 1926 Arrol Johnson (Scottish) ambulance.

The Redland Museum was officially opened in 1970, and since then has grown through eight stages of expansion to its present size of 1 450 square metres. The Museum and research collections relate to all aspects of the history of the Redland Shire from 1842 until the present.

The Museum collection of 13 000 objects includes treasures such as a rare working example of a wooden Halladay Standard pumping windmill that has been lovingly restored; a bell from an historic local sugar cane plantation; Captain Louis Hope's harmonium; an early example of a Cleveland Bakery cart; a 1930s railcar of the type which ran the Brisbane to Cleveland Line, and a working Garrett portable steam engine from 1900. Temporary exhibitions change every six to eight weeks.

Redland Museum is a non-profit community association, with a membership base of over 280, including 60 active volunteers and 3 paid staff. Our mission is to preserve the heritage of the local community, to operate an excellent museum with outstanding displays, and to entertain and inform the public.

Message to new participants

150 million years before dinosaurs roamed the earth, almost all backboned animals lived in water, not on land. This was the Devonian Period, or the 'Age of Fishes'. A chance find near Canowindra in NSW in 1956, and a major excavation of the same site in 1993, uncovered a remarkable fossil site. This site contained well preserved remains of thousands of bizarre, long extinct fishes encased in bony armour, other fishes with lungs and huge predators with crocodile-like jaws, many of them new to science.

The most important fossil treasures are now on display at the Age of Fishes Museum in Canowindra. They display a unique 'window in time' that allows visitors to study what happened there 360 million years ago. They are supplemented by aquarium displays, permanent exhibitions, gift shop, geological time line, sculpture garden and an outdoor picnic area. The audio tour will lead visitors through the exhibitions using an exciting and informative tour by Dr Robyn Williams and Karina Kelly. The audio tour is inclusive with admission and caters for adults and children. Large groups are given a guided tour of the exhibitions.

Message to new participants

Don't panic—I did! It was an excellent program with productive results for the Age of Fishes Museum. All members of the Age of Fishes Museum community encourage others to participate in the Standards Program.

Program outcomes

The Collection Management Policy was developed as a result of the Standards Program. This policy has since been updated and is in hardcopy and electronic format.

Due to developing long term plans the Age of Fishes Museum has been able to increase the annual visitation to the Museum. Additional exhibitions and activities have been added and include; a geological time walk, picnic ground, large games board, fossil stands and interpretation.

Boorowa Museum is housed in what is believed to be the last commercial pisé building in Australia, built by George Patterson (c 1860) as his undertaker's premises.

Prominent displays include "Windows on Wool", an historical and contemporary tribute to the Boorowa wool industry, and the Hume family display featuring the significant Hume Costume Collection. Another significant collection item is the "Star of Murrungal" and related documentation; a locally built bullock wagon (c 1900).

The Museum, operated by Boorowa and District Historical Society Inc, is an active partner in the Lachlan Museum Trail website and promotes the "Shamrock Trails" walking trail around Boorowa.

Canowindra Museum is situated in the main street between Memorial Park and the Age of Fishes Museum. The entrance is via a pioneers wall and commemorative walkway. The museum depicts the development of Canowindra from its beginnings as a 1840s frontier settlement through to its growth as a centre for a rich agricultural district.

The collection comprises vehicles of the horse drawn era, vintage farm implements and machinery that reflects the importance of lucerne, wheat and wool. An authentic slab hut, school room, woolshed and tiny weatherboard shop have been relocated and house thematic displays. The main building displays household items, textiles and wedding gowns of local brides from 1886 onwards and a complete dental surgery.

The Museum provides a fresh approach to the past featuring historical aspects of the Yass district.



Australian Country Hospital Heritage Association

Standards profile

2007 Gallery and Museum Achievement Awards. Winner, Organisations: Volunteer

The Australian Country Hospital Heritage Association Inc (ACHHA) was formed in 1998 with the aim of collecting and preserving a wide range of materials reflecting hospital life in country hospitals in the latter part of the 19th century and the first half of the 20th century. The collection includes artefacts, memorabilia, photographs, records and stories from nursing, medical, dental and pharmaceutical sources covering 150 years of nursing history.

On 21 November 2009, the Association opened a permanent home, the Country Hospital Museum at the Rockhampton Heritage Village. This building, formerly the Mt Morgan Hospital Nurses' Quarters, enables the Association to better display the collection in a hospital context featuring typical rooms and facilities found in country hospitals in the past.

The displays feature an equipped general ward, an operating theatre, a doctor's office, a dentist's treatment room, a pharmacy display, an infant care room, pan and treatment rooms and a typical nurse's bedroom. An operational Iron Lung donated to the Rockhampton Hospital by the Nuffield Foundation in 1938 takes pride of place on the veranda, as was often the case in hospitals when these were vital equipment items. A selection of historic photographs is displayed throughout the building, and a doll display of typical uniforms is a notable feature.

With the general museum displays well established, the Association's priorities include digitisation, documentation and recording of the Association's paper, video and audio tape records and the photograph collection. This will ensure the future availability of the archival collections which include important oral history interviews.

The Association has embarked on a program of changing displays featuring particular aspects of the collection. These will be renewed approximately quarterly to encourage return visits. Examples so far are nurses in wartime, poliomyelitis, Indigenous health at Woorabinda and Christmas in hospital wards.

Message to new participants

Don't be daunted – be enthusiastic and involve as many of your members as possible in this exercise. The results will surprise you. Best wishes and good luck.

Program outcomes

Organisational structure

The Standards Program reinforced the direction our association was taking. All management documentation eg. strategic and action plans, policies and procedures are being reviewed and updated biannually or as needed.

Management Committee support

Involvement in the program has helped management committee members to understand the importance of good governance which is a product of open and informed discussion followed by accurate documentation and follow through on decisions reached.

Capricorn Coast Historical Society

Standards profile

The Capricorn Coast Historical Society (CCHS) possesses a mainly print collection of material relating to all aspects of the Capricorn Coast region: photographs, publications, documents & records. The Society holds only a small number of objects. Increasingly, new material is being digitised to facilitate storage.

Items of significance include photographs taken by Rutherford Armstrong, last Manager of the Yeppoon Sugar Company; manuscripts, photos and correspondence of prolific Central Queensland poet and writer Mary Rattenbury; the Walls Family collection recording their 60 years as prominent leaseholders on North Keppel Island; archives of settler James Atherton; and papers of local firms and organisations such as the Coastguard. Over recent years, the CCHS has concentrated on building the photograph collection and, thanks to donations by local people, this is now a very significant record of the Coast's history.

In addition to building the collection and making it available to users, our activities include coach and boat tours to historic sites; workshops on preservation of collection items and recently on oral history interview techniques; a very successful publishing program of local history books and an annual calendar; and regular displays and community involvement. CCHS is part of the Central Queensland Museums Network.

We have now returned to our home at the Bunker following refurbishment of the building by Council. The Society also has undertaken considerable upgrading of storage and equipment facilities to ensure quality preservation of the collection and improving working conditions for our volunteers.

Message to new participants

The CCHS was unsure whether the Standards program would be relevant to our small organisation, but we benefited in many ways, focusing our goals and procedures. Accept the challenge!

Program outcomes

Develop policy documentation

We have worked to create a range of policy documents relating to the collection and management of the Society and the training of members. These will be reviewed on a regular basis.

Improved skills and awareness of collection conservation

With the move to the new premises, there has been an opportunity to greatly improve our storage, care and documentation of material in the collection.



Hambledon Cottage

Hambledon Cottage was built by John Macarthur in 1824 on the grounds of his Elizabeth Farm Estate. This elegant cottage is built of sandstock brick in the Colonial Georgian style, and boasts a verandah enclosed by French doors and a beautiful, vaulted ceiling.

Hambledon Cottage is presented as a house museum in the domestic style of the 1820-80s, and contains many pieces of the era. The building was leased to the Parramatta and District Historical Society (est. 1913) in the 1960s after restoration work was carried out by Parramatta City Council.

Highlights of the collection include an 1836 Broadwood square piano, the Rev. Samuel Marsden's desk and an elegant circa 1840s four-poster bed.

Maitland City Council is undertaking a program of restoration to stop rainwater affecting the building. This will mean roof and drain repairs.

Standards profile

Newcastle Art Gallery began in 1957 in the War Memorial Cultural Centre in Newcastle's CBD, following a donation of over 100 works of art by benefactor Roland Pope. The Gallery moved next door to its current location in 1977 and was officially opened by Queen Elizabeth II. Today, the Gallery presents a diverse program of over 300 public events and education programs annually, and over 30 events for members of the Newcastle Art Gallery Society. Events include art workshops, guided tours, film screenings, music performances, toddler family days, lectures, seminars, teacher previews and study days.

Exhibition program

The Gallery presents a diverse, changing program of up to 20 local, national and international exhibitions a year, 90 percent of which are curated in-house. The exhibition program primarily draws on the permanent collection, as well as public and private collections, and includes the presentation of major touring exhibitions.

Collection

Newcastle Art Gallery's collection presents a comprehensive overview of Australian art from colonial times to the present. It includes important Indigenous barks and poles along with a growing collection of Indigenous contemporary paintings. The collection also includes works on paper, photography and sculpture. The Gallery has the only Australian regional collection which includes a group of Rodin sculptures. It also holds the largest collection of modern Japanese ceramics in the southern hemisphere.

Society and support

Newcastle Art Gallery Society is an integral part of the cultural life of Newcastle and aims to promote and support the Gallery and the development of its collection. There are over 1,300 members who attend exhibition previews and special events including lectures and films. Members receive the society magazine Artemis. In addition, the Newcastle Art Gallery Foundation, comprised of over 140 members, raises money and manages invested funds to support the development of the collection. Since its inception the Foundation has donated works of art in excess of \$5.5 million.

Sketchley Cottage is the only known example of an 1840s colonial building in the Port Stephens Shire.

There is a blacksmith shop used for demonstrations and displays of hand made tools, an early timber jinker, a 1930 Massey Ferguson tractor, and other agricultural equipment.

The cottage houses a collection of handmade underwear, clothing and bed linen and is run by the Raymond Terrace and District Historical Society.

Wingham Museum

Wingham Museum and Archives is operated by the Manning Valley Historical Society, and is located in a National Trust listed building dating from the 1870s.

The building has operated as a store for much of its life and this identity is still preserved in many of the exhibits. The store sold a diverse array of goods ranging from clothing to ironmongery, crockery, patent medicines, wire netting, rope and saddlery. The collection today is just as diverse featuring photographs, furniture and household items from the lives of the early settlers in Manning Valley.

The Museum also displays material relating to the life of Jimmy Governor (immortalized in "The Chant of Jimmy Blacksmith") including the cell in which he was held before his transfer to Sydney.

Message to new participants
