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Upper Clarence Historical Society Pioneer Cottage & Bicentennial Museum Creates Action Plan for a Healthy Future

Museum and Gallery Services Queensland (M&GSQ) congratulates Upper Clarence Historical Society Pioneer Cottage & Bicentennial Museum, one of nine community collecting institutions from the Gold Coast, Hinterland and Scenic Rim areas who have completed the 2008 Standards Program. Their achievements were recognised at a formal event hosted by the Scenic Rim Regional Council on Wednesday 3 December.

The Standards Program is a year long supportive program for Queensland's museum sector designed to help participating museums plan for a healthy future by recognising their achievements, raising their profile and identifying strategic priorities for improvement and development.

Upper Clarence Historical Society Pioneer Cottage & Bicentennial Museum received a certificate of recognition from Rebekah Butler, Executive Director, Museum & Gallery Services Queensland in acknowledgment of their achievement and hard work.

Reviewers, Ken Brooks and Josh Tarrant, who provided professional expertise free of charge throughout the program, congratulated Upper Clarence Historical Society Pioneer Cottage & Bicentennial Museum saying

'the museum committee have shown dedication to implementing the actions devised in partnership with Reviewers through the Standards Program and have made considerable headway into the work at hand'.

The Upper Clarence Historical Society was established to collect and record the history of the region and to provide a resource of knowledge, ideas, stories and memories of its early settlers. The Upper Clarence Historical Precinct contains two buildings: a pioneer cottage and the Bicentennial Museum. The cottage of Cuthbert and Mary Lamb was constructed of local timbers at Legume in 1892 and was moved to its present site in Urbenville in 1977. In 1980 (in time for the cottage's centenary celebrations in 1982) its separate kitchen building was also brought to the site. The cottage buildings display a collection of early pioneer local domestic life and memorials of local World War 1 servicemen. The Bicentennial Museum houses collections reflecting the region's gold mining, timber and dairy industries as well as the social history of the local communities.

The Museum is making positive changes on a number of fronts. The Historical Society is currently researching the significance of the collections in order to better display the objects and their local

THE VISUAL ARTS AND CRAFT STRATEGY

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With the help of Reviewers the Museum has identified, what could potentially be a really significant object for the region. A Chinese urn, thought to be related to the Tooloom gold diggings in the 1860-70s, has yet to be further researched, but has already evoked a wealth of stories and memories from locals. This find emphasises the importance and diversity of community museum collections.

Kerry Brown, Chairperson, **Upper Clarence Historical Society Pioneer Cottage & Bicentennial Museum** explained what they gained from participating in the Standards program:

'Through being involved in the Standards Program we have received help in identifying significant items in our collection and assistance with understanding object files and significance statements. This has benefited the Society greatly allowing a starting point to be established for cataloguing. The Standards Program has enabled us to focus and define our goals, to update our collection policy and to implement a strategic plan.'

In 2009 the Museum Standards Program will be offered by M&GSQ in the Toowoomba region with the support of the Museum Development Officer (Southern Inland Qld).
